## Council Hears Request for Sidewalks Leading to Main Community

The president of the Mt. Vernon Woman's Club was before the Mt. Vernon City Council, at their regular meeting Monday night, to voice her club and other civic organization's support for sidewalks in three main areas of Mt. Vernon.

Mrs. Roland-Mullins told the council that a sidewalk to the high school from the existing sidewalk on West Main Street was badly needed to accommodate students wishing to walk to school. Also, for residents along the road which is narrow and extremely dangerous because of the traffic caused by schoolbuses and students driving to school.

Mrs. Mullins also said there needed to be a sidewalk installed to the grade school on Williams Street because the same reasons Mrs. Mullins also mentioned Maple Drive, from Richmond Street to the hospital (alongside Cox Funeral Home). She said this street needed a sidewalk because this is the major route ambulances take to and from the hospital thereby creating a danger for pedestrians.

Primarily, Mrs. Mullins asked for a letter of support from the council to be forwarded to the Department of Transportation for the sidewalk to the high school and the council complied. The council also agreed that sidewalks were needed in the other areas mentioned and said the first step would be to determine if there was already a right-of-way through property owners on which a sidewalk could be constructed.

The Council also discussed another sidewalk project which seems to have "biten the dust" so to speak-along old U.S. 25 (around by the cemetery).

At the time Valley View Apartments were built, developers agreed to blacktop the street from their apartment complex to Main Street and to build a sidewalk the same distance.

Blacktopping of the street has been completed but the sidewalk will apparently not be built due to property owners' refusal to grant right-of-way through their property.

The Council was told Monday night by City Attorney Carl Clontz that a search of the deeds back through the early 1900's shows that property owners on the street own to the edge of the road. Clontz said the city's only alternatives would be to negotiate with the property owners to buy the necessary right-of-way or, this failing, to condemn the property and build the sidewalk.

The consensus of the council was that since property owners in the area were against the construction of a sidewalk, that they the council would rather forget the project than enter into the aggravation of condemnation suits in order to acquire the necessary easements.

In other action, the council: Promoted Jimmy Durham to Police Chief with a salary increase of \$100 per month. Approved the blocking off of city streets for the Christmas Parade and

Increased the sewer connection charge from \$25 to \$100.

Fire Chief John Cox was before the Council to discuss the condition of the city's old fire truck which is being used to answer fire calls in the county in the area which the city protects.

Cox said the truck was in extremely bad shape with the tank leaking so that by the time the fire department arrived at the scene the water would be half gone. He also said that he and several members of the fire department had gone before the Fiscal Court to ask for monies to help with maintaining the present truck or obtaining another one but to no avail. However, Cox said that both Livingston and Brodhead Fire Departments had received several thousands of dollars from

## Fiscal Court Meets

At a Wednesday meeting of the Fiscal Court, Leroy Cole and Lewis Norris, representatives of the Jackson County REA met with the court to discuss electrical inspection of newly wired houses. The court adopted an agreement and ordinance with Jackson County REA naming the company as official inspecting agency for all electrical wiring within the service area of the Jackson County Rural Electric Cooperative Corp. in Rockcastle County. The ordinance prescribes the authority and duties of the inspector and provides penalties for violation of the inspection ruling.

In other business, Delno McClure was hired as general laborer for two months at \$3.75 per hour and Danny McKinney was hired as a truck driver, effective November 4.

Mr. Cox said he and other firemen planned to approach the court again at their December meeting and to tell them if they were unable to come up with funds for the Mt. Vernon department than fire protection service outside the city limits would have to cease as of December 31st.

Mullins went on to say that if this bill would have to be paid from the hospital's operating expenses rather than from monies received to build the extended care facility, then he felt the council might forgive the debt to the non-profit organization.

Councilman Ernest Stanley, who last month made the motion to collect the debt from the hospital, agreed with the mayor and made a motion to that effect. The motion passed.

## Audit Report

According to the accounting report following a review of the county financial records, the books were found to be in general compliance with a few exceptions.

The report filed by James B. Graham, auditor of Public accounts, lists the following areas of noncompliance:

"Violations of KRS 68.340 concerning inadequate budget records and appropriate ledgers were discussed with the County Judge, Executive and noted for change.

"The county was in violation of KRS 68.020 which requires publication of the Treasurer's annual report. The settlement published for fiscal year ended June 30, 1980 included only the General Fund.

"By complying with KRS 68.280 which allows for amendments to the budget, the county could have avoided being in conflict with KRS 68.220, the Uniform County Budget Law. The General Fund budget was overspent by \$19,419. Also, the county should budget the expenditures of the Rural Road Fund.

"The Sheriff owes the county, school and state \$839 \$345 and \$85 respectively from the 1979 tax collections. He is due a refund of \$114 from special taxing districts. Also, the sheriff has failed to pay the county \$747 of advertising cost for the 1979 taxes."

## Thomas Jefferson Niceley : Rockcastle's Political Legend

A full page biographical profile of Thomas Jefferson Niceley appeared in Vol. 3 of "History of Kentucky" by Connelley and Coulter, printed by the American Historical Society in 1922. Even though in 1922, Rockcastle Countian T.J. Niceley was just beginning what was to be a long career as an invincible politician and highly respected state Republican party leader, he had already gained sufficient re-

ognition, state wide, to be included in this history. He was characterized as follows: "There are unquestionable indicators of natural force of versatile gifts and talents of a high order in many directions, but it is their soundness, their vitality and their steadiness that they are such important factors in the community's life. A man

of this class is found in Thomas Jefferson Niceley, president of the Bank of Mt. Vernon and Circuit Court Clerk of Rockcastle County."

Tom Niceley was born in Rockcastle County in 1875, the son of Benjamin Franklin Niceley and Phoebe Nichols. Benjamin Franklin farmed here until the Civil War at which time he joined in the Union forces and fought in numerous important battles including Shiloh, Chickamauga, Stone River, Lookout Mountain and Missionary Ridge. "With

a splendid record for bravery and faithful performance of duty he returned to farming in Rockcastle County" following the war.

As Tom grew up he gradually assumed more of the responsibilities of the family farm. In 1898 he married Lucy M. Catron, daughter of Henry and Sarah Catron of Level Green. Catron, who was sheriff, appointed his son-in-law, deputy sheriff to serve with him during his term (1906-1910). Tom was then elected

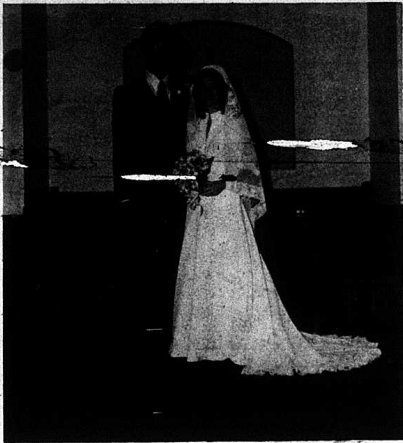

sheriff in 1910 and served until 1914. According to family members, Tom never carried a gun during his terms as sheriff and deputy sheriff. This was a time during which, I am told, men who carried guns were the rule rather than the exception. A sheriff who did not carry a gun was then even more exceptional.

But Tom Niceley's career and personality became more exceptional and outstanding as the years passed and his accomplishments mounted.

In 1914 Tom "was appointed to fill an unexpired term as Circuit Court Clerk. In November of 1915, he was elected to the office and served as Circuit Clerk and later as County Court Clerk. He served until 1953, when he was defeated in his final bid for the office of County Court Clerk by Clarence Carter. Following his defeat, he was appointed County Attorney and served in this position until his death in 1956.

"Tom Niceley politicized all the time," said one resident who remembers him. "But he was an honest and sincere person, not a crooked politician. He was for the little man. I once saw a woman come to him in his office and tell him of her dire circumstances and he, without hesitation, gave her \$2. Nothing was said about paying it back.

Generosity seems to be the one trait that best characterized T.J. Niceley and the one that he is most remembered for. He is said to have been generous both with his money and time. Perhaps his position, assumed in 1918, as bank president had something to do with the fact that people felt comfortable asking Tom Niceley for money and help.

This story is told and probably depicts Tom's nature best of all. He asked his son-in-law to drive him out to someone's house to collect a debt. Tom went up to the man's door and collected the \$100 he was owed, but before he got back to the car, the man had borrowed \$50.00 of it back.

He reportedly secured more notes, following his direct involvement with the bank, than anyone else

would dare. According to family members, he did not do it for political gain. He was there to back the person in need, and many times he "lost his shirt" because of his accommodating nature.

Son, Lewis Denver, says he remembers many times having seen his dad buy homes and farms sold on the courthouse steps for back taxes and turn around and give it back to the person who had owned it. Nell Wanda Travis worked in her father's office for several years, and remembers his going to the office numerous times at 2 or 3 a.m. to issue marriage licenses (there was no waiting period).

Tom was a lawyer by virtue of having read law books and having passed the state bar exam. He gave free legal advice and drew up deeds for 50 cents or 25 cents, when most lawyers were charging from \$5.00 to \$10.00. Naturally, he did a thriving business.

Once Nell remembers, as they got ready to close the office, a man came in to get a deed. According to Nell, they stayed for over an hour talking to the man and making his deed. When they were at last ready to go, the man made no mention of paying, but merely remarked (referring to Jalette Griffin, Egan, deputy clerk), "Well, she's a handy thing ain't she?" After their indignation wore off, Nell said they all got tickled.

Tom and Lucy Niceley were also close personal friends of U.S. Representative, and Mrs. J.M. Robson of Barbourville. They often visited each other when the Robsons were in the area. Once the Niceleys and another couple, the John Griffins of Mt. Vernon, were invited by the Robsons to Washington to attend a reception and parade for the King and Queen of England. Mrs. Robson, who was reportedly a very well educated and intelligent lady, paid little attention to her personal appearance and was no doubt determined that her role would not change her. Mrs. Niceley and Mrs. Griffin had bought new clothes for the grand occasion and were astounded that Mrs. Robson's shoes were "run over" and

years during which time he served not only in various official capacities in the local courthouse, but also he served on the state central committee for the Republican Party, was a Kentucky delegate to the National Republican Convention and ran for state auditor.

The nature of his political savvy won for him the respect of political leaders, state and nationwide. He was a "longer who had connections," said one who remembers him well.

The 1940 convention elected Wendell Willkie, a dark horse, to run against Roosevelt. Robert Taft and Thomas E. Dewey both wrote letters to Tom following the convention thanking him for his support even though efforts failed. From the tone of the letters, "Tom had at first supported Taft and when it no longer was in the running, he threw his support to Dewey. Dewey's letter urged all Republicans to get behind Willkie and the entire Republican ticket. Both Taft and Dewey invited him to visit them and to keep in touch.

During the Roosevelt years, Tom Niceley worked hard to keep the struggling Republican party alive, according to Lewis Denver. "It was difficult to get enough people to run for state offices." It was under these conditions that T.J. Niceley allowed his name to be put on the ballot as a candidate for state auditor.

### "LEGISLATIVE REPORT" (Cont'd from P-2)

This year's budget cuts for the last two years total \$489 million which is 11.2 percent of the original 1980-82 budget.

As enacted by the 1980 General Assembly, the state's General Fund budget for 1980-82 totaled \$4,349 billion. The budget was based on estimates of state revenues that eventually proved to be too high.

Revenues for fiscal year 1980-81 ran \$159 million below estimates, and revenues for this fiscal year have thus far run \$282 million below estimates.

Also, revenues for fiscal year 1979-80 ran almost \$48 million below estimates. Since the present executive administration took office during the latter part of that fiscal year, they had to make up the difference.

A one year budget would mean that the governor could call a special session for 1983, when the legislature is scheduled to meet anyway for a ten-day planning session.

In addition to keeping the constitutional budget-making authority in the rightful hands of the legislature, a one year budget at this time would enable the state to keep up with changing economic conditions.



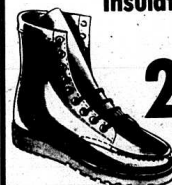

From "Clear Creek Community Church" which appeared in the Signal in the 1930's, Aunt Lucy Nicely is described as follows: "I have always said that I like to pay tribute to a place that I was born in. This is a place that I want to say that Aunt Lucy Nicely is one of the best women in the world next to my mother, in my opinions. Of course, most people know her as Tom's wife, but I know her as an individual person who stands apart in a lot of things other than just keeping house or the home fires burning. She has not only been a mother to her children, but she mothered a lot of waifs like myself. She is known far and wide for her charitable deeds, her good, big heart and at times she has gone out of her way to be a good Samaritan... I believe with all my heart, that it has not been all because of Tom's popularity that he has been re-elected for term after term as a county official, but because Aunt Lucy is the popular, big-hearted person that she is... I know that throughout all these years, no one has ever gone to them with a good cause

and found that their hearts or pockets/bags were empty... Tom's children say that he owned a thick black book reportedly filled with debts. When he died, none of the children cared to look at the book and it was burned. They felt, they said, that if their father had meant for the money to be collected, he would have done it himself.

No one contends the fact that T.J. Nicely could have been a wealthy man par excellence. He has been so generous, but obviously they enjoyed giving. The children and grandchildren have by no means been shortchanged. They rather have, been made rich with the legacy of Tom and Lucy Nicely.

The Nicely's had six children: Bonnie Cox of London; Dessie Helen Donovan of Mt. Sterling; Henry of Atlanta, Georgia; Lewis Denver and Neil Wanda Travis, both of Mt. Vernon, and Russell, deceased.

The Signal paid tribute to T.J. Nicely following his death in July of 1956. The tribute read in part: "Mr. Nicely's contribution to the community was service, friendship, and courtesy to all he knew and the public responded by electing him deputy sheriff, circuit court clerk, city court clerk. His final defeat, and one of his few, was no re-putation of Mr. Nicely, but rather a practical public view that he might not survive another term in office.

With his death at 80, most of the elder politicians of the heyday of the Rockcastle of the early part of the century have gone. It was fitting that Tom Nicely should be one of the last, because his political contribution and career was one of the longest and most illustrious...

At a memorial service conducted by Judge R.C. Tarter, the first hour of Christmas Court, Monday, July 16, 1956, the resolution included "and we would honor Jones Durham used at the passing of Uncle Dave Clark. When we go to the Court House and walk on the lawn, it appears to us that a shade tree is gone."

We have examined the Statement of Assets, Liabilities and Fund Balances Arising From Cash Transactions of Rockcastle County of June 30, 1980, and the related Statement of Cash Disbursements and Changes in Fund Balances for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. We also conducted tests of compliance with state and federal laws and regulations and the auditing procedure and standards for Revenue Sharing issued by the Office of Revenue Sharing.

As recommended by the State Local Finance Officer, pursuant to KRS 68.210, the accompanying financial statements are prepared on a cash basis. Consequently, certain revenue and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when a liability is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the assets, liabilities and fund balances arising from the cash transactions of Rockcastle County at June 30, 1980, and its cash receipts and cash disbursements during the year then ended, in conformity with the accounting system described above, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

The supplemental information presented in this report is not necessary for a fair presentation of the financial statements, but is presented as additional supplementary data. This information has been subjected to the tests and other auditing procedures applied in the examination of the financial statements mentioned above, and in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Recommendations and areas of non-compliance are as follows: The Sheriff owns the county, school and state 8939, 8345 and 885 respectively from the 1979 tax collections. He is due a refund of \$116 from special taxing districts. Also, the Sheriff has failed to pay the county \$147 of ad valorem taxes for the 1979 taxes.

By complying with KRS 68.280 which allows for amendments to the budget, the county could have avoided being in conflict with KRS 68.220, the Uniform County Budget Law. The General Fund budget was overspent by \$19,419. Also, the county should budget the expenditures of the Rural Road Fund.

We recommended the fiscal court review the bonds of the Sheriff who is now bonded for \$15,000 and the County Treasurer now bonded for \$20,000. We advise the Court to require bonding of these officials in an amount commensurate with their financial responsibilities.

Violations of KRS 68.340 concerning inadequate budget records and appropriation ledgers were discussed with the County Judge/Executive and noted for change.

We recommend that the gross amount of each salary payment be posted to the appropriate salary account in the budget appropriation ledger.

The county was in violation of KRS 68.020 which requires publication of the Treasurer's annual settlement. The settlement published for fiscal year ended June 30, 1980, included only the General Fund.

In order to improve bookkeeping, we are making recommendations which are enumerated in the supplementation section of this report.

Holiday centerpieces give your home a festive look whether for family meals or special occasions. Here are some quick and easy centerpiece ideas to try.

Many centerpieces are both edible and decorative. For instance, combine frosted grapes with holly. To make frosted grapes, beat egg whites lightly with one tablespoon of water. Paint this onto the grapes with a pastry brush, then sprinkle them with granulated sugar and allow them to dry.

Use two or three bunches of grapes in a fresh fruit arrangement. Place the fruit on a platter or in a compote and add evergreen for an attractive centerpiece.

Table trees are easy and fun to construct either by yourself or as a family project. The base can be made several ways. One way is to soak and drain Oasis and cover it with green foil that has been shaped into a cone. Fill the center tightly with soaked sphagnum moss. These two bases are good when you are using fresh plant materials. When you are not, a cone of Styrofoam works well.

Various other materials, such as yews, boxwood, ivy or similar foliage can be used to cover the base. Cut the greenery into pieces about three or four inches long and soak them several hours. Whittle the stems and place them close together into the tree base. This provided the background for the tree. Then simply set the base on plaque, stand or tray of any size or material. If you wish to give the tree a more natural look, insert one end of a dowel into a round or square, green block of wood and the other end into the tree base. Now, add decorations of your choice.

Brussels sprouts, lady apples or crabapples can be

placed on round toothpicks or green florist picks and fastened into the tree foundation. Or decorate the tree with radish roses, carrot and celery curls, lilies and other goodies and encourage guests to help themselves.

Cranberries can be inserted at random either individually or in groups of three of fours. Long straight pins are convenient for applying cranberries on a small tree. For a complete cranberry tree, apply cranberries liberally, but allow bits of green to show for contrast.

Small toys, angels or pearls can be sprinkled at random over the tree for a whimsical touch. Small gift packages, wrapped in bright holiday colors, can be arranged on or around the base of the tree, ready for Christmas morning or as party favors for guests.

Add velvet or satin bows to the trees and arrange flowers, perhaps red carnations with holly sprigs at the base.

## Feltner Apartments Win Award

So successful has a project been which is attempting to help mentally retarded and developmentally disabled adults, assume a degree of independence, that it has won the 1981 Outstanding Counseling Services Award for Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities Programs by the Kentucky Personnel and Guidance Association.

The Cumberland River Comprehensive Care Center project, which began last May with the opening of the Edith Feltner Apartments, provides housing, recreation, work and counseling for retarded residents who might have, a few years ago, been isolated in their family homes or been in institutions.

One of the basic concepts embraced by community mental health centers is that mentally handicapped persons should be allowed and encouraged to live productive, semi-independent and therefore happier lives exemplified in this Corbin complex.

next door to the Corbin Comprehensive Care Center main offices, were built with a \$534,000 loan from the U.S. Housing and Urban Development agency and is self-supporting in that Comprehensive Care receives no health services dollars for the facility. HUD does, however, provide rent subsidy.

Each resident is admitted with the understanding that he or she will take an active part in the planned program of habilitation, utilizing local resources, including Sheltered Workshop, counseling at the Comprehensive Care Center, Vocational Rehabilitation, Bureau for Social Services and other care giving agencies and community resources.

With the possible exception of work (and some have full time jobs) the 10 current residents lead fairly unregimented lives. They share meals in a dining room and participate in group counseling sessions at least twice a week.

Roland Mullins, executive director of the Corporation, lives

Comprehensive Care Center feels that the apartments afford as near independent living as is possible for the retarded. "The residents are supervised, but we try to keep away as much as possible. They are oriented to apartment living, work and recreation on their own as much as possible."

Besides providing social skills, affording residents an opportunity to learn housekeeping skills and giving them and their families the security of knowing the resident has an ongoing place to live," Mullins said, "perhaps the single most important change is the self-esteem that comes from living independently."

Residents must be retarded, ambulatory, at least 18 years of age. There's no upward age limit. Twenty-five percent of each resident's income goes for rent and utilities. Meals are paid for on a monthly basis.

## Ramp Nears \$2 Million Level

The U.S. Soil Conservation Service (SCS) has now obligated nearly \$1.9 million worth of Rural Abandoned Mine Program (RAMP) projects covering 16 different reclamation plans in Kentucky.

"RAMP" is entering its third year of implementation with some real visual accomplishments taking place," according to Eddie E. Wood, SCS state conservationist.

"Overall our best estimates indicate the reclamation work averages \$4700 per acre, about \$200 per acre above the national average," Wood said. "This figure does not include our servicing costs."

Four RAMP projects are in the final completion phase and should be 100 percent complete before the end of the 1982 construction season. These projects are Glenn Gill, Muhlenburg County; the Pentecostal Children's Home, Knox County; the Earlington Recreation Association, Hopkins County; and the David Community Development Corporation, Floyd County.

Another four are nearing completion and eight others have funds obligated to begin reclamation in 1982. These projects involve an additional 225 acres SCS reports.

Wood pointed out, "Erosion control, sediment reduction and visual improvements have been accomplished on 172 acres. Nine health and safety hazards have been eliminated, too."

"Thus far, the majority of post reclamation uses, 143 acres, have been for recreational purposes. The reclamation work has also improved water quality for 120 acres of lakes and 2,500 feet of streams," he explained.

Additionally, erosion and sediment control has resulted in an estimated savings of 18,000 tons of soil from washing off treated land.

"We had hoped to fund more reclamation plans with landowners this year," Wood said, "but because of experience budget cuts in RAMP, we are prohibited from approving any new basic contracts. This means we will concentrate our efforts

on completing reclamation work on the projects already underway until we receive further guidance."  
"I must say, however," continued Wood, "that because of reduced funds for technical assistance-projected about 73% less than last year-we will probably be forced to delay some of these construction contracts for back-to-back summers to design and construction supervision. It all depends on the final budget action and program guidance by Congress and the Administration."  
The 11 contracts on the FY 82 construction schedule have an approximate cost of \$744,000. They are in Henderson, Webster, Davies, Muhlenburg, McCreary, Pulaski, Floyd, Cassette, Clay, Leslie, and

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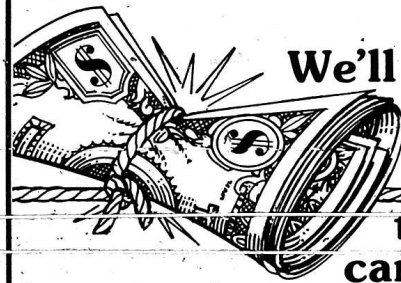

### Photography Exhibit Opens at Hayner

Monday, November 16th through Sunday, November 22nd, 1981, an exhibition of 30 photographs by Jack Bowman, formerly of Orlando, will be on display at the Troy-Hayner Cultural Center located at 301 W. Main Street, Troy, Ohio.

The exhibit is entitled and will feature "Gum-Bichromate Watercolor Pigment Images." This refers to an unconventional method of producing the photographs. The technique is an

adaptation of a photographic process used in the latter half of the 19th Century.

All modern color photographic prints have a life expectancy of less than 50 years. However, this use of water color pigment gives Mr. Bowman's prints a permanence of color. The photos are printed on watercolor paper then more watercolor paint is added. This addition of color gives some of the photographs the appearance of watercolor paintings.

Jack Bowman has taught art and photography at Piqua High School for the past nine years. He has taught art courses at Edison State College, the Troy-Hayner Cultural Center, and Brukner Nature Center. He holds a B.A. degree in ART from Eastern Kentucky University and has done graduate work in photography at Miami University. His paintings and photographs have been exhibited in group shows throughout Ohio. The photographs themselves, entitled "Last of the Noble Savages," were taken in the early 1970's in the area of the Daniel Boone National Forest in Central Kentucky. They depict the Kentucky Highlander pursuing outdoor sports for which he and the area are well noted. Many of the photographs were taken in Rockcastle County and several current residents appear in them.

Mr. Bowman will explain the process and technique for producing gum-bichromate photography Monday, November 16 at 8:00 p.m. at the Troy-Hayner Cultural Center.

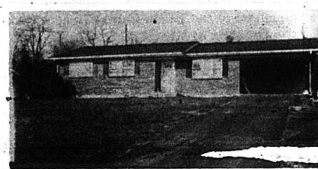

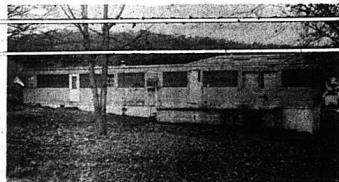
