Accident on U.S. 150

Two Doctors to Locate in Mt. Vernon

Henry Hoskins, administrator of the Rockcastle County Hospital announced Monday that Dr. Brian Badduke, 29, of Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, Canada, will be moving to Mt. Vernon to join the medical staff of the Rockcastle County Hospital and begin joint private family practice.

Dr. Monteyne finished his medical training at the University of Saskatchewan in 1980.

Dr. Badduke received a degree from Canadian Union College in theology in 1972, from Walla Walla College, a degree in biology in 1975 and

attended medical school at the University of Saskatchewan until 1980. His internship was spent at the Hurley Medical Center in Flint, Michigan.

Dr. Badduke will be arriving in approximately two weeks to ready office space on the first floor of the hospital, according to Hoskins.

Dr. Monteyne is scheduled to arrive in about 7 weeks. Their office will be open about January 1, 1982. Hoskins said.

The doctors were recruited by the Rockcastle County Hospital Board and the Rockcastle County Improvement Council.

Woods Wins District Judge's Race; Succession Amendment Defeated

Voters in Rockcastle County have elected a Democratic County Judge Executive for the first time in approximately fifty years.

Democrat Bob Jasper beat incumbent Frank DeBorde by a surprising 657 votes, in Tuesday's General Election.

Jasper, who had served 17 years on the Mt. Vernon City Council, carried all but 4 of the 14 precincts on his way to becoming the first Democratic judge since S.P. Caudill held the seat in the late 1920's.

DeBorde, who had been incumbent Hubert Thacker in the primary by only 26 votes, won 3 of the 4 Mt. Vernon precincts by carried North Mt. Vernon by only 2 votes. DeBorde's biggest margin of victory in the 4 precincts came in Conway where he beat Jasper by 33 votes.

Jasper's biggest margin of victory in any one precinct was in West Brodhead, where Jasper pooled 321 votes to DeBorde's 164.

It looked as if the race would be close when the first returns starting coming into the courthouse, but as the precincts from the rest of the county starting reporting in, it was evident that Jasper had easily won the seat.

Republican candidate for State Representative from the 80th District, Danny R. Ford got more votes than anyone in the race in Rockcastle as he beat

Democrat Andy Colburn by 2,928 votes in the county. Ford surprisingly beat Colburn in Colburn's own county, Lincoln, by 29 votes, 2588 to 2559. Ford also took the measure of Colburn in northern Pulaski County, where he won over 2 to 1, 781 to 382.

Ford, who is from Mt. Vernon and who has easily beaten Money E. Cummins in the primary, carried all 14 Rockcastle precincts. Colburn did not make a good showing in any precinct as he managed to tally only 657 votes to Ford's 3,585.

Ford will replace Republican William Harold DeMarcus, who had held the seat since his creation in 1963, in the state house of representatives, in January.

In the three magistrates seats being contested, there were few surprises as Republican Tom Denny beat Democrat Lee Faulkner by 276 votes, 507 to 231, in the second district, while in the third district magisterial race, Republican Alex Albright narrowly defeated Democrat Doug Bishop by 38 votes, 633 to 595.

Republican Joe Clark, who will be the only returning member of the Fiscal Court in January, easily defeated Democrat Earl McNew, 570 to 180 in the 5th District.

The city council race in Mt. Vernon was won by all 4 incumbents, Roger McClure, who was the biggest vote getter with 357 votes, Tom Welch with 353, Conrad Parrett with 324 and Ernie Tolle with 319. The new council members are Pete

Hurd, who got 278 votes and Buster Genery with 265. Mayor Roland Mullins was unopposed.

The six council members candidates who lost were Marshall Bullock who got 196, John Bullock with 179, Gary Noe with 134, Hubert Taylor with 174, Oscar Bullock with 238 and Joe Martin with 251.

In the Livingston City Commission race, Bobby Wilson, will remain as Mayor although he had some very strong opposition from former Mayor Bertie Rice. Wilson beat Mrs. Rice by only 6 voters, 52 to 46.

In the commissioners' race, Michael Robbins got the most votes with 61, Tod Mink was second with 58, Don Jones came in third with 49 and Ed C. McFargue will fill the final spot with 43 votes. The other men on the ballot, Danny L. Bullock had 41 votes, James McClure had 33 and Eugene Senters, 32.

In Brodhead, Ronnie Cash was unopposed for Mayor, while the 5 men tried for the 4 commissioners' seats. Eddie Cash got the most votes with 135, D.A. Robbins was second with 118, Billy Bussell was third with 116 and Johnny Wilcox was fourth with 112. Harold Harris, who was not elected, had 69 votes.

The succession amendment, which was the first on the ballot, took a beating in the county as it did across the state. In the county, the voters voted 1593 against the amendment to 375 for it. The second amendment, known as the Homestead Amendment also lost 1100 to 592.

Rockets End Season on Losing Note; Beaten by Central 20-6

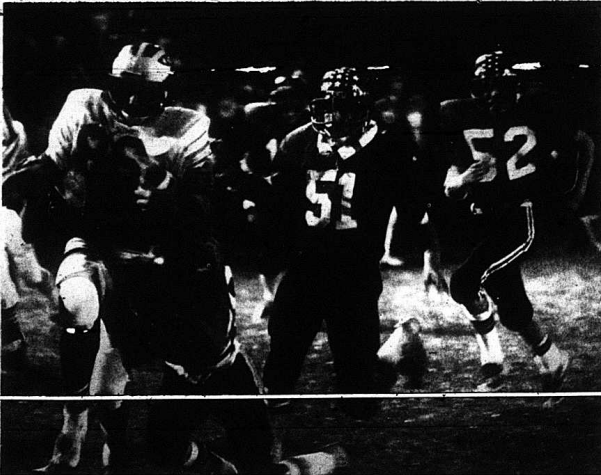



Freeze Pies For Holidays
 Once upon a time many women made a half dozen or more pies in one day, then kept

them in a pie safe for eating all through the week. They may have been great pies, but by week's end they lost some of their home-baked goodness.
 With a freezer to capture their freshness, you can have your own baking day several weeks or more before holidays, and tuck pies away for special eating. Use your favorite recipes, or those passed down from your grandmother, and count on their staying as mouth-watering good as the day you baked them.

Pumpkin, sweet potato, mincemeat and fruit pies all freeze beautifully. Chiffon pies freeze well, too. But stay away from cream filling and mergines, because results will be disappointing.

Fruit or Mincemeat Pie
 Use a tried-and-true recipe. This is no time to experiment. Either fresh or frozen fruit or canned mincemeat will do, but be sure to treat fresh fruit with ascorbic acid to prevent darkening.

Freeze the pies unbaked for best results. Line a glass or aluminum pie plate with crust, put in filling, top with another crust. Seal edges of two crusts together, cover pie with a paper plate and wrap with moisture-vapor-resistant freezer wrap. Label pie as to what kind it is and date frozen, then freeze immediately.

Fruit or mincemeat pie will keep well for 2 months. Unwrap, prick holes in the top crust, and bake at 475 degrees F. for 15 minutes. Reduce heat to 375 degrees and bake 30 minutes longer, or until done.

Chiffon Pie
 Pour cooled chiffon filling into crumb crust or baked pastry crust in glass or aluminum pie plate. Cover with paper plate, wrap with moisture-vapor-resistant freezer wrap. Label as to what kind of pie and date frozen. Freeze immediately.

Don't keep this in your freezer more than 2 weeks. Before serving, thaw in refrigerator overnight or for 8 to 10 hours.

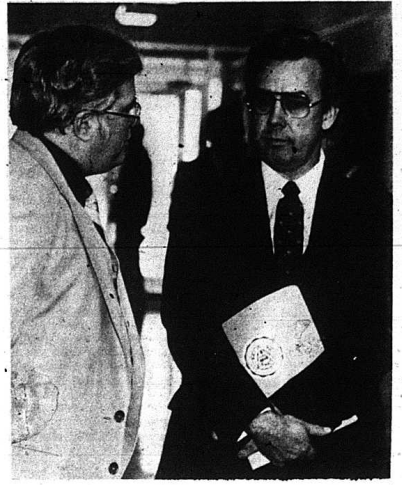

If you buy a smoke detector and install it in your house near the sleeping area, it could mean that you and your family will live through the winter. Prices range from around \$20 to \$50. You can buy a battery-operated unit or one that works on electricity. Look for the UL label that means it's approved by the Underwriters Laboratory, a testing agency that checks up on the safe operation of all sorts of electrical equipment.

Most home fires happen at night, which is why putting the detector on a ceiling or wall next to bedrooms is important. If you have bedrooms on two different levels or in different wings of a house, get one unit for each area.

If possible, work out two exits from every room, in case one is blocked by fire. The next step is practice fire drills in the home. Blow the whistle and see how long it takes everyone to get out of the house and meet on the front lawn.

Ways to Disobey God

The faithful child of God never seeks ways by which he can disobey God. Yet the Bible indicates different manners in which God may be disobeyed. It might help us to avoid some pitfalls of apostasy to reflect on the ways in which God is disobeyed.

1. BY DOING WHAT IS FORBIDDEN (Gen. 2:16, 3:6). Adam and Eve, in eating of the forbidden fruit, transgressed or violated the will of God. We refer to this kind of sin as sin of commission. They committed an act which God specifically had prohibited. Men today often do exactly what He has forbidden.

2. BY REFUSING TO DO WHAT GOD HAS COMMANDED (Jas. 4:17; Lk. 7:30, Heb. 10:25). The Pharisees and lawyers in Lk. 7:30 rejected the counsel of God on baptism. They therefore committed a sin of omission. James states that when one knows to do good and does it not, to him it is sin. Oen can do nothing and be sent to hell for doing nothing, for God has made demands upon us.

3. BY ADDING TO THE WORD OF GOD (Deut. 4:2, Rev. 22:18). God states that if one adds unto His word, the plagues written in the word of God will be added to that person. John declares that "lawlessness" is sin (1 Jno. 3:4-ASV). Sin, as defined by John, is that which is lawless. Sin is the doing of anything for which there is no law or for which there is no authority.

Men frequently ask, "Where is the scripture against it?" But John declares that if there is no law for the act in question it is "lawlessness," and lawlessness is sin. To act or speak where God has not spoken is a sin of presumption (Num. 15:30; Lev. 10:1-2). When one

acts without divine authority, he presumes to know God's will aside from the expressed will of God and presumes to speak in His behalf. Such is insolent sin, and is intolerable by God.

John declares that when one goes beyond the doctrine of Christ, he gives up both Christ and God (2 Jno. 9). Paul therefore insists that we must learn "not to go beyond the things which are written" (1 Cor. 4:6).

4. BY TAKING FROM THE WORD OF GOD (Deut. 32:19). To take from God's word is a sin of the same sort as to add to His word. Taking from His Word will result in the same being taken from the tree of life and the holy city written in the book.

When one talks about God's "nonessential commands," he is preparing his heart to commit the damning sin of taking from God's word.

5. BY SUBSTITUTING FOR WHAT GOD HAS COMMANDED (Gen. 4:4, Lev. 10:1-3). Cain substituted a vegetable sacrifice for what God had commanded (Heb. 11:4) and God had no respect for his gift. Nadab and Abihu, though they offered fire, did not offer the fire that God had commanded, and thus were consumed by their strange fire. In religion men must learn to "accept no substitute," for God will not accept a substitute for obedience (1 Sam. 15:22-23).

Realizing wherein we can fail, we need to use great caution "lest we fall." "If any man speak, let him speak as the oracles of God" (1 Pet. 4:11).

Baling Rye Tobacco

The main concern with farmers at this time of the year is how to get their rye crop prepared for market. Rockcastle County farmers will produce between 3 1/2 and 4 1/2 million pounds of tobacco this year. Such a valuable cash crop demands much of a farmer's time and attention. Most of the hand labor has been completed this season except for stripping. With the concern for eliminating labor costs for stripping many farmers will market their tobacco in bales for the first time.

This relatively new process is much like what many farmers have worked with for years. Tobacco must be in good case in order to be baled and handled in the stripping room. One advantage with baling is that tobacco in low case which could not be hand tied may be in case enough to handle in baling. On the other hand, many farmers are finding high case or wet tobacco is the same in either process and can cause more problems when baled. Wet tobacco when placed in bales, may cause caked or bruised tobacco as well as heavy bales which heat. Farmers who don't detect tobacco which has gotten hot stand to lose as much as 100 dollars or more per bale. This is a very good reason to avoid baling wet tobacco.

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Other advantages of baling is the increased efficiency in removing the leaves without having to tie each bundle. There is also time saved in handling the bales whether storing or loading for market.

Bales should weigh between 65 and 90 pounds. Dimensions should be 3 foot long by one foot thick and 22 to 24 inches high. Bales weighing more than 90 pounds and measuring over 24 inches will present problems in handling and storing. Each bale should be tied with cotton twine and labeled with a tag containing the farmer's name, address and farm grade. Bales should be

firm and stored setting as it would come out of the baler. Boards or plywood should be placed between layers when a second layer is made. All other storing practices of covering and keeping clean are the same as for hand tied tobacco.

Farmers are also reminded that nesting tobacco with sticks, stones or inferior tobacco is prohibited. Each bale will be labeled and those found to contain foreign objects will be returned to the grower.

Bale tags as well as baler plans are now available at the County Extension Office.
