Primary'81 - A Closer Look

Tuesday's Primary Election, which was not as heavily voted as had been anticipated, brought a few surprises-perhaps the biggest one being the ease with which newcomer Danny Ford defeated long-time politic Money Ed Cummins for the Republican nomination for State Representative.

Ford carried all 14 county precincts and won with 3,031 votes to 1,187. In Lincoln County, Ford carried all precincts and so carried all five Pulsack is precincts. The closest race of the night developed between incumbent County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker carried six and Leonard "Roge" Hammonds carried two with DeBorde nar-

acraried two with DeBorde narrowly coming out on top by 3c votes galling 1,610 to Thacker's 1,584 and Hammonds' 1,090. DeBorde will now face Democrat Bob Jasper in the fall. Jasper beat Graydon Cummins, 494 to 45 in the democratic race for County Judge/Executive.

Lester Burns, Jr., present Commonwealth Attorney, won big in the county-polling 2,055 votes to Benny Ham's and Dale Mitchell's 751. However, in the two county's combined, Ham won by 202 votes getting 5,134 to Burns' 4,932 and Mitchell's **P\$3.61.

Although James W. Lambert chose not to run for reelection to the office of County Attorney, a Lambert will still hold that position as his son, James H. Lambert, won by 94 votes over a former county attorney, William D. Gregory.

Denver Miller, who four years ago made an unsuccessful bid for County Clerk, this time-took the measure of his three opponents and won the office of Circuit Court Clerk, Miller won big-polling 1,891 votes, to his nearest opponent, Ernest K. Stanley's 1,032.

Sheriff Henry Lee Abney is the next Jailer for the county. Abney polled 1,434 votes to Delno McClure's 1,006 and James "Doc" Brown's 863. Incumbent PVA Robert Cromer lost badly (1398) to H.E. "Elmer" Hale (2400).

In the Magistrate's race in District 1, Donald Rowe, in his first outing, won over former magistrate Chester Whitaker 255 to 186. William "Red" Swinney was third at 170 and the other six candidates for the seat each polled less than 100 votes. This race included Rollie Mulnis who died recently.

Rockcastle County no longer has a precinct in which there are more registered Democrats than Republicans, according to voter registration statistics on file in the county clerk's office.

The precinct of Brown located in the general area of Ottawa and Willailla had been the only precinct in Rockcastle County to have more Democrats registered than Republicans.

However, the great number of persons seeking magistrate in the 3rd District, of which Brown is part of, and their efforts to register to new voters caused a change that has never been as far back as most anyone can remember.

Last November in the General election Brown had 282 registered Democrats to 222 Republicans. That isn't the case now as Brown has followed in line with the rest of the County However, the great number of

and has more registered Republicans than Democrats. At primary election time, Brown had 312 Republicans to 280 Demo-

crats.
This is the first time in This is the first time in history that Brown has not been a Democratic precinct. LEGISLATIVE REPORT

During the first 100 days of the Reagan administration a commitment was made to reduce the size, and number of federal regulations

Two days after his inaugur-Two days after his maugu-ation President Reagan created the Task Force on Regulatory Review, which is headed by Vice-President Bush. To date, the Task Force has postponed 36 regulations that were issued decided and the previous administration.

Also, the Task Force designation and the previous administration.

Also, the Task Force desig-nated an additional 27 regula-tions for review by various federal agencies. In all the Task Force has served to cut the pace

of federal regulatory activity by

fifty percent.

Kentucky's state government is also overly burdened with regulations and recent actions by two legislative tees indicate that an effort to tions has hearn

is nas begun. In November of 1980, the Kentucky State Racing
Commission passed a proposed
rule aimed at banning the use of

rule aimed at banning the use of all therapeutic drugs by horses participating in races at Ken-tucky racetracks. On February 13th, 1981 the racing commission submitted the proposed regulation to the Administrative Regulation's Review subcommittee.

Review subcommittee.
On April 1st, the subcommittee unanimously rejected the racing commission's regulation on the grounds of non-conformance with legislative intent.

The subsemmittee felt that the intent of the Kentucky Revised Statute, which the intent of the Kentucky; Revised Statute, which spawned the racing commis-sion's proposed regulations, is for the racing commission to issue regulations to prohibit any improper action done for the purpose of affecting the speed or health of horses in races. And that the banning of medically accepted proper care and diagnostic medication for horses is not the statute's in-tent.

On May 8th the racing com-

On May 8th the racing commission sought to have the regulation approved by the Business Organizations and Professions Committee. The committee voted 17 to 0 to uphold the Administrative Regulations Review subcommittee's April ist ruling.

The Issue at hand is not whether the regulation is good or bad, rather the issue is should unclected officials in state agencies be allowed to set themselves above the General Assembly by making law. Based on rulings by two legislative committees addressing the issue, the answer is no.





82 Year Old Diary Reveals Much About Early Mountain Life in Appalachia

The book, "I Thunk Me a Thaut" is a reprint of a touching Thaut" is a reprint of a touching diary kept by a young Appa-lachian boy, Will McCall. The diary began on his 8th birthday in 1899 when he received a course papered writing pad from his mother, something of a luxury at the time. The diary is funny and sad, but above all, it is one of the most authentically historical flashbacks we have into the real world of Appalachia around the turn of the century.

lachia around the turn of the century. The boy's mother died and his father remarried and obviously married a loving and caring person who helped him sage money to go to school on later. It was his step mother who, years later, after Will had left the mountains, found the diary in the attic, recopied it and sent it to him. He showed it is and sent it to him. He showed it comes with the charm and beauty of the journal that they insisted on his having it reprinted.

reprinted.

It is easy to detect from the diary entries, the intelligence which lay unchallenged in the young writer whose prose imagery sounds almost like poetry.

Many times for thosewho are Many times, for those who are gifted, nothing can stand in the way of achievement, not even isolation or lack of stimulation. So it was with Will McCall, now 90 years old, retired and living in Florida. Will attended Cum-berland College and worked in the mines every other semester in order to be able to go back to college the following semester.
From there he went to Teacher's College at Columbia University College at Columbia University and stayed until he earned a doctorate degree. He remained at Teacher's College a quarter of a century and left his imprint on his profession as a teacher, re-searcher and deviser of testing instruments.

Instruments.

The years after he went to Columbia, McCall was an established figure in education, his accomplishments so distinguished that he was the third scholar after. Thorndike and Dewey to be invited to China to help modernize the education system here. He spent 1923 there overhauling and renovating the teaching method there.
