The Charm of the Rural Post Office

In an overview of American history, regional rural post of-fices which were established around the turn of the century, had a relatively short life span. Although there are seven or so now left in the county, before 1950 there were more than 35. With increased mobility brought about by the car and improved roads plus a dimin-ished rural population, the de-pendence upon the rural post offices as a means of communicating with the outside world lessened.

cating with the outside world lessened.

According to Claude Gil-liam of Lamero, it was around 1919 that many of the post offices in the area sprung up. In order to get a post office, application had to be made to the postal department, usually with a required number of signatures. The department then sent out inspectors if there was any question as to whether an office in that location was justified. Most often the post office thingle hung over a store from the continuous continuous departments of the continuous departments. The post office as is more often the case now.

The post office-store usual-

The post office-store usual ly was assured of doing a good ly was assured of doing a good business since many people pre-ferred making one stop or one trip take care of most needs. The store usually carried groceries, hardware, farm tools, feed and sometimes clothing.

The post office often was the place for local news gathering and rumor swaping. During war times folks made more frequent trips to the nost office to

quent trips to the post office to wait for news from family mem-bers or friends. They shared what they had learned from a

what they had learned from a radio, newspaper or a letter about the progress of the war. In winter, when farmers had more leisure time, the local post office and general store with its red-hot, pot-bellied stove, rough wooden benches and the promise of some conver-

sation became the popular place sation became the popular place to go. Storytelling, trading, teasing, whittling, smoking, chewing and spitting and in later years listening to the radio or playing a game of checkers drew the area residents.

The job of post master or post mistress is a federal gov-ernment job and many times re-

mained in the family for more than one generation. The Disputanta post office in the northern part of the county, for instance, was in the Payne family for several years. The Brodhead post office was for many years held by members of the Owens family and the Wildie office which
