Correction May Be Finished Ahead of Schedule

Residents and businesses are being temporarily inconvenienced by the closure of U.S. 25 to the south of Mt. Vernon in "the cut" above the Superpet Service Station.

The D.O.T. backlogs correction project originally announced to be expected to take 3 months, may not take quite that long, according to Fred Upchurch, spokesman for the D.O.T. District 9 Headquarters in Somerset. Upchurch said Tuesday, that if work goes as

smoothly as it has, the road might be open again in 6 weeks or so, meaning the correction would be finished about 4 weeks ahead of schedule. The road has been closed since August 17.

Traffic is presently being rerouted via Old U.S. 25 from the Elmwood Cemetery to the pepper station at the top of the hill.

Melco-Greer, Inc. of London got the \$91,571.27 contract from the D.O.T.

Use Box Numbers

Fiscal Court Votes to Make Courthouse Repairs And to Continue to Maintain Public Roads

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court voted to hire Delmo McClure at \$3.75 per hour to do clean-up work and make repairs on the Courthouse. McClure was hired to do all the necessary work beginning on the Health Department offices which were said to be in worse repair than the rest of the building.

Authority was also granted the Judge-Executive to hire as needed an electrician to fix the lighting.

Paul Hansel, road superintendent for the county came before the court and asked if the roads which "were listed in the paper as private" were to be maintained by the county. He said that several people live on the roads and asked, "Do you all want to shut these off and let the people get in and out the best way they can?"

Making reference to the recent Grand Jury indictments against the County Judge,

Hubert Thacker and two road workers for allegedly grading private roads and driveways, County Attorney James Lambert said, "A great many (roads mentioned in the indictments) despite what the Grand Jury believes, are public roads."

A motion was then made and passed to continue to maintain all public roads which have been maintained in the past by the county and to maintain safe turn-arounds for school buses.

In other business, the court agreed to spend up to \$2,000 to build a polling place at Brown precinct and to accept a blacktopped road from Clarence Carter in the Evergreen Estates Subdivision in the Spiro section of the county.

Mike Durham was hired at \$3.75 per hour as a county road worker.

The following amendments were made in the budget: \$515.77, refund and interest on overcharge from 1974-75 from KU-72.57 of it going to the Library Materials and Supplies Account and \$443.20 to Courthouse Utilities; \$7,000 from Community Development Agency (grant) to Grandstand Exhibit Hall Account; transfer \$6,000 from Economic Assistance Fund to General Fund to be repaid when funds become available.

Early Morning Accident

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School Board Approves Budget for 1981-82, Placements and Hirings

In regular meeting Tuesday night, the Rockcastle School Board approved a general budget of \$4,146,847 for the school year 1981-82. The general budget does not include money for Title I nor some other special monies such as money for the Federal School Lunch Program. It does include receipts from taxes, Foundation Program and other state aid and some federal aid as sources of revenue.

Despite reported cuts in funds made available to the local school districts, this year's budget is \$85,655 over last year's.

This year the tax rate was set at 6.5% and is expected to bring in \$92,230 from real estate and personal property taxes based upon the \$141,891,441 total assessed valuation.

The school system will receive \$3,126,377, the bulk of the budget from the state Foundation Program, \$2,760,000 of which goes to pay-for-salaries of principals, supervisors,

teachers and instructional staff, substitute teachers, secretarial and clerical assistants, library, audio visual tests, teaching supplies and instructional travel.

The other budget appropriations were as follows: \$78,000, administration; \$28,000 attendance services; \$26,000, health services; \$485,000 transportation; \$239,000, operation of plant; \$87,000, maintenance of plant; \$173,227, fixed charges; \$500, community services; \$40,000, capital outlay; \$248,120, advancements and transfers.

The Chairman of the Board, Rudolph Burdette, opened bids for coal and coal haul and after examination and discussion the board awarded the contract to the low bidder, Western Bulk Coal of East Bernstadt at a price of \$39.00 per ton at the tipple. William Taylor submitted the low bid of \$5.00 per ton to haul the coal from the Laurel County site.

In other business, hirings and placements took up several items on the agenda.

Assistant coaches Jerry Penso (Roundstone) and Eddie Thompson (Brodhead) subject to certification, and Dal Whitaker (Mt. Vernon) were named. Whitaker was named to help while Coach Charles Carter attends night classes. Carter will divide coaching salary with Whitaker. Penso and Thompson will receive \$600 each.

The following substitute teachers were employed subject to certification: Ricky Barnett,

Randall Adams, Della Scoggins, Deborah Stevens, Dennis Lawrence, Deborah Lynn Philbeck.

The board vote to hire Harold Everett Woodall as custodian at \$3.50 per hour at Brodhead School, to employ Karen Miller and Liza Yost as student cafeteria helpers at RCHS at \$1.30 per hour and to approve a contract with Mrs. Patricia Boyce to do student psychological testing as needed at \$40.00 each. A psychologist had already been approved by the board but she failed to sign the contract.

A request to transfer from the high school to Mt. Vernon Elementary was approved for Kenneth Cornelius. David Hansel transferred from the grade school to RCHS to take his place.

The board voted to approve the following bus drivers subject to state and local regulations:

Ronald Eugene Gabbard, Sylvia Gabbard, Charlotte Humes, Larry Travis, Preston Nunnely and Joyce Wilkerson as Tommy Renner as contract haulers.

Child Fatally Injured at Home

Two-year-old Dee Ann Pigg, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Pigg, was killed Saturday when she was accidentally struck by a truck driven by her father at their home on Terry Street in Owens Subdivision in Mt. Vernon.

Dewey Pigg and two sons were preparing to leave the driveway when Dee Ann apparently ran into the path of the moving vehicle according to the official report.

She was pronounced dead at the scene by County Coroner, Bill Dowell who said the child died of head-injuries.

Survivors besides her parents include two brothers, John F. and Shannon Dale Pigg, paternal grandparent, Eleanor Pigg of Lancaster; maternal grandparents, James and Sudie Kincaid of Brodhead.

Services were held Monday at the Brodhead Church of God. Cox Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Anthony Mason Suffers Gunshot Wound

Anthony Mason, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Mason of Orlando, is listed in serious condition in the St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington following a gunshot wound to the head.

According to Anthony's father, Anthony and a friend, Robbie Miller, of Mt. Vernon were at the Mason home Monday night where Anthony had been showing his friend an assortment of guns. Reportedly, the boys were sitting at the table

and Miller was on the phone to a friend when he picked up an automatic pistol and, thinking it was unloaded, pulled the trigger. The bullet entered over Anthony's right eye and exited above his left ear.

The accident occurred between 10:30 and 11:00 p.m.

Mason reported Wednesday that Anthony's condition was much improved and he was progressing better than was at first expected.

School Days... School Days...

School has begun again with its bells and smells of chalk dust and fresh paint, with its sharp-pointed pencils, its promises of unlocking vast storehouses of knowledge and with its new and nervous students.

Remembrances of my own early school experiences and those of my children and friends make me aware of the need for increased communication between child and parent when school starts.

Fears, pressures, and problems children face in the new environment at school particularly in the first year fade from the conscious mind once the child is at home again in secure and familiar surroundings.

I'll never forget my son coming home from school the last day of his first year overjoyed that he had passed to second grade. Even though he had made good grades all year, for some reason he feared he had failed first grade. He had never mentioned it to anyone.

I had a friend in grade school who was blackmailed out of her lunch money every day for several months by a child who threatened to tell on her. My friend had made a correct

statement about how babies were born. The truth was learned early after the black-maller made my friend go home with her from school. Her parents became alarmed when she didn't come home and finally traced her whereabouts. When she was quizzed about why she went without asking her parents, she finally told her secret and her personal terror was over.

My most vivid recollections are of first grade, which spent at two one-room schools, Level Green and Sand Hill. They are recollections of fear and embarrassment.

The fear was raw, stark and overpowering and came from talk around school by older more knowledgeable children about "shots" and "nurses". This was before the push for pre-school immunization and to my knowledge, I had never had a "shot", but I knew from what I heard that they were bad. Just listening to the talk I would get sick. I made up my mind early on that when the nurses came, I would run away from school.

Two or three times during that first year traveling missionaries visited the school. Evidently nurses and missionaries were the only ones who visited schools in cars because

there was always a few minutes of indecision on the pupils part as to whether our physical or spiritual needs were to be ministered to. I can distinctly remember standing poised in a cold sweat ready for flight until somebody announced, "It's missionaries". (Somehow in my first year of transferring from Sand Hill to Level Green, I missed the school altogether).

Being different is horribly embarrassing to small children. I remember that most of the children at Level Green wore blue jeans to school in cold weather. The girls wore blue jeans under their dresses and left them on all day for warmth. At the time, blue jeans were not worn by the girls in my family.

My mother made me wear a "snow suit" which consisted of a heavy wool coat and pants or "leggings" to match. I always held back and waited until the bell rang and the children were all inside before I went in. That way I could pull my leggings off outside where nobody could see me. I was sure they would laugh their heads off.

So during cold weather, my day in first grade started off with my being so nervous that I was almost sick, but I don't remember ever telling my mother how I felt.

THANKS BE TO GOD MIRACLES STILL HAPPEN

Sinners saved by Grace, through Faith, by the Blood and through the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Five thousand

plus, fed with just five loaves and two fishes. Lepers cleansed and Blinded Eyes opened. Miracles, Miracles, Miracles. Jesus Christ the same yesterday and today and forever.
 For about three and one-half years I have been troubled with what is known as Kronners Disease, which has to do with Colitis of the bowels and colon. After months under Doctors care and heavy medication I improved, then my disease grew worse and worse and for the past several months I lost almost all control of my bowels. To the point of having several embarrassing mishaps or accidents in public. Because of this and knowing unless God intervened that surgery resulted in a Colostomy or Ileostomy was my fate.

A Colostomy is where they remove some or a part of your colon and bring your waste organ out your side, where a bag is attached to collect the body waste which is discharged at random without any control from you. Basically the Ileostomy is the same, except the small intestine or some other organ higher up is removed and same process is followed.
 In losing almost all control and knowing what I was facing, I earnestly sought God for Healing. Our church, knowing my problem, was also seeking God with me, but seeming to no avail. When all hope on my part had vanished, I started praying, not my will but thine be done, and for God to get Glory out of my life. I also asked the church to pray, not my will but thine be done. Not knowing what would follow, I consented to enter the Hospital for more tests and medical experiments if you will. I certainly wanted to rule out every possibility before consenting to surgery. After every test proved positive. Some of them, visually seeing the blood and infection. It was spreading and not receding. Finally all hope of treating with medication was gone. The doctors told me surgery was a last resort; that even with surgery, by taking out the infected area, there was no guarantee it would stop the spread of the disease.
 I was told that my entire colon and part of my small intestines had to be removed and that would be no reversing the process once it was done. I signed the paper Monday, August 17th to have surgery; Tuesday, August 18th. Prayer requests had been given out for me in a wide area, including many churches of several denominations. Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today and forever. Miracles of God are real, they do and are happening. I am a living walking miracle. When first awakening in the recovery room, the doctor told me he didn't have to do the Colostomy of Ileostomy. My reaction was, "Doc, are you lying to me?" His reply, "better still, after hand examining your entire tract we found nothing, no bleeding, no sores, nothing to warrant an Ileostomy." My reply, "Praise God, I could shout on this table." Truly God has worked a Miracle in me. He has given me a new lease on life. He is everything, Praise be to God through Jesus Christ.
 The closing comment of my doctor was "after positive identification, we find no cause for the Ileostomy Surgery."
 I do not know what individual or group prayed the prayer of faith and touched the throne of grace for me. It

Because of the variety of school related experiences, I include some from recent interviews with local people.

Barbara Browning: In the 7th grade I had to transfer from Chestnut Ridge, a two room school; to Mt. Vernon. I was scared to death and was treated typically like the "new girl". Our teacher had to take a leave of absence at Christmas break and Miss Christine Krueger replaced her. It so happened that Miss Krueger knew me because she had been my teacher at Chestnut Ridge. When the other children learned this, they came to me wanting to know all about her and what to expect. For the first time, I had a little bit of an edge on them and they warmed up to me. Because of that experience, Miss Krueger has always been a special person to me.

Louise Carter: My dad was a welder and we moved around. When I was in the second grade, my daddy walked me to school the first day at the new school. At noon I was to walk home for lunch. I got lost. On the way to school, my dad had cut across lawns and had, in general, taken a short cut. I remember a teacher coming by and asking "Honey, are you lost?" I was so shy and so embarrassed that I said "No". She said, "Are you sure?" I still would not admit it and told her I lived right on down the street.

I kept my eye on a steeple that was near school and made it back to school where my dad was waiting for me because I hadn't come home. The minute I saw him, my composure left and I ran crying to him.

Kathleen McCracken: At the beginning of first grade there was a little boy who kept calling me "Kathleen Snake". I didn't know exactly how to react, but I had seen others report things to the teacher and was eager to "tell, on somebody".

It so happened that she was the kind of teacher who took everything very seriously. When I told her he was calling me names, she said, "You whisper to me what he called you." I remember thinking, well, this isn't really very bad, but I told her. To my surprise and horror, she whipped that little boy and I felt terrible. I had no idea he would get a spanking.

Lil Adams: I went to boarding school when I was 5 years old. I wet the bed the first night. I had never wet the bed before in my life. My punishment was to drag my sheets down the hall and be called "Dandelion" for the rest of the day by the other students. It was humiliating to say the least.

Legislative Report

By Rep. Harold DeMarcus

The 1980 General Assembly appropriated \$1,319,838 in University of Kentucky agency funds to the Capital Construction Fund for the purpose of completing the Sanders-Brown project on the University's campus.

This latest phase of the project entails the construction of the fourth floor of the Sanders-Brown building. The fourth floor is to be used to house laboratory animals.

Revenue shortfalls forced a cut in higher education's general fund appropriation, as a result the University transferred the \$1,319,838 from the Capital Construction Fund and earmarked it for operational expenses. This action was approved by the state Department of Finance.

This is an example of using non-recurring revenues to fund recurring programs. Of course, actions of this type over the last several years have helped precipitate the Commonwealth's current fiscal situation.

The University and the

state Department of Finance then planned to take this questionable fiscal procedure into another phase.

The University, with sanction from the Department of Finance, intends to complete the Sanders-Brown project by including the cost of its completion as part of the Series G Bond Issue to be sold by the University to cover the construction of a primary-ambulatory care facility.

After reviewing this situation, the Capital Construction and Equipment Purchase Oversight Committee unanimously voiced its opposition to the use of non-recurring revenues to fund recurring programs and to issuing bonds to compensate for usurped Capital Construction funds.

Following the committee's objections, a department spokesman stated that the Department of Finance would re-evaluate the Sanders-Brown project.

On a more positive note, Prefiled Bill 289 has been introduced and seeks to designate the following verses as the official pledge of allegiance

to the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

I pledge allegiance to the flag of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, standing high, and flowing free. Standing for Justice and Liberty. United we stand, divided we fall. Give us justice, peace and freedom for all.

Fishing Report

The doldrums are definitely here but the fisherman with the pioneering spirit can still search out a good catch with a bit of effort. The lake-by-lake rundown as compiled by fish and wildlife conservation officers:

Kentucky: crappie fair six to eight feet deep; catfish fair in tailwaters; clear, falling slowly at two feet below summer pool, 80 degrees.

Barkley: crappie slow over

submerged cover and along drop-offs; white bass slow in the jumps; black bass slow on crankbaits and plastic worms along drop-offs; in tailwaters catfish fair on cutbaits and shad minnows; clear, falling at two feet below summer pool and 80 degrees.

Rough River: crappie fair in submerged treetsops; bluegill slow along deep banks and off rocky points on worms; clear, stable at summer pool and 78 degrees.

Nolin: crappie fair eight to

ten feet deep; catfish fair on trotlines; black bass slow off rocky points; clear, stable at summer pool and 79 degrees.

Barren: crappie fair over submerged cover; black bass slow to fair on crankbaits or spinner baits or plastic worms; clear, stable at one foot above summer pool and 78 degrees.

Green River: crappie fair over submerged cover; black bass fair on spinner baits or plastic worms; bluegill fair on worms; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 80 degrees.

Cumberland: trout excellent below the dam with many limits taken; crappie fair drift fishing heads of creek channels; clear, falling at 22 feet below the timberline, 80 degrees.

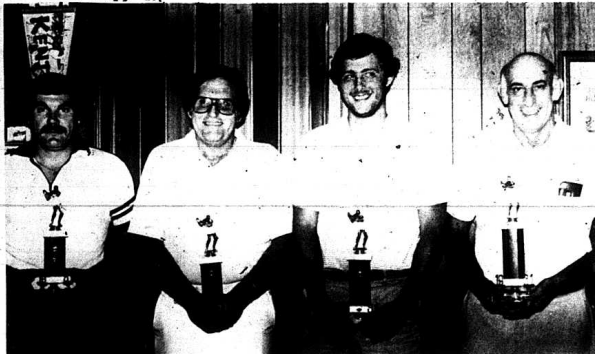
Dale Hollow: bluegill fair on worms along deep banks; black bass fair on plastic worms along deep banks and in weed beds; clear, falling at two feet below normal pool, 82 degrees.

Herrington: bluegill fair to good on worms along drop-offs; black bass slow to fair in evenings; white bass slow trolling spinner baits in the upper lake; clear, stable at summer pool, 82 degrees.

Laurel: bluegill fair to good in submerged cover along deep banks; trout fair; clear, stable at seven below power pool and 79 degrees.

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Keith Smith Enrolls in National Angus Herd Records Program

Edward Keith Smith, II of Mt. Vernon, Angus Cattle Breeder, recently enrolled his herd in the Angus Herd Improvement Records program of the American Angus Association, reports Dick Spader, executive vice-president of this national organization with headquarters in St. Joseph, Missouri.

Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR) is a comprehensive within-herd evaluation

program used by cattlemen to help them keep records of reproduction, and growth rate on individual animals. Each year hundreds of Angus breeders use AHIR records to produce more profitable, efficient Angus seedstock.

By weighing calves at 205 days of age and again at a year of age, breeders not only identify the cattle that grow the fastest and most efficiently, they also identify cows that regularly produce above average calves, and bulls that sire outstanding calves.

The American Angus Association in 1967 was the first breed organization to offer its members a production records program. Since that date the AHIR program has grown to the point that breeders report more than 125,000 weaning and yearling weights each year. This mountain of information is processed and stored in the Association's modern computerized data processing systems.

Manage Alfalfa For Winter Survival

What would happen to your calves if you didn't feed them during the entire winter? Obviously they would die? What would happen if you fed them less feed than necessary to maintain their body weight? They would lose weight, those which go into the winter in poorest condition would die first, some later, and some might even survive.

The same thing happens to plants. Have you ever had a good stand of alfalfa in the fall and very little stand the following spring? Alfalfa doesn't make top growth during the winter in Kentucky, but the roots and crowns must stay alive over winter if you are to

have a stand next spring. Those plants which go into winter weak may not survive until spring. There are three reasons plants to be weakened: (1) low carbohydrates in the roots; (2) low phosphorus; and (3) low potassium. You can manage to avoid these conditions.

Keep root carbohydrates high. Carbohydrates in alfalfa roots supply energy needed for plant metabolism during periods when there is little or no top growth. In order for root carbohydrates to be high going into winter, plants need about 45 days between time of the last fall harvest and the first hard freeze (24 degrees F. or lower). After this freeze occurs, removal of tops will not weaken plants. In fact, this accumulated growth should be utilized if at all possible. It is hard to make hay at that time of year, so put it into the silo or graze it. Removal of stems will also reduce the alfalfa weevil problem next spring.

Provide adequate phosphorus (P)-If you have adequate phosphorus in the soil, there should be adequate phosphorus in plants to permit winter

survival. Phosphorus benefits alfalfa in all alfalfa varieties but is most beneficial where plants have been subjected to harsh management during the growing season.

Potassium (K) is extremely important. You may think of potassium (or potash) as "frost-freeze" in alfalfa. Research, established many years ago, shows that alfalfa winter survival is closely related to the amount of potassium in plants. Non-hardy varieties are benefited even more than hardy varieties. Most varieties in use now contain genetic material from both hardy and non-hardy types. High potassium levels also appear to be of even greater benefit to plants which have been abused or stressed during the growing season. Almost all alfalfa has been stressed this year by high soil moisture during spring and by diseases.

If your soil test and fertilization history show need, put on the recommended phosphorus and potassium as soon as you remove your last cutting and it should get into plants in time to help them survive the winter.

Many other nutrients are needed by alfalfa. Most can be obtained from Kentucky soils if they are limed to a pH of 6.5-7.0. The only exception is boron. Apply 1/4 to 2 lbs. of actual boron at the time you apply P and K.

Food Preservation Clinic Making Apple Butter

Yield: About 5 pints (good cooking apples make the best apple butter)

6 pounds apples (about 24) 2 quarts Apple Juice 3 cups sugar 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon 1 teaspoon ground allspice 1 teaspoon ground cloves

Wash and slice apples. Add juice and cook until tender. Press through a sieve or food mill to remove skins and seeds. Measure out 3 quarts of apple pulp and cook until thick enough to round up on a spoon. As pulp thickens, stir frequently to prevent sticking. Add sugar and spices. Cook slowly, stirring often, until thick—about 1 hour.

Pour hot into hot clean pint jars. Leave 1/2 inch headspace. Seal and process for 10 minutes in boiling-water-bath canner.

Freezing Pears Select well ripened firm pears, but not hard ones. Wash, peel, cut into halves or quarters and remove cores. Heat pears in boiling 30 to 40 percent syrup for 1 to 2 minutes, depending on size of pieces. Drain and cool.

Pack into containers and cover with 1/4 syrup. For a better product, add 1/4 teaspoon crystalline ascorbic acid to a quart of cold syrup. Leave 1/2

inch headspace, seal and freeze. To make syrup, dissolve sugar in hot or cold water. You can mix it up the day before and keep it cold in the refrigerator. Use the following proportions:

- 30% syrup - 2 cups sugar, 4 cups water
- 35% syrup - 2 1/2 cups sugar, 4 cups water
- 40% syrup - 3 cups sugar, 4 cups water

Freezing apples

Sliced fresh apples are handy for pie making. Select full-flavored apples that are crisp and firm. Don't use mealy-textured ones. Wash, peel and core. Cut 12 slices from a medium-size apple and 16 from a large one.

To prevent darkening, slice apples into a solution of 2 tablespoons salt to a gallon of water. Hold in this solution no more than 15 to 20 minutes. Drain. Over each quart of apple slices, sprinkle 1/4 cup sugar, and stir. Or you can omit the sugar. Pack apples into containers and press fruit down tightly. Leave 1/2 inch headspace. Seal and freeze.

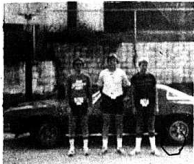

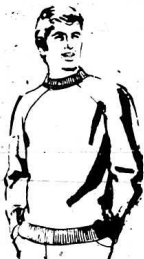

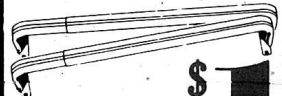
