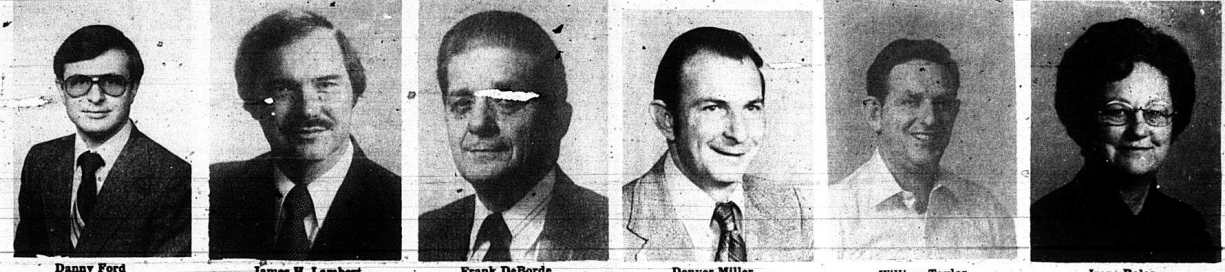

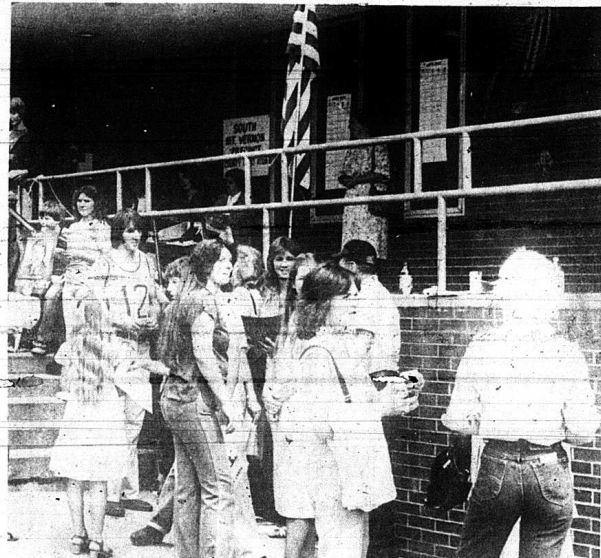

### Brown Precinct Now Republican

Rockcastle County no longer has a precinct in which there are more registered Democrats than Republicans, according to voter registration statistics on file in the county clerk's office.

The precinct of Brown located in the general area of Ottawa and Willalla had been the only precinct in Rockcastle County to have more Democrats registered than Republicans.

However, the great number of persons seeking magistrate in the 3rd District, of which Brown is part of, and their efforts to register to new voters caused a change that has never been as far back as most anyone can remember.

Last November in the General election Brown had 282 registered Democrats to 222 Republicans. That isn't the case now as Brown has followed in line with the rest of the County

and has more registered Republicans than Democrats. At primary election time, Brown had 312 Republicans to 280 Democrats.

This is the first time in history that Brown has not been a Democratic precinct. Brown is still by far the most heavily populated Democratic precinct in the county, but as Rockcastle County has little say so in what goes on in a Democrat Frankfort, Brown has little to say about what goes on in a Republican courthouse.

### Primary '81 - A Closer Look

Tuesday's Primary Election, which was not as heavily voted as had been anticipated, brought a few surprises—perhaps the biggest one being the ease with which newcomer Danny Ford defeated long-time politician Ed Cummins for the Republican nomination for State Representative.

Ford carried all 14 county precincts and won with 3,031 votes to 1,157 in Lincoln County. Ford carried all precincts but one, which he lost by 9 votes and also carried all five Pulaski precincts. Ford will now face Democrat Andy Colburn of Lincoln County in the fall.

The closest race of the night developed between incumbent County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker carried six and Leonard "Roge" Hammonds carried two with DeBorde narrowly coming out on top by 26 votes polling 1,610 to Thacker's 1,584 and Hammonds' 1,090. DeBorde will now face Democrat Bob Jasper in the fall. Jasper beat Graydon Cummins, 494 to 45 in the democratic race for County Judge/Executive.

Lester Burns, Jr., present Commonwealth Attorney, won big in the county-polling 2,055 votes to Benny Ham's and Dale Mitchell's 751. However, in the two county's combined, Ham won by 202 votes getting 5,134 to Burns' 4,932 and Mitchell's 4,936.

Although James W. Lambert chose not to run for re-election to the office of County Attorney, a Lambert will still hold that position as his son, James H. Lambert, won by 94 votes over a former county attorney, William D. Gregory.

Denver Miller, who four years ago made an unsuccessful bid for County Clerk, this time took the measure of his three opponents and won the office of Circuit Court Clerk. Miller won big-polling 1,891 votes to his nearest opponent, Ernest K. Bales' 1,032.

Incumbent County Clerk Irene Bales experienced little

trouble with her three challengers as she polled 2,155 to Harvey Pensol's 986, Jerry Carter's 749 and Freda Abney's 255.

William E. Taylor, a newcomer to politics, was successful in his race for sheriff's office which drew 10 candidates. Taylor polled more votes (1,802) than his next two opponents combined, Billy Kirby (1,015) and Oscar "Larney" Durham (724).

Sheriff Henry Lee Abney is the next Jailer for the county. Abney polled 1,434 votes to Delmo McClure's 1,006 and James "Doc" Brown's 863.

Incumbent PVA Robert Cromer lost badly (1,398) to H.E. "Elmer" Hale (2,400).

In the Magistrate's race in District 1, Donald Rowe, in his first outing, won over former magistrate Chester Whitaker 255 to 186. William "Red" Swinney was third at 170 and the other six candidates for the seat each polled less than 100 votes. This race included Rollie Mullins who died recently.

Thomas "Tom" Denney (247) won the Second Magisterial District by 64 votes over incumbent J.R. "Boone" Cromer (183). R.B. Miller was third at 119.

Eleven candidates were seeking the seat of Danny Sargent who did not run for re-election in the Third Magisterial District and A.G. "Alex" Albright emerged victorious with 214 votes to his nearest opponent's (Elmer Burdette) 128 votes. Albright will now face Democrat Deroyn "Doug" Bishop in the general election.

In the fourth district, former Magistrate, W.H. "Bill" Wren won handily, 354 votes, to Charles W. Lamb's 224 and the fifth district returned Joe Clark to the Fiscal Court by a whopping 610 votes with his nearest rival, Roy "Schooner" Lucas polling 85 votes.

Winning in the constable races were: First District, Keith Sowers; Second District, Jesse L. Baker; Third District, Lester Abner; Fourth District, William G. Cromer and Fifth

### LEGISLATIVE REPORT

During the first 100 days of the Reagan administration a commitment was made to reduce the size and number of federal regulations.

Two days after his inauguration President Reagan created the Task Force on Regulatory Review, which is headed by Vice-President Bush. To date, the Task Force has postponed 36 regulations that were issued during the final hours of the previous administration.

Also, the Task Force designated an additional 27 regulations for review by various federal agencies. In all the Task Force has served to cut the pace

of federal regulatory activity by fifty percent.

Kentucky's state government is also overly burdened with regulations and recent actions by two legislative committees indicate that an effort to reduce the rate of state regulations has begun.

In November of 1980, the Kentucky State Racing Commission passed a proposed rule indicating that the use of all therapeutic drugs by horses participating in races at Kentucky racetracks.

On February 13th, 1981, the racing commission submitted the proposed regulation to the Administrative Regulation's Review Subcommittee.

On April 1st, the subcommittee unanimously rejected the racing commission's regulation on the grounds of non-conformance with legislative intent.

The subcommittee felt that the intent of the Kentucky Revised Statute, which spanned the racing commission's proposed regulations, for the racing commission to issue regulations to prohibit any improper action done for the purpose of affecting the speed or health of horses in races. And that the banning of medically accepted proper care and diagnostic medication for horses is not the statute's intent.

On May 8th the racing commission sought to have the regulation approved by the Business Organizations and Professions Committee. The committee voted 17 to 0 to uphold the Administrative Regulations Review subcommittee's April 1st ruling.

The issue at hand is not whether the regulation is good or bad, rather the issue is should unelected officials in state agencies be allowed to set themselves above the General Assembly by making law. Based on rulings by two legislative committees addressing the issue, the answer is no.

In a similar vein, several weeks ago it was reported that the Department of Revenue was proposing administrative regulations to shorten the amount of time many retailers have to forward sales-tax receipts and withholding taxes to the state. After coming face to face with the mounting opposition, the Department of Revenue decided to withdraw the regulations.

### AIRMAN CUMMINS RECEIVES ASSIGNMENT

Air Force Airman Ralph W. Cummins, son of Lucy Z. Cummins of Route 4, Mt. Vernon, has been assigned to Keeler Air Force Base, Miss., after completing Air Force basic training.

During the six weeks at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, the airman studies the Air Force mission, organization and customs and received special training in human relations.

In addition, airman who complete basic training earn credits toward an associate degree in applied science through the Community College of the Air Force.

The airman will now receive specialized instruction in the avionics systems field.

## Sabbath or Sunday?

One of the Ten Commandments was "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy" (Ex. 20:8). This day was not given to the Gentiles but to the Jews only (Exodus 31:12-17). It was a "sign between me and you", said God to the Jews. To them this day served as a memorial of their exit from Egyptian bondage (Deut. 5:15). It was not given to ANY OTHER PEOPLE for a memorial.

Keeping the Sabbath involved obedience to the following: Do not do any work (Ex. 20:10); do not travel (Ex. 16:29); do not cook (Ex. 16:23, 29); do not build a fire (Ex. 35:3); sacrifice two lambs every Sabbath (Num. 28:9-10); Sabbath violations to be punished by death (Ex. 31:13-15). No one truly keep the Sabbath today (not even Sabbatarians).

This day, as well as the rest of the Ten Commandments was fulfilled by Jesus and was finally taken away (Matt. 5:17-18; Col. 2:14-17; 2 Cor. 3:1-16; Gal. 4:21-31). Read

in particular Paul's statement in Col. 2:16: "Let no man therefore judge you in meat, or in drink, or in respect of an holy day, or of the new moon, or of the sabbath days..."

Christians now meet for worship and to observe the memorial of the death of Christ on the "first day of the week" (Acts 20:7). This day is NEVER called "The Christian Sabbath" in the New Testament. (Sabbath means seventh or Saturday). It is ALWAYS the "Lord's day" or "the first day of the week."

We are now under the New Testament (Heb. 8:15-17; 10:1-6). The New Testament does not authorize the keeping of the Sabbath. We are complete in Christ without bits and pieces borrowed from Judaism. Let us exercise care and diligence to respect and obey the gospel. Let us with equal care resist any attempts to alter that gospel by deletions or additions (Rev. 22:18-19).

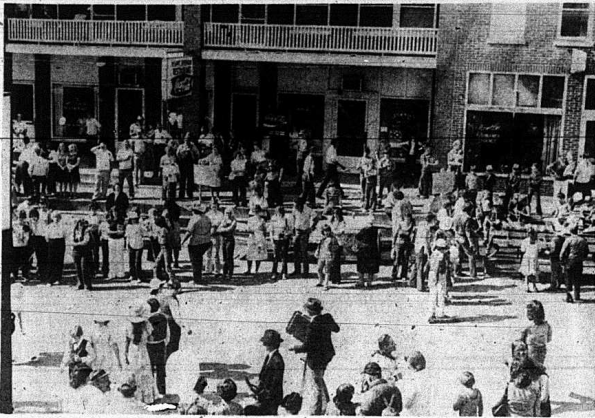

### Conference On Aging

The following is a report on the trip to the Kentucky White House Conference on Aging at Frankfort, May 18, 20, 21.

After registering in the Ramada Inn with Fran Thomas of Pineville and Hallie Smith of Barbourville, we went to Bradford Hall on one of K.S.U.'s buses for the opening ceremonies at Bradford Hall on K.S.U.'s campus, May 19th.

Fannie Dorsey, Director of Division of Aging Services of Kentucky Department for Human Resources, introduced Dr. William Butts, President of K.S.U., who gave us a hearty welcome to the university's campus.

Suzanne Turner, Commissioner of Bureau for Social Services, Kentucky Department for Human Resources, welcomed us to Frankfort, also.

Ky. Lt. Governor, Martha Lane Collins, was the speaker of the evening. When I hear and see her, I feel proud that we selected a gracious and intelligent woman to serve as Acting Governor in the absence of the Governor. She invited us to call her office at any time for any help we need.

After a thirty-minute break, The Emotion Picture Company, through a psychosocio-drama presented by seven Human Resources employees, made us think about some of the problems faced by older Kentuckians. These problems were the issue basis for the conference workshops.

Next, we were introduced to the national conference delegate nominees. Out of the 1,800 voting delegates at the 1981 White House Conference on Aging, 15 will represent Kentucky concern in Washington, D.C.

Adjournment was at 4:30 p.m.

We returned to our rooms for a rest and got dressed for the banquet at Frankfort's Civic

Center at 7 p.m. After partaking of some delicious food, Fannie B. Dorsey again introduced celebrities on the stage and Suzanne Turner introduced our keynote speaker from Eastern Kentucky, W. Grady Stumbo, M.D., Secretary, Kentucky Department for Human Resources. He gave us an updated look at what's happening in aging programs both on the state and national levels. He said Human Resources Budget will be cut by \$34.4 million. That will mean cuts in all departments in the near future.

On Wednesday, May 30, 1981, we ate breakfast at K.S.U.'s cafeteria at 7 a.m. and found the room in which our workshop was located by 8 a.m.

My workshop was called Social Service Delivery System.

Our instructor asked each of us to talk to one person sitting beside us and then introduce each other. I introduced a retired teacher from Western Kentucky. When we had introduced the 30 who had been assigned to this workshop, our instructor said, "I believe teach-

ing is a healthy job. If you're a retired teacher or school official, please raise your hand."

Over half of the people raised their hands. Then we were divided into groups of 10 to discuss Social Services and try to combine some services recommendations to Washington, as we had been told that all services would have to be cut.

I really had to keep alert as I was made reporter of my group.

After hearing the other group's recommendations, we come up with this: Combined Services—Medical, Medicaid, mental, home health, nutrition; Financial: social security, S.S.I., unemployment insurance, section VIII, food stamps, weatherization, legal services; Supportive: transportation, outreach, information and referral; protective.

We had some hot discus-

sions! One young Human Resource employee looked at us and asked, "What do you expect us to give you when we won't have it to give?"

A co-worker of his replied, "You won't have to worry about that then as you or I won't have a job at that time."

We were dismissed one hour for lunch and adjourned at 4:30 p.m. It was a long work day for me but very informative.

On Thursday, May 21, 1981 after breakfast at 8 a.m., everyone met at Bradford Hall for a general session for the 12 workshop reports and election results for those chosen to go to the White House in November.

Adjournment was at 11:30 a.m. when the 1,800 delegates returned to their homes from all over Kentucky.

By reporting on this Kentucky White House Conference, I hope others will be interested in attending this conference

next year and have Rockcastle County represented by more than just one person. Remember that we are the State if we make enough noise otherwise the governor is the State!

# 82 Year Old Diary Reveals Much About Early Mountain Life in Appalachia

By Nancy Mullins

The book, "I Think Me a Thaut" is a reprint of a touching diary kept by a young Appalachian boy, Will McCall. The diary began on his third birthday in 1869 when he received a course papered writing pad from his mother, something of a luxury at the time. The diary is funny and sad, but above all, it is one of the most authentically interesting flashbacks we have into the real world of Appalachia around the turn of the century.

The boy's mother died and his father remarried and obviously married a loving and caring person who held him safe money to go to school on later. It was his step mother who, years later, after Will had left the mountains, found the diary in the attic, recopied it and sent it to him. It showed it to his wife and his friends. It was so taken with the charm and beauty of the journal that they insisted on his having it reprinted.

It is easy to detect from the diary entries, the intelligence which lay unchallenged in the young writer whose prose imagery sounds almost like poetry. Many times, for those who are gifted, nothing can stand in the way of achievement, not even isolation or lack of stimulation. So it was with Will McCall, now 90 years old, retired and living in Florida. Will attended Cumberland College and worked in the mines every other semester in order to be able to go back to college the following semester. From there went to Teacher's College at Columbia University and stayed until he earned a doctorate degree. He remained at Teacher's College a quarter of a century and left his imprint on his profession as a teacher, researcher and deviser of testing instruments.

Ten years after he went to Columbia, McCall was an established figure in education, his accomplishments so distinguished that he was the third scholar after Thorndike and Dewey to be invited to China to help modernize the education system here. He spent 1923 there overhauling and renovating the teaching method there.

MY BIRTHDAY. 8 year old. Ma nit me gluv. Pa git drunk. Beet me fur ny nuthin. Ma tride to stop him. He hit her. Just fur that that may be I kill him soon day.

Ma give me ritin book to. Ma sez sez she Willie you rite real purty. So thank me a thaut. I will rite ever thing I do. Show sum of hit to May. But not all.

AFTER SUNDAY CHURCH weuns all go eat at Ebenezer. Precherman and all decurs. Rite dab in midel of tabel wuz apple of my eye. Jist 1 big custurd pie. Im hog bout custurd pie. The wuzent nary a cake. So thank me a thaut.

When blessin wuz amend the Ebenezer wuzm sez reel sweet what I want. I sez sez I custurd pie. She cut me pec. What that wuz gome. She sez reel sweet what I want. I sez sez I custurd pie. Ma scols and give me that that look duble. I get pec. Pec git litle and litle. I eat all that that custurd pie.

When we git home Ma shoke me and sez sez she I never did in all my mortife in all my life. I hat to mortify Ma but I like custurd pie.

I JUST LOVE UNCEL JOHN. Ever singin and laffin and makin jokes wuz my molly. Maest tell his millpond. Fly kept on a keepin on bother my ear. Slapped at hit time and time again. Do you know what. Uncel John wuz ticklin my ear with fether.

He had some candy in paper bag. Give me pec. Then sprink sum green stuff on rest. I sez sez I what wuz that fur? He didn't say but askd me to take candy across creek to Nancy. I wuz glad to take candy across creek for Nancy air red purty with purty red hair. 16 years old. She air awful good to me. Saves peeces of cake fur me.

Asks folks bout Uncel John. When I give her candy she give me pec. I sez sez I no. She sez first time she ever seed me sez sez candy. Why? She wuzm and wuzm hit out me. She git mad as all get out. Sez iffen he wants her he gotta cum across. That thar made no sense to me fur he go across creek 3 times aweek to see her.

UNCLE JOHN AND NANCY WUZ HITCHED TODAY. Ater supper I went down to see em. Door wuz locked. I nocked nocked nock. No door. I nocked nocked nock. No door. I knod that wuz one fur I food heer em being still inside.

When hit wuz dark fur a long time Pa and we went to see Uncel John and Nancy. Pa tuk his shot gun. I tuk the bell from our old cow. What a moule we had. May be a hole hole full of beer. I wuznt last. Buuh. I did not like hit I bit.

NANCY AINT HALF AS GOOD TO ME NOW as she used to be. Uncel John plays with her more now than he plays with me. Dont want to go fishin nary nuthin. Wuz hed left off gittin mad.

HOWE AND ME. MAKE MONEY sellin books. Trained miles and miles. Sold nary a book. On way back B heard Ant Alice a callin him. He called back. She screemed her wuz goin to git the whippin of his life. He wodnt tell me why. We got a grandmas. I turned in thar. B begged and begged me to go up hill with him. I just coodnt see him whipped when I wodnt be whipped. Hit tore my hart not gain all the way with him. Put fingers in my ears when I hear screams begin. I aint nevur nevur nevur ever furgit them screams. Ill go all by myself and dig ginseng fur us both.

I HAVE COLD SUMPIN GOSHAWFUL. Gof hit from top to bottom. Docter cum. Belly-laffed at me. He wodnt laff iffen he had my cold. Give me sum white pills. No mattr how hard I try I cant keep em down. Upbeck upbeck all the time. I sez wuful sweet. Pats her hand on my forid when I leen over to puke.

WHEN NANCY WENT TO SCHOOL she wuz good at books. Larned lots of jawbraker words. When Ma asks her is hit yit Nancy sez sez she no I must be impregnable. I asked Nancy what impregnable meens. She sez you will find out sum day. Hit makes me madum all git out the way growupn keep saying that to me.

Today in english class I asked teacher what impregnable meens. He looked pins at me and sez he hits a dirty word and Ill whup you iffen I hear you. I hear screams words. B bout that big word. We collect dirty words and cuss words.

WUZ SLIPPIN THRU LAUREL looking for a squirt to shoot. Cam on Uncel John who begin to run. Seed me. Sward me never ever to tell. Made me pardner in moon shine still Uncel John used corn he tuk in tole. Had still in woods up above den. Put moon shine in jars. Hid em in bushes near Four Mile Baptist Church. Sold jars at church on Sun days.

Then come big game at church. 2 precherman preachin at same time. Lots of wimmin shoutin. We wuz makin money hand over fist. Lots of men got rejilin. I of em ratted on Uncel John. Mean renoovers come sniffin. Fould our gold mine. Ma made me stay home. Uncel John toled us they chapped holes in still. How whiskey run down in mill pond. He sayd fish jumped outta water and run round in circle.

BAREFOOT HEEL BRUZED EVER STONE IN ROAD. One stone bruzed back. Now I got stone bruzed. Today cooled heel in creek while precherman baptized saved to wash sins away. Men was dunked eys when precherman bent em be. Ever I come up stranglin. Precherman too litle to baptize. Layed big fat woin. Coodnt lift her up. She grabbed him to git back up and him and

her both was baptized. Folks laffer. Uncle John air a stinner but he jumped in and saved the saved.

I heard prechman preach that sins air scarlet. I know whut scarlet meens. Hits juts a hifalootin word for red. Ever time precherman pushed em down I looked for red streak in wuz. Precherman preaches that wimmin sids air redder than mensins. But nary woinm showed aery red streak.

I woidin mind aery b't been baptized iffen I cood take off my shirt and pants. But I dont want to be saved. No sur. The saved caint have aery more fur a tall.

CHUM CHARLES GIT MEZZLES. Docter sayd give him fryd eggs and lemunade. May my shirt and water jist to hear bout hit. I think and think how he had Easter and July 4 ever day. My folks wodnt let me see Charles. But I wanted meezles. Sneaked in and had him, blow bresh in my mouth. Now Im all speckled with specks. Bring on your fryd eggs and lemunade.

SUNDAY PA WENT OVER MOUNTAIN to Capasheen creek. No Pa. Ma wuznt and wuznt. Hit was awful cold. Snow was deep. Ma think he might be drunk and sleepin on the mountain.

I lit lantern and went part way up mountain. Had to feel with my feet for path under snow. Found a sleepin sound. Coodnt wake him. He shore wud freeze to deuth up neck. Hanged lantern round my neck.

Tuk Pas 2 hands and drug him home. Pas had and bottom was sore for days. Ma rubbed liniment on the 2.

TEACHER KEEPS ME ATTER SCHOOL high ever day. Larns me high school lessins. I larn em reel easy. I could larn with him for ever. Lones me books so I dont have to feel from May any more. Sayd Wild Bill and Mick are for kids but not for me. Loned me book called Ismael Worth. Grippid my teeth so hard when readin hit they felt sore. Think me a thaut. Ill do whut that thar kid did.

Mister Worley asked me why I got low marks in conduct. Told him I wuznt bad at first. Told him old teacher sayd I fond faces at boys and girls. I never made nary a face.

ATTER SCHOOL Mister Worley asked me to head still and look at the right then left. Then he toled me sumpin I never, ever knowed afore. Sayd when I looked to left my left eye stayd still. Sayd I was makin faces. Show me how always to turn my head when lookin left. Well whut do you know.

SUMMER HAINT SUMMERS ELZ. My nose air on fire. Ma gits sick and well and sick and well. Docter sayd it was cumphusin.

In Jellico store is the purt-yest pink dress I ever did see. I want hit for Mas birthday. I asked clurk how much. He sayd 2 dollars and 60 cents. I can get that by pickin and sellin 25

gallins of black berry. Folks furgat about old feeld way up old loggin road. Hits a long way up mountain and heavy carry back. Knees git wobbly. Carryin load down hill. But feeld air black with berry.

Weeks of pickin on Saturday and I had me 2 dollers and 10 cents. On my way down mountain I go under a big oak lim stretchin strade across road. Was under that thar lim when I looked up. Layin on that lim sound asleep was a big painter. I run frunt cause I can run frunt faster back. Run on my bare tiptoes softer aery fether on aery ducks feet. When runnin soun-my head all the way back to watch that thar painter. Haf my berryrs was spilled down that thar road.

May was sweet. Sayd she pay me the rest of the 2 dollers and 50 cents iffen I wodnt go back up that thar mountain agin. I says I wuznt scared of aery old painter. Made her beg awful hard for I knowed the wuznt stop begrin. But I didnt want

her mony. Picked little berryrs to hit to home. I'd be richem all git out iffen I could sell ever chigger bite for 10 cents.

WHEN I GIVE MA THAT PURTY DRESS she oched, and ached and smiled in my eyes the way she shoed and mused my mused hair more.

A MINER PULLING STUMPS DIDNT GET OUT fast enuf. Mountain fell on him. Mashed him flat as pancakes. Docter Gatliff rich mine owner come to funeral on Sunday. Teacher was with him. Hooked finger at me. Sayd Docter Gatliff wanted to go fishin next day in Clear Fork river. Sayd he would pay me penny for aery wurm I digged for him. Thank me a thaut.

Took him 2 dollars Monday. Merxy he sayd. Asked how many. Merxy 2947 counted 2 times. Stopped me when I started to count him for him. I sayd stop begrin. But I didnt want

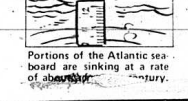

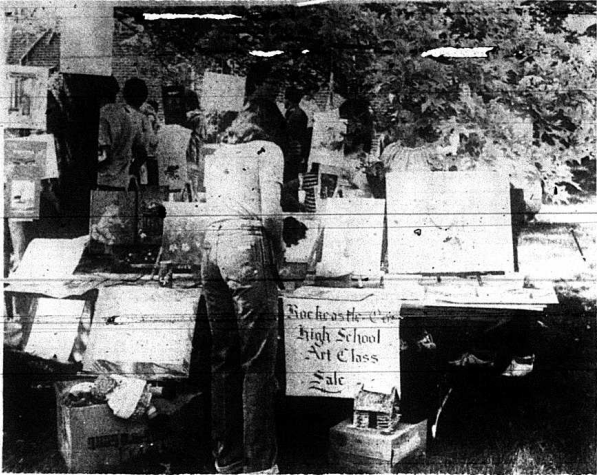
**LYNN BIVINS RECEIVES SCHOLARSHIP**

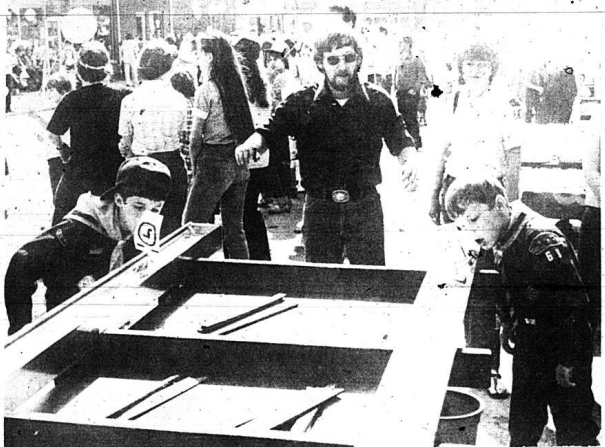
