## Executive Session Is Popular At Monday Meeting of City Council



"Step right up and get a plate filled with fish, hush puppies and slaw," say the three young ladies behind the serving counter at the hospital-sponsored Fish Fry Saturday night. The servers

The main business before the Mt. Vernon City Council at Monday night's meeting was conducted in executive session—a discussion of the proposed water rate increases with representatives of the two water districts and of the City of Brodhead.

The Council also went into executive session to conduct a discussion with Sterling Hoskins, operator of the Renfro Valley Boat Dock, and afterwards the only comment made on this session was by Mayor Roland Mullins that no action was taken.

The discussion with water district representatives and the City of Brodhead was a lengthy one which culminated in the council having to rescind their previous motion to revise the billing rate to the City of Brodhead, Northern Rockcastle and Western Rockcastle Water Districts to a standard 84 cents per thousand gallons. The motion, passed by a 4-3 vote, was

Mayor Roland Mullins raised the question of whether it would make any difference that the city was negotiating with the two districts for a rate increase at the time of the anniversary date of Northern's contract. Clontz said that would be a matter for a judge to decide if Northern chose to fight the increase.

In the case of Brodhead's contract, it, in effect, states that their rate cannot be changed without a change also in the rate structure for customers in Mt. Vernon. However, Mayor Mullins said after the meeting that, should the Council choose to do so, this change in rate structure to Mt. Vernon users could be effected by changing the structure in such a way as to effect only a few of the biggest users and their rate would possibly be lower if it were standardized with Brodhead's rate.

The representatives were asked to meet among themselves and try to come up with a figure agreeable to them and the city for an increase. Mayor Mullins pointed out that the City was merely trying to raise an additional \$35,000 in revenue yearly and had figured the increases to amount to only about 20% of the district's and Brodhead's total operating costs. In their original motion, the council also offered these customers a new office space, telephone and billing equipment free of charge to help reduce their operating costs and offset the rate increase.

In other business, the council heard a report on what has been done and is planned to alleviate the flooding problems being encountered by residents of Valley Manor. Subdivision 3 was reported that ditches had been pulled and the railroad culvert had been cleaned out and that potholes in the streets would be filled with blacktop as soon as the blacktop plant was opened.

County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker, who was at the meeting, said the county would donate a five foot tile to be installed under the road leading down to the library which, along with the City of Brodhead, there, should take care of carrying off water during heavy rains.

Bids for the auditing of the city's waterworks books were opened. Four were received and they ranged from a low bid of \$1300-\$1475 to \$1745.00. Awarding the bid sparked some controversy since Councilman Tom Welch wanted to award the bid to Dwight Griffin, a local CPA, who submitted a bid of \$1,650 rather than to the low bidder, Greaves Ballback and Hart who submitted a bid of a minimum of \$1,300 and a maximum of \$1,475.

Welch said he would rather keep the city's money at home by giving Griffin the contract and asked City Attorney Carl Clontz if the council had to accept the low bid. Clontz said that while the council did not

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## Four Arrested in Weekend Shooting

Four Rockcastle County youths were arrested Monday morning in connection with a shooting which allegedly took place over drink coolers which were reportedly stolen during the Blue Grass Festival at Renfro Valley Saturday night or early Sunday morning.

Wounded in the shooting were David Durham, 26, and Bruce Durham, 32, both of Mt. Vernon.

Arrested and charged with first degree assault and second degree assault, criminal conspiracy and theft by unlawful taking were Randy Kirby, 20, and Ellis Bennet Hines, 19, both of Mt. Vernon. Also arrested and charged with theft by unlawful taking and criminal conspiracy were Greg Kirby, 17, and Earl Brent Kirby, 25, of Mt. Vernon.

According to state trooper, Guy Blevins, the trouble started when coolers belonging to the Durham boys were found by the Durhams near the Kirby van. He said that witnesses reported that after the initial trouble, the Kirbys left (about 5:00 or 5:30 a.m.) and returned. Reportedly Randy Kirby then got into the car with Ellis Hines and they began shooting from the car at the Durhams striking David Durham in the chest and Bruce Durham in the left arm.

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## Blood Drive July 21

On Tuesday, July 21st, the Rockcastle County Homemakers will hold their second Blood Drive of the year. This Blood Drive needs to produce 71 pints of blood for each county to keep pace with their second year Rockcastle County achieved "Total County Coverage".

This coverage means that any Rockcastle County who uses blood anywhere in the world, would not have to pay replacement costs for each pint of blood used. This is a special gift that healthy caring neighbors can give to their community and it would be a sad thing to see it lost. There are only 3 blood drives a year in Rockcastle County which must produce an average of 65 pints per visit in order to reach the county goal. As the first Blood Drive held in March produced 54 pints, the Homemakers would like to see well over 100 people come out and donate their blood Tuesday.

The hours for the Blood Drive will be from 10:00 a.m. to

1:00 p.m. and from 2:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. at the Bank of Mt. Vernon. Be a life-saver and give the "Gift of Life".

People often ask, "How do I know that people from my community have been helped by my donation?" To answer that question the following statistics have been made available.

From January through May of 1981, these people from Rockcastle County have received a total of 38 pints of blood in hospital outside of Rockcastle County: Johnny Abney, William Graves, Georgia Decker, Andy Cox, Fannie McClure, Sallie Cummins, John Shepherd, Zandall-Powell, Christine Mosses, Fannie Gill, Paul Owens, Preston Tankersly, Lou Payne and Welkie Ballinger.

The Rockcastle County Hospital reports having used 37 pints the first 5 months of the year for a total of 75 pints used by Rockcastle Countians while we donated only 54 pints at the March 1981 drive.

## CVADD to Continue Services

The Cumberland Valley Area Development District will be able to continue providing service to this eight-county area, Gatlinf Craig, Executive Director of the ADD, told Secretary George Atkins during the Secretary's visit to London recently. The question was posed in view of recently announced cutbacks by the Reagan Administration and subsequent limitations announced by one state agency.

"The continuity of developmental assistance by the ADD has been assured for the coming year, and the foreseeable future," Mr. Craig stated. When asked about the future, "We are forced to somewhat alter our course to meet current conditions but the basic mission of this coalition of Bell, Clay, Harlan, Jackson, Knox, Laurel, Rockcastle and Whitley Counties, to promote, develop and

improve this area for ourselves and our children will not change," Craig stated. "This continuance is possible as a result of a strong, rallying concern by both the involved Mayors and Judges and certain other state agencies that will be utilized."

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## DOT AWARDS CONTRACT

The State Department of Transportation has awarded a contract to eliminate an erosion problem on U.S. 25 at the south-east city limits of Mt. Vernon.

Melco-Greer Inc. of London was awarded a \$91,571 contract for the project.

The company will remove stone from the hillside that was cut for the road. Erosion of the slope had created a potential hazard from stone falling on the road.

## Two Accidents on I-75

Seven persons were injured in a 2-vehicle accident about 7:25 Thursday morning July 9 on I-75 about 2 miles South of Mt. Vernon, according to Jack Lawless, state trooper who investigated the accident.

George Ogle, 25, of Cleveland, Tennessee, driver of a tractor-trailer stated that he was traveling south behind the other vehicle when he fell asleep. He stated that he woke up before the impact and tried to cut to the left to avoid hitting the car but was unable to complete the maneuver. The tractor-trailer hit the left rear corner of the car driven by Robert Bledsoe, 23 of Dryden, Virginia, who received class #2 (disabling) injuries.

Also injured in the accident and taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital were six passengers in the car. Danny

Miles, 10, Michael Miles, 9, Clarence Miles, Jr., 37, and Frank Weiser, 4, all received class #3 injuries. Shirley Miles, 38, and Annette Bledsoe, 18, received class #2 injuries. All those in the Bledsoe car were from Dryden, Virginia.

State trooper Danny Trosper investigated an accident on I-75 a little more than an hour later at 8:44 Thursday morning in the Northbound lane about 5 miles south of Mt. Vernon.

According to Trosper, Charles Wilson, 40, of Phoenix City, Alabama, reportedly that he was following a tractor-trailer in the passing lane when he apparently fell asleep and ran under the truck driver by Fred Wilhelm, 55, of Cincinnati, Ohio.

Wilson received class 3 injuries and was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital for treatment.

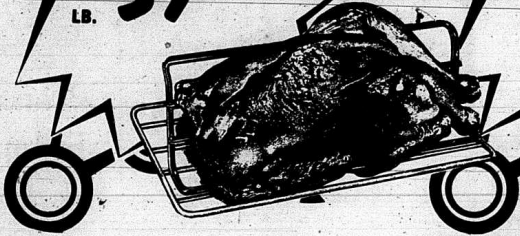

lizing the District to do contractual work. The Cumberland Valley Area Development District staff will continue to respond to the Judges, Mayors and any other individual upon request. As always, our office is open to any citizen and we can be reached by phone any business day."

Mr. Craig stated that the ADD, formed in 1988 by a group of progressive citizens and elected officials of Laurel and seven surrounding counties, continues to promote economic and human service development, as was the original purpose.

"When the ADD was formed, no city or county in this area could afford any planning or development staff. Competition for development dollars with more affluent cities and counties that did have staff found our area in a very unfavorable position."

Mr. Craig said, "Although Louie and/or McKee or Harlan County could not individually afford to hire a person to promote their interests, collectively they could. In order to promote development, the area needed a small staff of staffed people to work on local problems, so the District was formed. Our staff is now comparable to any in the state, placing our area in a very competitive position, so a good many people are committed to preserving this resource."

Mr. Craig pointed out that much mis-information about Kentucky's Area Development Districts had been disseminated by individuals who "are not

totally familiar with the organization and purpose of the Districts. "This is unfortunate, however, I am gratified that the more experienced do recognize the more comprehensive role that ADDs play in Kentucky. As an example, the state County Judge Executive Association, in their meeting last week, unanimously adopted a resolution of confidence and support for the State's Area Development Districts. The balance of Kentucky's 120 counties are grouped into fourteen other multi-county districts such as this eight county District in the Cumberland Valley area."

also have to, he felt the council should have a good reason not to other than that (the council) wanted to keep the city idea at home. Welch put his idea into the form of a motion which did not receive a second. Councilman Ernie Tolle then said that while he realized that Mr. Griffin did an excellent job last year when he was low bidder on the audit, he felt that the council should take the lowest bid. The motion was slow in getting a second but Councilman Roger McClure finally did and the motion was approved with Welch voting no.

Anita Plummer, the only bidder was awarded the audit of the city's general fund and tax books.

The city also formally adopted an ordinance banning the placing of any advertisements, utility signs or any other structure within the right-of-way of any street within the city limits of Mt. Vernon. Councilman Ernest Stanley had originally made the motion following the May Primary, in which he was a candidate when the right-of-ways were littered with candidates' posters. Stanley said at the time that he personally did not feel that placing the posters enhanced any candidate's campaign and they certainly detracted from the looks of the city. Penalty for the offense was set not to exceed \$25.

The Council heard a report from the street committees as to which streets in town needed blacktop the most. The streets given priority were Maple St., Coffey St., Davis St., Carter Dr., and the street going down to Bradley's Garage.

However, it was decided that sufficient monies might not be available to work on all the streets so the street committee will meet again and present their final recommendation to the full council next month.

Several items were placed on the agenda for a planned called meeting later this month. These include: discussion of a 10% pay increase requested by city water department workers, a part-time policeman and discussion of the 1979 tax audit.

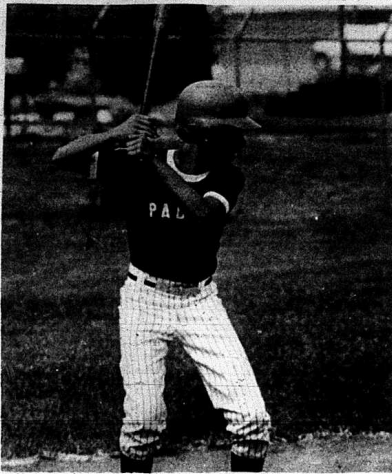

## Mrs. Mullins Remembers...

By Nancy Mullins

Certainly no other Rockcastle Countian has ever attained the recognition as an artist as has Bert Mullins whose art work is in the hands of private collectors, in homes and in public buildings in Kentucky and across the nation.

Mullins' widow, Mrs. Eva Mullins, whose love, devotion and encouragement allowed for much of his success, says her husband often asked for her opinion, once he finished a painting. She seldom gave an opinion frequently answering simply, "Tell me about it." She didn't make criticisms and seldom asked him to do a painting for her, however, he did do a pink and a yellow lady slipper at her request. She says his paintings are something she never grows tired of looking at.

Mrs. Eva was for some time an art major at Berea College, but changed her major to elementary education when she returned to school for the purpose of getting a teaching degree. She says she appreciates Bert's art work and his style, but feels if she had ever sat down to paint that she would have chosen bold, primary colors—red, yellows and blues—in a heavy, more modern style.

"Sometimes I think I'll get a pallet and paint, yet, (You should.) If you can be creative."

Maybe that's something for her to get into some day when she's not busy. Right now there seems no time, for she has, in the last few years since her retirement from teaching, been working to finish the home she and Bert began building over 40 years ago. She also pursues a hobby of cultivating flowers and landscaping with wild flowers, reading books including those by close, personal friend, Janice Holt Giles, and needle-

work of all kinds especially quilts. "If there's something you're bent on doing, you might as well try it—leave off everything and try. My problem is I always liked to do everything. I think if you dropped me off on an island in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean, I'd immediately find something to do."

During the summer of 1938 when the artist and his wife traveled to Provincetown, Mass. and rented a small cabin on the ocean for three months she found great joy walking the dunes while he was in town at the studio. In those days the beach was unmarred by tourists. The coast guard patrolled the beaches from stations five miles apart and there was a busy steamboat line, but no throngs of people. In the afternoon when the tide turned,

various types of large fish coming in to feed on minnows and sandhoppers were beached. They merely had to go out on the beach and select supper. Mrs. Eva remembers that they were good, not like the same variety of frozen ones. They also dug cherry-stone clams which were the biggest and best she can remember eating.

The next morning, sea gulls and other birds came to eat the remaining fish so there was no smell.

While there, Bert painted from his surroundings, light-houses, boats and other sea scenes. Perhaps because the mountains inspired him more than these unfamiliar surroundings, they returned to Rockcastle County to stay.

"Bert had the true artistic temperament", Mrs. Eva says of her late husband. "He didn't paint for money. A real artist is going to paint whether he makes a living at it or not. An artist gives up everything for art. It may be disappointing... but anything other than that is just a skilled or talented business person."

Bert was a shy person. Most people didn't know that. People were attracted to him. (In conversation) He didn't do much of the talking. His main interjection into the conversation was a periodical "I'll be damned". Mrs. Eva says of their relationship that like many married-people who transmit silent messages when in the presence of others, she could always tell when he was bored or tolerating a conversation by his eyes and his responses.

Another misconception about the artist she says was that he had black eyes. Actually his eyes were green. The fact that he had such overpowering black eye brows and eyelashes gave

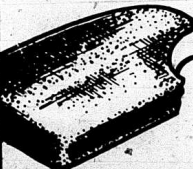

# At The Fair

Many projects will bring their wares to the Brohead Fair Monday, July 27. Some will exhibit projects they have completed during the year; others will bring freshly baked cookies, cakes, yeast rolls and nut bread. Some will display their talents in canning and some will show their expertise as tobacco farmers or in growing garden vegetables.

\$3 will be awarded for a bluebon, \$2 for a red and \$1 for a white in all 4-H categories except tobacco for which \$10, \$5 and \$3 will be paid for blue, red and white ribbons respectively.

The following classes are open only to 4-H members in Rockcastle County:

**Foods-4 peanut butter cookies, 3 squares breakfast cake, 4 yeast rolls, 1/2 loaf fruit or nut bread, 3 jars canned fruit (2 quarts different fruit and 1 quart tomatoes), 3 jars different canned vegetables, 2 jars different pickles or relish, and 2 plants jans, jelly or preserves.**

**Miscellaneous-geology (15 rocks labeled with numbers 1-15 of rock, where found and its use); insect collection from entomology project; photography exhibit from photography project.**

**Clothing-Unit 1: two items from stitching fun or simple skirt, pants, apron or top; Unit 2: vest, skirt, blouse, or simple dress; Unit 3: item from knit fabric; Unit 4: 1 or 2 pieces casual wear of woven fabric;**

Unit 5: dress, match, advanced dress which is lined, outer wear, special occasion clothes, and creative clothing are for seniors only. Knitted and crocheted items are for both juniors and seniors.

Furnishings and crafts-pin up board, wastebasket, throw pillow, hand crafted item (atch-hook or needlepoint), painted, refinished or unfinished accessory, bedspread, quilt or placemat, stitchery, string art, macrame, weaving, mosaics, ceramics, painting, drawing, decoupage or modpage, casting or candle making.

Electric & woodcraft-extension cords which have been either made or repaired, lamp, electric item made or repaired, birdhouse or birdfeeder, and advanced woodcraft.

Horticulture-4 white potatoes, 1 doz. green beans, 4 onions, 4 tomatoes, 4 green peppers, best pumpkin, 4 cucumbers, terrarium, and desert-dish garden.

Tobacco-one stick green burley tobacco.

Check in time for all exhibits except livestock is Tuesday, July 28 from 10 a.m. until 1:30 p.m. Exhibits will be judged at 1:30 p.m. Exhibits must remain on fairgrounds until 10 a.m. Monday, August 3.

4-H members may also enter their dairy animals from 5 until their closing, Monday, July 27. The dairy show will be at 6 p.m. For a catalog or for more information, call the County Extension Office at 256-2403.

then on.

Bert, who was the son of William Green and Eliza Mullins, had no formal art training, but showed an early talent and never lost an all consuming drive to create an canvas.

He used oil as a medium to produce pastel muted hues with simple linear backgrounds and subjects which suggest folk art and pastoral quality. Some have said there is an impressionistic quality to his paintings.

During the Depression, the government helped support struggling artists who were worthy by sponsoring contests in which artists submitted sketches of their work to be judged. The program was under the auspices of the Selection of Fine Arts of The Works Progress Administration. On the strength of his sketch entries, Bert received several commissions to do murals and portraits of historical notables both in Kentucky and in other states.

From this exposure he was to obtain future work and according to Mrs. Eva, was never out of work after this. His works include over 69 portraits, 36 seal paintings, 13 murals on public buildings and 12 religious murals in churches.

Examples of the artists work can be seen locally at the Mt. Vernon Elementary School library (mural-Wilderness Road and Rockcastle County Products), Renfro Valley Studios (mural-History of Music), Mt. Vernon History Church (mural-Jesus Bearing the Cross), Wildie Christian Church (mural-Jesus Knocking at the Door),

and the Clear Creek Baptist Church (mural-Jesus in the Garden).

A more complete description of the house at Disputants and more details of the artists life and works of art can be found in "The Mountain Artist" a book written in 1976 by Opp Bussell, Jr. about the artist.

**Enjoy Fruits of the Field**  
Blackberries are ripe now. If you are fortunate to have berries, here are some delightful ways to serve them. Enjoy fresh berries while they are at their peak. Blackberries are a good source of calcium, phosphorus, vitamin C and are low in fat. One cup of raw blackberries contain 85 calories.

**No Bake Blackberry Pie**  
1 baked pie shell or graham cracker crust  
1-1/4 quarts whole blackberries, washed  
1 cup sugar  
3 tablespoons corn starch  
1 cup water  
3 tablespoons blackberry flavored gelatin

Mix sugar and cornstarch well. Add water and mix. Heat to boiling, stirring until mixture is clear and thick. Mix in gelatin and cool. Stir in blackberries. Pour in pie shell and

chill. Serve with whipped topping or ice cream. 335 calories per 1/6 pie (plain).

**Blackberry Ice Cream**  
4 cups blackberries  
2 cups sugar  
4 cups heavy cream  
4 teaspoons vanilla  
Crush blackberries and force through sieve to remove seeds. Combine sugar and cream. Stir in berry puree and lemon juice. Freeze, makes 2 1/2 quarts.

**Fresh Blackberry Cake**  
1 cup shortening  
2 cups sugar  
3 eggs  
3 cups blackberries  
3 cups flour  
2 teaspoons soda  
1 teaspoon cloves  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1 teaspoon allspice

Cream shortening and sugar. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each. Sift flour, soda and spices together. Add flour to cream mixture. Gently fold in blackberries. Pour into 2 greased and floured 9" pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes. Frost with caramel or cream cheese icing.

the impression that his eyes were dark.

Following a 1950 article about the artist and their home by Allen Tourt, which appeared in The Courier Journal, they were swamped by visitors from everywhere and it finally became annoying to people who enjoyed and valued his freedom to paint. Berta students came with such regularity that they finally had to ask them not to come. Many times they would look up from breakfast coffee to see people tromping past their windows on a day's outing.

Entrance to the estate is now locked and is gained by invitation only.

Bert agreed for Eva to begin teaching during World War II rather than go into war industry. It turned into a career in which she spent 27 years. Even though he allowed her to teach, he would have much preference to have her within sight at all times, she says.

Mrs. Eva's philosophy with regard to education encompasses the theory that freedom of expression is of the greatest importance to children and that they should not be overinflated. She says that children in the lower grades can draw better than older children because they do not have preconceived ideas and expect their work to

look like a photograph. She found that if you ask a young child to paint a self-portrait, the likeness will amaze you.

Art lessons were a regular part of Mrs. Eva's curriculum in the rural school. She inspired her young students by taking them for walks and then asking them to paint.

Following their summer on Cap Cod, Bert and Mrs. Eva built a 2-room cabin at Disputants and lived there 10 years. They built their permanent residence a few yards away. The lifestyle chosen to avoid pressure and allow the artist to paint and create, something he had to do. The two were obviously well paired, for their goals and ambitions were seemingly one.

Together they built the natural rock stone house from the rock in the hills behind the house. With Bert's early learned carpentry and work working skills plus the creative nature of both, the house is something almost beyond description in its natural beauty and uniqueness. But Mrs. Eva did not stand with arms folded and watch as the house took shape. She did much of the "ground work" and was the scaffolding. One original feature of the house was the roof which was covered with hand-made oak shingles. However they were later replaced due to the threat of fire.

According to Mrs. Eva, Billy Ed Wheeler, famous writer from Berea, has written poems about the estate.

She is "sentimental" she says about every piece of furniture and once she sets a piece of furniture, that's its place from

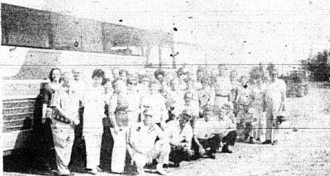
