## Board Names Transportation Dir.; Payne and Van Winkle Transferred

The local Board of Education met in regular session Tuesday night and filled the position of Transportation Director. Transportation Director, Earl Whitaker, Bigg Towery, Jr., principal at Brodhead Elementary was placed in the Central Office position and will assume the duties of Whitaker which revolve around supervising the busing program. His salary reportedly will not change.

Tom Payne was transferred to the position of principal at Brodhead Elementary. Payne is presently principal at Roundstone Elementary.

Payne's vacancy at Roundstone was filled by Glen Van Winkle, history teacher at RCHS.

Mr. Parsons, school superintendent explained to the board that there were several persons in the county who had principalship certificates, but they were qualified for secondary position rather than elementary.

Preston Parrett met with the board and passed along a request that the board give the high school basketball coaches

permission to practice earlier and later in the season than they are now being allowed to practice. The board agreed to let basketball practice begin as soon as school gets organized in the fall and continue, if desired, until school is out.

Dwight Griffin of Mt. Vernon, the low bid of \$1,750 to do the general yearly audit of the financial records of the school system. J. Courtney Horton, who is with an auditing firm from Mt. Sterling, was underbid by \$150. It is the first time in at least 12 years that the firm has not done the audit.

In other business the board voted to accept the resignation of Mrs. Elaine Coleman as

teacher at Mt. Vernon Elementary and to hire Beverly Owens as special education teacher upon completion of state requirements.

G.E.D. certificates were approved for Mary H. Gadd, Samuel J. Hicks, Patricia D. Kates, Delores Stevens McClure, John Allen Mitchell and Janet Louise Souder.

Pauline Mullins, Garian Cummins and Shirley Mullins were appointed audit committee to audit school lunchroom accounts and elementary school financial records. No mention was made of auditing high school financial records.

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## Council Asks Hoskins to Vacate

The Mt. Vernon City Council will be looking for a new tenant at the boat dock on Lake Linville if Sterling Hoskins will comply with the council's request that he voluntarily leave the premises within thirty days due to alleged illegal activities.

At a special called meeting of the council on Thursday night the council decided to authorize City Attorney Carl Clontz to write Mr. Hoskins, present operator of the boat dock, a letter requesting that he voluntarily vacate the premises within the thirty day period.

In other business, Jerry Makin asked the council that if

## County "Finally" Buys Building; Now Has Garbage Contract

By a vote of 3 to 2 and one abstention, the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court voted to purchase the old Dinner Bell building from Howard Saylor and Cleston Saylor for the amount of \$52,000 at their regular monthly meeting Tuesday.

The building will be used for the new county health department and the home health agency. Along with the \$52,000 for the purchase of the building it will cost the county approximately \$70,000 to renovate the building.

Magistrate Joe Clark put the motion on the floor to purchase the building and Danny Sargent seconded it. "We'll just lose the money," Clark said. "It's a grant and we can't use it for anything else."

Magistrate J.R. Cromer and Magistrate Frank DeBorde vote no. Cromer said that there had not been a Ky. Stone bill paid since the first of the year and he felt these matters should be taken care of first. DeBorde said that he didn't know that

the Fiscal Court had agreed to buy the property in the first place.

Magistrate Amos Burdette sustained causing a tie in the voting which was broken by Judge Thacker who voted in favor of the purchase.

The court also voted to continue the garbage contract with William K. Bullen until January 1st, 1982. The contract had been expired since March.

The Fiscal Court also voted to tentatively approve the Budget for the 1981-82 Fiscal year subject to approval in Frankfort. Magistrate DeBorde asked for a copy of the budget and Judge Thacker told DeBorde he would receive one after it was brought back from Frankfort. The Fiscal Court must approve the budget again before it can go into effect.

## The Charm of the Rural Post Office

In an overview of American history, regional rural post offices which were established around the turn of the century, had a relatively short life span. Although there are seven or so now left in the county, before 1950 there were more than 100. With increased mobility brought about by the car and improved roads plus a diminished rural population, the dependence upon the rural post offices as a means of communicating with the outside world lessened.

According to Claude Gilliam of Lameroy, it was around 1919 that many of the post offices in the area sprung up. In order to get a post office, application had to be made to the postal department, usually with a required number of signatures. The department then sent out inspectors if there was any question as to whether an office in that location was justified.

Most often the post office shingle hung over a store front. That was not always the case, however, for sometimes a dwelling with a room used to store mail was the setting for a post office as is more often the case now.

The post office store usually was assured of doing a good business since many people preferred making one stop or one trip take care of most needs. The store usually carried groceries, hardware, farm tools, feed, seed and sometimes clothing.

The post office often was the place for local news gathering and rumor swapping. During war times folks made more frequent trips to the post office to wait for news from family members or friends. They shared what they had learned from a radio, newspaper or a letter about the progress of the war.

In winter when farmers had more leisure time, the local post office and general store with its red-hot, pot-bellied stove, rough wooden benches and the promise of some conver-

sation became the popular place to go. Storytelling, trading, teasing, whittling, smoking, chewing and spitting and in later years listening to the radio or playing a game of checkers drew the area residents.

The job of post master or post mistress is a federal government job and many times re-

mained in the family for more than one generation. The Disputants post office in the northern part of the county, for instance, was in the Payne family for several years. The Brodhead post office was for many years held by members of the Owens family and the Wilde office which





She was tired of lying in the same position for a short while, but she could not turn over and change her position by herself. Someone had to do it for her.

It was then that I actually realized that we could come and go and wish them well and touch their lives; but Debbie and her family live it day after day and night after night. Then I thought, "What can we do to help?" We all could do more to make life a little more cheerful. 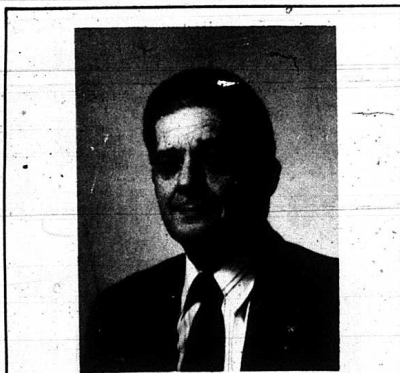

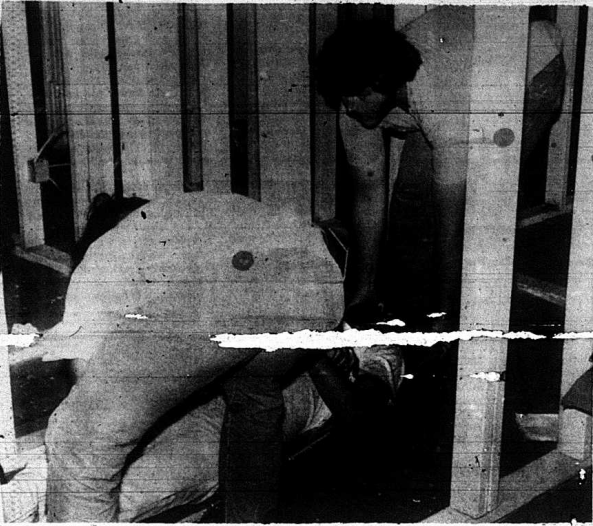

was run for years by W.L. Hiatt now run by Jan Stevens, his son-in-law.

Many post offices have unique names. Three Links, a post office run by John Luther Phillips in later years, has its name origin associated with a lodge which was located there whose emblem reportedly had 3 links in it.

One favorite way of arriving at a name for a location for a post office if the area was not already named, was to name it for someone living in the area.

Boone post office, last run by Mrs. Casper McCracker, was no doubt named for Boone's Gap where Daniel Boone trekked.

Meteburg took its name from Col. James Meark, a prominent resident of the area. That name was run by Grace Gomerum. Wabed was named for W.A.B. Davis, an early resident of that area. Mrs. Bradley Taylor ran this post office more recently from her two story house on Highway 461. Withers, whose last post master was Estil Mullins, was at Mullins Station and was named for an old man Withers who lived there when the railroad came through.

Some names such as Level Green, Sand Springs, Pine Hill, Horse Lick, Jep Hill, and Quail perhaps came from geographical features or nature's abundance.

Names such as Billows, Lamer, Spire, Bloss, Well Hope and Conway are intriguing ones and no doubt have interesting stories behind their origins.

Of the rural post offices, only Wildie, Lamer, Renfro Valley, Conway, Climax, Johnetta and Orlando remain.

Renfro Valley post office which used to be hidden behind the museum and radio station, is now located in plain view from U.S. 25 beside the gift shop. According to present post mistress, Betty Sue VanWinkle, the post office serves 45 residents. No business is run in conjunction with this post office. Former post mistresses include Mrs. John Lair and Mrs. Louie Kelsey. Renfro Valley was named for a family who lived in the area years ago.

William Kenneth Vanzant is post master at Orlando. The office has two star delivery routes and serves a total of 338 families. Twenty-three residents pick up their mail at the Orlando post office in the Vanzant residence. Mr. Vanzant was postmaster for 24 years. Before he took the Civil Service Examination to qualify for the job, Myrtle Burnett had had the post office with a general store at Brush Creek for 23 years. Before her, L.J. Reams was post master for Orlando.

Lamer was named for a Mr. Clarence Lamerax, of the area, a Frenchman whose name was pronounced the way it is now spelled. The first post mistress in 1922 when the post office was established was Mr. Lamerax's wife, Charollette. Following her tenure was Nora Coldiron and then Myrtle Gilliam. Mrs. Elsie Jones, Mrs. Gilliam's daughter now is post mistress and runs a store. Mrs. Jones mentions the fact that Lamerax post office is very unique in that it has been located in two counties-Laurel (41 years) and Rockcastle. It is now in Rockcastle, but is still close to the Laurel County line and serves 22 families, some of them in Laurel.

Johnetta is another post office named for someone. In that instance it was two first names, John and Etta (Ballinger), which were combined to form the name of the location. Gladys Morris is post mistress at Johnetta. Twelve families get their mail now at this residence office. Tom Owens who died recently was post master before Mrs. Morris.

Wildie post office, name for two brothers, Will and Dee Albright, now serves about 700 families. Jan Stevens, post master, is in the process of taking out the old oak mail boxes and replacing them with new lock boxes. His father-in-law, Mr. W.L. Hiatt who was post master for 31 years also ran a store, as does Jan, and as did Mr. Hiatt's predecessor, Mr. Joe Bullens. Mr. Bullens' store was located in a different building up the road from the present location. Mr. Hiatt told us that before Mr. Bullens, an Uncle Henry Woods and his wife served as postal officials for years by trading the office back and forth. That was, according to Mr. Hiatt, "back when the job was political, you know what I mean" (and I did). She was registered a Democrat and he was registered a Republican, so that when "politics" changed, they simply switched positions and thus kept it in the family for years.

The Conway office serves about 57 families and for years a store was run in conjunction with the post office, but for the last 8 years Willard Wynn has run the post office from his residence. Ida Miracle and Lloyd Towery were in the office before Mr. Wynn.

Mrs. Virgil Mullins, post mistress at Climax post office said that she had heard two stories about how the post office got its name. Some say the name came from the fact that two roads came into the area and here, but Mrs. Mullins said that U.G. Baker told her that he helped name the post offices, including Climax, by drawing the names out of a hat. The Climax post office serves about 25 families and is now located in Mrs. Mullins' residence. Plans are to build a small office near her home.

Catherine Moore is the first post mistress Mrs. Mullins recalls followed by Beverly "Doc" Moore, her son. Henry Anglin preceded Mrs. Mullins as post master of Climax.

Boone, Billows, Gauley, Buman, Disputant, Burr, Pine Hill, Horse Lick, Hummed, Ottawa, Quail, Willalla, Bloss,

Hansford, Level Green, Lumer Mareburg, Sand Springs, Spire, Wabed, Well Hope, Jep Hill, Three Links and Withers have closed within the last 40 years.

So rural post offices are like front porch swings, ice cream socials and wind-up victrolas-there aren't many of them any more. In a few years we will have to stay in our children and grandchildren, "Now you age they had these rural post offices..."

The board approved advertising for sealed bids for yearbooks, monograph and duplicator paper, school furniture and other necessary supplies. Also approved at a cost of \$900 was a treasurer's bond in the amount of \$380,000 for Lloyd Shuttis by Norton Insurance Agency.

The board is changing the 10 telephones and equipment now located in the central office for \$2,044.77. This will, according to Mr. Parsons, cut the monthly bill from \$283.10 to \$168.40 the board opted to chance the first year under the new ownership without a \$40.00 a month service contract.

Mr. Parsons reported that all schools, with the exception of Blue Springs, received a standard rating and are fully accredited by the State Department of Education.

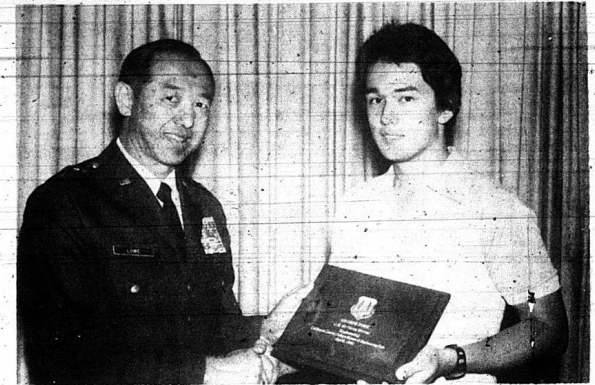

A spokesperson for the Road Cross Chapter of the county came before the court and asked if they could help them out with a little money. The court voted unanimously to give the chapter \$500.

The Fiscal Court also voted to give Road Supervisor Paul Hansel authority to sell the used tires at the county garage, which can be used.

Along with the election of officers who were raised from \$20.00 a day to the \$30.00 the election commissioners will also be raised to \$30.00 a day. Joe Clark made a motion and Judge Thacker seconded it. Boone Cromer voted no and the rest of the magistrates sustained.

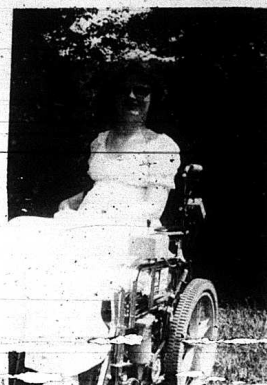

### JUNE IS DAIRY MONTH

Milk is always a good buy, and when the nutritional content is compared to the price, it is an exceptional value.

This year milk is even in greater supply than the usual peak of production. Production of milk and other dairy pro-

ducts are at an all time high. Many stores are offering good buys on milk, so now is a good time to enjoy it and include plenty of milk in your family meals.

Milk's importance to the human diet has been recognized since prehistoric times. American settlers moving West found the dairy cow was a mobile food factory. Since that time, dairying has become a highly technical, mechanized industry. Single dairy herds consist of hundreds of cows milked mechanically. Milk is stored in refrigerated tanks, processed, sealed in sanitary containers,

and delivered to doorstep or supermarket dairy case, only coming in contact with air as consumers open carton. This modern technology has given milk a 7-day shelf life.

Milk and other dairy products are excellent sources of protein, calcium and B vitamins. Whole milk is rich in vitamins A and D and most low-fat milk products are fortified with vitamin D.

Try using milk in shakes and other beverages, custards and puddings, cheese cakes, homemade ice cream, dressings and dips and cream gravies.

**Green Magic Cow Shake**  
2 teaspoons pre-sweetened lime drink mix  
1 cup cold milk  
1 scoop vanilla ice cream

Place all ingredients in blender and mix well. Makes 1 serving. Note: for orange, purple, red, or pink magic cow, vary the flavor of drink mixes.

**Bread Pudding**  
½ cup sugar  
¼ teaspoon cinnamon  
¼ teaspoon salt  
2 eggs  
1 quart (4 cups) fluid milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
8 slices bread, cut in cubes  
½ cup seedless raisins  
2 tablespoons butter, melted

Mix sugar, cinnamon and salt in a large bowl. Beat in eggs and slowly stir in milk and vanilla. Stir in bread cubes, raisins and butter. Pour into 9-inch square pan. Bake at 350 degrees for about 1 hour until knife stuck near center comes out clean. Makes 6-one cup servings.

- 1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened

## Robert Robinson Resumes Position

Col. Robert E. Robinson, Rt. 3, Brodhead, has been reappointed District Court Trial Commissioner for Rockcastle County by Chief District Judge Walter Flippin Maguire. Judge Robinson, who has served as Rockcastle County's only Trial Commissioner until his resignation for the office of Circuit Court Clerk in the recent Republican primary, resumed his prior duties Friday, May 29. In announcing Judge Robinson's reappointment, Judge Maguire expressed his genuine appreciation for the interest shown by other Rockcastle residents in the position of District Court Trial Commissioner. "When Judge Robinson elected to resign and seek the Circuit Clerk's office, I contacted the attorneys in Mt. Vernon and notified the Signal of Judge Robinson's resignation in hopes of generating interest in the position of Trial Commissioner. The attorneys either were not in a position to serve or felt they could not serve and continue in their private practices. I did have one letter of application and three or four personal contacts prior to the primary. Some of those who expressed an interest or in whom I expressed an interest were candidates and as a result of that situation Judge Venters and I felt it appropriate to withhold an appointment until after the primary. I must confess that Judge Robinson's decision to seek the Circuit Clerk's position left me with mixed feelings at the time of his resignation. I felt he would do a good job as Clerk but I also knew what an outstanding and dedicated job he had done for the people and for the District Court as Trial Commissioner. Those who have written or contacted me by phone or in person, and those whom I sought out as potential candidates for the Trial Commissioner's position are among the finest citizens in our country, and all of us are indebted to them for their interest and concern," Judge Maguire said.

"The position of Trial Commissioner, like that of District Judge, is a twenty-four hour a day job with a good deal of inconvenience and heart rending situations. The \$7,200 annual salary is meager compensation for the responsibilities involved. As a retired person, Judge Robinson is able to give persistent attention to the job, and I am very pleased that he has agreed to resume the duties of this demanding position. Of those who filed written letters of application with me, only Judge Robinson is a retired person, and while separate employment is not prohibited, I am confident that Judge Robinson will have more time to give to this duties and I know he has served tirelessly in the past and that he will continue to work for the citizens of Rockcastle County with fairness and dedication," Judge Maguire noted.

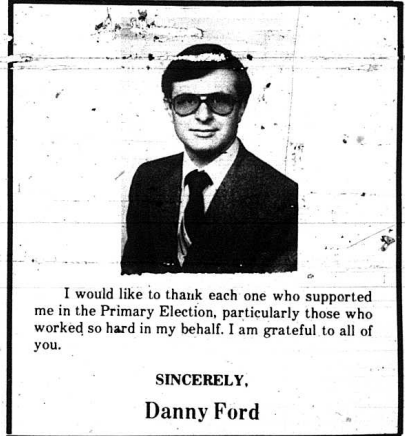

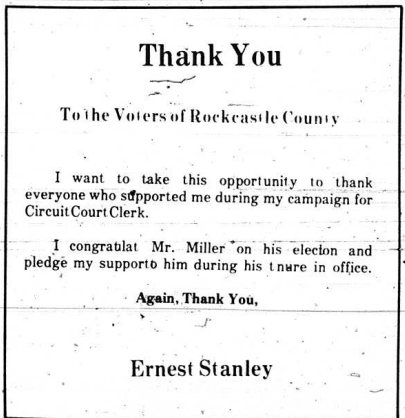

The Rockcastle County Chapter of the DAR met Tuesday night May 12 in the Community Room of the Rockcastle Co. Library.

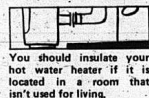
