These residents returned to their flooded trailers in Cox's Trailer Park Saturday afternoon to find out the extent of damage caused by the flash flooding. Five trailers were flooded when waters rose above the tops of automobiles. One woman reported that she was unaware of what was happening until she

heard a thumping noise and when she investigated found that water had risen and had turned over her gas tanks. She then notified other trailer park residents who later reported having lost much of their household belongings.

Persistent and Heavy Rains Cause Damage

The rain "poured and spilled" Friday night and all day Saturday, dumping 3.59 inches of rain on the already saturated ground. During a 33 hour period from 11:00 p.m. Friday to 8:00 a.m. Sunday.

Tuesday, June 2, .08 inches fell. The following Wednesday, .27 inches fell according to official weather recorder, Bud Cox, and Thursday, .13 inches fell bringing to 4.06 inches the total rain fall for the first 6 days in June.

The preceding month was a wet one also with 7.95 inches of rain falling during that 31 day period.

The six weeks of rainy weather has put crops, which were extremely affected by the lack of rain last year, in jeopardy again. According to Harold Ballinger of the local ASC office, numerous problems have arisen for farmers due to the damp conditions and the washing rains.

Ballinger says that he knows of only one person who got wet without it getting wet. He estimated that only 1% of the hay crop has been cut and that hay losses are estimated at

\$250,000. Small grains including wheat have suffered also from the step rains. Many cases rust, is setting in. Wheat losses are estimated to be \$10,000.

"It is really getting late for corn," said Mr. Ballinger Monday. About 25% of this year's crop is not in the ground yet. Usually by this time all of the corn crop in the county has been planted. Corn losses according to the ASC office tabulation are about \$500,000.

Many farmers who had their tobacco patch set-out Friday when the deluge came had the entire crop destroyed. Robert Cromer reportedly lost his entire crop of 8 or 9 acres plus some plant beds. The big cash crop may suffer again this year, as it did year before last, from Blue Mold, a plant disease that typically thrives in humid weather. May 30 through June 15 is the time when most farmers set tobacco plants, so there is some time left for farmers before plants get too big. Ballinger estimates that 30-35% of the tobacco remains to be set because the tobacco patch has been

Flood Main Topic of Council Meeting

Flooding, water and sewer rate increases and the hiring of another policeman were the main items on the agenda at Monday night's regular monthly meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council.

About 30 residents of Valley Manor Subdivision were on hand to talk to the council about their problem with water whenever a heavy rain occurs. Saturday, about 8 to 10 homes were flooded due to the heavy rain and the council talked with the

residents at some length to try and determine what might have caused the water to not drain off as rapidly as it usually does. Speculation by the residents ranged from the culvert under the road leading down to the library being blocked by a storage trailer swept off its foundation by the flood; to a sinkhole that usually carries off a great deal of the water not doing its normal job; to the possibility that the clearing of a field about the subdivision contributed to the problem.

Residents told the council

of continual problems with water - even in not so heavy rains. One resident said that the sewer line stayed uncovered because of the dirt over it being washed off whenever it rains. Several complained about bad erosion of their yards and continual damage to gardens due to rain.

The council agreed to hire an engineer to make a study as to what might be the primary cause of the frequent flooding and what steps can be taken to alleviate the problem. The council also decided to try and

A Man and His Garden

Soft-spoken, unobtrusive, Mr. Elige Woodall can be found these days sitting out back of his house on Williams Street in his chair looking out over his rank and growing garden. Mr. Woodall does more supervising and observing now than in times past because he admits to having "smothering spells".

Like many of us who enjoy bragging on our garden or getting ahead of the neighbor's garden, Mr. Woodall has for

years enjoyed the challenge and has been able, with few exceptions, to have the earliest garden, the prettiest garden and the most productive garden in town.

The Woodalls own what amounts to about 3 or 4 large town lots and he says that they have been offered "big prices" from people who want to buy, but, he says he would never even consider selling his place. The Woodalls bought the property from Dr. Monroe Pennington in the early 1940's after they had rented it for over 14 years.

This year a large portion of the tillable land (2 big gardens) lies fallow due in part to Mr. Woodall's failing health. He says that without the help of David, his grandson, to do the strenuous work such as running the roto tiller, he would not be able to grow his garden this year.

Unlike most town gardens, Mr. Woodall's is more than a source of food supply for his family and more than a hobby; it is a cash crop for him. He has seen the time when he sold 200-300 dozen ears of corn a season. One year he made \$150 from the sale of corn alone and that was when he had a full-time job and sold corn for 50 cents a dozen. Now he gets \$1.00 a dozen and sometimes sells as many as 25-30 dozen ears to one customer.

This year he planted his corn about the first of April and has 15 rows, much of which he plans to sell. In more recent years, the summer income from the garden has amounted to from between 150-200 dollars. He sells everything and anything he grows in abundance, including tomatoes, potatoes (which he says are already as big as goose eggs), cabbage, squash, beans, greens and peas. This year Mr. Woodall pointed out that he has something growing in his garden that most people don't have-two or three kinds of herbs-including a large clump of horseradish.

Perhaps one reason for Mr. Woodall's tremendous garden success is his fearless determination to get his garden planted early (We of his neighbors call it getting the jump on us). When most people are still shivering their heads declaring that frost will surely kill beans planted before the 15th of April, Mr. Woodall has beans 2 inches high.

Scouts Trapped in Sinks Cave

Six Boy Scouts and three Scout leaders, all from the Cincinnati area, were trapped in the Sinks Cave at Mullins Station all night Saturday night by rising water from the heavy rains.

The group went into the cave sometime Saturday afternoon to explore it and became trapped by the high water. One of the Scouts swam out of the cave early Sunday morning and told Otis Howard, mine security officer at Tennecco Mine, that the group was trapped. Howard said the Scout grabbed an inner tube and went back into the cave.

Howard called the Police around 6:30 a.m. and, when police and rescue units from Garrard County and Madison County responded to the call, they found that the road leading to the cave at Mullins Station was blocked by a mud slide. The rescue units then proceeded to Brush Creek in hopes of getting into the cave from the other side of the hill. However, when rescue units got about 3 miles from the cave on the other side,

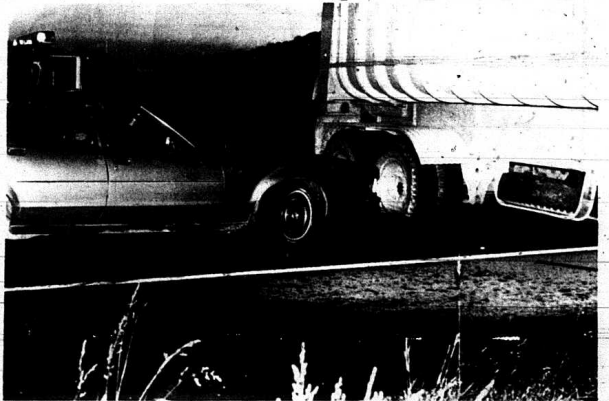
they found water waist deep in the road and their entrance blocked.

The rescue squad called the mine officer near the cave around 8 a.m. to find that all of the Scouts had emerged on their own from the cave and were unharmed. Mr. Howard used a backhoe to clear a path through the slide for the scouts.

The group was camping in the valley in front of Salt Petre Cave and when they returned to the campsite Sunday after leaving the cave, found that water had gotten up into their gear and equipment and scattered it all across the valley.

One man in the group, a cave explorer, returned to the camp site to find that his car had been submerged by the flooding waters and a log was laying on the hood.

Two of the men in the group, Robert Morris and Timothy Morris, are the son and grandson of Edgar Morris of Livingston. Mr. Morris said Monday that he did not know his son and grandson were even in the county until Sunday after they had been trapped in the cave for approximately 22 hours.



One accident led to another on I-75 early Friday morning when a truck driven by Dale Greer of Lily rammed into the rear of a truck driven by Gordon Turley of Oynthiana. As both trucks traveled south, Greer was unable to stop behind the slower moving Turley truck and was unable to pass because there was a vehicle in the passing lane, according to state policeman, Cary Eaton. About 15 minutes later, at 5:10 a.m., a car driven

by Rockelle Cohen of Milwaukee, Wisconsin ran into the Greer truck which was across the road. She reported that she did not see a flare or the truck in time to stop. The Interstate was reportedly blocked for over an hour due to the wreckage. A passenger in the Cohen car, Jean Pies also of Milwaukee, Wisc. and Greer received minor injuries.

Legislative Report

Kentucky's state representatives and senators are continuing to prefile bills, with the Legislative Research Commission, for the General Assembly's 1982 regular session.

Legislators propose bills in order to give their legislative colleagues and the public ample opportunity to study their proposals before the 1982 session convenes in January.

By the end of May, 150 bills had been drafted by a staff of the Legislative Research Commission. However, less than half of these proposals have been officially prefilled with the Commission.

Two of the more interesting prefilled bills seek to curb the proliferation of marijuana as a cash crop in Kentucky and address the problem of marijuana being sold to buyers.

Prefilled bill number 67 seeks to amend the Kentucky Revised Statutes to read that any person who knowingly and unlawfully plants, cultivates or harvests five or more plants of marijuana for the purpose of sale will be confined to the penitentiary for not less than one year nor more than five years nor more than \$3,000 nor more than \$5,000 or both. Also, under this bill it will be a Class B misdemeanor to harvest less than five plants of marijuana.

Prefilled bill number 68 seeks to amend the Kentucky Revised Statutes to read that any person who knowingly and unlawfully sells or transfers any amount of marijuana to a person under eighteen years of age shall, for the first offense, be guilty of a Class D felony and for each subsequent offense shall be guilty of a Class C felony.

A bill seeking to increase the penalties for possession and sale of marijuana passed in the House of Representatives during the 1978 General Assembly, but failed to gain approval in the state senate. House Bill 141 of the 1980

This year he began planting around the 10th of February and had most of his garden in the ground by the 20th of March, including his beans. He says that there were 2 or 3 frosts but they didn't hurt his beans.

Always curious about Mr. Woodall's successful garden and a little too inhibited to ask his secret, I finally took a deep breath, pencil in hand and pad on lap and asked him. Expecting some complicated philosophy of planting according to the moon, the signs or the almanac, his answer was almost too simple to be credible, but his honest and gentle face made me believe he was telling all. He said, "No, I don't plant by the signs or nothing. I just get my garden out as soon as I can get it ready and can get the plants and seeds."

"Lord, I've worked, it's been one more sight. I'm not bragging, but I've worked harder than most men", Mr. Woodall says of himself. From having known and observed him for some 20 years, hearing him tell the things he's done plus the fact that he has helped read and financially supported 12 child-

ren, I strongly testify to his statement.

Elige Woodall was born in Brodhead to Henry and Emma-Elize Deaton Woodall in 1900. When he was 18 years old he went to work for the railroad and worked for 4 years. He managed a tobacco factory at Brodhead for several years. The factory was taken over when Highway 150 came through. Owner Dick Martin moved the plant in about 1928 to Mt. Vernon and with the help of Cossie Sutton and Grant Baker set up business in the old Baptist church building next door to the Woodalls. Mr. Woodall operated the factory here with the help of 8 women who twisted, stemmed and boxed chewing tobacco. He remembers that much of it was shipped by rail to Indiana and other places.

Mr. Woodall's says they brought their tobacco on the market in large quantities, mostly the dark type. "Rough and Ready" was a favorite seller made from the dark or black tobacco grown in Tennessee. After the workers left at night, Mr. Woodall swept and laid the tobacco out on the floor. He then sprinkled melted licorice on it to give it flavor. The

licorice was bought in 200-300 pound quantities and melted on a big stove at the factory. In the mornings he came in before the workers and put the tobacco in "casing boxes" to be ready for the workers to use from 5 days a week. After the twists were made, they were packed in boxes, stenciled and aged for from 5 to 6 months. This "Rough and Ready" twist became so popular it took the place of "Farmers' Twist", a market favorite until then.

There were some Burley twists. "Kentucky Home", a natural twist was made by adding only seaeharine. "Friendship" twist and "Rough Rider", a big 8-inch long twist selling for 15 cents, were also made from Burley.

They made some plug tobacco, using presses and shipping it in wooden boxes, but there was not much of it at the time. He says they also tried making some smoking tobacco, but, like the plugs, there was no big demand for it.

The Depression may have forced the plant to close, for those were hard times, but soon after that Mr. Woodall went to Cincinnati and got a job at Fox's Paper Mill where he worked

once before. He said he happened to meet a man he knew from here on the street the day he got the job. The man was somewhat aggravated because he said he had applied for work at the same mill a day or two before and was told they weren't hiring anyone. Mr. Woodall thinks he may have gotten the job because he had worked for them and they knew that he was a good worker.

Bosses always "made up" with him he says because they appreciated the kind of worker he was. They would try to get him to "slack down" by saying "Elige, he can't get it all done today." At the paper mill they wanted him to become a manager and work in the office, but he refused, he says because he didn't feel he was educated enough. They were confident that he could do the job, but he wouldn't try.

In 1945 he went to work for Kentucky Stone Company and worked there until 1965 when he retired and devoted full time to his garden, yard mowing and to being custodian at the First Baptist Church, a job he retired from only last month. At one time he mowed 15-20 yards (all those from his house to the railroad tracks).

As Mr. Woodall told me of an occurrence while he worked at the quarry, I came to the conclusion that his luck is not confined to his success with his garden.

He tells about the time he was up on top of a 75 feet high loading scaffold over the top bin which held between 150 and 200 tons of dense grade rock. Without realizing that a man had "cut out" some rock from beneath, leaving essentially a cave under the wet top layer, he climbed into the bin with an iron pole to see why the rock wasn't pouring through the chute at the bottom. The rock in the bin caved in taking Mr. Woodall through the 22x8 inch opening at the bottom of the bin and into a dumpster below. He said that that had happened to another man, once, but the man did not leave the bin and had to be cut out hours later.

Mr. Woodall was taken to Rockcastle Baptist Hospital for treatment of rock and dust inhalation and for a torn arm. He went back to work in 5 or 6 days and went back into the bins later to clean them out. He said he was told that if his feet

were bigger or not positioned just right, if he had been a larger man or if his dentures had not caught a lot of the dust and rocks (to name a few "ifs"), he would not have survived.

According to Mr. Woodall, the company sent him a check for \$17 or \$18 and he sent it back, insulted "that if that was all a big accident like that paid that he 'didn't want it'." He said the company wanted the accident kept quiet. They were afraid he would sue and he says that he could have, but preferred not to since the company had always been good to him and he had been able to work out his place while working there.

He says he has no job at all now. He attributes his shortness of breath and falling health to the fact that he has had to have 4 operations in the last 2 years. And so, at age 80, a man who thrived and survived on work, who is small in stature, but big in the eyes of many, has had to quit work.

which has been much discussed for several months - an increase in water and sewer rates but not for city of Mt. Vernon. With very little discussion, Councilman Ernest Stanley made a motion which read as follows: "To revise the billing rate to Brodhead City, Northern Rockcastle and Western Rockcastle Water Districts to a standard .84c per thousand gallons. Also, to offer the three customers the services of office space, telephone and billing equipment should they desire to go to one central billing department, thus reducing annual costs and preventing the increase from being passed on to customers."

Mayor Roland Mullins recommended in his budget message (budget story next week) to the council that water and sewer rates in Mt. Vernon not be increased. The Councilmen that he felt "If the same cutbacks were affected by the city, no rate increase to customers by the districts and Brodhead would be necessary."

later that this increase still leaves the districts and Brodhead at approximately 40c per thousand gallons less than is paid by surrounding water districts. It was also pointed out that this is the first increase in water rates since 1964.

Mayor Mullins further said that if the districts and Brodhead would take advantage of the city's offer of free office space and free use of the city's billing machine, then there could be a combined savings to them of \$22,000 to \$25,000 per year thus offsetting the increased charge to them by the City for water.

The new rate will not be reflected until the August billing to the districts and Brodhead. The motion passed unanimously. The council adjourned but stayed to informally meet with three applicants for the police department position which was created by the resignation last week of Charles "Bud" Lovell.

accident and criminal investigation, social services, first aid, firearms and management of human conflict. The officers receiving certification will be given salary increases under the Kentucky's pay incentive programs.

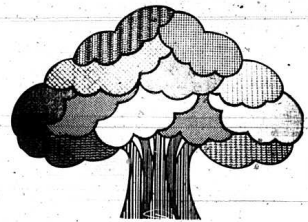
The graduation of basic classes 122 and 123 brings the total number of officers trained by the Bureau of Training to 3,102.

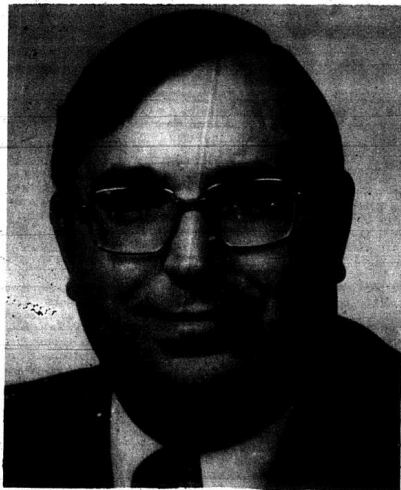

top muddy. Official estimates for tobacco losses in the county run close to \$1 million.

Pepper crop losses were estimated at \$100,000 and garden losses at \$800,000.

Property damage including fences, driveways, buildings,

homes and outbuildings was conservatively estimated at \$202,000. Flash flooding caused people in Rockcastle to flee homes Saturday afternoon and night. Perhaps hardest hit were 5 families living in Cox's Trailer Park in Mt. Vernon who suffered heavy losses when floodwaters rose over the tops of cars in the street and up to the trailer windows.

According to Mayor Roland Mullins, even though several families were forced to evacuate, only 3 of the families were without a place to go. The city lodged them in a motel Saturday night and the Family Life Center has been providing emergency shelter since that time for the 16 persons. Church groups provided food for some of the families whose food supply was contaminated. City workers helped victims mop and sweep the mud and silt from the trailers Sunday.

Fire Chief, John Cox, said that it is the second time that he has ever known of the area being under water and that the culverts under the railroad are large and ordinarily should take the water unless they were obstructed in some way. The other time the area flooded it was a result of drains being clogged with cinders from a fire.

Several homes in the Valley Manor Subdivision near the Li-

brary suffered from water damage Saturday afternoon. A metal storage building belonging to the Clarence Thompson's washed away and was lodged against a culvert nearby. City backhoe crews worked late Saturday afternoon to clear streets in the subdivision of inches of mud and rocks.

According to one resident, the basement wall in his home on Fairground Hill gave way and, at one point, he feared that the upper wall in his house would also give way.

In other sections of the county a road that goes to Piney Branch was completely destroyed by water, leaving the residents stranded. At Caloway a bridge washed away leaving one family without access to their home. Damage was reportedly done to several

homes in the area.

In Brodhead, a trailer was swept from its foundation by the swift rising waters of Dix River. The trailer reportedly was unoccupied at the time.

Parts of the Western Water District have been without service since Saturday due to an undetermined cause but obviously related to the washing rains and pressure.

Steve Midkiff of the local health department strongly recommends that all food except canned food that was soaked by water should be thrown away. Contaminated cans should be checked for leaks and if found to be sound, should then be washed in hot soapy water and immersed for one minute in a solution of 6 oz. of chlorine bleach to 1 gallon water, and relabeled.

Her only chance for restoration was a blood transfusion from someone who had previously conquered the disease. Since the two children had the same rare blood type, the boy was the ideal donor.

"Johnny, would you give your blood for Mary?" the doctor asked. The boy hesitated, his upper lip started to tremble. Then he smiled and said, "Sure, doctor, I'll give my blood for my sister."

Soon the two children were wheeled into the operating room—Mary, pale and thin; Johnny, robust and a picture of health. Neither spoke, but when their eyes met, Johnny grinned.

As his blood siphoned into Mary's veins one could almost see new life come into her tired body. The ordeal was almost over when Johnny's brave little voice broke the silence. "Say, doctor, when will I die?"

It was only then that the doctor realized what the moment of hesitation, the trembling of the lips had meant. Little Johnny actually thought that in giving his blood to his sister he was giving up his own life. In that brief moment he had made his great decision.

You see, that's really the kind of decision we made in receiving Christ. It is commitment unto death. His blood for our blood of

USDA Adjusts Food Stamp Eligibility Limits

Food stamp income eligibility limits will rise reflecting increases in the cost of living, by approximately 13 percent for the period beginning July 1. Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Mary C. Jarratt has announced.

The 1977 Food Stamp Act requires the Department of Agriculture to adjust income eligibility standards annually to reflect increases in the cost of living. The Office of Management and Budget's poverty guideline is used as the stand-

ard for food stamp income limits. The maximum net income limits a family of four must meet to qualify for food stamps will rise from \$621 to \$705 per month. Allowable deductions are taken, the maximum gross income for a family of four without elderly persons will rise from \$1,026 to \$1,131 per month.

From July 1 through June 30, 1982, the maximum net monthly income for the continental United States, Guam, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Isl-

ands for households of various sizes will be:

- One person household, \$360; two person household, \$475; three person household, \$590; four person household, \$705; five person household, \$820; six person household, \$935; seven person household, \$1050; eight person household, \$1165. For each additional member over eight, add \$115 per month.

The new income eligibility limits listed here as well as those for Alaska and Hawaii appeared in the May 22 Federal Register.

Dr. A.J. Hiatt, Chairman of the Department of Agronomy at the University of Kentucky, was recently named a Fellow of the American Society of Agronomy. The award was presented at the Society's national meeting in Detroit. The American Society of Agronomy, which has more than 10,000 members, names 20 to 25 fellows each year to recognize outstanding contributions in the field of Agronomy.

Dr. Hiatt, a UK faculty member since 1960, has been Chairman of the Department of Agronomy since 1969. He received the Cooper Outstanding Research Award from the College of Agriculture in 1965 and the University of Kentucky Agronomy Award in 1968 for his research on the absorption and utilization of potash and nitrogen by crop plants. He served on the editorial board of Plant Physiology, a professional journal, for 10 years and is currently Secretary of the Governing Board of the International Grassland Congress to be held in Lexington in June.

The primary basis of Dr. Hiatt's selection as a Fellow was for administrative leadership to the Department of Agronomy. The Department, which has 65 faculty members, 60 technical and clerical staff, and 60

graduate assistants has become nationally recognized for its research and teaching in many areas of agronomic science. The department has received worldwide recognition for research development of no-tillage systems of cropping.

Dr. Hiatt is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W.L. Hiatt of Wildie. He completed elementary school at Wildie and graduated from Mt. Vernon High School in 1948. He received his B.S. degree in Agriculture from the University of Kentucky in 1953 and the Ph. D. degree from North Carolina State University in 1960. He is married to the former Elaine Parrett, daughter of Conrad Parrett of Mt. Vernon. They have a son and a daughter, both attending the University of Kentucky.

fun for everyone!

Steps for Easy Fire Building

- 1. Line the bottom of the grill with heavy aluminum foil and sand or fine gravel.
2. Pile the amount of charcoal you need in a mound. Soak with starter fluid and light.
3. When the charcoal is covered with a grey-white ash, it is hot enough for cooking. Spread the coals (use tongs or a small garden rake) over the area needed. Charcoal spread out like this will burn for 45 minutes to one hour if the grill is not in a windy area. For a smoked flavor, add wet hardwood chips or small pieces of wood, such as hickory, to the coals. Soaking the chips in water before adding to the fire prevents the fire from flaring up and will give a better smoked flavor to the food. You will find special commercial charcoal on the market with a "built-in" smoke flavor.
4. If the fire is too hot and

there isn't a regulator for moving the food away from the heat, you can sprinkle wet coals with a little water or move some of the coals to the side.
* 5. For a hotter fire, knock off the ashes from the burning charcoal.
6. When you are finished cooking, you can save the unburned charcoal by smothering it in a covered pall or bucket.

Cooking Hints and Recipes

- 1. Grease the grill lightly if meat tends to stick. Keep grill clean so food particles will not burn on grill.
2. Trim off the outer rim of fat from steaks, chops and ham slices. Excess drippings may result in a flame. The coals should not be allowed to blaze because this will cause a burned hard crust on the food. It may be necessary to move the food aside and sprinkle blazing coals lightly with water to extinguish the flame.
3. The steak will be juicier if turned one only. Salt after turning, using tongs instead of a fork. Piercing the meat with a fork results in loss of some

juice.
4. Have meat patties pressed firmly before starting to broil. Do not put down during broiling because the juice will be lost.
5. Use meat tenderizer on chuck and round steak at least one hour before broiling. Fork the tenderloin to follow directions as given for the product you are using.
A thick piece of meat should be farther from the heat and cooked a longer length of time, especially if it is to be cooked well done or medium.
A thin slice of meat should be broiled closer to the heat and for a shorter length of time.

Think Barbecue Sauce
(For franks, hamburgers, chicken and ribs)
1/4 cup onions, chopped

2 tablespoons fat or oil
1/4 clove garlic, grated
2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
1/4 teaspoon chili powder
1/4 cup water
1/4 cup catsup
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
Brown onions in fat until lightly browned. Add remaining ingredients. Cover and simmer about 20 minutes. If sauce gets too thick, add a small amount of water. Use immediately, or keep in a covered container in refrigerator until needed. Serve hot. Makes 1 1/2 cups.

Potatoes
Baked in Foil-Wrap each scrubbed baking potato in heavy-duty foil. (Use double thickness of regular foil.) Place potato on the glowing coals.

Bake 1 hour or until done, turning occasionally. Cut a cross on top, pull back foil, and insert butter. Serve in foil.
Bundle of Potatoes-Place thick slices of peeled potatoes in a 10-inch square of well-greased heavy aluminum foil. Season with salt and pepper, add 1 tablespoon of butter and a few slices of onion. Wrap it tightly, twisting ends. Bake on hot coals or on grill for 45 minutes.
