Robbery Suspected as Motive for Murder of Motel Desk Clerk

An attempted robbery is suspected by police investigators as the motive for the early Friday morning murder of the night desk clerk at the Best Western Motel at the US 25 Burr Interchange South of Mt. Vernon.

Huckabee said the motorists had stopped to eat breakfast at Kastle Inn Restaurant and when they found it closed decided to ask about serving time at the office where they found Kemp. Apparently Kemp was shot through the security glass of the office sometime after 5 a.m. He was dead upon arrival of the ambulance.

According to Huckabee, there is a suspect in the murder. However, no arrest has been made.

Mr. Kemp was born in Cherry Hill, Tenn. on July 30, 1926, the son of the late John and Golda Taylor Kemp.

Survivors are: his wife, Melba Jean Mason Kemp of Mt. Vernon; two sons, David Mason and William Martin, both of Mt. Vernon; one sister, Mrs. Daisey Worley of Canton, North Carolina; one half sister, Mrs. Pauline McCanis of Canton, North Carolina; eight grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Sunday, September 27 at the Sun's Funeral Home Chapel by Bro. Stanley Stamper. Burial was in the Mt. Vernon Cemetery.

Kidnapping and Rape Charges Filed

Kidnapping and rape charges, have been filed in connection with an incident which reportedly took place Friday morning between the hours of 6 a.m. and 7 a.m.

According to state police detective, Roland Huckabee, four men went to a dwelling at Pine Hill occupied by Carol Renner, 20, and Charles Frankie Ashcraft, 21, and forced the two to go with them, putting Ashcraft into the trunk of the car. Huckabee said that he was able to undo the lock on the trunk and escape from the car while it was in motion; however, Ms. Renner was taken to the Sand Hill area where she was reportedly raped, then taken back to Pine Hill and released.

She was later treated and released from the Rockcastle County Hospital.

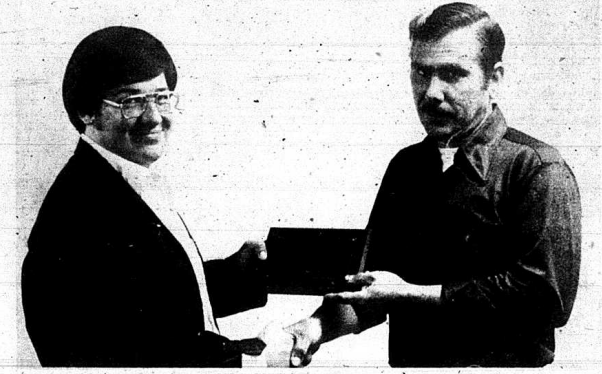
Arrested and charged with kidnapping were Donald Newcomb, 26, and Duke Gibson, 20, of the Livingston area. Arrested and charged with rape and kidnapping was James E. Brown, 24 of Mt. Vernon. Also charged with rape and kidnapping in connection with the incident, but not yet apprehended, is 46-year-old Paul Milburn of Mt. Vernon. Brown, Gibson and Newcomb are being held without bail pending a bail hearing, according to Huckabee.

The youngest set is the Lamb boys, Ronnie Jay and Donnie Ray, who are still 16. The boys started to school at five years of age, as did the other three children of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Lamb. Betty, who is 18, is planning on going into the army soon. Shelia, 15, is a junior, and Charles, 14, is a sophomore at RCHS. The Lambs live at Clear Creek.

When asked if it wasn't hard getting 4 teenagers off to catch the bus at 7:30 each morning, Mrs. Lamb said, "No," but admitted she does have to wash clothes about every day.

Lamb insists that life when the twins were little wasn't hard enough though she

had all five children on the bottle and four in diapers at one time.

She said she never had any trouble telling them apart even though to most people they are identical. Ronnie was always ruddier and Donnie lighter complexion and she could tell them apart by their cries when they were babies. She says to her, they don't look anything alike.

Now, even though Donnie is slightly taller; they can easily wear each other's clothes and Mrs. Lamb mentions that sharing things, staying together, looking out for each other and having much the same temperament are all dominant characteristics she notices in the twins.

Contrary to the story told by the parents of many twins, Mrs. Lamb says Ronnie and Donnie were not especially active babies and were content to spend much of the time in a

Ronnie and Donnie do some arm wrestling when not in school and at school they are both enrolled

in vocational auto mechanics classes.

Most of the students at the high school can't tell them apart unless they are together and it is obvious which one is slightly taller.

The Hedrick twins, Alan and Cindy, caused quite a stir when they were born over 17 years ago while their parents, Carrie and Charles Hedrick, Jr. were sophomores living in married students quarters and attending Campbellsville College.

Rev. Hedrick, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Mt. Vernon, relates that the doctor casually mentioned (more as a joke) the possibility of twins about 3 or 4 months before they were born. But he says his wife still insists she didn't know they were going to have twins until after she entered the hospital.

Since both parents were in school, they had to arrange schedules so that while he was in class, she could take care of

More than 15,000 semifinalists nationally will compete for about 5,000 Merit Scholarships to be offered next year. These 15,000 were selected from more than a million students who took the test. To become finalists the boys must be recommended by their principal, demonstrate high academic standing and score well on another examination. Finalists will be announced in April.

Legislative Report

An insight into what the General Assembly's 1982 budget hearings will be like was given during a September meeting of the Appropriations and Revenue subcommittee on Area Development Districts.

Area Development Districts are administrative panels composed of locally elected officials from ten or twelve county regions in Kentucky. There are fifteen area development districts in the Commonwealth.

The professional staffs of the area development districts help local officials apply for federal grants and supply expert consultations in such fields as budget making, transportation management and road-maintenance planning.

It appears that the federal government is planning to substantially reduce its appropriations to the districts. The reduction stems primarily from the Reagan administration's decision to change emphasis from categorical grants to block grants.

Lawn Fertilization
How do you determine what fertilizer your lawn needs? The best way is to have the soil tested. A good recommendation can then be made as to how much lime, phosphate and potash is actually needed to supply the fertility needs for your lawn. Samples can be

collected any time during the year and your soil should be tested every three or four years to make sure you are providing the necessary fertility.

When do you apply nitrogen and how much? The soil test does not indicate nitrogen needs, but root growth is very much affected by nitrogen fertilization. Apply the nitrogen at the wrong time or in heavy amounts, and you may severely damage your lawn. If

you apply too much nitrogen too often, your lawn will likely suffer from disease and insect problems that can be very costly to control.

Nitrogen fertilizer should not be applied at the same time for all grasses. Fescues and Kentucky bluegrass grow best during cool weather. Because of this, fall and winter nitrogen fertilization is best. These grasses should not be fertilized during the normally fast growth period of spring or during the hot summer. After heavy spring rains, sometimes it becomes necessary to fertilize lightly in late spring. However, be careful not to over-fertilize to the point that weeds such as crabgrass are being encouraged and the desirable grasses weakened.

Nitrogen applications should be made at the following rates and dates. Actual nitrogen needed per 1000 square feet of lawn is one pound in September; 1 to 1 1/4 pounds from October to Mid-November; 1-1 1/4 pounds mid-November to January and 4/4 pound mid-May to Mid-June, if needed.

If you fertilize according to this program your lawn will not be dark green all summer, but it will maintain its density, green-up quickly in early fall, and not be so seriously damaged by disease and insect problems. A lawn receiving heavy spring

and summer fertilization is very susceptible to summerkill caused by disease, insect and drought stresses.

Nitrogen fertilizer is very effective in "greening up" a lawn and in causing fast growth. Because of this, it is important to apply nitrogen-containing fertilizers uniformly over the lawn. This eliminates "streaking" which is very unsightly in lawns.

It is difficult to evenly apply fertilizer by "hand". Either a drop-type or rotary spreader should be used. However, when using drop-type spreaders, be careful to overlap the wheel tracks, since all of the fertilizer is distributed between the wheels. It is difficult to maneuver drop-type spreaders around ornamental trees and shrubs without causing some streaking. Rotary spreaders are somewhat better in that they usually cover a broader swath and tend to fan out the fertilizer at the edges of the swath. They seldom leave the distinct coloration or growth difference that occurs with skips and overlaps when using the drop-type spreaders.

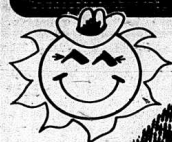

During fiscal year 1980-81 Kentucky's fifteen area development districts received a total appropriation of \$2,976,889 from the federal government, \$1,878,385 from the state government and \$469,751 from local governments.

A spokesman for the Commerce Department stated that if local governments want the area development districts then they should fund them. However, there were over fifty mayors and county judges at the meeting who strongly disagreed with that line of thinking.

Following the Commerce spokesman's presentation, the Secretary of Finance stated that it should be left to the discretion of each individual state agency to decide if area development districts can help their respective causes. If an agency thinks that the districts are worth then the agency would include funds for the districts in the budget requests that they submit to the legislature.

Then came a series of city and county officials giving presentations extolling the virtues of area development districts. And each statement was greeted with a hearty applause from a clearly pro-development district audience.

It was the consensus of the subcommittee that area development districts are an appropriate budgetary concern, because area development districts provide valuable services

to the local governments which are subdivisions of the state government.

In essence the meeting was a preview of the lengthy and often intense debate that will occur in virtually all budgetary sessions during the 1982 General Assembly.

However it should be mentioned that some legislators believe the county governments are the primary beneficiary of Area Development Districts, and that they should be funded solely by county governments.

Also, most counties have funds on time deposit that are drawing interest and should be put to use. Since county judges believe so strongly in the districts, then they should use these revenues to fund them.

The Hurst twins, Barry and Garry, are so identical that they have no trouble confusing teachers. One teacher remarked that she was concerned because she couldn't learn to tell them apart until she asked their dad, Donald Hurst of Williams, how he distinguished between them and he said he wasn't always successful at it.

Their mother, Ora Hurst, says she sometimes has to look them in the face before she can tell them apart. According to her, their voices are so alike that it is easy to trick

everybody with the possible exception of "the girls". They seem to be able to tell them apart, she says.

They used to dress alike, but not any more. Even though they like the same things (like playing football) and are extremely close, they enjoy a little more individuality as they grow older.

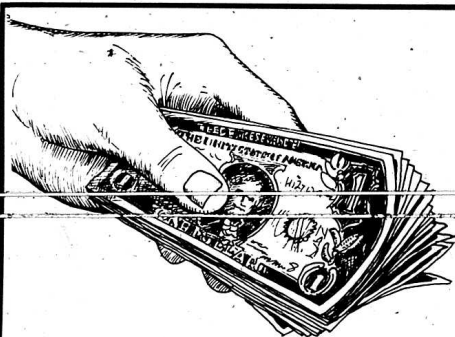

amount granted is only 28 percent of that requested.

"Disappointing," said Eugene E. Morris, president of Continental Telephone of Kentucky. "Our costs, like those of any other business, have skyrocketed." Our request was a deadlier serious projection of the actual revenue required to produce a reasonable rate of return.

"To grant only slightly more than one-fourth of the request is unrealistic," he said.

Morris pointed to the two major factors contributing to the "vast difference in revenue requirements" as seen by the Commission and by the Company.

"The first factor is the allowed return on equity. We requested a 16.5 percent rate of return and were granted only about 11.34 percent.

"Although the 14.25 percent is the best we have been granted by this Commission, it simply is not sufficient in today's economy."

The second factor is a disagreement in assumptions about the rate of return to be expected from intrastate toll revenues.

The Commission has assumed that an 11.34 percent rate of return would be realized on intrastate toll.

"We proposed, in our rate case, that the intrastate toll rate of return would be 7.76 percent, a much more realistic projection than the 'Commission' had assumed."

The impact of the difference between the 11.34 and 7.76 percent projections is about \$800,000 in revenues.

Other, smaller conflicting projections make up the difference between the Company's request for \$3.9 million and the Commission's grant of \$1,091,000.

It will be a couple days before we actually have a chance to read the Commission's order," said Morris. "At that time, we will begin reviewing it and see where we go from there."

Forest Fire Season Is Now Underway

The Fall Forest Fire Season is now here, and the danger of forest fires will greatly increase. According to Rockcastle County Forest Ranger Steve Bullen, the period from October 1 through December 15 is the official Fire Hazard Season. During the Fire Hazard Season, it is illegal for any person to burn anything within 150 feet of any woodland before 4:30 p.m. After 4:30 p.m., a person may legally burn materials on his own property only if he has taken all reasonable precautions to keep the fire from spreading. These precautions would include clearing all fuel for several feet around the material to be burned, having fire-fighting tools on hand, and staying with the fire until it is completely out.

A major cause of fires during this fall is smoking out of gear. This practice is highly dangerous and is also illegal under both the fire laws and the hunting laws.

At least 90% of the fires in this area are the result of the violation of one or more of the fire laws. As a fire prevention measure there will be increased emphasis on enforcing the fire laws beginning this fall, according to District Forester H.F. Whitaker. The fire laws are designed to prevent fires so a person violating the law would be subject to a fine even if the fire has not yet escaped. If the fire does escape, the person responsible is subject to pay the cost of suppressing the fire in addition to the fine for violating

the law. For these reasons, the Division of Forestry urges everyone to obey the fire laws and burn safely.

Resources Appraisal Available

At Soil Conservation Office

The most comprehensive appraisal ever conducted of the Nation's soil and water resources will be available for reference September 1, in local offices of the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) and the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

SCS Soil Conservationist David Stipes said that the Appraisal—which was called for by the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA)—reveals that soil erosion is critical in many important farming areas in the United States. If continued, David said, these high erosion rates will reduce the future ability of the country to produce food and fiber. He added that upstream flood damage and other resource losses also are likely to increase if current trends

continue.

The appraisal is published in two volumes. Part I, Status, Condition, and Trends, presents data on soil, water, and related resources in the United States. Part II, Analysis of Resource Trends, shows likely future consequences if current practices continue.

These documents replace earlier drafts of the RCA appraisal. Extensive public comments on the drafts are reflected in the final appraisal. A reference will be available at the Rockcastle Soil Conservation Service Office (Rockcastle Courthouse) for use by interested individuals and groups.

A recommended conservation program of the Secretary of Agriculture, which will be based on the appraisal and on public response to earlier RCA draft documents, will be released for public comment this fall, David explained.

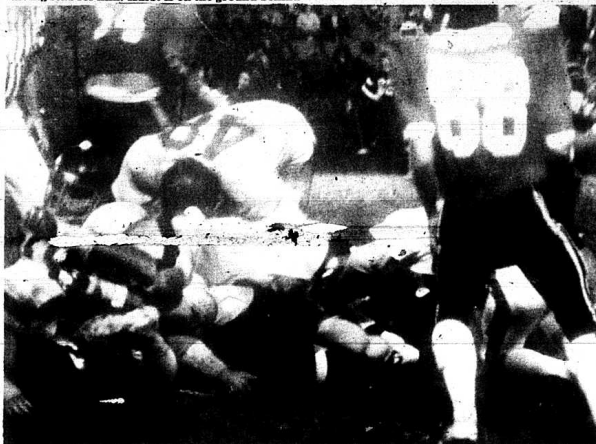
Rockcastle will try to improve their record to 4 and 3 this Friday night when they play host to Casey county.

Fishing Report

Fall fishing has been generally fair. Larger lakes, with plenty of fishermen enjoying our pleasant weather conditions. The lake-by-lake rundown, according to the state fish and wildlife department:

Kentucky: crappie fair 20-25 feet deep in submerged cover along edge of old river channel; in tailwaters, catfish fair; clear to murky; falling slowly, 3/4 feet below summer pool and 68 degrees.

Barkley: black bass fair casting plastic worms into stick ups; crappie fair 8-10 feet deep in submerged cover; in tailwaters, catfish slow to fair; clear to murky, falling slowly, 3/4 feet below summer pool and 73 degrees.

Nolin: crappie fair 8-10 feet deep in submerged cover; clear, stable at summer pool and 74 degrees.

Rough River: black bass fair on crankbaits and plastic worms around rocky points; crappie fair in stick-ups, clear, falling slowly, two feet below summer pool and 72 degrees.

Barren River: crappie fair in submerged cover and stick ups, clear to murky, falling slowly, one foot below summer pool and 72 degrees.

Creen River: crappie excellent 4-8 feet deep in stick ups, black bass fair on crankbaits and spinnerbaits around shoreline cover; clear to murky, falling slowly, two feet below summer pool and 74 degrees.

Dale Hollow: crappie good about 15 feet deep in submerged cover; walleye fair trolling deep runners around mud flats and shallow banks; clear, falling slowly, 3/4 feet below summer pool and 73 degrees.

Cumberland: crappie, white bass and walleye fair trolling crankbaits around points and drop-offs; in tailwaters; trout excellent; clear, falling slowly, 25 feet below the timberline and 73 degrees.

Laurel: trout and bluegill good; black bass fair early and late in the day with surface lures and plastic worms; clear, falling slowly, nine feet below normal pool and 70 degrees.

Herrington: black bass good late in the day on crankbaits and at night with plastic worms; crappie fair 8-10 feet deep; bluegill fair; clear, stable, 1/2 foot below summer pool and 70 degrees.

Cave Run: musky good on buzz baits and large diving plugs in timbered coves; crappie fair in stick-ups; clear, falling, two feet below summer pool and 68 degrees.

Grayson: little or no activity; clear to murky, falling, 12 feet below summer pool and 69 degrees.

Buckhorn: black bass fair on surface lures and buzz baits around shallow cover; crappie fair 5-15 feet deep in submerged cover; clear to murky to muddy, stable, three feet below summer pool and 69 degrees.

Antlered - Only Bow Hunting in 40 Counties

Bow hunters in 40 Kentucky counties will be limited to antlered deer only during this year's archery season, which opens Oct. 1.

This "bucks only" rule, the only major change in bow hunting regulations this year, applies in deer hunting zones four and five. Zone four counties are Bath, Daviess, Elliott, Fleming, Lyon, McCreary, Marshall, Menifee, Morgan, Nicholas, Pulaski, Rowan and Wayne.

The counties in zone five are Bell, Breathitt, Bourbon, Clark, Clay, Clinton, Fayette, Garrard, Harlan, Jackson, Jefferson, Jessamine, Knox, Laurel, Lee, Leslie, Letcher, Madison, Montgomery, Owsley, Pike, Powell, Rockcastle, Simpson, Whitley, Wolfe and Woodford. Deer populations in these counties are below what the habitat could support, biologists say. Every doe is

important for breeding stock in these areas, and high bow-hunter harvest of does last year prompted the antlered-deer only rule.

These counties also have shortened gun seasons—five days in zone four and three days in zone five. Eight counties are closed to both gun and bow deer hunting—Estill, Floyd (except for Oct. 1-31 bow hunting on Dewey Lake wildlife area), Johnson, Knott, Lincoln, Magoffin, Martin and Perry.

Bow hunters in remainder of the state (zones one, two and three) may take either antlered and antlerless deer during the entire archery season, which runs from Oct. 1 through Nov. 5 and Nov. 18 through Dec. 31. Crossbows may be used only during the Nov. 21-30 portion of the archery season.

An antlered deer is defined as one having at least one antler four inches long or longer, measured from the skin to the antler tip. The antlers may be forked or unforked, as long as this minimum size requirement is met.

The season limit this year will be two deer, provided that at least one is taken by archery (bow or crossbow). This means that two may be taken by archery or one by archery and one by gun. The only way two deer will be taken by gun hunting is if one is taken from a

"special area"—Ft. Knox, Ft. Campbell, Land Between the Lakes or the Bluegrass Army Depot.

A "second deer" permit is required to hunt for the second deer and a portion of the first permit must accompany the second. Complete details are contained in the deer hunting guide which is attached to each permit.

Biologists expect another record harvest of deer this season. Kentucky's deer herd continues to expand rapidly in many sections of the commonwealth and should keep growing for several more years.
