Marijuana Valued at \$13,000 Destroyed

About 120 large, healthy marijuana plants were destroyed early Thursday evening on a farm on the Crooked Creek Road about 15 miles from Mt. Vernon by local law enforcement officials.

The total cash value of the plants, which were valued at from between \$100 and \$150 each by state police detective Roland Huckabee, was said to be nearly \$13,000.

The four officers, County sheriff, Henry Abney and deputy Robert Abney, City policeman, Jimmy Durham and

Detective Huckabee cut and brought the plants, which were close to the harvest stage, into the courthouse where they were later destroyed by fire.

Charged with producing marijuana and released on \$2,500 property bond was Joe Lane, who, according to the sheriff, was in the process of buying the farm where the marijuana was found.

Producing marijuana is a class A misdemeanor which carries a maximum penalty of up to 1 year and a \$500 fine.

Lane is scheduled to appear in District Court September 23.

County Tax Rate Set by Court; Assessment Up; Rate Down

During last week's Fiscal Court meeting, one order of business, the tax rate, was not attended to since, according to Judge Executive Hubert Thacker, auditors were still working on the tax books.

The court met Tuesday, Sept. 7, and set the tax rate for 1981. The county tax levy was lowered from the 14.11 cents per \$100 assessment set in 1980 to 12.88 cents per \$100 of assessed value for 1981. The reason for the lower rate was the increased overall county assessment.

Cities, Counties and the state are prohibited by law from generating in total tax revenue more than 4% over the previous year, so when total assessment is up, the rate must be pared down to reflect only the 4% increase or less.

Last year the total assessment for Rockcastle County was \$139,940,215 as compared to \$152,479,411 for the year 1981. Residential made up the largest portion (\$5,549,400) and farms were second with \$51,570,883.

The general County levy was set at 8.1 cents, health tax at 2.4 cents; County Extension Service at 1.3 cents; Library at .93 cents and soil conservation at 1.5 cents. The biggest single reduction was in the general county tax levy which dropped from 9.1 cents to 8.1 cents.

The state rate was set at 22.9 cents, down from last year's 24.1 cents. Rockcastle's share of state taxes this year amounts to

\$420,312 in contrast to the 1980 figure of \$389,950, according figures made available through the County Clerk's Office.

In other business, the county treasurer, Floyd Owens, reported to the court that there was a surplus in the timber tax fund and upon the recommendation of Steve Bullen, forest ranger, the court voted to void the 3 cents per acre timber tax for one year.

Authority was also given to Judge Thacker to apply for \$40,000 state grant (matching money) to be used for meeting expenses of ambulance service personnel costs.

G & G Kentucky Construction Co., London, received a \$183,452 contract for resurfacing 2.3 miles of Ky. 70, Brodhead-Eubank Road, from Ky. 1650 to U.S. 150.

The Company will also resurface Ky. 1229, Doug Hill-Lincoln County road, from Ky. 1650 to U.S. 150.

A Time for Everything - At Copper Creek It is Time to Make Molasses

This is the favorite time of year for many.

It is the time of year for football games and foggy mornings and full freezers, among other things.

But on the far western edge of the county, on the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Brooks, it is the time of year when the cane heads turn red and that means it is molasses-making time.

During the cane harvest

season, there is lots of noise, activity and excitement on the farm as the cane is transformed into the thick, rich, brown syrup by a process which, though modernized, is basically ancient and painstaking.

Astor and Mary Durham, neighbors of the Brooks, work and help supervise the whole process. Mrs. Brooks said the Durhams have helped every year since they began making molasses six years ago and she credits much of the success of the operation which produces 30

gallons of molasses a day to their help and expertise.

Astor has had a lot of experience in this field and so has Mary, who says her father made molasses. She said she made them back when it was a custom to move the cane mill from field to field and work up the crop into molasses.

The first step in the home process is to raise the cane. The Brooks always save their cane seed and raise the same kind each year. It makes a good light colored molasses. They say

that's the kind most people want. But this year, Mrs. Brooks sent off for a different kind of seed from Mississippi and they are curious as to what kind it will make. It has grown to about 12 feet (2 or 3 feet taller than the other kind) and is not ripe yet. Brooks says they have been told it will make a darker molasses and, if so, they may not raise it again.

Brooks says with a grin,

"The older you get, the harder you try to make the job easier."

Every year he says he looks for ways to cut down on the amount of work they will have to do to produce the same amount of molasses.

Last year down in western Kentucky he bought a corn binder. His wife admits she chided him for paying \$200 for it and doubted its worth. But she is first to admit that it has

already more than paid for itself in cutting labor costs. The binder is pulled behind a tractor which is equipped with a front-end loader. The binder cuts the cane, bundles, ties and dumps the bundles onto the ground. One trip down the row with the machine and one back using the loader and a job that once took considerable time and

LEGISLATIVE REPORT

During the August meeting of the Appropriations and Revenue Committee, the De-

partment of Finance's Office for Policy and Management distributed a document entitled "1980-82 Kentucky Budget Information."

One section of that document elaborated on what the Department of Finance acknowledged to be "facts about education budget cuts." Several of the Finance Department's facts are as follows:

(1) State Financing for local school districts has not been cut. Instead the rate of increase in state funding has been reduced from 10.2% to a 5.4% increase. This increase comes at a time when student enrollment is dropping at a rate of 2% per year.

(2) Because of increased investment income in the Teachers' Retirement System, there will be no reduction in any benefits to any retired teacher now or in the future.

(3) Investment earnings by the Teachers' Retirement System exceeded the amount required by their actuarial assumptions by more than \$28 million. Only \$9 million of these excess earnings was used to help meet the revenue shortfalls.

(4) Of the eight states, Kentucky and the seven surrounding states, Kentucky ranks fourth out of eight in teacher salary average.
 (5) Teacher salaries have not been cut. But because teachers will work two less days, the average increase in teachers' salaries will be 8.2% rather than 9.2%.

Of course, some of the Finance Department's statistics are very creative. Particularly, I am referring to their claim that teacher salaries have not been reduced.

In point of fact, under the administration's past teachers

will lose approximately \$160 due to the deletion of two in-service days. However, it is important to mention that this action cannot be legally taken without first being mandated by the legislature. And I don't think the 1982 General Assembly will enact this mandate.
 Education in Kentucky has made great strides over the last ten years, but there is still a ways to go.

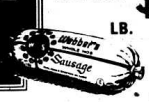

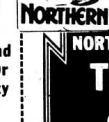

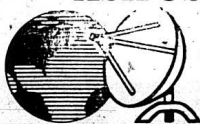

Drying Apples in Kentucky

Most Kentuckians dry their apples without sulfuring, and the fruit gradually darkens during drying and storage. That's the way they like their dried apples, so that's the method I'll give here.

Use Cooking Apples
Fall and winter cooking apples are best for drying. Wash, peel, core and trim out blemishes. Cut into slices or rings about 1/8 inch thick.

Spread slices one layer deep on drying trays. You can make drying trays from screens or from wood slats attached to a frame. Some people use cookie sheets, but they're not as satisfactory. Cover your drying

trays with clean cheesecloth or other thin cloth that will let air circulate.

Spread apples slices on the trays. If you're going to sun dry, place another layer of cheesecloth over the food to help keep out dust and insects.

Sun Drying
Successful drying depends on heat, low humidity, and good air circulation. Because of the humidity, you may need to use a combination of sun drying and oven drying, or trust the whole job to the oven. Some people even dry foods inside a car parked in the sun, keeping windows open for ventilation.

To sun dry, place loaded trays on a roof or other high surface, away from pets and small children, and away from traffic exhaust and dust. Bring the trays in at night. If it's not too humid, 3 to 5 days of sunshine should do the job.

Oven Drying
This takes anywhere from 4 to 12 hours, and you need to

keep a close eye on the apples.

Preheat oven to 140 or 150 degrees. If your thermostat can't be set that low, set it as low as possible. Then check it with a thermometer so that you can turn the oven off if it gets too hot.

Put the trays of food no more than 4 to 6 pounds of prepared apples at a time. Prop the door slightly open. It's good to keep air circulating with an electric fan, if possible. Stir and turn the foods every half hour or so and shift position of trays.

Doneness Test
To test, let apples slices cool first. They should feel tough and leathery and shouldn't be sticky.

Pasteurize and Package
Heat-treat trays on sun-dried apples in a 175 degree oven for 15 minutes before packaging. This helps protect them from insects during storage.

Spread dried apples out to cool on a clean cloth. Don't package them until they are completely cool.

Use dry, scalded, insect-proof storage containers. Large glass jars and metal cans with tight lids are good. It's handy to fill up small (pint-size) plastic bags with the dried fruit first, then put these in the jars or cans.

Store them in a cool, dark, dry place, if possible. If the weather stays humid, check the apples from time to time. If you find moisture, reheat for 15 minutes, cool and repackage. If you have extra room in your freezer, you could store your containers of dried apples there.

effort, is done in a matter of minutes.

The cane is then jopped and piled upon a table from which it is fed into the cane mill which squeezes a green juice out of the stalk.

The old time method used a mule or horse hitched to a long pole. The animal trot in a circle four after hour to turn the mill. Later tractors were used with a belt attached to the grinder. Now, Brooks has made himself an electric motor-driven mill. The juice is caught after being double strained and is pumped into a 150 gallon tank. From there it is strained again and is fed through a gravity flow valve into the first of 7 cooking vats.

Another change has been brought about in their molasses-making and that is the use of gas to replace a wood fire to boil the molasses. The gas method more easily controls the cooking temperature and takes much of the work and sweat out of the notoriously hot job.

During the cooking process, which demands from 2 to 3 attendants, the green foam which rises to the top in the first 2 or 3 vats, has to be taken off by the use of a wooden "paddle" which is dipped and scraped periodically. In vats 5 and 6 the foam is merely spooned back in to vat 4. The last vat is the one which demands the most attention because it is here that the molasses might scorch or might be taken off before or after they are the right consistency.

According to Mrs. Brooks, the first batch is ready to run off at about 11:00 a.m. or 12 noon,

depending on when the cooking begins, usually around 7:30 a.m. It takes about 4 hours for the "boiling down" to take place.

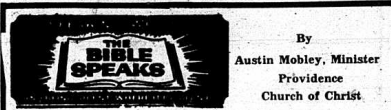
It usually takes from 3 to 4 weeks to get the cane crop made up, but this year Mrs. Brooks says it will take more like 5 or 6 weeks. They have been making for 6 days.

Friends and neighbors stop to visit or buy molasses frequently during molasses-making time and the previous day Mrs. Brooks said she had sold \$360 worth of the Copper Creek Pure Cane Molasses they

make.

After surveying the scene and having a woman's point of view, I came up with my own definition of the process. Molasses making "all boils down to" an agricultural endeavor which involves a crop harvest that turns into a festive occasion not unlike a huge yard sale.

Mr. Brooks retired less than 2 years ago from a job with the Mt. Vernon Water Works. The Brookes live on the Copper Creek Road.

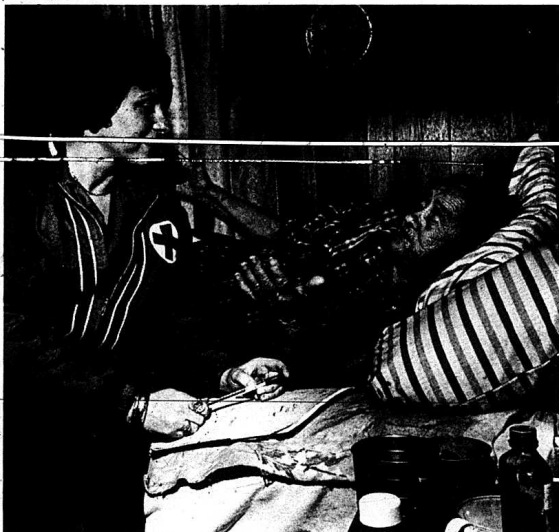

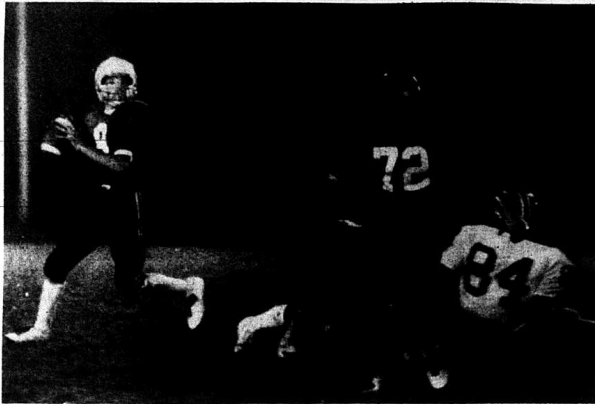

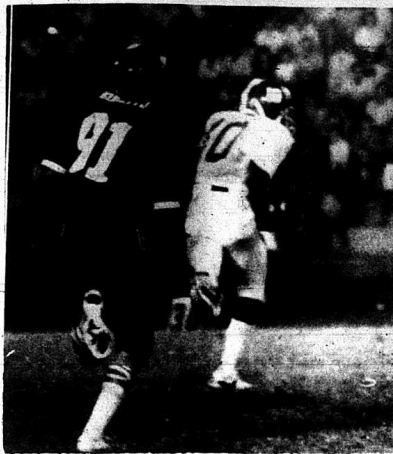
Wins Tournament

Stockpiling An Easy Way To Winter Cattle

During the five to six months during winter when pastures produce very little or no growth, cattle producers must have an adequate supply of feed in storage. One storage method more are using is stockpiling.

Stockpiling of forages is an economical method of feeding your cattle over the winter months, according to Extension forage specialist, University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Stockpiling is accumulating the field the growth which occurs from August to November and using it for additional grazing during the fall and winter. This method has become more popular with producers because it reduces labor. You don't rake, bale, store or feed

the forage; the grazing cattle do all the work.

Mid-August is the time to begin stockpiling for the coming winter. Producers should remove cattle from the fields to be stockpiled, apply the needed fertilizer and allow grass to accumulate growth until November or December.

Not all plants are good for stockpiling. Tall fescue and bluegrass are best because they are somewhat resistant to low temperatures, retain green color winter and form good sods. Timothy and orchardgrass work well, too. It is good management to select for stockpiling the fields where legume stands are almost lost. Producers should fertilize fields according to how much feed is needed. Take a soil test to determine lime, phosphorus, and potassium needs. Determine nitrogen rates according to how much stockpiled grass will be needed.

To calculate how much

nitrogen to apply, figure that a pound of nitrogen will produce approximately enough dry matter to feed a mature 1,000 pound cow for one day.

The maximum fertilizer rate should be around 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre on bluegrass and 90 pounds per acre on fescue.

Stockpiled grasses can provide adequate nutrition. The quality of tall fescue and Kentucky bluegrass is better in the fall and early winter than at any other time of the year. Although the nutritive value and protein content of stockpiled grasses go down during the winter, the grasses retain acceptable feed value for mature, dry, pregnant beef cows.

Farmers should graze grass-legume fields immediately after the first frost, before the quality deteriorates. After these fields are eaten off, cattle should be turned in to graze stockpiled fields.

To make most efficient use of the stockpiled material, use a temporary fence to open up a new strip every week or so. Some farmers prefer to ration

graze stockpiled growth by limiting the cattle to two or three hours in the field each day.

It is very important to efficiently use the stockpiled fields or nitrogen costs may not be recovered.

Barley Harvest To Run Late: Flue Cured is Selling High

The 1981 barley tobacco crop is winding up with an extra-lengthy harvest season, which early fall rains have made even longer. Renewed growth has postponed cutting of many late-planted fields, and tobacco leaders are still hopeful that a large output will help relieve barley shortages of the last two years.

Whether the crop will come

up to the predicted 700 million pounds is held highly doubtful, although increased acreages and better yields seem to have assured the largest betwixt crop since 1983.

Barley harvest time finds the flue-cured markets in the South holding up well in price, with half to two-thirds of the crop sold. Opening by stages in the different belts, the southern markets began in mid-July. They usually continue into late October or early November.

This year's flue-cured is well ahead of any recent years in quality. The crop is estimated at about 1,097 billion pounds, with a recent jump of 35 million over earlier production estimates.

The Georgia-Florida belt has been sending 3 to 4 percent of sales to the Stabilization

Corporation, compared with 15 percent last year. About the same loan percentages prevailed on the Border markets, but Eastern North Carolina and the Old and Middle belts have been reporting heavier loan receipts than last year.

Border belt season average at the end of August was \$174.67 per pound compared with \$64.41 last season. Georgia-Florida was up \$12 over last year, also at around \$174. Eastern North Carolina likewise has a \$174 season average. The Old and Middle belt held at \$160, well above last season's \$135.

Officials of the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association, at Lexington, have been encouraged by reports of

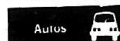

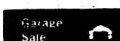
