Executive Session Is Popular At Monday Meeting of City Council

The main business before the Mt. Vernon City Council at Monday night's meeting was conducted in executive session-a discussion of the proposed wat-errate increase with represent-atives of the two water districts and of the City of Brodhead. The Council also went into executive session to conduct a discussion with Sterling Hos-kins, operator of the Renfro Valley Boat Dock, and After-wards the only comment made on this session was by Mayor Roland Mullins that no action

was taken. The discussion with water was taken. The discussion with water district representatives and the City of Brodhead was a lengthy one which culminated in the council having to rescind their previous motion to revise the billing rate to the City of Brod-head, Northern Rockcastle and Western Rockcastle Water Dist-ricts to a standard 84 cents per thousand gallons. The motion, passed at the May meeting, was to have taken effect with the July billing; however, the coun-cil was advised Monday night that contracts with the two districts would not permit the city to implement a rate in-crease to them at this time. Northem's contract, according Northern's contract, according to City Attorney Carl Clontz, literally says that any rate increase must be effected by its anniversary date-the latest of which was April 1, 1981. Since the contract extends for another the contract extends for another five years from that date, it would appear that it will be 1986 before Northern could be hit with a rate increase without their consent. Western Water District has the same type of contract only their next an-niversary date is December of 1982 at which time a rate in-crease could be effected against them.

In their original motion, the council also offered these three customers the services of office space, telephone and bill-ing equipment free of charge to help reduce their operating costs and offset the rate in-

County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker, who was at the meeting, said the county would donate a five foot tile to be installed under the road leading down to the library which, along with the 48" tile already there, should take care of carry-ing off water during heavy rains.
