Fiscal Court Meets Tuesday in Special Session

A special called meeting of the Fiscal Court Tuesday was deemed an emergency session by County Judge-Executive Hubert Thacker. The meeting was called for the purpose of purchasing a compressor motor for courthouse air conditioner. The air conditioner went out of order last week.

The court voted to buy the motor from Tousses Refrigeration of London, Ky. for \$5,000.

No bids were solicited for the motor, as, according to Anna Rose Mullins, the Judge's assistant, the company has had the service contract for 2 or 3 years.

According to one courthouse occupant, the air conditioner has always given poor service and was not the quality or design needed for the building initially.

Council Hires Howard

In a called meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council, June 13, Joe Howard, 30 of Mt. Vernon, was hired as city policeman to replace Charles Lovell, Jr., who recently resigned that post.

Howard has previously served as city policeman but most recently has been employed by Mason's Construction Company.

Several Attend Public Hearings

Eighteen persons attended the 10 a.m. County Road Ad public hearing Monday. Most were there to request that a portion of the \$238,645 in county road aid funds be spent to upgrade the approximate 1 1/8 miles Mareburg Cemetery Road. Garland Deborde, spokesman for the group, pointed out that although the road dead ends, a school bus travels the road and it is badly in need of repair. A request was made for ditching, tile, blacktop or chip and seal railroad crossing improvements and whatever upgrading could be obtained or deemed necessary.

County Judge-Executive Hubert Thacker seemed sympathetic and said he would look into it. He further stated that he couldn't promise blacktop and that it was more likely to be chip and seal. He said that someone should meet with the fiscal court to request a letter be written to the state asking for signal lights at the crossing.

Joe Lane, who lives on the upper end of Crooked Creek, asked that his road be repaired. The recent flood did damage to the road and according to Lane it will soon be impassable if not repaired.

Verla Scott asked that the road from Climax to the Big Hill Road be repaired.

Judge Thacker said that both roads would be considered for repairs.

At 10:30 a.m., a hearing concerning recommendations for expenditures in the total amount of \$213,760, Revenue Sharing Funds. Four representatives of the Rockcastle County Library were on hand to request an additional \$10,000 to cover continuing increases in operational costs. Library board chairman Harold Ballinger, in addition, requested that the library be exempt from the \$50 per month rent that the library now pays the county. He thanked the court for their past support but stated that at present they are not receiving enough income to continue to provide the present level of service.

Mrs. Alene Davis, librarian, stated in her request that the library is now open to the public all day Saturday from 1-5 through the weekend and on Thursday nights and that she would hate to see the hours shortened.

Bookmobile librarian Geraldine Robbins said that through her route she is able to provide service to 200 families per month with over 3,000 monthly circulation.

Nancy Parkerson, school librarian at Broadhead Elementary, said that the public library was a supplement and resource center for hers and other school library programs in the county.

Newly-elected deputy sheriff, "Jib" Hasty requested \$30,000 from Revenue Sharing be allocated to the sheriff's office for operational costs including gas, cars and vehicle upkeep (not to be used as salary). Present Sheriff Henry Lee Abney spoke on behalf of the request stating that the office desperately needed the added income.

To one was present for the 11:00 a.m. hearing concerning the spending of \$84,950 in Local government economic assistance.

Some concern was voiced following the meeting as to whether the budget (which will be presented to the Fiscal Court July 7 for final adoption) could be changed at this point to affect the appropriations for the coming year.

However after contacting Al Hallowell of the Office of

Finance on Local government in Frankfort, we were advised that the fiscal court may make any change it wishes to in the budget before final adoption and registration in Frankfort. He also stated that the court can order funds transferred at any time during the year and that periodically the county receives

unanticipated revenues which have to be amended into the budget and spent. Hallowell said the recommendations made at the public hearings are supposed to be made known to the fiscal court. The hearings are required by law to be held at least one week prior to the final adoption of the budget.

After 21 Years, Billy Lawrence Still "Loves" Milking

Billy Lawrence says, "If I didn't love milking, I wouldn't stay with it." He has been in the dairy business for 21 years.

Right now, Lawrence is milking 48 Holsteins twice a day. His Grade A dairy with a four stall, fully automatic milking parlor allows the job to require only about four hours a day. The rest of the day is free to do his other farm work.

Lawrence buys some feed grain, but otherwise he raises his herd's feed-27 acres of alfalfa, 44 acres of corn and some wheat. Besides these crops, he also raises 3 acres of tobacco.

In addition to the 48 cows being milked now, there are 28 heifers and about 20 dry cows in Lawrence's herd which also require feed. The only feed withheld from those not giving milk is the 18% protein Test Chow which is automatically micro switched from a bin outside into feeders inside the milking booths.

The milking parlor is a phenomenon of modern technology. Everything is fully operated and controlled by buttons and levers. Each of the four milking stations has a button which opens the door to the rear to allow a cow to enter, then closes. Levers open stall doors for cows that are to be milked and close to dry cows which are "run through." Not only is the milk not touched by human hands, but neither are the milkers or the tubes and pipes through which the milk is pumped into the 600 gallon holding tank. Following the milking, Lawrence merely pushes a button and the equipment is washed, rinsed and sanitized in 3 cycles of automatic cleaning.

As each cow enters the stall to be milked, a small spray hose attached to each unit is used to spray the cow's teats, bag, hooves and the concrete under the milking area. The teats and teats are then wiped clean and the milk is attached. When the milking is finished, the milkers automatically pop off if they are not taken off. Before the cow leaves the stall, a handled cup

containing an iodine solution applies the medication to each teat. This, according to Lawrence, prevents chapping and mastitis.

Lawrence's dairy is one of the largest in the county. By the first of the year, he expects to be milking 70. He says that milk prices have remained fairly steady during the last 21 years. Grade A prices now run around \$13.85 per hundred pounds a few dollars above the price for grade B milk. (Grade A dairies have about 3 yearly unannounced inspections and have certain standards of operation which must be complied with.) Milk producers were promised an 80 cents per hundred increase, but it was cut out by President Reagan. Lawrence expects the 90 cents September increase to be voided also. According to Lawrence it's the middle men—the processors and distributors—who are making the profit.

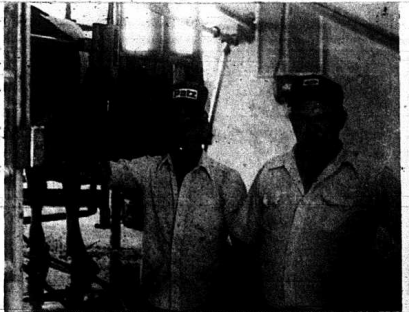
The average daily output per cow is 48 pounds. This time of year, the milk is picked up every other day. At times when he is milking more, the 5173 pound capacity tank has to be emptied daily.

When asked how he thinks the future looks for farmers, Lawrence says that in his opinion, things don't look good for the farmer. High interest rates are of most concern to farmers right now he says. To build a dairy parlor similar to his, now he estimates would cost at least \$35,000, plus the investment in cows which run 9000 to \$1,300 each.

The Lawrences, Billy and Dorothy, have three children: Linna, 14, Kathy, 17 and Frankie, 21. Lawrence says his wife used to help milk until her back began to bother her and his son, he says, doesn't mind working, but he won't milk. So Lawrence hires Jeff Thompson, a neighbor, to help him.

When asked if he doesn't mind the confinement, Lawrence grins and says, "No, suse don't" and brags, "In the 26 years since I've been married, I've never taken a vacation."

After pondering this for some time and since it seems (Cont. to 2)

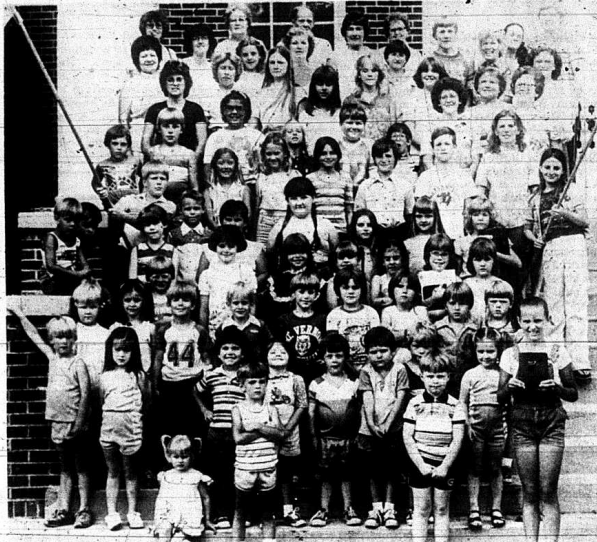

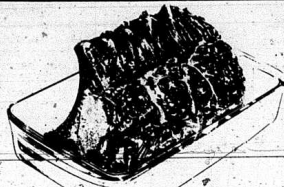

USDA Proposed To Prorate Initial Food Stamp Benefits

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced proposed rules that would change the way food stamp benefits are calculated in the initial month of application. The changes are designed to reduce program costs and better target program benefits to an applicant's actual needs.

Rules now in effect allow people who qualify for benefits to receive a full month's allotment whether they apply on the 2nd or 28th of the month. Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Mary Jarratt said, "This sometimes results in households receiving benefits retroactively and providing them food stamps for a period of time for which they have already purchased food," she said.

Under the second option of the proposal, food stamp benefits paid in the first month of eligibility would be prorated on a daily basis. This option would save \$420 million annually.

Jarratt said the proposal is in line with the Department's efforts to reduce program spending and make the program more accountable. Approximately 23 million people currently participate in the program each month and receive \$954 million in food stamps.

Paul Holcomb of the Yankees leads the Little League in hitting with a .714 average.

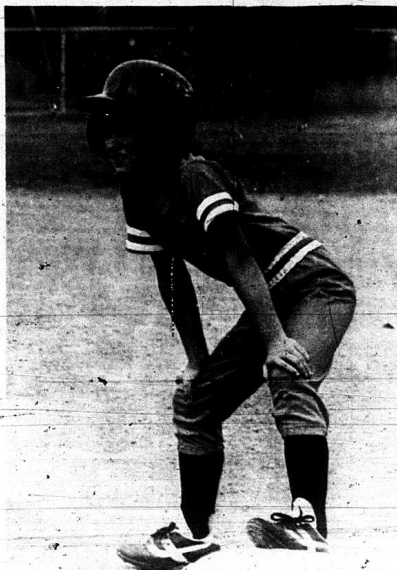

receive under the \$125,000 contract is \$41,500 for a Lexington attorney to head the project, \$50,000 for two professional administrators, \$15,000 for a certified public accountant and \$18,500 for expenses.

The Department of Human Resources estimates that the state will pay \$50 million in 1981 to insure health-care coverage for 82,000 employees, teachers and retirees. Also, that Blue Cross-Blue Shield is expected to ask for a 30 percent increase in premiums when their contract comes up for renewal in October.

State government started paying for health coverage for its employees approximately ten years ago. The 1974 General Assembly placed public school teachers under the coverage and the 1978 General Assembly placed retirees under the contract.

While explaining the contract to the subcommittee, the Secretary of Human Resources claimed that the data compiled by the management team will be used to determine if the state should retain the present system, open the coverage to competitive bid or institute a system of self insurance.

The Personal Service Contract Review subcommittee reviewed thirty-three state con-

tracts and amendments to contracts during its June 8th meeting. The contracts represented \$4,388,592 in state spending. Twenty-eight contracts

were approved and five contracts were decreased in total amount. The decreased contracts will result in a reduction in state spending of \$2,035,964.

\$2,035,076 of the reductions were on two Department of Transportation contracts for engineering services. The decreases were brought about by Transportation's decision to take over supervision of several highway construction projects. One of the twenty-eight,

approved contracts was a \$125,000 Department of Human Resources pact for consulting services.

The purpose of the contract is to fund a management team to monitor the \$50 million in annual premiums for Blue Cross-Blue Shield coverage paid by the state and its employees, which is the largest single recurring expense for state government.

The maximums each member of the management team can

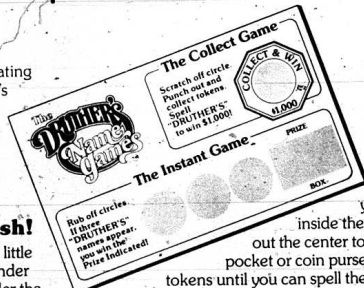

Make Your Quilt A Prizewinner

If you are a quilter, you may have considered showing off your work at a quilt exhibit or contest. But what do judges look for in a quilt? Here are some tips to help you quilt a prizewinner.

Make sure to buy enough fabric before you begin your quilt. Dye lots often don't match, and if you find you are short a half-yard or so, you may never be able to get the exact color you need at a later time.

Also, buy the best quality materials you can afford. Don't waste your time and talent on poor materials. Excellent workmanship seems to emphasize the cheap look of poor fabrics.

Don't try to save money on the lining fabric either. Judges look at both sides, and your quilt will get worn on both sides, too.

Don't mix blends with cottons in the same quilt. They

don't have the same look and when they are used together this difference is emphasized. Generally, all cotton fabric gives a more aesthetic appearance.

Use dark or printed linings only on quilts that have equally dark colors in the top. Linings that show through can detract from the total appearance. In addition, when you sew a light patch to a dark patch, press the seam away from the light patch so it doesn't show through.

It is also advised that you miter borders. Patchwork or applique should be planned so that the design elements are complete in the corners.

Most quilts need an accent color. A quilt top that is too pale or too dark lacks a certain character that an accent color would provide.

The quilting often doesn't live up to the piecing or applique. Sometimes the reverse is true. To win in competition, both quilting and piecing or applique must be high quality.

In contemporary quilts, quilting is sometimes not close enough to be effective either visually or functionally. Even though it is not necessary to quilt polyester batting as closely as cotton batting to hold it

together, close quilting still looks richer and makes the quilt more impressive.

The quilting should be planned to relate to, harmonize with, and enhance the design of the quilt's top, not just used to fill empty places in the design or to fasten the quilt together.

Extra care should be taken with the binding because it gets the most wear and definitely affects the life of the quilt as well as its appearance. Keep these points in mind:

Binding should be full of batting out to the edge. An empty binding feels flimsy, looks bad and will soon wear out.

Binding should be sewn firmly, with stitches close together, to both front and back of the quilt. Loose bindings soon come unsewn.

The color of the binding and the lining should be planned as part of the total quilt. Fabric should be selected at the beginning of the quilt-making project. The color of fabric for binding should not be an afterthought.

Finally, sign the quilt on the back rather than on the front. Unless the embroidered signature is worked into the design, it usually detracts from the quilt's overall appearance.

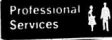

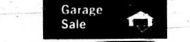
