State Says Ky.461 Project, Including M.V. Bypass, Could Begin in Spring

Secretary of Kentucky Department of Transportation, Frank Metts, announced Tuesday at a meeting in Somerset that the road widening on Ky. 461 and the Mt. Vernon bypass construction project are now off the back burner.

Metts said money is now available for the \$20.2 million project as a result of savings in the department coming from the "austerity" program and wise investments of bonds. The project will be financed entirely with state funds, according to Metts.

follows: the total distance under construction will be 16.3 miles; construction will begin at the Ky. 80 connector, six miles east of Somerset and extend to 2 miles southwest of Mt. Vernon; a new alignment of Ky. 461 will be built to U.S. 150 at the Rockcastle Industrial Park Site; using the new alignment adds 3.2 million to the original \$17 million cost estimate for the project; construction of the bypass will begin at the intersection of the new 461 and U.S. 150 and loop around the northwest side of Mt. Vernon for a distance of 3.9 miles and junction with U.S. 25 north of town; the loop is designed for 4 lanes, but will initially be only 2 lanes.

Fiscal Court Hires Ambulance Drivers Dropped from CETA

At the regular meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, Tuesday, magistrates voted to approve a recommendation by County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker to hire the nine present ambulance service employees, five of which were being paid from federal Comprehensive Education and Training Act funds, effective October 1, 1981 through January 31, 1982. George Brand, Clay Hayes, Freddie Mullins, Bradley Durham, Gary Robinson, Jimmy Houk, Jeffery ... George Wallis and James Bowman will be paid \$3.63 per hour not to exceed 40 hours a week. This will be paid out of whichever funds are available, whether revenue sharing, general fund or ambulance collections.

The Rockcastle School Board approved a close-estimate combined budget of over \$5 million for fiscal year 1982 in the regular October meeting Tuesday night.

The board opened newly solicited bids for coal haul. William Taylor, who previously had submitted the low bid of \$5.00 per ton was unable to accept the contract. Clarence Hasty, Jr. received the contract with the low bid of \$6.00 per ton. The coal is to be hauled from East Bernstadt. Robald McFerron submitted the only other bid at the Tuesday night meeting. His bid was for \$8.50 per ton.

Maggie Leach was employed as substitute teacher, subject to certification and Mary Elizabeth Polk, Loretta Mae DeBorde and Dorothy Marie Peru were approved to receive GED certificates.

In other business, the board voted to approve a contract with Donald B. Shelton to draw up plans and specifications for the Title I classrooms at Roundstone at 6% construction cost.

Upon the recommendation of County Superintendent Charles Parsons, the board agreed to employ Joyce Marie Shehan, Roy Lucas and Herman Baker as substitute bus drivers, subject to meeting state and local requirements and to employ Lillie Bullock to transport a child to the end of Cove Branch Road to meet handicapped bus at \$66 per month.

A policy relating to procedural time-line for evaluating and placing handicapped students was also approved.

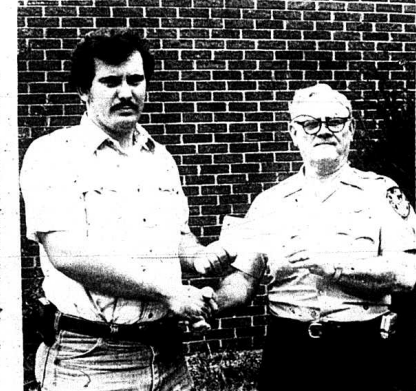
LONDON KSP POST HAS TOLL FREE EMERGENCY

The Kentucky State Police, London Post, serves Laurel, Pulaski, McCreary, Wayne, Rockcastle, Whitley and Clay Counties.

Non-emergency calls will not be accepted on the toll-free number since such calls would keep that line tied up. For emergency information and requests, the public may call the Kentucky State Police at 606-878-6622.

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EDITORIAL

Most who choose to live in a small community like Mt. Vernon appreciate the benefits it affords and realize there are certain facilities, accommodations and services for which the taxes, in a predominantly rural community, will not support.

Sidewalks are obviously one of those accommodations which residents, with the exception are a few main streets in Mt. Vernon must do without.

Taking into account tight city budgets and limited tax revenue, there are two streets, Williams and Maple, which have gone without a sidewalk far too long. The building of a sidewalk on Williams Street must be considered for the safety of many elementary school children who walk to and from school.

Before school each morning, and following the high school dismissal, buses, fast-moving student vehicles and parent vehicles, enroute to pick up or leave children, clog Williams Street at about the time many elementary students are walking to and from school.

The safe and alert driver must, many times, stop or certainly slow down to avoid either hitting a child or children or the approaching vehicle even when children are walking clear of the pavement.

Speed breakers have, from time to time, been placed and removed from the street in an effort to force drivers to slow down, but the problem remains that the narrow street desperately needs a sidewalk.

Not only is it a danger to the children walking to and from school, but the elementary school is a main focal point for almost every community activity which involves children.

Maple Street, another narrow and much-used street, needs a sidewalk, to accommodate those wishing to walk from the hospital to town as well as residents from Lewis, Tevis and Newcomb Streets.

The time has come to stop sitting back and talking about how dangerous this situation is and wishing something could be done. The time has come to do something about it.

Few city governments totally finance construction of all city sidewalks; however, we feel in these two major instances, when safety is such a major factor, the mayor and city council should find a means of providing Williams and Maple Streets with sidewalks.

Legislative Report

Kentucky's state representatives and senators have set a record for their work during the current 1980-81 interim period, according to a report compiled by the Legislative Research Commission.

A total of 573 meetings of the interim committees, subcommittees and special committees have already been held in the General Assembly, which is 105 more than was held during the entire 1979 interim.

As a result, committees

have prefiled 15 bills and individual legislators have prefiled 73 bills to be considered by the 1982 General Assembly.

Legislative tours during the interim have included visits to a paper mill, a wildlife management area, a hazardous waste incinerator, an agricultural experiment station and the Blue Grass Army Depot.

The committees have also visited an underground coalmine, a hydropower generating plant and a uranium enrichment plant.

Seventeen Citizen Speak-Outs have been held across the Commonwealth in order to gather information from Kentuckians about issues likely to be addressed by the 1982 General Assembly, as well as to gain insight into citizen feelings about current conditions.

Other public hearings to date have concerned issues such as multi-bank holding companies and statewide banking, and four meetings on the reorganization of Louisville and Jefferson County have been held in that area.

The topic of unemployment insurance was covered in six meetings throughout the state and issues pertaining to small business have been discussed with citizens in a two-day workshop and in three public hearings.

Child passenger safety and solar energy have also been discussed in special public hearings.

During this interim I have attended an average of three committee meetings a week and signed in several of the reform-named "Task Force" newly-elected members of the legis-

Come Join Us

One of the major programs in the Cooperative Extension Service is the Homemakers Association. The primary objective of the Extension Homemakers Association is to carry out an informal educational program. The educational pro-

gram is planned by club officers and members and designed to provide information to help homemakers make better use of their resources to provide a better life for themselves and their families.

Types of Membership

Anyone can be a Homemaker member. There are two types of membership available. The regular member belongs to an organized group which meets once a month, has officers, has an educational program at each meeting and meets in the community. Homemaker club

members are active on the club, county, area, state and national levels of the Association.

The second type of membership is the member-at-large. This is especially geared to the person who has little time or interest in organizational activity, but is interested in on-going learning. The at-large member does not belong to a club, but has all the other advantages. At large members are a part of the Association, receive monthly lessons through the mail, receive newsletters giving information of events and are invited to participate in county programs, tours and other activities as they choose.

Are There Dues?

Yes, two dollars a year pays your Extension Homemaker dues to be a member of a club or an at-large member in the county, area and state association. Club members may add a small amount for their club treasury.

What Is There To Learn?

You'll learn such things as energy, money and time management, family foods and nutrition, clothing, family life, health and safety, cultural arts and crafts, international understanding and community issues and concerns.

Club members develop leadership by serving as project leaders, being a leader in club programs or serving as club officers.

Homemaker Club members become a vital part of the community by getting involved in community service projects and citizenship programs.

Start Your Own Club

If there is not an organized club in your community, you and some of your friends are invited to organize one. Usually ten to fifteen members is a good number to have in a club, although no set number is required. Some groups are smaller, some larger. Clubs meet on a regular basis, usually once a month, from September through June. They may meet either during the day or at night at the convenience of the members. Clubs may meet in local community meeting rooms or in individual homes. The County Extension Agent serves as advisor and will assist the club in organizing.

Faith Without Works

"But wilt thou know, O vain man, that faith without

works is dead? It is interesting to note that the words "faith only" occur together only once in the Scripture: "Ye see, then, that by works a man is justified, and not by faith only" (Jas. 2:24).

James tells those who think that faith is all that is required for salvation that even the demons are capable of belief in Jesus (Jas. 2:19). Yet no one expects that demons will be saved because of their inactive faith.

In yet another comparison, James points out that a body without the spirit is dead—it is a lifeless corpse. In Christianity, works or actions prescribed by the Lord are as necessary to the believer as spirit is to the body. Works will not effect salvation in themselves, any more than faith by itself. It is faith plus works, faith expressed in positive action, faith demonstrated that becomes saving faith that leads to salvation.

James refers in his letter to the example of Abraham and his unwavering obedience to God. Abraham believed God, but God required something more than faith alone. God asked Abraham to demonstrate his

faith and prove his love for God. Abraham responded by the act of taking his son, Isaac, to Mount Moriah to be offered as a sacrifice to God. Before Abraham acted, his faith was spoken, a surface response with "no obedience. After his act of faith, Abraham's faith was demonstrated, deep and total. (Jas. 2:21-23).

Today, God still requires something more than just an intellectual assent, an affirmation of faith. God not only requires but commands that we demonstrate our faith in His Son by repenting of our sins (Acts 17:30), confessing Him before men (Rom. 10:9-10; Acts 8:37), and being buried with Him in baptism (Rom. 6:3-4).

Having arisen to walk in newness of life, the Christian is to add to his faith virtue, knowledge, temperance, patience, godliness, brotherly kindness and love (2 Pet. 1:5-8). In other words, his faith must be expressed by obedience-faithfulness (Rev. 2:10).

Friends, remember the words of Jesus, "For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also." It is good to believe; it is better to put that faith into action.

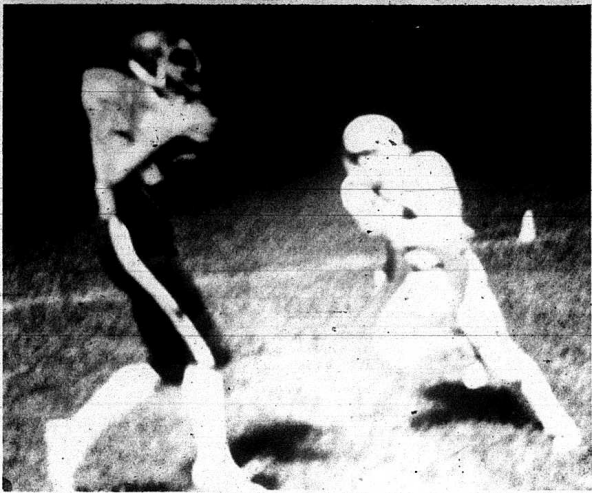

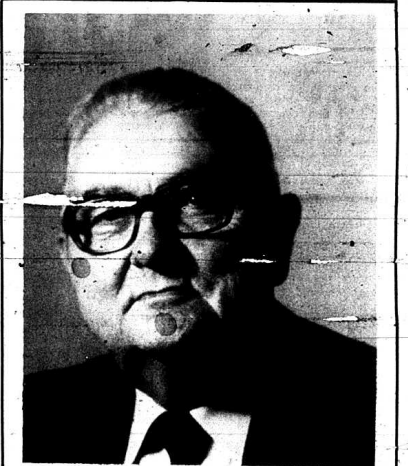

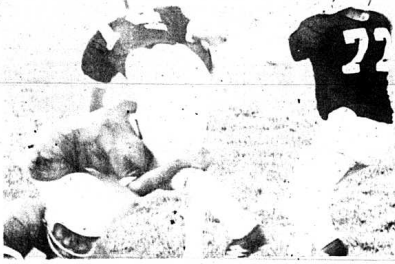
