Grand Jury Reports on Courthouse Condition

The July 1981 term of the Rockcastle County Grand Jury returned the following report on the condition of the courthouse facility Thursday, August 20, following its tour of the building.

The Grand Jury of the Rockcastle Circuit Court conducted an investigation of the Rockcastle County Courthouse and the Rockcastle County Jail. The Grand Jury found the jail to be clean, orderly and properly and efficiently maintained and administered. The Grand Jury has no recommendation concerning a change in the conditions of the jail and recommends that the Jailer, Billy Kirby, continue to perform his duties as he is presently doing.

The Grand Jury is shocked and outraged at the deplorable condition of the remainder of the Courthouse property and lays responsibility for these conditions on the County Judge-Executive and the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court. Numerous Grand Juries in the past have made recommendations and suggestions which have gone unheeded. The Rockcastle County Courthouse

is a new structure, one which the members of this Grand Jury and the citizens of Rockcastle County could once take pride. It is with hard earned tax dollars that our Courthouse was erected, and while we are aware of the demands of our economy on the county budget and the need for fiscal restraint, without basic maintenance our entire investment in this structure will be lost in the near future.

It is with this in mind that the Grand Jury makes the following recommendations and suggestions to the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court as to repairs needed to the courthouse. This list is by no means all inclusive, but merely represents obvious problems noted by us as members of the Grand Jury on a cursory tour of this facility.

1. The entire courthouse is filthy and lacks even basic maintenance.
2. The plumbing throughout the courthouse is leaky and in need of repair.
3. The roof of the courthouse is in need of repair.

Congressman Rogers Addresses the Issues and Answers Questions

He admitted that he does not agree with the administration's proposal to change the system especially with regard to the penalty for those anticipating early retirement.

He further stated that the administration and the Ways and Means Committee are studying the system and said, "Things are going to be okay, don't worry."

County Judge - Executive Indicted on 13 Counts; Two County Employees Also Indicted

Rockcastle County Judge-executive Hubert Thacker was indicted, by the Grand Jury Thursday on 12 counts of "theft by deception" charging illegal use of county gravel on private roads and driveways and one count of malfeasance of office.

Tom Kirby, truck driver for the county was named in four of the indictments and charged with aiding Thacker in the thefts.

Monroe Hansel, county-hired heavy equipment operator was named in two of the indictments as aiding Thacker in the thefts and was also listed as a defendant along with Thacker.

According to the indictments gravel was placed on private property belonging to Monroe Hansel, Dewey Robbins, Stella Moore, Calvin Barnett, Mae Leach, Howard Bullock, William McClure, Garrett Taylor, Frankie Martin, D. Stewart, Ed Thackett and Virgil Wynn.

In a telephone interview Tuesday, Judge Thacker declined comment on the indictments.

A maximum prison term of 60 years, a \$1,000 fine and removal from office are the possible penalties faced by Thacker if he is convicted. Thacker was defeated in his third bid for the office of county judge-executive in the May Republican Primary by magistrate Frank DeBordie. Thacker, Kirby and Hansel remained free on their own recognizance following Thursday's indictments. They are scheduled to be arraigned in Circuit Court September 25 at 1:30 p.m.

Adams' Desire to Play Led Him to Symphony

The situation is improbable, of course, but it would be interesting to know what this community would be like if we had been able to keep all those people born and reared here, who have moved away, especially those who have become successful.

Successful, of course, has many connotations but after an update on this former Rockcastle Countian, I think you'll agree, that he has perhaps achieved a youthful goal to become successful musically.

To those who knew Jack Lincoln Adams during the years he spent here, there was probably little to make them think that this musically intense and talented person who made Mt. Vernon High School Band and later Rockcastle County Band proud at regional contests and festivals, would be satisfied to stay here.

One of his former band students, Martha (Sowder) Cox, who played clarinet during her high school years recalls, "It is impossible for me to think of the man, Jack Lincoln Adams, without automatically thinking of words like 'great ability' and 'true quality' and without feeling total respect and gratitude. From the first day we band students lifted our musical instruments to the final school day when we closed our cases for the last time, we were exposed to the best music education possible. That was

more than we expected in such a rural school with limited resources, but we received much more from Mr. Adams. Because of his enthusiasm for music, he instilled an intense desire in his students to tackle the most difficult tasks. After being successful many times in these difficult tasks, his students learn to feel immense pride in themselves and their ability. He taught and demanded total respect in no uncertain terms, and accepted nothing less than the very best from his students. Out of Mr. Adams' unique teaching ability, he was able to plant these valuable seeds deep within his students that would last their lifetime and for that I will always be grateful."

Adams says some of his happiest years were spent

teaching school for Clyde Linville. He said, "I left, not to get away, but to get to a place where I could study, play and teach." Adams says he has always played and wanted to play, whether he was paid or not.

As a young boy in "knee pants, Adams remembers one of his earliest associations with music was that of playing drums in a local orchestra which included famous others from time to time, Bragg Thompson, "Wart" Thompson, Miss Kit Thompson, Pat Patterson, and Bill Kreuger.

The orchestra played for dances and social events traveling as far as Crab Orchard Springs to entertained.

180-81 ran \$159 million below estimates. State officials now expect revenues for this fiscal year to run \$282 million below original estimates.

Also, revenues for fiscal year 1979-80 ran almost \$48 million below estimates. Since the present administration took office during the last part of that fiscal year, they had to make up the difference.

The total of these figures add up to \$489 million that the administration had to make up by reducing expenditures.

The higher figures used by the administration include not only the \$489 million in budget cuts but also another \$187 million in reduced growth of expenditures.

Certainly, state spending under the present administration has grown less rapidly than in previous administrations. However, the retarded growth in state expenditures has been due to a recessionary economy and not because of any frugality on the part of state government.

Legislative Report

On July 28th the executive administration announced, in very general terms, the details of its fourth budget cut.

During that announcement the administration claimed that the total of its four budget cuts was \$676 million or 16 percent of the entire budget.

Those are impressive figures. Also, those figures are a bit misleading.

The administration's budget cuts for the last two years total \$489 million, not \$676 million. That's 11.2 percent of the original 1980-82 budget, not 16 percent as was claimed by the executive branch.

the 1980 General Assembly, the state's General Fund budget for 1980-82 totaled \$4,349 million. That budget was based on estimates of state revenues that eventually proved to be too high. Revenues for fiscal year

Wallace Proctor Receives Everett Brown Award

Mr. Wallace Proctor, farmer, carpenter and resident of Rockcastle County for some 50 years was chosen by the Rockcastle Improvement Council to receive the Everett Brown Award at the Monday night meeting.

The award was established by a trust set up by a son of the late Everett Brown, former resident of Level Green section of Rockcastle County. The Improvement Council administers the yearly award selection and presentation which honors the local citizen the council feels has contributed the most to the betterment of the community.

Mr. Proctor was cited for having been an active leader in the various aspects of community life and for having made these contributions as a private citizen on a purely voluntary basis.

Born in Pulaski County in 1908, Mr. Proctor married the former Novara Hasty of this county and moved here in 1937. He has been a member of the Bethel Church of Christ where he is a deacon.

For the past 25 years, he has served on the board of the local Soil Conservation District. Part of this tenure, he has served as chairman.

He has been a PCA director for 17 years, been a member of Farm Bureau for several years and has been president of the Farm Bureau for 14 years.

For the last six years, he has served as a director of the Western Water District Association. He helped organize the Livestock Improvement Association and for several years has helped with the Business Banquet.

Proctor has also been a member of the board of directors of the Farmer's Home Administration and of the Fair Board.

Mr. and Mrs. Proctor of Ottawa, have two sons, Arlos, a building contractor and Bobby, President of the Citizen's Bank of Brodhed.

Rogers said the system was in trouble when he and the present administration took

office and that it was going to require "some repair" to the plumbing to stop some leaks" and urged people not to be alarmed at the "noise" the "repair work" will make.

In answer to one question, he said old age and survivors benefits, the one trust which seems to be in the most "trouble" was running low for at least three reasons: one, people are living longer and drawing out more than anticipated; two, because of the high rate of unemployment, not as much has been coming into the fund; three, with the passage of the Minimum Benefits Program a few years ago, which assures (no matter how much was paid into the fund) that each recipient will receive \$122.50 per month. "In other words, more is being paid out than was paid in," Rogers commented.

Rogers assured those present that the commitment to people who have paid into Social Security would be honored and added, "President Reagan feels the same way."

The Congressman addressed the issue of welfare by saying we have overspent ourselves and the present administration is trying to cut back on welfare to people who are less needy.

He said one of the first things he voted on was to raise

the ceiling on the national debt from 930 billion dollars to 985 billion, in order to pay the past years debt. "It was either that or shut down the government. Something has to be done when you are paying over 90 billion dollars a year in interest on money, much of which is being given away."

Some time was spent explaining the ramifications of the new tax bill. He said he had sponsored one portion of the bill which will lessen or eliminate, in some cases, "death or estate" taxes. The purpose of this part of the bill, he said, is to lift the burden from small businesses and farms, thus allowing them to remain in the family.

Rogers told the group that he had recently invited the Mayors and County Judges of his district to Corbin to meet with major railroad officials and allow for local heads of government to voice complaints concerning the railroad. He said he specifically mentioned the rough crossings and the often long traffic blocked access in the center of Mt. Vernon.

With regard to the high interest rates, Rogers said interest rates were set by the Federal Reserve Board which is an independent agency over which Congress and the administration have no control except to establish or abolish.

He said the chairman of this board feels the way to curb inflation is by raising interest rates. Rogers said, "However, this causes the small businessman and farmer to be squeezed out and therefore is bad for our economic system. He further stated that the President, as he does and that there has been some discussion of abolishing the Federal Reserve Board.

Rogers voiced open fear for the future of the Tobacco Price Support Program and fear for thousands of people who will be affected if the program fails to withstand the current opposition. He pledged to do "hand to hand combat" to try to salvage the program when he returns to Washington this fall.

The Tobacco Price Support Program is in trouble, according to Rogers, because of the fierce

anti-smoking campaign, the budget cutting fever and the fact that the family of tobacco producing states are fighting among themselves and "our enemies see it as an opportunity to strike."

Rogers closed his session with an outpouring of praise for the people of Rockcastle and other counties which he represents.

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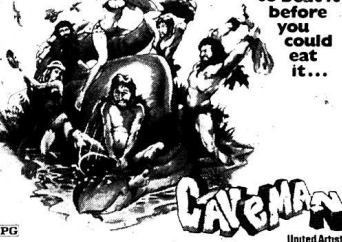

We had high hopes we would get a blacktop road built to the cemetery community this year. Eighteen persons attended the County Road Aid Public hearing this past June. We were requested that a portion of the 238.645 in county road aid funds be spent to build a hard surface road of approximately 1.18 miles to accommodate the community and cemetery users.

We were promised it would be looked into by the County Judge. So far we have heard nothing. This has been disappointing because we feel the road is needed here as much or more so as any road in the county because a school bus and mail route travels this road as well as the people. We still have hopes though that we will get a road. Thank you for all you help and kind words.

The band was organized during the school year 1938-39 with the sponsorship of the Mt. Vernon PTA, according to Jack Adams, one of the band members who has made a career of music.

Later, Adams recalls, when he was in the 8th grade, the Mt. Vernon PTA organized a band program conducted by John Griffy of London. Griffy came with some of his band students once a week and taught after school and at night. Adams said he chose a Conn trumpet which was bought through the director. He played in the band with about 20 or 25 other students.

He said he played every chance he got. His mother, a piano teacher, accompanied him. They played together at home, for social events, club meetings, "anything." "My desire to play increased more than my ability to play. There is only so much you can do taking lessons by listening to Harry James on the radio and playing by ear."

So, after graduation from Mt. Vernon High School in 1943 and a stint in the army, the boy who had "always played but had not studied" transferred from Berea College to the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music where he obtained a bachelor's degree in 1950 and a master's degree in 1951.

When he left the Conservatory, he went to New York for further study with the famous William Vacchione, who was "first trumpeter player of the New York Philharmonic for 38 years."

As a "broke music student," he worked for a summer in the Norfolk-Westport, Connecticut area helping build

houses. (Norwalk and Westport are considered part of Greater New York.)

"The first 'eastern fling' was followed by several years spent teaching school back home in Mt. Vernon, in Carrollton, Ky., in Oakland City, Ind., and finally two years spent teaching at Berea College. Looking for a place to settle following his marriage to Peggy O'Brian of Louisville and recalling pleasant memories of the culturally stimulating coastal town of Westport, the couple decided to look around. He filled out an application for a teaching position and was hired.

Jack Adams is now principal trumpet player for the Norfolk Symphony, having played with the orchestra for 14 years.

This May, Adams was one of two featured soloists at a gala benefit "pops" concert given in celebration of the symphony's 42nd birthday and the 25th anniversary of its women's sponsoring organization.

The benefit, which also featured jazzman-composer, Gerry Mulligan as guest performer, included a Strauss overture, Saint-Saëns' "Havaneise" and Chabrier's "España" as opening selections.

One review of the concert and of Adams' performance which appeared in the BRIDGE-PORT POST following the event read, in part, as follows:

"While Jack Adams, first trumpet with the orchestra since 1967, showed what his instrument could do in the way of sparkling staccato arpeggios in a brilliant solo-studded 'Trumpeter's Lullaby,' the other players entered into the spirit of the Bernstein selections from 'West Side Story' as completely as into the sinuous rhythms of the closing Borodin 'Polovnian Dances'."

Adams teaches band and instrumental music at Long Lots Junior High School in Westport and also teaches privately and in the Westport School's Summer session.

In addition to teaching and playing in the Norfolk Symphony, Adams plays for social events on weekends with his own five-piece band. For 15 years he has also been a member of the Sentimental Seventeen "big band."

Westport, Connecticut is part of a large resort area in the exclusive Long Island Sound area. It is home or a summer home for many famous musicians, writers, actors and t.v. personalities including Paul Newman, Harry Reasoner and Johnny Carson.

house needs to be replaced or repaired to stop leaks.

All walls need to be professionally painted and repaired where damaged, especially by water.

5. Ceiling tiles need to be replaced where damaged by water, and/or painted.

7. Many light bulbs require replacement, their covers repaired, replaced or cleaned.

jury. Let the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court be aware that this Grand Jury will re-evaluate the courthouse property when it reconvenes in November and December of this year. It is hoped and suggested that what appears to us to be a shirking and willful neglect of duty on the part of this body will cease, and that action will be taken by it to maintain and upgrade the courthouse property.

The Grand Jury would note in its final comment to the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court that better facilities should be provided for the Grand Jury to conduct its sessions rather than making use of whatever room happens to be available. This again is not only our suggestion, but has been noted by Grand Jurors repeatedly in the past. In this regard we would recommend that the wall separating the back room of the office periodically used by social security on the third floor of the courthouse and the back room of the law library be removed and the resulting larger room be made available to the Grand Jury. This area is presently no subject to constructive use, and would provide a meeting room of sufficient size to be used by other community groups when the Grand Jury is not in session.

The grand Jury wishes to thank Circuit Court Clerk, Money Ed Cummins, the Circuit Judge, Honorable Phillip K. Wicker, and Jailer Billy Kirby for the cooperation and assistance they have shown us during this term of Court. 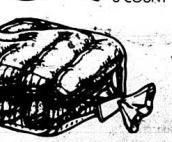

To Prevent Grub Losses
Kentucky cattlemen should treat cattle for grubs during the next few months to prevent possible weight gains, reduced milk production and lower quality beef and hides. Cattle infested with grubs may not convert feed efficiently and may show reduced weight gain, according to Extension entomologists in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. Damage depends on the number of grubs and how long they remain in the animal. Milk production decreases of 10 to 15 percent and beef gain reductions of one-tenth to one-fourth pound per day as a result of grub-infestation have been reported.

Grub infestations may lower the value of beef cattle. Cattle being finished for slaughter are discounted routinely at the market if they are grub-infested because slaughter plants must trim affected meat. The value of hides is lowered also.

The recommended treatment period is from August to the end of October. If grub control is attempted later than that, some damage already will have occurred and dead larvae may cause additional harm to cattle. The life cycle of the cattle grub makes early treatment necessary. Adult grubs lay eggs on the hairs of the animals in the spring. When grub larvae hatch, they bore through the skin, and for the next eight to

ten months, migrate through the animal's connective tissue. They move to the gutlet or the spinal column during November and December, and finally settle under the skin of the back in late winter.

Infested cattle should be treated before the grubs move to the gutlet or the spinal column. Killing large number of grub larvae in the gutlet or spinal column areas may cause bloat or partial paralysis because of the animal's reaction to the dead insects.

Treatment consists of applying or feeding a systemic insecticide to beef herds, and in dairy herds, to dry cows and young stock not being milked. Lactating dairy cows cannot be treated. Pour-on, spot-on or spray insecticides penetrate the animal's hide, and feed-through products penetrate the gut wall. The insecticide enters the blood stream and kills the larvae throughout the animal's body. With the pour-on method, the farmer estimates the animal's weight, measures the insecticide accordingly, and pours it along the animal's back. Instructions and a dipper are included with the product.

The spot-on is similar, except that a highly concentrated product is applied in only one spot on the animal.

Spray treatment requires a high pressure-sprayer, with 250 to 400 pounds of pressure per square inch. The insecticide must be forced through the hair so it can be absorbed through the skin.

Feed-through insecticide is given in mineral block or mixture, although it may not be

widely available because its active ingredient is no longer being made. Cattle should be fed the insecticide continuously for 14 days to insure grub control.

CUT COOLING COSTS

As long as a room air conditioner sits in a window, whirs and blows out cool air, most consumers pay almost no attention to it. But with increasing electrical costs, you should take some time to help your air conditioner do its job as efficiently and inexpensively as possible. To help you get the most from your air conditioner, we offer the following tips:

Place your room air conditioner in the window providing the best air distribution into the room you wish cooled. Don't worry about it being a south or west window. Exposure to the sun has less effect on air conditioner performance than air distribution does.

Be sure the air flow of the unit is not blocked by draperies or furniture. Air flow is also important on the outside, so trim shrubs and bushes and keep them away from the unit.

Keep the air filter clean. Take it out and clean it about once a month. Its job is to screen out larger particles of airborne dust, dirt and pollen. It should be vacuumed or washed periodically so it can perform its job efficiently without impeding the flow of air into the air conditioner.

Some brands of air conditioners need annual fan motor oiling and drain tube cleaning. If you're not certain about the instructions for your room air conditioner, check your owner's manual.

Take steps to keep hot air outside and cool air inside. This can be done by weather stripping around the air conditioner, using blinds or awnings on windows in direct sunlight, or closing drapes on windows without air conditioners. Close fireplace flues and seal heating ducts so cold air will not flow down open registers and be lost.

A good investment of the working family is an automatic timer to turn the air conditioner off in the morning and on late in the afternoon. Not all appliance timers will work with all air conditioners. Make sure that the timer you buy will handle the electrical requirements of your

air conditioner.

If you're adding an air conditioner or replacing an old one, consider a high-efficiency unit. It may cost more initially but will operate for less than a regular unit of comparable capacity. Consider the severity of the warm weather season and the unit's features including your decision.

Blanche Vegetables

Before Freezing
Blanching before freezing is one of the most important steps in preserving fresh vegetables safely, but it's a step that many people skip. Vegetables that are not treated in boiling water develop off-flavors, colors and odors. In addition, they lose vitamins A and C, thiamine and riboflavin. In comparison properly blanched vegetables will keep eight to 12 months in the freezer with little loss in eating quality or nutrition. The only vegetables you can take a shortcut with are green peppers and chives.

Although some people blanch vegetables by putting them in the dishwasher or even a washing machine, these methods are not safe. They don't get to boiling temperatures which are necessary to inactivate enzymes. They are certainly clean, but they are not blanched.

The recommended blanching method is to immerse the vegetables in boiling water before freezing. This is done by putting a small quantity of vegetables in a large amount of boiling water for a short time-usually from three to five minutes. The exception is corn which requires more time.

Here are some easy steps to follow when blanching vegetables: put enough water in a blancher or large kettle to cover the vegetables. Usually, one gallon of water per pound of vegetables or two gallons per pound of leafy green works well. While heating the water to a boil, clean, trim and cut up the vegetables. When the water is boiling, put the vegetable pieces in a wire basket or blancher basket or in a large, loose cheesecloth. Submerge in the boiling water, cover the pan, and start counting the blanching time for small vegetables.

When the time is up, remove the vegetables and plunge the basket or cheesecloth into ice water. This stops the cooking right away so that the vegetables don't taste overcooked. To preserve the vitamins, chill the vegetables only long enough to cool them, usually the same time as they are in the boiling water. Drain thoroughly. Any extra water on the vegetables will form ice crystals in freezing which can make them mushy. It even helps to spread the drained vegetables on a clean cookie sheet or
