Bennett Burton Dies Suddenly Sunday from Sting

Bennet Burlon, 45, of Mt. vernon died a out 2:00 p.m., Sunday, a few minutes after he

Sunday, a few minutes after he received a sting from a yellow jacket, according to local comorer, Bill Dowell.

Dowell said that Burton was on an outing with the Saddle Club and was near the Salt Petre Cave when apparently a yellow jacket nest was disturbed. Burton was stung once on the forehead and died a few minutes later.

According to one of the members of the Saddle Club who is a nurse, she administered aid to Burton in the form of a shot to counteract the sting; however, it did not revive him. of a shot to counteract the sting; however, it did not revive him. According to her, another member of the riding club employed the techniques of cario-pulmonary rescultation, but was unsuccessful.

Burton had been stung on the leg by a yellow jacket within the last month and was ill for a couple of days according to Dowell.

Burton died from anaphylactic shock, according to Dowell.

School Meal Prices Increase

The price of meals served at The price of means served at the county school cafeterias will increase when school gets in full swing this Friday, according to E.J. Smith, Food Service Director for Rockcastle County Schools.

Full-price lunches will be 70 cents for high school students this year-up 10 cents over last year. Reduced lunch for high school students will be 30 cents.

In the elementary cafeteria, the full-price lunches will go from last year's 55 cents to 65 cents this year, with reduced lunches selling for 25 cents.

Breakfast, which is served to approximately 800 students county-wide, is up from 25 cents to 30 cents this year.

According to informed sources, the family income Full-price lunches will be 70

level, qualifying approximately 65% of the approximately 2800 lunches served daily to be received free or reduced, will be dropped to exclude some who have been receiving free lunches.

Lunch money collection is the responsibility of each school therefore, the policy with regard to charged lunches varie with each school.

Smith said that lunch prices did not have to be increased as much as school officials had feared last year when threats to cut lunch room funds were first

Blue Mold Again Problem for Area Farmers

Blue mold, which caused significant damage to Burley tobacco crops in Kentucky two-quars ago, is rearing its ugly head on the farming scene once again in Kentucky tobacco patches.

patches.

Last year, due to the general drought, area farmers did not see blue mold in the

did not see blue mold in the patch.

However, some surrounding counties are especially plagued by the plant disease this year and some has been detected in Rockcastle County Extension Agent.

Blue mold is a downy leaf mildew caused by an airborne knigus. The disease is erratic in Kentucky, appearing for a few years, then disappearing only to return again. However, when it is here, it is a serious threat to all plant beds in the state because all tobacco presently grown is highly susceptible. Greatest damage usually occurs in beds located in the shade or

low wet areas and in very early and very late beds. Blue mold is favored by wet foliage from rain, dew or fog, by cool temperatures (50-85 degrees) temperatures (50-85 degrees) and by low light intensity due to shade or plant led covers back of the shade or plant led covers. Each of these factors plays a major role in the disease, but when all are present at once, when all are present at once is disease is capable of destroying the entire bed. Presence of a bluish downy mildew growth on the leaf is the best diagnostic feature of this phase of blue moild.

feature of this phase of blue mold.

In the field there are two kinds of blue mold, leaf blight and systemic blue mold. Leaf blight manifests itself first with yellow épots and then the development of a blue-gray mildew on the lower side of the spot. Later these spots will turn brown and die. During overcast, wet weather these spots and become so numerous as to destroy the entire leaf.

The fungus invades the vascular system causing a

brown discoloration just bemeath the bark in the systemic
blue mold phase. Since this
phase interferes with nutrient
movement and growth, considreable stunting, yellowing and
discoloration often results.

Mills says that at this
harvesting or near-harvesting

is in an active or a dormant
stage and how ripe the crop is.

If the tobacce is too
immature to cut, then spraying
with a fungicide is about the
only other alternative. Mills

almost impossible to get complete coverage by hand spraying.



the grueling 5 mile run.





Farmers Expecting Low Crop yields Should Notify ASCS

"Rockcastle County farmers who think they will be eligible to receive low yield payments on their wheat and feed grain crops should contact the county of th our office as soon as possible," Billy Lawrence, Chairperson of the Stabilization and Conservation committee, said.

The ASCS disaster

disaster The ASCS disaster payment program covers crops affected by natural disasters such as strong winds, hail, heavy rains or drought. To be eligible for disaster benefits, however, farmers must have however, farmers must have filed an accurate acreage report and the county committee must determine that the production loss was caused by the natural disaster. Payments are author-ized for a farmer whose crop yield is less than 60 percent of the established yield for wheat-and feed grains.

and feed grains.

Farmers who store all or a part of their harvested crop on the farm must have this production measured by ASCS before it is put to another use or commingled with production from another farm, he said.

"Farmers who sell their production should identify any corn or wheat sales slips, by farm, for proven yields or proven production and turn in their slips when harvest, is over," the ASCS official said.

If the crop is so poor that it will not be carried to harvest for grain or lint, ASCS must appraise the crop before its destruction or substitute use.

Disaster claims must be filed within 15 days after harvest.

If you have beans in your garden that have gotten too mature and beyond the green bean stage, don't let them go to waste. They're good as dried beans, a source of protein and other important nutrients

Let the beans mature and dry on the wines. Shell them and

spread them in the sun until the beans are hard and brittle.

in an oven on a cookle tray by
heating them for 10 to 15

Use the Right Kind
Of Salt For Pickles
When homemade pickles
don't turn out crisp and firm
with good, bright color, often
times it is because, of the
salt-using the wrong kind of
salt or using too much salt or
not enough. not enough.

Coarse pickling salt or

pure granulated salt is recommended for making pickless. Table salt contains additives which prevent caking and these additives can make the brine cloudy, also, iodized salt darkens pickles and is not recommended.

Rock-salt or ice resum salt

ens pickles and is not recom-mended.

Rock salt or lee cream salt should not be used for making pickles because these are not pure and are not intended for use in food.

Too much salt makes cucumbers shrivel and not enough, salt makes them soft and slimy. So it's important to use the right kind of salt and to measure it carefully. For information on making pickles and relishes at home, call the Cooperative Extension Service, office (256-2403).



Timplants Spur Calves

Growth Stimulating implants offer commercial beef cattle producers a speedy method of increasing growth rate of calves. But their use as profit-boosters is often neglected by beef producers.

Using growth-stimulating implants increases rate of gain, is seconomical and requires little skill, according to Extension beef cattle specialists at the University of Kentucky.

Producers who use implants in calves can expect an increased gain of about six percent for suckling calves and 10 percent for growing calves. Calves getting good quality feed and gaining at a fast rate will have an even greater response to growth-promoting implants.

Implants come in the form of pellets that are inserted in a calf's ear. They generally cost about one dollar per calf and about one dollar per calf and

In trials conducted in 28 Kentucky counties, implanted suckling steer calves gained an average ounds more than non-imed calves.
