

Lawn Fertilization Lawn Fertilization
How do you determine
what fertilizer your lawn
needs? The best way is to have
the soil tested. A good recommendation can then be made as
to how much lime, phosphate
and potash is actually needed to

supply the fertility needs for your lawn. Samples can be

collected any time during the year and your soil should be tested every three or four years to make sure you are providing the necessary fertility.

When do you apply nitrogen and how much? The soil test does not indicate nitrogen needs, but turf growth is very much affected by nitrogen fertilization. Apply the nitrogen at the wrong time or in heavy amounts, and you may severely damage your lawn. If

Nitrogen fertilizer should not be applied at the same time for all grasses. Fescues and Kentucky bluegrass grow best during cool weather. Because of during cool weather. Because of this, fall and winter nitrogen fertilization is best. These grasses should not be fertilized fertilization is best arranges see should not be fertilized during the normally fast growth period of spring or during-the hot summer. After heavy spring rains, sometimes it becomes necessary to fertilize lightly in late spring. However, be careful not to over-fertilize to the point that weeds such as crabgrass are being encouraged and the desirable grasses weakened.

Nitrogen applications

being encouraged and the desirable grasses weakened. Nitrogen should be made at the following rates and dates. Actual nitrogen meeded per 1000 square feet of lawn is one pound in September; 1 to 1½ pounds from October to Mid November; 1½ to 1½ pounds from October to Mid November; 1½ to 1½ pound mid May to Mid June, if needed. If you fertilize according to this program your lawn will not be dark green all summer, but it will maintain its density, green-up quickly in early fall, and not be so seriously damaged by disease and insect problems. susception of summersus caused by disease, insect and drought stresses. Nitrogen fertilizer is very effective in "greening up" a lawn and in causing fast growth. Because of this, it is important to apply nitrogen-containing fertilizers uniformly over the lawn. This eliminates "streaking" which is very unsightly in lawns. It is difficult to evenly apply fertilizer by "hand". Either a drop-type or rotary spreader should be used. However, when using drop-type spreaders, be careful to overlap the wheel tracks, since all of the fertilizer is disbributed between the wheels. It is difficult to maneuver drop-type spreaders around ornamental trees and shrubs without causing some streaking. Rotary spreaders around ornamental trees and shrubs without causing some streaking. Rotary spreaders are somewhat better in that they usually cover a broader swath and tend to fan out the fertilizer at the edges of the swath. They seldom leave the distinct coloration or growth difference that occurs with skps and overlaps when using the drop-type spreaders.

Does Jack Frost Really Cause Fall Leaf Colors?

Have you ever wondered why leaves turn color in the fall of the year? The old adage that "Jack Frost has been painting the tree" is usually sufficient explanation for those people who wish only to enjoy the beauty of the fall colors. But for most gardeners this explanation is inadequate because it doesn't tell what is taking place.
Actually, the development of color is the result of a series of nature's chemical reactions;

of color is the result of a series of nature's chemical reactions; and frost really plays little part in the process. In fact, in many instances, frost can greatly reduce the amount and brilliance of the color produced. In an aftempt to better understand what is happening, it is necessary to know that there are four broad groups of chemicals in leaves which are responsible for the colors we see. Chlorophylls are the green colors; carotenoids and xanthophylls produce the yellows through reds; and anthocyanins, the blues, purples and reds.

through reds; and anthoryanins, the blues, purples and reds. At the end of summer leaves are green because they have large quantities of chlorophylls. The other colors are also present in the leaves at this time, but, because for the large amounts of the chlorophylls, the leaves look green to us.

This high concentration of sugars in the leaves results in an increase in the production of anthocyanins. 1-

I- Also, because of the general slow up of living processes in the plant, chlorophyll is not produced as rapidly as it is destroyed. Therefore, as the cool weather continues, there is, less and less chlorophyll in the leaf to hide the other colors, and the countryside begins to take on a whole new look. Plants vary in their ability to manufacture anthocyaninsome plants, such as the elms, produce practically none, while others, such as the sumacs, maples, and black gum, produce large amounts. For this reason, the leaves on plants will range from clear yellow to clear, bright red.

Local School Board Providing Enrichment for Gifted

With approximately \$1,200 in Title V-B funds designated for staff development during the 1980-81 school year, a committee of teachers, one from each of the 5 schools, and a chairperson, has developed a handbook for teachers to follow in developing. a 'workable classroom program for those students deemed "gifted".

Based on the report on Congress on Education in 1972 concerning the gifted and the staff of "gifted" and talented students in any given school population is from 3 to 15 percent. In the Rockcastle County Schools, this means that there are from 96 to 480 students with special needs that range beyond what is normally provided for in the regular program.

According to the handbook,

provided for in the regular program. According to the handbook, lack of financial resources, staff and space prohibits the county school system from offering a specific program of instruction geared solely to the gifted or talented. The booklet is an attempt merely to provide enrichment activities for academically gifted students.—
The handbook further

demically gifted students.

The handbook further states that good teachers attempt to reach all their students and to provide for their individual needs and that the handbook is simply an extension of that philosophy.

"Gifted" students present further

"Gifted" students possess talents and abilities differing

from those of their peers to such a degree that special education-al programs should and must be provided in order to help them realize their contribution to self

provided in order to help them realize their contribution to self and society. The "gifted" may possess' general intellectual ability consistently' superior to that of other children, may show superiority in one or more subject areas, may think creatively and as a result approach a conventional task in an unconventional manner, may exhibit outstanding leadership ability, may dispiay outstanding ability, may dispiay outstanding allily in some phase of visual or performing arts or visual or performing arts or may demonstrate superior psychomotor skills, mechanical or athletic.

The handbook provides the teacher with a detailed "gifted" child identification process which includes teacher judge-ment, combining and analyzing the results of varjous tests. ment, combining and analyzing the results of various tests, record of school performance and judgement by, among others, parents, peers and school personnel.
