

State Says Ky. 461 Project Including M.V. Bupass. Could Begin in Spring

Secretary of Kentucky Department of Transportation, Frank Metts, announced Tuesday at a meeting in Somerset that the road widening on Ky 461 and the Mt. Vernon bypass construction project are now off

construction project are now off the back burner.

Metts said money is now available for the \$20.2 million, project as a result of savings in the department coming from the "austerity" program and wise investments of bonds. The project will be financed entirely with state funds, according to

with state tunks, according to Metts.

The design of the new alignment of 461 and the bypass is 40% complete and at lens another year will be required to complete the design and clear the right of way, however, the right of way, however, the represense outher stated that the project may segfin as early as the spring of 1982. 

Most who choose to live in a small community like Mt.

Venon appreciate the benefits it affords and realize there are certain facilities, accommodations and services for which the taxes, in a predominatly rural community, will not support.

Sidewalks are obviously one of those accommodations which residents, with the exception are a few main streets in Mt.

Taking into account tight city budgets and limited tax revenue, there are two streets, Williams and Maple, which have gone without a sidewalk far too long. The building of a sidewalk for Williams Street must be considered for the safety of many elementary school children who walk to and from school.

Before school each morning, and following the high school dismissal, buses, fast-moving student vehicles and parent whicles, enroute to pick up or leave children, clog Williams Street at about the time many elementary students are walking to and from school.

The safe and alert driver must, many times, stop or critainly slow down to avoid either hitting a child or children or the saproaching vehicle even when children are walking clear of the pavement.

Speed breakers have, from time to time, been placed and removed from the street in an effort to force drivers to slow down, but the problem remains that the narrow street desperately needs a sidewalk.

Not only is it a dange.

Legislative Report

Kentucky's state represent-atives and senators have set a record for their work during the current 1980-81 interim period, rding to a report compiled the Legislative Research

according to the property of the Legislative Research Commission.

A total of 573 meetings of the interim committees, subcommittees and special committees have already been before the General Assembly, which is 105 more than was held during 105 more than was held during the entire 1978-79 interim.

As a result, committees

dividual legislators have pre-led 73 bills to be con-dered by the 1982 General

sidered by the 1982 General Assembly.
Legislative tours during the interim have included visits to a paper mill, a wildlife management area, a hezardous waste incinerator, an agricultural experimention station and the Blue Grass Army Depot.
The committees have also visited an underground coalmie, a hydropower generating plant and a uranium enrichment plant.

Seventeen Citizen Speak Outs have been held across the Commonwealth in order to gather information from Kentuckians about issues likely to be addressed by the 1982 General Assembly, as well as to gain'nsight into citizen feelings about current conditions.


Other public hearings to date have concerned issues such as multi-bank holding companies and statewide banking, and four meetings on the reorganization of Louisville and Jefferson County have been held in that area.



Faith Without Works

But wilt thou know, O vain man, that faith without

One of the most wide-spread-and greatly accepted errors of our time is the doctrine of "faith only." This popular but false teaching emphasizes faith to the exclusion of obedience to the

emphasizes faith to the exclusion of obedience to the Lord. It is interesting to note that the words "faith only" occur together only once in the Scripture. "Ye see, hen, that by works a man is justified, and not, by faith only" (Jas 2:24).

James tells those who think that faith is all that is required for salvation that even the demons are capable of belief in Jesus (Jas. 2:19). Yet no one expects that demons will be saved because of their inactive faith.

"In yet another comparison, James points out that a body without the spirit is dead—it is a lifeless corpse. In Christinaity, works or actions prescribed by the Lord are as necessary to the belief up to the belief of the belief in the believer as spirit is to the body. Works will not effect salvation in themselves, any more than faith by itself. It is salvation in themselves, any more than faith by itself. It is faith plus works, faith expressed in positive action, faith demonstrated that becomes saving faith faith that leads to salvation.

James refers in his letter to the example of Abrahan and his unwavering obedi-ence to God. Abraham and his unwavering occur ence to God. Abraham believed God, but God required something more than faith alone. God asked Abraham to demonstrate his faith and prove his love for God. Abraham responded by the act or taking his son, Isaac, to Mount Moriah to be offered as a sachine to God. Before Abraham acted, his faith was spoken, a surface response with no obedience. After his act of faith, Abraham's faith was demonstrated, deep and total. (Jas. 2:21-23). 2:21-23). Today, God still requires

something more than just an intellectual assent, an affir-mation of faith. God not only requires but commands that e demonstrate our faith in we demonstrate our faith in His Son by repenting of our sins (Acts 17:30), confessing Him before men (Rom. 10:9-10; Acts 8:37), and being buried with Him in baptism (Rom. 6:3-4).

Having arisen to walk in newness of life, the Christian is to add to his faith virtue, knowledge, temperance, patience, godliness, brotherly kindness and love (2 Pet. 1:5-8). In other words, his faith must be expressed by obedience - faithfulness (Rev.

2:10).
Friends, remember the words of Jesus, "For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also." It is good to believe r it is better to put that faith into action.


