

Final Candidate Spending Report

Candidates spent anywhere from \$5,979.59 to nothing at all, during the recent county election, according to financial reports on file in the county-clerk's office.

Danny L. Ford, candidate for State Representative, was the big spender during the election spending \$5,979.59 on his campaign. On the other hand, his opponent for the Republican nomination to that seat, now Circuit Court Clerk, Money Ed Cummins, spent only \$1,598.69 on his campaign.

In the hotly contested race for County Attorney James H.

Lambert outspent all the rest seeking county office by putting \$5,220.09 into the campaign. His opponent, William D. Gregory, spent \$1,429.87 on his campaign.

The big difference in the money spent did now show up in the final count in the voting on May 26. Lambert won by a narrow 94 votes over Gregory.

In the closest race bif the election, the County Judge Executive, now Judge Hubert Thacker, outspent both of his opponents but the result was not in his favor. Thacker spent \$2,108.83, to winner of the seat, Frank DeBorde's, \$1,501.77 and Leonard "Roge" Hammond's, \$1009.15.

One race in which the victor of the seat did not spend the most money was in the Circuit Court Clerk's race. Denver Miller won the race by some 800 votes but was third in line for spending the most money at \$1,116.90. Ernest Stanley spent the second largest amount of money and that is where he ended up when the votes were all counted. Stanley Moore spent \$755.00 and ran fourth.

Roads to Get Half of \$901,964 County Budget: \$54.000 for Health Building Repairs

Only three magistrates, Danny Sargent, Joe Clark and Amos Burdette met with County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker in a special meeting of the Fiscal Court Tuesday morning to approve planned spending for the coming year.

The court is obliged to meet before the first day of the new fiscal year which begins July 1 and vote on the budget and decide whether or not to pay claims as presented to the coun-ty for 1980-81.

The court voted to approve the \$901,964 budget for 1981-82 and to pay all claims as pre-sented. This reflects a \$98,652 increase over last years \$803,312 total budget.

Of the total \$901,964 bud-get, \$620,904 is considered Gen-eral Fund and amounts to what eral Fund and amounts to what the county budget would be without the \$281,060 federal Revenue Sharing monites harded to the county this year as in the past several, with few strings attached. Last year Rockcastle received only \$194,660 in Revenue Sharing Funds.

The \$20,904 figure for estimated receipts is arrived at by combining the following sources of state and local income: Department of Human Resources Child Support Unit (state), \$1,000; Administrative Office of the courts (state), \$1,500; strip mine permits (state-local), \$5,300; Local Government Economic Assistance state-local), \$3,48,500; property tax transfer (local), \$3,000; courty road aid (state), \$23,000; aid (state), \$2,000; aid (state), \$2,000; courty road aid (state), \$23,000; cocupational following strip the state, \$2,000; cocupational following strip the state, \$2,000; cocupational following strip the s

The total budgeted for the general expense fund is \$185,030 and for the county road fund, \$309,645; local government economic assistance, \$84,950 and a miscellaneous fund, \$41,279.

The dargest silice of the general budget (over \$122,000) goes to pay salaries, benefits, and personnel costs for courthouse officials. Office supplies, printing, advertising, insurance, utilities and several other miscellaneous courthouse expenses make up approximately \$21,500 of the budget. The remainder of the itemized expenditures includes interest on Rock-costle Industrial Development Authority, \$7,500, reserve, \$7,432, debt service, \$12,803, and subsidies to services in the amount of \$12,250. subsidies to services amount of \$12,250.

The county road fund budget makes only two distinctions in how money is budgeted-\$55,000 of the total \$309,645 is designated to pay labor costs and the remaining \$254,645 is for maintenance, supplies and

materials.

Rockcastle County received local government economic assistance aid in the amount of \$84,950. This was, according to Anna Rose Mullins, assistant to Judge Thacker, the first time the ocunty has received this particular reyenue. Of this new money, \$44,950 will be spent on

road maintenance and labor costs. The remaining \$40,000 will be spent on the newly pur-chased Health Department building for renovation costs.

A miscellaneous fund appropriates money to the health department, library, soil con-servation office and the county extension agency in the total amount of \$41,279.

amount of \$41,278.

The biggest chunk (\$100,000) of the Revenue Sharing Budget was appropriated for materials and supplies for county road maintenance, bringing to a toal of \$453,950, the amount to be spent on the county's roads. The next largest appropriation was for health services including \$45,000; garbage disposal; \$3,900 dog warden, and \$14,592, health department, building renovation for a total of \$63,492. The juil received \$600 from Revenue Sharing and the library, \$5,000. Financial Administration accounted for a \$41,895 appropriation to cover expenses such as counted for a \$41,995 appropriation to cover expenses such as fairground and courthouse utilities and county treasurer. Six-ty-thousand went to courthouse repair and maintenance in an account entitled, Capital Construction, Maintenance or Equipment. The Senior Citizens Program received \$8,000 and social services received \$2,00 from Revenue Sharing.

Disaster Relief Center To Be Set Up in McKee

A call from the office of Cong, Harold Rogers' office Tuesday served to inform us that the 10-county area seeking to be designated a disaster area, and failed to be so named by the Reagan administration. Brian O'Grady, press secretary to Rogers, said however, that the Small Business Administration (SBA) had been approved to make money available at low interest rates (3% to homeowners and 5% to businessmen) for flood related damages to persons in Rockcastle, Jackson, Lee andOwsley.

The loans can be obtained by persons to replace furnishings or repair property.
O'Grady announced that the SBA would be in McKee to set up a Disaster Relief Center Tuesday night July 7 at 7:00 p.m. to give general information concerning loan assistance. The office will remain open on July 8 and 9, all day.

The location of the center will be publicized as soon as arrangements are made.
The deadline for applying for flood relief is August 29th.

"The President of the U-"The President of the U-nited States of America, author-ized by Act of Congress ap-proved March 3, 1863, has a-warded in the name of the Congress the MEDAL OF HON-

warded in the name of the Congress the MEDAL OF HON-OR to Private First Class David Monroe Smith, United States Army with citation as follows: Private First Class David M. Smith, Company E. 9th Infantry-Regiment, 2nd. Infantry-Division distinguished himself by conspicous gallantry and outstanding courage above and beyond the call of duty in action near Yongsan Korea on September 1, 1950. Private Smith was a gunner iff the mortar section of Company E. emplaced in rugged mountainous terrain and under attack by a numerically, super-attack by a numerically, supermountainous terrain and under attack by a numerically super-ior hostile force. Bitter fighting ensued and the enemy overran forward elements, infiltrated the perimeter and rendered friendly positions untenable. The mortar section was ord-

The mortar section was ordered to withdraw, but the enemy had encircled and closed in
on the position. Observing a
grenade lobbed at his emplacement, Private Smith, fully aware of the odds against him,
shouted, a warning to his comrades and flung himself upon
the grenade and amothered the
explosion with his body.
Although mortally wounddin this display of valor, his
intrepid act aswed 5 men from
death or serious indury. Prijsate
Smith's inspiration conduct and
supreme sacrifice reflect lasting.

KENTUCKY CROP WEATHER Agricultural News-Farmers average 5.2 days in the field as last week was filled with sunshine and little or no rainfall. The soil moisture situation is changing rapidly, and as of last Friday was reported as 11 percent short, 78 percent adequate and 11 percent sirplus. Shortages in topsoil moisture were becoming evident in a number of counties in the Eastern half-of-Kentucky, while surplus a of counties in the Eastern half of Kentucky, while surplus a mounts were still reported in low-lying areas of Western Ken-tucky. Many fields were worked when too wet, and fields in general have become hard and a light rain would be very bene-ficial. Primary activities this past week were harvesting wheat, planting soybeans, har-vesting bay, cultivating tobac-co, and fertilizing corn and soy-beans.

co, and rerthing corn and soy-beans. Corn and Soybeans: Early corn made very rapid growth and 12 percent of the corn is saseling. This compares with only 2 percent a year ago but is about average for this date. A high percentage of the corn is tasseling in southern areas of West Central Kentucky. Average height of corn is about 40 inches. There is evidence of chemical damage on some rain-washed corn fields. Soybean planting advanced rapidly and is now 70 percent complete. This is well behind last year (96 percent) and the

complete. This is well behind last year (96 percent) and the 5-year average of 92 percent. Most beans left to be planted are in the bottom lands or on acres to be double cropped following wheat harvest. In most years, yields will average less on soybean planted this late. We do have some reports of no-till beans planted in stubble that have already emerged. Average height of all emerged soybeans is about 5 inches.

Tobacco-Burley tobacco is

is about 5 inches.

Tobacco-Burley tobacco is generally all set, but some resting is taking place. A preponderance of our reporters say tobacco is in fair condition. Generally the early set tobacco is the most promising, with the tobacco set in low areas the poorest. In much of the Bluegrass and Central Kentucky, rainshowers are now needed.

One of County's Biggest Payrolls Comes From Mason Backhoe and Construction

At a time when businesses in Rockcastle County are being honored we thought it appropriate to do a story on one man's business that brings over \$320,000 a year into the County. That man is Ernest Mason and his business is Mason's Backhoe and Construction with offices on Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon. Mason employs 29 men of which 20 are from the county.

His company does nothing but work for & L&N - ditching, flxing road crossings, unloading crossites and helping to clear up/derailments and put the track

derailments and put the track back in order. Mason has 14 crews of 2 men each with a backhoe and a truck in each crew. His crews are stretched from Florida to Illi-

On call 24 hours a day, Mason says that the work is sometimes long and hard but the benefits, he feels, are well worth it. Mason pays his operators \$7.00 an hour and his truck drivers \$5.50. We are always looking for trained operators and we have positions opin now," Mason said.

Mason has been with L&N
for 11 years and his business has
gotten bigger each year. This
has allowed him to hire more
people and pay them better
wages.

When asked if he had ever had a contract with L&N, he said, "No, when you do a good job, you don't need a contract, they will call you anyway."

One of Mason's old school mates, Doug Miller, is his supervisor and is in charge of the crews when Mason isn't around Miller is an operator himself and fills in when all the crews are out on the job and no one else is available. After Miller's gone it's Mason's turn to sit on the backhoe, which Mason says, "comes much too often."

Seventy-eight Medias of Honor were awarded during the Koréan War. Three were to servicemen from Kentucky andone of the three was Smith.

Smith was born November 10, 1926 in Livingston and graduated from high school there. He had two sisters, Nellie and Mable and three brothers, Eugene, James and George. Of the five, only two, Mable and Eugene survive and both live in Ohio. According to his sisteriniaw, who still lives in Livingston, two of his brothers, Eugene and James also served in the Korean War.

He was remembered by those who knew him as a good boy who never caused any trouble.

There were three men who eived Medals of Honor dur-There were three men who received Medals of Honor during Indian fighting in the Battle of the Little Big Horn in Montana. Records show the three, william M. Harris, George D. Scott and Thomas W. Stivers entered the service in Mt. Vernon, Ky. but it is uncertain as to whether or not they were residents of the county at the time (circa 1873). The date is arrived at partially from the fact that General Custer with whom the men fought, lived in Elizabeth. town from 1871-1873. He was sent from there to deal with the Indians, presumably after rounding up all the kentuckians who would consider going with him. with him

In 1876 Custer and 264 men In 1876 Custer and 284 mere killed at the battle that is known as Custer's Last Stand. Of the men named, none had Rockcastle as a birthplace. Harris and Stivers were born in Madison County, Kentucky and Scott listed Garrard County as his birthplace.

his birthplace.

The Medals of Honor were awarded to the three men for "voluntarily bringing water to the wounded under fire."

Following the turn of the century, the number of medals awarded was drastically reduced and a more complete record as to the reason for the award was made and kept. Twelve hundred were awarded Twelve hundred were awarded during the Civil War and 416. between 1861 and 1898 for con-flicts with hostile Indians. The flicts with hostile indians. The large number of winners per-haps accounts for the vague accounts of heroism and the small glory accompanying the

medal. Today. Freedom's Founda-tion at Valley Forge, Pennsyl-vania compiles a history of Medal of Honor winners com-plete with a picture. Many men and boys from this county fought and died in World War II and many more earned distinguished records. Plans are to include some re-lated articles in later issues. In 1976. the Rockcastle Jav-

Health Dept Gives Advice For Getting Rid of Insects

Too often people who com-plain about pests don't realize they themselves contribute to the problem.

Basically, all insects and rodents need to live and thrivan are food, water and shelter and these animals are not picky.

They can survive under condi-tions that would kill a human being.

tions that would kill a human being.

This inspector has collected samples from metal walls in refrigerators which confirmed that mice were living in the refrigerator. Apparently, they had gnawed their way through the metal walls into the refrigerator and were nesting in the insulation in the walls, coming out at night to eat.

Whether in a restaurant, grocery or home, the same methods (with certain restrictions or pesticles) could be used to eliminate these pests and keep them out.

them out.
The following information came from the Kentucky State Department of Health, courtesy of the USPAS Food Service Manual in February, 1956. The advice is as good today as it was

To get rid of rats and mice and keep them out: 1. Keep the place clean, and free from trash; 2.Block their entrance; 3. Starve them out by keeping floors clean and using tight garbage containers; 4. Store foods and supplies above the floor.

To get rid of flies and keep them out: 1. Keep the place clean; 2. cover all foods; 3. close garbage cans tightly; 4. close all openings, use screens, etc.; 5. get rid of food wastes at once; 6. get

rid of breeding places for files;
7. doors must be self-closing; 8.
use fly swatters, traps, paper
and insections.

To get fid of cockroaches
and keep than out: 1. keep the
place clean-bod housekeeping;
2. close openings; 3. keep garbage cans 'closed tightly; 4. dispose of garbage daily; 5. use
Insect sprays; 6. starve them out;
7. keep the floors clean; cover
all foods at night; eliminate all
hiding places; 10. upon delivery,
screen vegetables and groceries
for roaches.

Solvency of the state's unemployment insurance system
is shaping up as the primary
isbor and industry issue for the
1882 General Assembly.
The national recession has
caused the Commonwealth's unemployment rate to go as high
as ten percent this year and also
served to bankrupt the state's
unemployment insurance trust
fund.

fund. The unemployment fund, built up by mandatory business contributions, has been empty for months. By the end of June, the state will have borrowed more than \$50 million from the federal government to keep up payments, and expects to borrow another \$50 million by Sentember.

September.
The Department for Human
Resources has proposed several
options aimed at addressing the
situation. These proposals are
being considered by the Labor
and Industry committee.
One proposal seeks to install a one-week waiting period
before benefits begin and reducing the maximum number of
weeks for basic benefits from 26
to 24.

weeks for basic benefits from 26 to 24.

Another proposal suggests that businesses increase from \$6,000 to \$9,000 the portion of a worker's salary on which companies are required to contribute to the benefits fund.

Of course, the state can continue borrowing indefinitely from the federal government, as some states have. However, this could lead to higher business contribution rates and/or interest penalties leveled by the federal government that would raise the rates even higher.





USING COMMERCIAL JARS
Economizing is important to all of us these days. However, when it comes to buy the pain gome canning jars, it pays to buy the real thing. Saving empty mayonnaise and peanut butter jars for home canning may seem like a smart inflation-fighting idea now, but in the end it may cost more. The wise consumer knows not to take chances when home canning.

Commercial food jars are excellent glass jars, but they are made to serve a single purpose only to package food products bought at the grocery store. Although they are made from the same raw materials as home the same raw materials as home USING COMMERCIAL JARS

the same raw materials as home canning jars, they are not meant to be reused in home processing. If they were made to be reusable for home canning, then the food we buy in glass jars would cost

re.

Consider the condition of a numercial jar after the food commercial jar after the food has been removed. Aren't metal knives commonly used to scrap the last bit of peanut butter or mayonnaise from the jar? Metal utensils can scratch the inside of the jar. When the jar is heated, stress will build up at the scratched point and may cause a break at this point. This will also cause a loss of food as well as the time and energy spent in preparation. That's not a wise money-saving idea.

Not only can home processed peanut butter or mayonnaise jars break more, easily, males preak more, easily,

raise jars break more easily, there are other overlooked problems when using commer-cial jars for home canning. All important processing times may important processing times may be inadequate. A mayonnais jay may look like a standard home canning Jar, but it may actually hold several more ounces of food. If processing is done according to standard recipe processing times, the food may not be heated through to the genter of the jar and be under rocessed. Unimprocessed to did will spoil and will not be safe to eat. Processing times need to be exact and that's

Our adivce is, don't try to save money by home canning with salvaged peanut butter or mayonnaise jars. With the possi-bility of jar breakage and food spollage, why gamble with ex-pensive food and your family's health and safety? Stick with standard home canning jars; it's
