New Exhibit Hall for Fairgrounds

If everything goes as planned, there will be new spaces for the exhibits on hand at the Little World's Fair this July. The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court gave Judge Thacker authority to sign a contract with Carter Johnson to enclose the area underneath the new bleachers, at the fairgrounds at a cost of \$5,000, at their regular monthly meeting Tuesday.

The enclosed area would be on the project, with the other two bids at \$13,300 and \$9,500, according to Judge Thacker who told the court that Johnson had promised completion of the project by July 25th, which would be in time for the annual fair.

The enclosed area would be used for the exhibits put on display each year by the various 4-H projects and individual persons in the county, with an area for concessions and other activities.

The court voted to transfer \$6,744.60 into the fairgrounds utilities and miscellaneous expense account to help pay for the project.

In other business the court gave Judge Thacker authority to borrow \$50,000 from the Bank of Mt. Vernon, of which \$35,000 will go into the road fund account. The \$35,000 will be repaid from truck licensing distributions within 80 days. The other \$15,000 will go into the general fund and will be repaid from tax money no later than November 1.

Several persons were at the Fiscal Court meeting with items to bring to the court's attention. Jim Cox came before the court with matter concerning the Mt. Vernon Fire Department's county runs.

Cox told the court that the truck that the fire department is now using on county runs was bought in 1960 and is almost out for operating condition. Cox told the court that they need to be aware that in the near future Mt. Vernon would no longer be able to answer calls outside the city limits due to lack of proper equipment.

Mt. Vernon made approximately 19 runs in the city limits last year.

Cox really never made it clear why he and other members of the fire department were there except to say that they wanted to make the Fiscal Court more aware of that would be happening shortly.

"We'll postpone talking about this right now," said Judge Thacker, "and talk about it later. We'll help you if we can." The court will act before the change the name of the Rockcastle County Civil Defense to

Rockcastle County Disaster and Emergency Services. The Court unanimously approved the change.

Judge Thacker will have a field named after him at the fairgrounds in Brodhead. James Kirby came before the court as a representative of the Little League Council and asked the court if they would approve of the council constructing a sign at the field with no cost to the county. The field will be named after Judge Thacker and the sign will also have all of the magistrates names on it.

Roy Adams of Ford Realty and Auction Co. Inc. of Mt. Vernon came before the court to offer them two roads on the James Poynter property, and the Cummins Brothers property. The roads are 40 feet wide and at present, have no homes on them.

The court voted to take the roads into the county but added a clause in the motion stating that no work would be done on the roads until there were homes built on them.

The court also voted to live the old Gilford Road near Livingston. The road has four families living on it and will be maintained by the county

Pickers of Blackberries

It is blackberry pickin' time in Rockcastle County again, so get out your yard bucket and hit the briary, chiggery, snakey trail that leads from one blackberry vine to another.

There are probably as many kinds of blackberry pickers in this area as there are seeds in a blackberry. I personally know of several kinds. Perhaps there are more.

First there is the "commercial picker" who picks to sell to others. Usually this picker, town folk and older folk would go without blackberries, so this picker is valuable and deserves a word of recommendation.

Next comes the "eat-in picker" who hits the patch early on because his mouth has been watering since early January for a warm blackberry cobbler with vanilla ice cream melting and running down into the juice. This kind contributes nothing to his fellow man and he only picks for temporary, sensual gratification.

The "homemaking picker" is the one who stands over the stove all summer making jelly and jam of all varieties and descriptions so she can stand back, proudly count and then casually mention in conversation with a neighbor that she has put up a mere 300 pints of jelly. This person goes into the berry field with one thought in mind and this is how much jelly she is picking. This type sometimes sends a family member

into the field while she "works up the apples." The "sent picker" is perhaps the most miserable and pathetic picker that picks, for he or she receives little or no monetary reward, gets little personal satisfaction and in a few cases may not even like blackberries.

This brings us to the last and by far the most enthusiastic picker, the "second-childhood picker." This type picker, has for years, had the same aversion to the blackberry patch as to a warm cow pile. In a few cases it was said that he had "gotten above his raisin'" and perhaps felt he was "too good to pick."

However people change and after a separation from the pastoral scene of perhaps 20 or 25 years this one begins to romanticize and yearns to return to the fondly remembered natural and uncomplicated lifestyle of childhood which included skinny dipping in the creek, smoking cornslinks and pickin' blackberries.

Flashbacks of being out in the field in 93 degree temperature with the bearing sun burning through long sleeves buttoned at the wrist (to keep the briars off), hair wet with sweat under a felt hat (best to keep the sun off), the smell of kerosene (taking the breath away (worn on rags tied at the wrist and ankles to keep the chiggers off) and hot feet in gum boots (worn to prevent snake bite) have faded.

LEGISLATIVE REPORT

Kentucky's state representatives and senators are continuing to prefile bills, with the Legislative Research Commission, for the General Assembly's 1982 regular session.

Legislators prefile bills in order to give their legislative colleagues and the public ample opportunity to study their proposals before the 1982 session convenes in January.

Profiled bill 58 seeks to reduce the motor vehicle usage tax rate on new motor vehicles from 5 percent to 2.5 percent. This bill has been referred to the Appropriations and Revenue Committee for discussion and study.

Profiled bill 62 seeks to eliminate the requirement of a physician's statement for a disabled voter applying for an absentee ballot. This bill has been sent to the Election and Constitutional Amendments Committee.

Profiled bills 83 seeks to provide for the development

and implementation of an automated motor vehicle and trailer registration and titling system in all counties of the Commonwealth. This bill has been referred to the Transportation Committee. However, this issue will also be considered by several other committees before 1982.

Profiled bill 93 seeks to create a new section in Chapter 350 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, relating to strip mining, to direct the setting of a bond with the Department of Natural Resources not to be required until within ten days of the date postmarked on the envelope containing the notification of the approval of the application for a permit to strip mine coal. This bill has been referred to the Agriculture and Natural Resources committee for study and consideration.

Profiled bill 104 seeks to require the state in the case of counties over 75,000 in population, the Department of Finance return 25 percent of the fees collected from the sheriffs and clerks to their fiscal court on a quarterly rather than an annual basis. This bill has been referred to the Counties and Special Districts committee.

Profiled bill 139 seeks to provide military recruiters access to university campuses and student directory information if access is made to other recruiters. The purpose here is to provide the same courtesy as that afforded to business and industry recruiters. This bill was prefiled by the Education committee.

Profiled bill 170 seeks to prohibit utilities from increasing basic residential rates to persons aged 65 and older. This bill would also require the

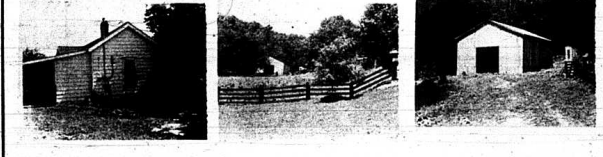

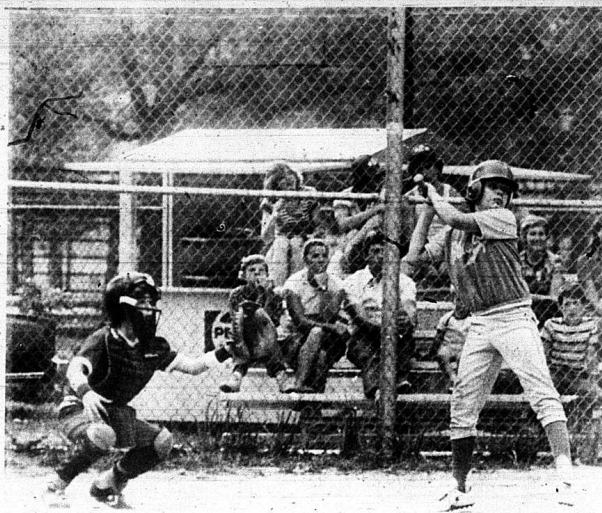

Fishing Report

Night fishing continues to be the best bet at most Kentucky lakes but some white bass and bluegill are also being taken during the day-light hours. The lake-by-lake rundown, according to the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

Kentucky: sauger good trolling and on minnows; white bass excellent; (and large sized) on spoons; bluegill good on willow flies; in tailwaters, catfish and white bass good; clear, stable at summer pool and 78 degrees.
Barkley: white bass fair in the jumps; bluegill good; in tailwaters, catfish excellent; white

bass and bluegill slow, clear, stable at summer pool and 79 degrees.
Barren: black bass fair on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers; white bass fair trolling and in the jumps in early morning and late afternoon; clear, falling at 10 feet above summer pool and 80 degrees.

Nolls: black bass slow at night on deep runners; white bass good on surface baits; crappie and bluegill slow; clear, stable at one foot above summer pool and 84 degrees.
Rough River: crappie slow at night; bluegill slow; murky, falling at four feet above summer pool and 86 degrees.
Herrington: black bass fair at night on artificial nightcrawlers along deep banks; bluegill fair along deep banks; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 84 degrees.

Green: black bass fair at night on artificial nightcrawlers; bluegill good on worms and crickets; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 80 degrees.
Cumberland: black bass slow at night on artificial nightcrawlers; white bass and crappie fair to good at night under lights about 30 feet deep off points in the main lake; walleye good trolling over mud banks and points in main lake with deep runners; in tailwaters, trout excellent (some limits); clear, stable at 7 feet below the timberline and 84 degrees.

Dale Hollow: white bass good at night off deep banks and points; crappie fair over submerged cover; walleye fair trolling across points with deep runners; clear, stable at one foot above normal pool and 84 degrees.
Laurel: trout good at night; bluegill fair in the shallows; clear, falling slowly at 4 feet below power pool and 81 degrees.

Cave Run: black bass fair at night and early morning on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off deep banks; bluegill fair on worms; clear, stable at summer pool and 80 degrees.

Buckhorn: white bass and crappie fair at night over stickups; bluegill good on crickets; clear to murky, falling slowly at summer pool and 84 degrees.

Grayson: crappie slow over submerged cover; bluegill fair; clear to murky, stable at one foot above summer pool and 81 degrees.

Dewey: crappie and bluegill slow over stickups and tree-tops; murky, stable at summer pool and 79 degrees.

Fishtrap: crappie and bluegill slow; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 80 degrees.

AN AMAZING FOOTBALL STORY

LEXINGTON — Al Morgan must have the easiest job in Kentucky. He's the ticket manager at the University of Kentucky. Al hasn't even opened the ticket sales windows in Memorial Coliseum this summer and he's already sold out the tickets for four of Kentucky's six home games. The season tickets are all gone but there are individual tickets left for games at Commonwealth Stadium for Kentucky's opening game against North Texas State and against Virginia Tech.

Al Morgan won't open his ticket windows for almost a month. On August 3, what few tickets are left will go on sale to the general public. Morgan has already written to the schools on Kentucky's home schedule to see if they have any tickets they can't sell. "We'll sell 'em like hot cakes when we open the windows," Morgan says.
How come tickets are left for just two games? "We set aside a certain number of tickets for the visiting schools," Morgan says. "North Texas State and Virginia Tech didn't want as many as we had set aside, so that's the only reason we have tickets for those two games. We'll be completely sold out by early August."

It is one of the most amazing success stories in college sports. Winning football teams sell tickets. Losing football teams go begging. That's certainly the case at UK, where the Wildcats won only three games last season, the second worst record in Fran Curci's eight years as coach.

Why do the fans bother to come watch their team lose week after week? Who says they're going to lose this year? Kentucky football fans are an optimistic lot and there's sound reasoning behind their belief that Kentucky will be a better football team this year.

Then too, game day in Lexington is Kentucky's most gigantic party. The fans arrive hours before kickoff time. They bring food and refreshments in their cars and campers and the parking lot turns into a festival.

What few tickets left for this season's football schedule at UK will soon be gone and Al Morgan smiles a lot when he can hang up the sold out sign.

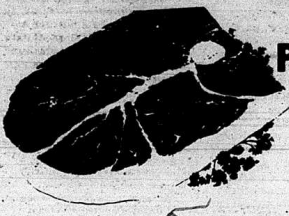

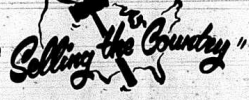

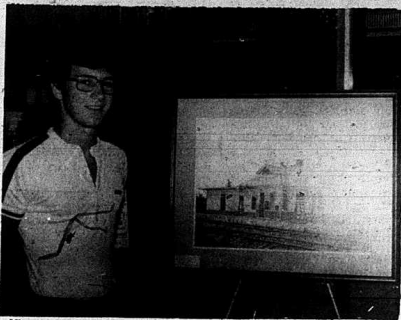

ker is usually a person between 40 and 50 years of age who is under daily stress and strain and is mistakenly recalls the patch as a haven of calm serenity akin to being on a boat on a placid lake. While tolerating the daily hassles of an office, he or she may look forward to getting home and "hitting the berry patch" where the stresses (at least if they do not disappear) take on a more concrete form, i.e. copperheads, mosquitos, sharp briars and bees.

Once there, this backsliden but rededicated modern-day picker allows his mind to wander to earlier pickin's and he inevitably recalls that his mother warned him 95 or so times, "look out for snakes... copperheads smell like fresh cucumbers... a rattlesnake makes a sound like buttons rattling in a jar... some snakes make a hissing noise..." The warnings had made him jumpy everytime he heard a June bug or the slightest noise.

He remembers the uncontrollable itching that commenced after 30 minutes in the field and the more he scratched the more he itched until... well he thought he could not endure it.

The salty breeze that was used to kill the chiggers drips into his hand.
He thinks about his irritat-

ing little brother who used to stand and fuss and complain and beg to go home until it made him want to hit him. The whiner never got any berries picked.

He checks his fingers periodically for signs of stans.

And then the story comes to mind that Aunt Polly used to tell about a woman who went to the berry patch and left her children by the road to wait until she came down from the mountain with her berries. Someone came by about dark and found the children, whose mother had not returned. A search party was sent and the berry was reportedly found dead of a snake bite to her throat. Mercy! It was a true story.

With that recollection and one glance around for snakes and one glance into the plastic pickin' container, the "second-childhood picker" decides to call it an afternoon and come back tomorrow, maybe.
