## Final Candidate Spending Report

Candidates spent anywhere from \$5,979.59 to nothing at all, during the recent county election, according to financial reports on file in the county clerk's office.

Danny L. Ford, candidate for State Representative, was the big spender during the election spending \$5,979.59 on his campaign. On the other hand, his opponent for the Republican nomination to that seat, now Circuit Court Clerk, Money Ed Cummins, spent only \$1,598.69 on his campaign.

The large difference in the money spent was about the same as the difference in the votes received on election day. Ford carried all 14 precincts and beat Cummins 3031 to 1157 in the county.

In the hotly contested race for County Attorney James H. Lambert outspent all the rest seeking county office by putting \$3,230.09 into the campaign. His opponent, William D. Gregory, spent \$1,429.87 on his campaign.

The big difference in the money spent did now show up in the final count in the voting on July 25. Lambert won by a narrow 94 votes over Gregory.

In the closest race of the election, the County Judge Executive, now Judge Hubert Thacker, outspent both of his opponents but the result was not in his favor. Thacker spent \$2,108.83, to winner of the seat, Frank DeBorde's, \$1,501.77 and Leonard "Roge", Hammond's, \$1,009.15.

On the Democratic side of this ticket, Bob Jasper spent more money than did his opponent Graydon Cummins. Jasper spent \$612.44 to Cummins' \$125. Jasper also outpooled Cummins 10 to 1 with 495 votes to Cummins' 10.

One race in which the victor of the seat did not spend the most money was in the Circuit Court Clerk's race. Denver Miller won the race by some 800 votes but was third in line for spending the most money at \$1,116.90. Robert Robinson spent \$2,621.26, the most in this race but ran a distant third in the vote tally. Ernest Stanley spent the second largest amount of money and that is where he ended up when the votes were all counted. Stanley Moore spent \$755.00 and ran fourth.

In the race for County clerk, incumbent Irene Bales put more money into her campaign than did her opponents. Mrs. Bales spent \$1,190.99 in winning her second straight term. Jerry Carter ran third in the voting but was second on the money list at \$109.07 and Harvey Pensel spent \$68.60. The fourth candidate for the office, Freda Abbey failed to file her

William Taylor did not spend the most money in the race for Sheriff but he did get the most votes. Taylor spent \$1,908.10 in winning his first ever try for public office.

Billy Kirby spent the most money in the race but ran very distant second. Kirby spent \$2,008.75. Lamey Durham was third on the money list and that's where he ran on the ticket. Durham spent \$1,529.65 in his unsuccessful bid for the office. Eugene Stevens spent \$858.94 while Farmer Waddle spent \$721.00 and Joe Stevens spent \$642.75. James Bowman spent \$601.20 and Kenneth Harris spent the least money of all the candidates spending no

## Roads to Get Half of \$901,964 County Budget: \$54,000 for Health Building Repairs

Only three magistrates, Dan Sargent, Joe Clark and Amos Burdette met with County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker in a special meeting of the Fiscal Court Tuesday morning to approve planned spending for the coming year.

The court is obliged to meet before the first day of the new fiscal year which begins July 1 and vote on the budget and decide whether or not to pay claims as presented to the county for 1980-81.

The court voted to approve the \$901,964 budget for 1981-82 and to pay all claims as presented. This reflects a \$98,652 increase over last year's \$803,312 total budget.

Of the total \$901,964 budget, \$620,904 is considered General Fund and amounts to what the county budget would be without the \$281,060 federal Revenue Sharing monies handed to the county this year as in the past several, with few strings attached. Last year Rockcastle received only \$194,680 in Revenue Sharing Funds.

The \$620,904 figure for estimated receipts is arrived at by combining the following sources of state and local income: Department of Human Resources Child Support Unit (state), \$1,000; Administrative Office of the courts (state), \$15,000; strip mine permits (state-local), \$5,350; Local Government Economic Assistance (state-local), \$84,950; property tax transfer (local), \$6,200; motor vehicle and operator's licenses (local), \$1,000; county road aid (state), \$235,645; election expense refund (state), \$2,300; jail fees (local), \$6,000; occupational licenses (local), \$1,100; courthouse rental (local), \$8,300; truck license distribution (local-state), \$70,000; delinquent tax receipts, \$1,500; tax levies, \$179,559.

The total budgeted for the general expense fund is \$188,030 and for the county road fund, \$309,645; local government economic assistance, \$84,950 and a miscellaneous fund, \$41,279.

The largest slice of the general budget (over \$122,000) goes to pay salaries, benefits, and personnel costs for courthouse officials. Office supplies, printing, advertising, insurance, utilities and several other miscellaneous courthouse expenses make up approximately \$21,500 of the budget. The remainder of the itemized expenditures includes interest on Rockcastle Industrial Development Authority, \$7,500; reserve, \$7,432; debt service, \$12,803; and subsidies to services in the amount of \$12,250.

The county road fund budget makes only two distinctions in how money is budgeted—\$55,000 of the total \$309,645 is designated to pay labor costs and the remaining \$254,645 is for maintenance, supplies and materials.

Rockcastle County received local government economic assistance aid in the amount of \$48,950. This was, according to Anna Rose Mullins, assistant to Judge Thacker, the first time the county has received this particular revenue. Of this new money, \$44,950 will be spent on

Brian O'Grady, press secretary to Rogers, said however, that the Small Business Administration (SBA) had been approved to make money available at low interest rates (3% to homeowners and 5% to businessmen) for flood related damages to persons in Rockcastle, Jackson, Lee and Owsley.

## Those Who Fought And Died

As the day approaches which symbolizes our freedom and stability as a nation, it seems fitting that some remarks be made concerning those who have fought for this continuing cause.

Time sometimes dims our sense of what is historically significant. Often we remember only the heroes about whom movies are made, so seldom are the individual efforts and honorable actions enumerated.

The only Rockcastle Countyman to win the Congressional Medal of Honor was Private David Monroe Smith, son of the late Dave and Lou Moore Smith of Evingston.

The citation reads as follows:

Private First Class David M. Smith, Company E, 9th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Division distinguished himself by conspicuous gallantry and outstanding courage above and beyond the call of duty in action near Yongsan Korea on September 1, 1950. Private Smith was a gunner in the mortar section of Company E, emplaced in rugged mountainous terrain and under attack by a numerically superior hostile force. Bitter fighting ensued and the enemy overran forward elements, infiltrated the perimeter and rendered friendly positions untenable. The mortar section was ordered to withdraw. The enemy had encircled and closed in on the position. Observing a grenade lobbed at his emplacement, Private Smith, fully aware of the odds against him, shouted a warning to his comrades and flung himself upon the grenade and smothered the explosion with his body. Although mortally wounded in this display of valor, his intrepid act saved 5 men from death or serious injury. Private Smith's inspiration, conduct and supreme sacrifice reflect lasting

road maintenance and labor costs. The remaining \$40,000 will be spent on the newly purchased Health Department building for renovation costs.

A miscellaneous fund appropriates money to the health department, library, soil conservation office and the county extension agency in the total amount of \$41,279.

The biggest chunk (\$100,000) of the Revenue Sharing Budget was appropriated for materials and supplies for county road maintenance, bringing to a total of \$453,000, the amount to be spent on the county's roads. The next largest appropriation was for health services including \$45,000; garbage disposal, \$3,900 dog wardens, and \$14,592, health department, building renovation for a total of \$63,492. The jail received \$600 from Revenue Sharing and the library, \$5,000. Financial Administration accounted for a \$41,895 appropriation to cover expenses such as fairground and courthouse utilities and county treasurer. Sixty-thousand went to courthouse repair and maintenance in an account entitled, Capital Construction, Maintenance or Equipment. The Senior Citizens Program received \$8,000 and social services received \$2,000 from Revenue Sharing.

The loans can be obtained by applying to rental furnishings or repair property.

O'Grady announced that the SBA would be in McKee to set up a Disaster Relief Center Tuesday night July 7 at 7:00 p.m. to give more information concerning loan assistance. The office will remain open on July 8 and 9, all day.

The location of the center will be publicized as soon as arrangements are made.

The deadline for applying for flood relief is August 29th.

**Social Security Administrative Costs Are Low**

Social security pays just 1.5 percent of all the social security taxes collected to administer the programs of retirement, survivors and disability benefits, a

**KENTUCKY CROP WEATHER**

Agricultural News-Farmers average 5.2 days in the field as last week was filled with sunshine and little or no rainfall. The soil moisture situation is changing rapidly, and as of last Friday was reported as 11 percent short, 78 percent adequate and 11 percent surplus. Shortages in topsoil moisture were becoming evident in a number of counties in the Eastern half of Kentucky, while surplus amounts were still reported in low-lying areas of Western Kentucky. Many fields were worked when too wet, and fields in general have become hard and a light rain would be very beneficial. Primary activities this past week were harvesting wheat, planting soybeans, harvesting hay, cultivating tobacco, and fertilizing corn and soybeans.

**Corn and Soybeans:** Early corn made very rapid growth and 12 percent of the corn is tasseling. This compares with only 2 percent a year ago but is about average for this date. A high percentage of the corn is tasseling in southern areas of West Central Kentucky. Average height of corn is about 40 inches. There is evidence of chemical damage on some rain-washed corn fields.

Soybean planting advanced rapidly and is now 70 percent complete. This is well behind last year (86 percent) and the 5-year average of 92 percent. Most beans left to be planted are in the bottom lands or on acres to be double cropped following wheat harvest. In most years, yields will average less on soybean planted this late. We do have some reports of no-till beans planted in stubble that have already emerged. Average height of all emerged soybeans is about 5 inches.

**Tobacco-Burley tobacco** is generally all set, but some resetting is taking place. A preponderance of our reporters say tobacco is in fair condition. Generally the early set tobacco is the most promising, with the tobacco set in low areas the poorest. In much of the Blue-grass and Central Kentucky, rainshowers are now needed for these tobacco plants. Black shank is being reported, but here in Kentucky we have no reports of Blue Mold. There has been excessive leeching and many tobacco fields are going to need addition fertilization. Average height of set tobacco is above last year with nearly 25 percent over 12 inches and another 45 percent in the 6-12 inches height range.

**Winter Wheat-Winter wheat** harvest is 82 percent complete compared with 42 percent last year and the 5-year average of 50 percent.

social security representative said recently. This information, pertaining to 1979, was contained in a report recently published by social security's Office of the Actuary.

The report also shows that administrative costs, which include salaries, rent for property and equipment, building operating expenses and supplies, have been decreasing over the years both as a percentage of taxes collected and of benefits paid. Administrative expenses amounted to just 1.4 percent of benefits paid in 1979.

In 1957, for example, administrative expenses amounted to 2.2 percent of taxes paid. This year was the first that disability benefits were paid.

Administrative expenses have increased more slowly than either tax income or benefits paid in spite of the fact that the programs have grown greatly in size and complexity over the years, the spokesperson said. Of course, actual dollar expenditures have increased each year even though the ratios have decreased.

The decreasing proportion of administrative expenses to income shows that administrative productivity has increased. This favorable trend is expected to continue into the future as the program matures.

The report shows that the services provided by social security to the public have been getting cheaper relative to the costs of other services, based on the consumer price index. Since 1960, this relative cost has decreased by about 10 percent.

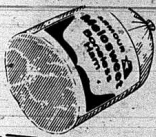

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## Health Dept Gives Advice For Getting Rid of Insects

By Steve Midkiff

The Health Department gets occasional complaints or requests for help to get rid of pests.

"Too often people who complain about pests don't realize they themselves contribute to the problem.

Basically, all insects and rodents need to live and thrive are food, water and shelter. And these animals are not picky. They can survive under conditions that would kill a human being.

This inspector has collected samples from metal walls in refrigerators which confirmed that mice were living in the refrigerator. Apparently, they had gnawed their way through the metal walls into the refrigerator and were nesting in the insulation in the walls, coming out at night to eat.

Whether in a restaurant, grocery or home, the same methods (with certain restrictions or pesticides) could be used to eliminate these pests and keep them out.

The following information came from the Kentucky State Department of Health, courtesy of the USFAS Food Service Manual in February, 1956. The advice is as good today as it was then:

To get rid of rats and mice and keep them out: 1. Keep the place clean, and free from trash; 2. Block their entrance; 3. Starve them out by keeping floors clean and using tight garbage containers; 4. Store foods and supplies above the floor.

To get rid of flies and keep them out: 1. Keep the place clean; 2. cover all foods; 3. close garbage cans tightly; 4. close all openings, use screens, etc.; 5. get rid of food wastes at once; 6. get

rid of breeding places for flies; 7. doors must be self-closing; 8. use fly swatters, traps, paper and insecticides.

To get rid of cockroaches and keep them out: 1. keep the place clean-good housekeeping; 2. close openings; 3. keep garbage cans closed tightly; 4. dispose of garbage daily; 5. use insect sprays; 6. starve them out; 7. keep the floors clean; cover all foods at night; eliminate all hiding places; 10. upon delivery, screen vegetables and groceries for roaches.

## Legislative Report

By Rep. Harold DeMarcus

Solvency of the state's unemployment insurance system is shaping up as the primary labor and industry issue for the 1982 General Assembly.

The national recession has caused the Commonwealth's unemployment rate to go as high as ten percent this year and also served to bankrupt the state's unemployment insurance trust fund.

The unemployment fund, built up by mandatory business contributions, has been empty for months. By the end of June, the state will have borrowed more than \$50 million from the federal government to keep up payments, and expects to borrow another \$50 million by September.

The Department for Human Resources has proposed several options aimed at addressing the situation. These proposals are being considered by the Labor and Industry committee.

One proposal seeks to install a one-week waiting period before benefits begin and reducing the maximum number of weeks for basic benefits from 26 to 24.

Another proposal suggests that businesses increase from \$6,000 to \$9,000 the portion of a worker's salary on which companies are required to contribute to the benefits fund.

Of course, the state can continue borrowing indefinitely from the federal government, as some states have. However, this could lead to higher business contribution rates and/or interest penalties levied by the federal government that would raise the rates even higher.

Clearly, solvency of the state's unemployment insurance system is a legislative issue with battle lines being

**Barren:** bluegill fair to good along steep banks; white bass fair in the jumps; black bass fair casting spinner baits and plastic worms along points and rip rap; clear, falling slowly, 14 feet above pool and 80 degrees.

**Nolin:** white bass fair night fishing off steep banks; black bass fair casting plugs... worms off points at night; clear, falling, one foot above pool and 84 degrees.

**Rough River:** bluegill slow in coves; white bass slow in the jumps; clear, falling nine feet above pool and 82 degrees.

**Herrington:** black bass fair

at night casting plastic worms and spinner baits off points; bluegill fair along steep banks; clear to murky, falling slowly, two feet above pool an 83 degrees.

**Green:** bluegill good on worms and crickets off shallow banks; crappie slow over submerged cover; clear to murky, falling, at summer pool and 80 degrees.

**Cumberland:** white bass and crappie fair night fishing off steep banks; walleye fair trolling deep runners off points and along gravel banks; in tailwaters, trout good; clear, falling, seven feet below timberline and 82 degrees.

**Dale Hollow:** white bass and crappie fair to good night fishing off steep banks; walleye fair trolling deep runners along points and shallow banks; clear, stable at one foot above pool and 84 degrees.

**Laurel:** trout fair night fish-

ing off steep banks; bluegill good in the shallow; clear, stable at 3/4 feet below pool and 80 degrees.

**Cave Run:** bluegill fair off steep banks; black bass fair early and late and at night casting plastic worms off points; clear, stable at pool and 82 degrees.

**Buckhorn:** bluegill fair in the shallows; white bass and crappie slow night fishing off steep banks; clear to murky, stable at pool and 84 degrees.

**Grayson:** bluegill fair in coves; crappie slow over submerged cover; clear to murky, stable at one foot above pool and 80 degrees.

**Dewey:** crappie slow over submerged cover; bluegill slow in coves; murky, stable at pool and 82 degrees.

**Fishtrap:** crappie slow over submerged cover; bluegill slow in coves, clear, stable at pool and 80 degrees.

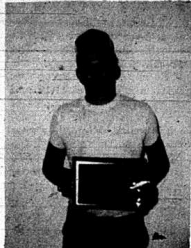

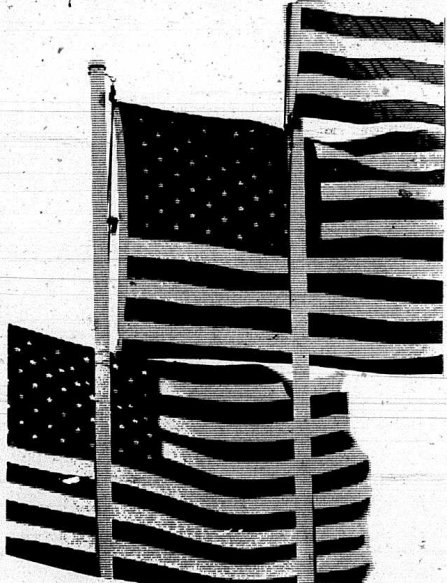

### USING COMMERCIAL JARS

Economizing is important to all of us these days. However, when it comes to buying home canning jars, it pays to buy the real thing. Saving empty mayonnaise and peanut butter jars for home canning may seem like a smart inflation-fighting idea now, but in the end it may cost more. The wise consumer knows how to take chances when home canning.

Commercial food jars are excellent glass jars, but they are made to serve a single purpose only - to package food products bought at the grocery store. Although they are made from home canning jars, they are not meant to be reused in home processing. If they were made to be reusable for home canning, then the food we buy in glass jars would cost more.

Consider the condition of a commercial jar after the food has been removed. Aren't metal knives commonly used to scrap the last bit of peanut butter or mayonnaise from the jar? Metal utensils can scratch the inside of the jar. When the jar is heated, stress will build up at the scratched point and may cause a break at this point. This will also cause a loss of food as well as the time and energy spent in preparation. That's not a wise money-saving idea.

Not only can home processed peanut butter or mayonnaise jars break more easily, there are other overlooked problems when using commercial jars for home canning. All important processing times may be inadequate. A mayonnaise jar may look like a standard home canning jar, but it may actually hold several more ounces of food. If processing is done according to standard recipe processing times, the food may not be heated through to the center of the jar and be under-processed. Under-processed food will spoil and will not be safe to eat. Processing times need to be exact and that's

hard to do with odd sized jars.

Sealing commercial jars creates other problems. Even though two-piece home canning lids appear to fit correctly on commercial jars, they may not seal later in storage. The jar rim on a commercial jar may not be as even as the rim on a home canning jar, leaving a space where air can enter and cause spoilage. Special closures are made from commercial jars; two-piece lids are specifically made for home canning jars. The two should not be interchanged.

Our advice is, don't try to save money by home canning with salvaged peanut butter or mayonnaise jars. The possibility of jar breakage and food spoilage, why gamble with expensive food and your family's health and safety? Stick with standard home canning jars; it's the wise choice.
