Council Discusses Need For Additional Police Protection

The City of Mt. Vernon is in great need of more police protection, according to councilman Tom Welch and local business man Oscar Bullock. Bullock was present at the regular monthly meeting of the council Monday night to see what could be done about all of the break-ins and vandalism going on in the city.

Councilman Welch strongly agreed with Mr. Bullock and said that something had to be done. "It's a shame when you can't leave your home without fear of someone breaking in," Welch said. "I don't know what the answer is, maybe more policeman would help. We need an officer to come on at 1 p.m. and stay until 4 a.m. to help stop some of the crime going on at night," he said.

To add to the city's problems, they now only have three policeman whereas before they had four. Rank DeBorde resigned, effective August 10, to devote all of his time to campaigning for County Judge Executive against Councilman Bob Jasper this fall. Rank DeBorde Officer Jim Durham told the council, "We need another policeman bad." "We are having to work seven days a week, 56 hours a week," Durham said. Although the city has just put the council on call of hiring another one until Mayor Mullins returns from vacation.

Welch told the council that he felt like they should put on a curfew to stop the loitering on Main Street after 12 midnight. "They haven't got any business up there, nothing is open at that time of night," he said. "We're just the city government, we can do what we want to."

Another interested citizen, Don Mink, told the council that he was afraid to leave his wife, who has been in a wheelchair for seven years, by herself to even go to church because of all the trouble people have been having.

Oscar Bullock told the council that he had counted as many as 21 people in front of his store after midnight. "It's a shame when you have to sleep in your place of business because you're afraid to leave it for the night. Something has got to be done," he said.

Because of Mr. Mink's absence, the council felt handicapped and decided to put off any action until the Mayor was back in town.

In other business, the council voted to let the Forestry Department pump water out of Lake Linville to fight forest fires and voted to fix Davis Streets from Pic Pac to Lois Stevens driveway at a cost of \$4,000. The council also voted to fix two other streets, Locust Street Extension and Coffey Street.

The council also went into lengthy discussion about what to do with Hill Street. Because of some strong disagreement and the absence of the Mayor and Clarence Carter, who owns property around the road, the council members decided to put off any work on the road until the next meeting.

The council voted to give acting Mayor Ernest Stanley authority to sign checks while Mayor Mullins is out of town. Stanley is unable to accept City Policeman Frank DeBorde's resignation.

DOT To Repair Bridge

The Kentucky Department of Transportation will replace the bridge over Skegg Creek on Ky. 1249, Mt. Vernon-Sand Springs Road, in Rockcastle County.

Concrete has deteriorated on the present structure, which is more than 46 years old, causing a restricted weight limit to be placed on it. Construction officials said construction of the new bridge will begin after the end

The council voted to accept the three audits—one for the 1979 tax audit and the 1980 General Fund and Tax Audit.

The Council also told city policemen to start issuing citations for loud mufflers and to give people warning tickets first, allowing about 72 hours to fix them. If not corrected, the police were instructed to issue

another citation.

Few things of great importance were voted on during the meeting because of the absence of the Mayor and a council member. It was understood by the council members present that Mayor Mullins would have a called meeting next week when he returned.

Candidate Danny Ford Speaks To Kiwanians

The next session of the General Assembly will be one of the most difficult in the history of the Commonwealth, according to Danny Ford, Republican candidate for the House of Representatives from the 80th District. Ford spoke on several issues dealing with the problems of the Assembly at the Kiwanis club's annual luncheon last Tuesday.

Mr. Ford took a stand on several controversial issues that may have to be dealt with during the coming General Assembly. The issues included abortion, collective bargaining for public employees, repeal of House Bill 44, Gun Control and legalization of Marijuana.

Ford told the small group of Kiwanians that he was opposed to abortion unless the pregnancy endangered the mother's life or came about as the result of rape or incest.

Although Mr. Ford's wife, Sue, is a schoolteacher, he stated that he was against collective bargaining for public employees. "You only have to pick up a newspaper or turn on the television to see what chaos some of our cities are in because of strikes by teachers, firemen, policemen and most recently air traffic controllers," Ford said. "Let me reiterate, I am opposed to collective bargaining of public employees," he said.

Cut government waste and spending instead of repealing House Bill 44. This bill, which was enacted only two years ago, limits the tax increase to 4% yearly. Ford told the group that many members of the General Assembly had now given the bill time to work before they started calling for its repeal. "Under the provisions of House Bill 44, any municipality which feels the tax rate is not adequate to take care of its needs may [Cont'd to P-8]

Rockcastle County Schools To Lose

\$182,629 In State Cuts for Coming Year

The Rockcastle County Schools will lose \$182,629 in state money for the coming school year because of two statewide cutbacks to elementary and secondary education.

Rockcastle County Superintendent Charles B. Parsons, attending the Kentucky Association of School Administrators meeting in Louisville last week, received the local breakdown on the budget cuts from State Superintendent Raymond Barber.

According to the state figures, Rockcastle County will lose about \$52,498 because of the most recent \$39.6 million state

cut last week by Gov. John Y. Brown, Jr. That figure will include \$24,129 from current operating expenses, such as money for utilities, teaching and custodial supplies; \$11,400 from capital outlay expenses for new equipment and maintenance; \$25,000 student fee money and \$22,100 in power equalization money.

Earlier state cuts by Gov. Brown in March meant a loss of \$100,131 in state dollars for Rockcastle County Schools. Both cuts together total \$247,629. The school board and superintendent are left with the problem of what to cut out or

cut back to make up for the loss in revenue.

The cuts were on a percentage basis statewide. All 181 districts in the state received cuts in proportion to their budgets.

In addition to the state cuts, Federal Programs such as Title I and Title VI, were cut from 15 to 25 percent.

Candy Strippers: Teenage Volunteers Who Aid the Sick

Accent on Youth

The face of a perky young candy stripper or two along in the afternoon, when the hours seem to pass more slowly, can sure be a welcome sight to a patient-confined to bed at the local hospital.

The candy strippers, sometimes called "candy sticks" and "social workers" by patients are teenagers (boys or girls) who must be in high school to volunteer. They (usually in pairs) spend their time under the direct supervision of the nursing staff at Rockcastle County Hospital.

They may assist with feeding, take up food trays, run errands, deliver ice water, empty bed pans, make beds, attend a pediatric patient or stay with a patient who should be watched while smoking.

One volunteer, Patricia Rowe, fourteen year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Rowe, said that she was once asked to go to the store and buy chewing tobacco. Patricia became a candy stripper last spring. She is working on an FHA degree and being a candy stripper was one of the approved activities to help her qualify. Patricia said she chose this volunteer program at the hospital because she "kinda" wants to be a doctor. She also volunteered her time to help at the hospital sponsored fish fry.

The strippers are not limited to the number of hours they can volunteer, but they may work at the hospital only on two hours shifts. Most, according to Betty Purcell, director of staff development and in-service training at the hospital and

supervisor for the volunteers, spend two afternoons a week at the hospital during the regular school term. Vacations, jobs and other summer activities cause the number of girls and number of hours to be less during the summer months.

Ms. Purcell is responsible for the Strippers Orientation and training period which takes several hours and usually is spread out over about a 3 day period. Ms. Purcell says that the program, which was in effect when she came to the hospital in 1968, can effectively take only 12 volunteers at a time. Right now, there is a waiting list of girls who applied to work last spring.

The nursing staff at times may assign the strippers to the X-ray or lab department where the girls get wider experience. Debbie Wallin, a veteran of 3 years, has had this special opportunity and says she is considering either a career in some phase of health care or one in music.

Debbie has not spent much time at the hospital this summer because she has a job baby-sitting. She will be a Senior this year and has earned (from 25 hours of work) her cap and pin (from 50 hours of service). The pin is inscribed "teenage volunteers". She was motivated to volunteer, she says, as a freshman by a friend who needed a partner and she is glad she did.

call for a referendum and let the voters decide whether the tax rate for that local municipality should be increased on a state level. I don't feel repeal of House Bill 44 is the answer to the revenue problems and I support any legislation to repeal House Bill 44," Ford said.

Everyone has the right to bear and keep arms, it's a constitutional right. Ford told the Kiwanis and "I intend to support that right." Ford further said. He said that the so called limitation on the "Saturday Night Specials" will not eradicate harmful crimes and killings, but "strong and swift punishment would." The candidate said, "We have got to stop the criminals from returning to the streets for gun-related crimes."

Some states have already legalized the sale of marijuana and it could be proposed in Kentucky, Ford said that many people feel it will increase our revenue and enhance our economy.

However, Mr. Ford disagreed, he said that it would cost the state enormous sums of money for medical facilities, additional law enforcement and most of all heartache to parents. "I have two small children and I don't want to be raised in an atmosphere of easy to get pot. I will support any legislation to changing from a misdemeanor to a felony, those persons convicted for planting, harvesting or trafficking marijuana or other drugs," Ford said.

Ford also said that his main goal in the legislator will be to see the 80th district sprout new economic growth in drawing new industry to this area.

assistance." According to Stumbo, qualified low-income Kentuckians can apply for financial aid to cool their homes by having a physician or nurse practitioner or certify that the summer heat presents a risk to the life or health of a household member due to a particular illness or medical condition.

The assistance will be in the form of money paid directly to those persons in need, Stumbo said. "The one-time payments will range from \$10 to \$150 per household and may be used to help with utility bills, purchase fans or other cooling devices."

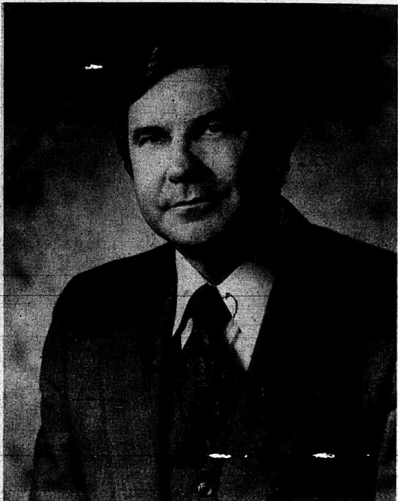
The program is the cooling component of the federal Home Energy Assistance Program which is administered in Kentucky by the department's Bureau, for Social Insurance.

Kentucky's portion of the program has a total budget of \$1.7 million and is scheduled to operate until the end of September or until the funds are exhausted, whichever comes first, Stumbo said.

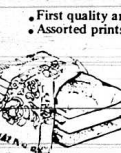

Controlling White Grubs In Lawns

White grubs are a major pest to lawn grasses in Kentucky and are causing problems again this year. According to University of Kentucky Extension entomologist with the College of Agriculture, now is the time for treatment of white grubs in your lawn.

The white, C-shaped, chubby worms with brown heads are causing extensive damage to some lawns. Grubs eat the roots of grasses causing a problem in the plant's absorbance of deeper soil moisture in the late summer months. As a result, large patches of dead grass five to 20 feet in diameter develop in grub-infested areas. Sod on these patches is not anchored well to the soil and can be rolled back to expose the grubs. If the damage is allowed to develop to this stage, it is usually too late to save the turf. As yet the grubs have not reached a size to have caused noticeable injury to the lawn, but the situation will change quickly when the weather turns dry. If your lawn had a grub problem last year, there is more of a chance that it will be reinfested this year.

White grubs are the larval stage of several kinds of beetles such as masked chafers. May beetles, green June beetles and

Japanese beetles. If these adult beetles are numerous in your neighborhood in June and July, you can expect a high infestation of white grubs later on.

To determine the amount of white grub infestation in your lawn, sample six or seven areas, cutting a square foot piece of sod and inspecting the roots closely for grubs. Be careful to catch all the grubs because many are small in the early stages of infestation. A sample count of seven grubs per square foot may indicate a need for insecticide treatment. Be sure to tamp the sod sample back into place and water it well to prevent permanent damage to the lawn.

Treatments are more apt to be effective before large numbers of grubs infest the lawn. If treatments are made later in the season, the grubs are harder to kill. Noticeable lawn damage may have occurred and there is less likelihood of being able to take advantage of rains. Insecticide sprays and granular treatments should be soaked into the soil immediately after they are applied. If the treatments can be applied right before a good rain, so much the better. Soil should be soaked to a depth of two inches or more after treatment. Lawns with thick slopes and thick thatch layers need more water.

There are three insecticides that are registered for control of white grubs-triclorfon (sold under the trade name of Dylox and Proxol), chlorpyrifus (sold

under the trade name of Dorsban), and diazinon (trade names Diaxion and Spectracide). Diazinon has given the most consistent satisfactory results in Kentucky tests.

Milky spore disease is effective only against the white grubs of Japanese beetles. The most prevalent white grub in Kentucky lawns are the grubs of masked chafers, even in areas where adult Japanese beetles are a problem. Entomologists warn that it is not worthwhile to use milky disease spores unless you are sure the grubs are Japanese beetles grubs.

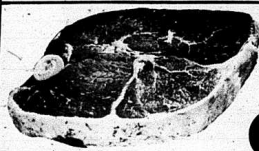

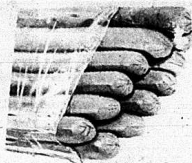
