Plooding, water and sewer rate increases and the hiring of another policeman were the main items on the agenda at Monday night's regular month-ly meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council. About 30 residents of Val-ley Manor Subdivision were on hand to talk to the council about their problem with water when-ever a heavy rain occurs. Satur-day, about 8 to 10 homes were flooded due to the heavy rain flooded due to the heavy rain and the council talked with the

residents at some length to try and determine what might have caused the water to not drain off as rapidly as it usually does. Speculation by the resi-dents ranged from the culvert under the road leading down to the library being blocked by a storage trailer swept off its foundation by the flood; to a sinkhole that usually earries off a great deal of the water not doing its normal job; to the possibility that the clearing of a field about the subdivision con-tributed to the problem. tributed to the problem. The rais "poured and spilled" Friday night and all day Saturday, dumping 3.50 inches of rain on the already saturated ground. During a 33 hour period from 11:00 p.m. Friday to 8:00 a.m. Sunday. Tuesday, June 2, 08 inches fell. The following Wednesday, 27 inches fell according to offic-ial weather recorder, Bud Cox, and Thursday, 13 inches fell bringing to 4.06 inches fel bringing to 4.06 inches the total bringing to 4.06 inches the total usin fall for the first 6 days in June. The preceeding month was a wet one also with 7.96 inches of rain falling during that 31 day period.

of rain failing during that si day period. The six weeks of rainy weather has put crops, which were extremely affected by the lack of rain last year, in jeop-ardy again. According to Harold Bailinger of the local ASC of-fice, numerous problems have arisen for farmers due to the damp conditions and the wash-ing rains. Bailinger says that he knows of only one person who got hay up without it getting wet. He estimated that only 1% of the hay crop has been cut and that hay losses are estimated at

\$250,000. Small grains including wheat have suffered also from the stigon winds and it, analy cases rust, is setting in. Wheat losses are estimated to be \$10,000.

Scouts Trapped in Sinks Cave

Six Boy Scouts and three Scout leaders, all from the Cin-cinnati area, were trapped in the Sinks Cave at Mullins Sta-tion all night Saturday night by rising water from the heavy raine rains

rains The group went into the cave sometime Saturday after-noon to explore it and became trapped by the high water. One of the Scouts swalh out of the cave early Sunday morning and told Otis Howard, mine security officer at Tenneco Mine, that the group was trapped. Howard said the Scout grapped an inner tube and went back into the cave.

Shit in Score grapped at links tube and went back link the cave. Howard called the Police around 6:30 am and, when police and rescue units from Garard County and Madison County responded to the call, they found that the road leading to the cave kt Mullins Station -yas blocked by a mud slide. The rescue units then proceeded to Brush Creek in hopes of getting into the cave from the other side of the hill. However, when rescue units got about 3 miles from the cave on the other side.

they found water waist deep in the road and their entrance blocked.

The rescue squad called the The respective quad called the mine officer near the cave a round 8 a.m. to find that all of the Scouts had emerged on their own from the cave and were unharmed. Mr. Howard used a backhoe to clear a path through the slide for the scouts.

A Man and His Garden

Soft-spoken, unobtrusive, Mr. Elige Woodall can be found these days sitting out back of his house on Williams Street in his chair looking out over his rank and growing garden. Mr. Woodall does more supervising Woodall does more supervising and observing now than in times past because he admits to times past because he admits to having "smothering spells". Like many of us who enjoy bragging on our garden or get-ting ahead of the neighbor's garden, Mr. Woodall has for years ënjoyed the challenge and has been able, with few excep-tions, to have the earliest gar-den, the prettiest garden and the most productive garden in

the most productive garden in town. The Woodalls own what amounts to about 3 or 4 large town lots-and he says that they have been offered "big prices" from people who want to buy, but, he says he would never even consider selling his place. The Woodalls bought the prop-erty from Dr. Monroe Penning-ton in the early 1940's after they had rented it for over 14 years



This year a large portion of the tillable land (2 big gardens) lies fallow due in part to Mr. Woodall's falling, health. He says that without the help of David, his grandson, to do the strenuous work such as running the roto tiller, he would not be able to grow. his garden this year. year Unlike most town gardens, Mr. Woodall's is more than a

Mr. Woodall's is more than a source of food supply for his family and more than a hobby; it is a cash crop for him. He has seen the time when he sold 200-300 dozen ears of corn a season. One year he made \$150 from the sale of corn alone and that was when he had a full-time job and sold corn for 50 cents a dozen. Now he gets \$1.00 c dozen and sometimes sells as many as 25-30 dozen ears to one customer.

many as 25-30 dozen ears to one customer. This year he planted his corn about the first of April and has 15 rows, much of which he plans to sell. In more recent years, the summer income from the garden has amounted to from between 150-200 dollars. He sells everything and any-thing he grows in abundance, finduding tomatoes, potatoes (which he says are already as joig as goose eggs), cabbage, squash, beans, greens and peas. This year Mr. Woodall pointed-out that he has something grow-ing in his garden that most people don't have-two or three kinds of netwis-including a large clump of horseradish. clump of horseradish.

Perhaps one reason for Mr. Woodall's tremendou's garden success is his fearl@s determin-ation to get his garden planted early (Weo'h is neighbors call it getting the jump on us). When most people are still shaking their heads declaring that frost will surely kill beans planted before the 15th of Ayril, Mr. Woodall has beans 2 inches high.

Legislative Report

Kentucky's state represent-Kentucky's state represent-atives and senators are contin-uing to prefile bills, with the Legislative Research Commis-sion, for the General Assem-by's 1982 regular session. ⁴ Legislators prefile bills in order to give their legislative colleagues and the public ample competentit to chuck their pre-

opportunity to study their pr posals before the 1982 session convenes in January. By the end of May, 150 bills

By the end of May, 150 bills had been drafted by the staff of the Legislative Research Com-mission. However, less than half of these proposals have been officially prefiled with the Commencial

hall of these proposals nave been officially prefiled with the Commission. Two of the more interesting prefiled bills seek to curb the proliferation of maritylama as a cash crop in Kentucky and address the problem of mari-juana being sold to luxgalles. Prefiled bill number 67 seeks to amend the Kentucky Revised Statutes to read that any person who knowingly and unlawfully plants, cultivates or harvests five or more plants if maritylana for the purpose 4 sale will be confined to the peni-yent of the stand of the purpose fund not less than 35,000 nor more than 55,000 nobth. Also, under this bill it will be a Class B misdemeanor to harvest less B misdemeanor to harvest less I han five plants of maritylana. Prefiled bill number 68 seeks to amend the Kenucky Revised Statues to read that any person who knowingly and unlawfully sells or transfers any amount of maritylama to are-person under eighteen years of age shall, for the first offense, be guilty of a Class D felony and follony.

for each subsequent offense shall be quilty of a Class C

shall be quility of a class -felony. A bill seeking to increase the penalites for possession and faile of marijuana passed in the House of Representatives dur-ing the 1976 General Assembly, but failed to gain supproval in the state sente. House Bill 141 of the 1980

General Assembly passed in both the House and Senate. House Bill 141 would have substantially increased the pen-alited for possession and sale of marijuana. Unfortunately, the governor vectored House Sill 144, claiming that the stiffer penal-ties would over-crowd Ken-tucky's jails. Representative Hermán

tucky's jalls. Representatives Hermain Ratified of Campbellswille, the House Caucus Chairman, is sponsoring both prefiled bill 37. and 68. Representatives Ratififf should be commended for his efforts in pre-filed reasonable legislation which serves to ad-dress an ever growing and dis-turbing problem.
