1981 Parade Plans

Weather permitting, Santa will arrive in Mt. Vernon by helicopter this year on Saturday, December 5th, during the Christmas Parade. The parade, which is scheduled to begin at 10 a.m. Saturday morning, will feature old cars, floats, a ping pong ball drop, the Rockcastle High School Band and the firetruck, the saddle club and much more.

Registration entries must be made no later than Tuesday, Nov. 24. To register, call either Bill James at the Bank of Mt. Vernon or Karen King at King's Pic Pac.

Floats will be judged on beauty, originality and theme. The theme of the 1981 parade is "Christmas 2001". There is no entry fee this year and prizes of \$100, \$50 and \$25 will be awarded for the three floats judged best.

Accident at Conway

An accident on U.S. 25, 8 miles north of Mt. Vernon, Saturday, November 7, apparently was caused by a vehicle stopped on the roadway, according to investigating officer, Greg Ennis.

Ennis said Jackie Bullock, 21, of Route 1, Mt. Vernon was traveling south about 10:10 p.m. As he approached a lightless vehicle stopped in the roadway, he was unable to stop in time to avoid a collision.

Clara York, 39, of Route 3, Mt. Vernon, was driver of the stalled vehicle. A third vehicle, driven by Auburn Richards, 62, of Danville, was approaching north and was struck head-on by the Bullock vehicle.

Bullock struck the York vehicle in the left rear, knocking it out of the roadway then proceeded across the northbound lane and into the Richards vehicle.

Joy Bullock, 15, of Route 4, Mt. Vernon, a passenger in the Bullock vehicle received class 4 injuries. Richards and Mary Richards,

Two men were spotted taking the tin off the roof of an abandoned building on property belonging to Chester Whitaker in the Pongee area of the county, Sunday night, around 8 p.m.

A state police special response team, including David Lane, Roland Huckabee, Steve Lundy, Allen Scharf, David Campbell and a bloodhound, were called to the scene and unsuccessfully pursued the two back into a wooded area.

About 3 a.m. of the following morning, the suspects were arrested on I-75 South and charged with criminal mischief in the 1st degree. Arrested were John Bentley, 28, and Salle Ray Pruitt, 30, both of Pittsburg, Ky.

K.A.G.E. Organized

Approximately 30 parents and educators met at the high school November 12 to discuss special education for gifted children. Superintendent of schools, Charles B. Parsons, introduced the subject with some opening remarks concerning recent efforts and expenditures of local funds towards this project. He explained that a staff development and in-service program concerning education of the gifted has now been completed county-wide. Betty Jo McKinney, an English teacher at RCHS who has completed a graduate class on the gifted child, attended workshops in Richmond and Louisville, and various independent research projects on the gifted, spoke to the group on the characteristics and special problems of these children. She also presented a film entitled "Understanding the Gifted."

Doris Mills, president of K.A.G.E. (Kentucky Association for Gifted Education) from Owensboro, was also present. She discussed the purpose, background, and present status of K.A.G.E., and of gifted education in Kentucky and the nation. K.A.G.E. now has a steadily growing membership of over 2000 members. Ms. Mills distributed membership forms and fifteen people joined K.A.G.E.

Twelve of the fifteen new members expressed a desire to meet locally to learn more and to make plans for Rockcastle County's gifted children. Local meetings will be scheduled sometime in the near future.

Federal Program Focuses on Needs of Elderly, Handicapped

Poor, elderly or handicapped people in Rockcastle County may be warmer this winter thanks to a federal weatherization program designed to make old houses warmer.

The work and materials are free and the agency administering the program, the Daniel Boone Development Council, in Manchester, may spend up to \$560 per home, according to Ruth Martin, who heads the program.

Martin said Daniel Boone has a branch office in Mt. Vernon that people who are eligible may contact.

The program consists of repairing homes to make them weathertight, Martin said, and is implemented in stages, according to the condition of the home.

First, workers will caulk around doors and windows and anywhere there's a hole," she said.

Next, weather stripping is added around and under doors. If needed, windows will be replaced, and new putty added.

The next priority is repairing outside holes in walls and new masonite outside wall covering will be added if necessary, according to Martin.

She said window and door frames will be replaced if they cannot be repaired and roofs and ceilings will be repaired.

The last priority will be the installation of attic insulation, she said.

She said in the past, work was done on a priority basis which helped the elderly and handicapped first.

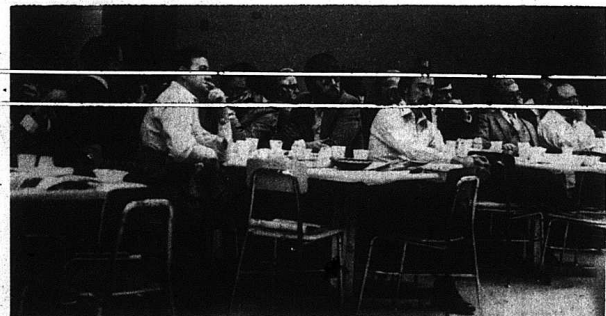

National Education Week: A Spotlight on Two Former Teachers

It seems appropriate that during National Education Week, we feature two former school teachers, Dorothy and William Landrum.

Almost invariably when Mt. Vernon High School Alumni reminisce about old school days, Mr. and Mrs. Landrum's names surface as two who have contributed in a special way to education.

Mrs. Landrum taught biology for 32 years at Mt. Vernon and earned for her-

self the reputation as a teacher of superior ability.

Biology, for most students, is not one of the easier subjects to grasp, but Mrs. Landrum's method reportedly combined a strictly disciplined classroom and a classroom filled with interest centers which might include such things as demonstrations, displays and stimulating news clippings or articles. Mrs. Landrum had the ability to "put it across" as well as the ability to encourage learning on different levels.

It has been said by former pupils that she commanded that students learn. There was no getting out of it. "Any discipline problems were killed before they had a chance to get started."

One former student said, "Not only did she know a lot, but she was able to give it to us."

Mrs. Landrum is modest about her teaching ability and says that because she had a voice problem, she felt students had to listen more closely to hear her.

Dorothy Haff moved to

Mt. Vernon with her parents, Robert C. and Emma Fogelman Haff, both of Pennsylvania Dutch ancestry, when she was 12 years old. Her father made the move from Maryland to take a job at the Pine Hill Lime Plant which was owned by a Baltimore Company.

Dorothy attended Langdon School for two years and Mt. Vernon High School for 4 years, graduating in 1929. She graduated with a major in biology from Wooster College in Wooster, Ohio, a college run by the Presby-

terian Church, and returned to work for a year as a pioneer in the field of government social work. Her job was to visit homes of persons on relief or who were working for WPA. Offices were over the Peoples' Bank and later over the old Signora Company.

After the school year began in 1935, she felt lucky to have been asked to replace a biology teacher who had resigned and moved away.

Mrs. Landrum says she enjoyed the classroom and

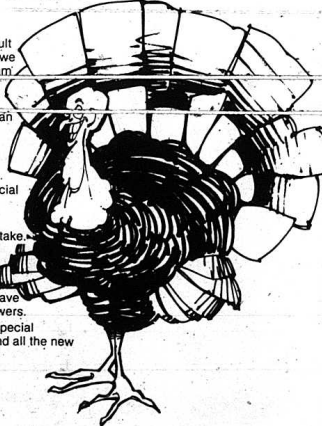

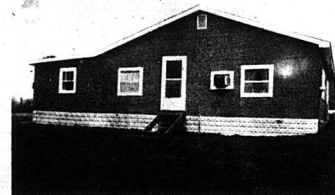

misses the contact with young people, but she says she also thoroughly enjoys her retirement.

Mrs. Landrum has for many years been an active and supporting member of the Mt. Vernon Woman's Club as well as a very positive force in other community endeavors such as church work at the Mt. Vernon Christian Church and in scouting.

Devoted not only to classroom teaching, Mr. Landrum, who had an understanding of children's needs and could explain in detail the complexities of algebra and math, also had a career as a successful basketball coach and served for several years as teaching principal.

In 1935, three years after he began teaching at Mt. Vernon High School, Mr. Landrum became basketball coach Jack Laswell, who later became coach, was on the first team, Mr. Landrum coached until he resigned in 1943 to serve in the Army during World War II.

His best team perhaps was the 1940-41 team which prompted this January 1941 article in the Courier Journal:

"Coach William Landrum's Mt. Vernon High School team is leading the field of 26 non-conference

basketball teams in 8 counties of this section with a record of 16 victories and no losses.

Mt. Vernon's closest call was a foul point win over Brodhead. Mt. Vernon has since lost the services of 6'4" center, William Noe.

"William Noe, in the language of Coach Landrum, made the Mt. Vernon team a 'powerhouse,' but has recently developed a rheumatic condition and will be unable to see service the rest of the season.

"Robert Harmon, the team's captain, has been shifted to center, and the team has been able to hold up the perfect record in the past 4 games, defeating Berea, East Bernstadt, McKee and Rose-Hill (Mercer Co.).

"Every first string man has been high point man at least one game."

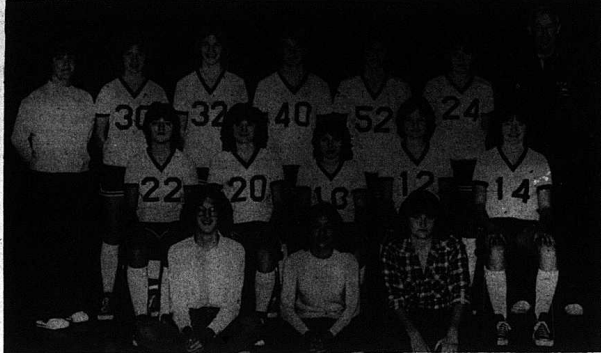
Mr. Landrum continued to coach until 1943 when he resigned to serve in the Army during World War II. He returned to Mt. Vernon in 1945 and wed Miss Dorothy Haff to whom he had become engaged before leaving to serve in the Signal Corp in the China-Burma-India theatre of the War.

In 1946, he became teaching principal in the still independent school district. Later, when Mt. Vernon High School became part of Rockcastle County Schools, Mr. Landrum served as assistant principal but still taught a class or two.

Mr. Landrum retired in 1972, after 41 years of service to children. He modestly comments that it was the fact that there were always good elementary school teachers who prepared the high schoolers well and thus made successful of their teaching attempts. He thinks that teaching may have been easier in the past because seemingly then there was always parental support.

Bill Landrum is living in the same house in which he was born in 1908. His parents, James and Martha McNeill Landrum moved to Rockcastle from Laurel County in 1897 when his father became railroad agent here. He attended Mt. Vernon Graded and High School which was on Richmond Street then. Following his graduation, he went to Maryville College in Maryville, Tennessee, a Presbyterian School. Later, he did graduate work at the University of Kentucky.

When the war began, Mr. Landrum took telegraph training and enlisted in the Army. In the spring of 1943, he entered active service and received nine months of telegraph installation and maintenance training in Missouri before being sent to Ceylon near the equator to work with the British under Admiral Mountbatten's Southeast Asia Command.

Hello from Clear Creek!
I traveled down what I had called Lower Clear Creek Road, but is really named Wildie Road. Sat. Hope the good people down that way overlook my mistake, and they must have, for everyone made me welcome until I said I could stay a week with all the kind treatment which greeted me. Some changed the subject quickly.

The first door I knocked on was Cecil and Vivian Bowman Abney's which was where I thought my range of news could start. Cecil is a cousin of mine and I am indebted to him for pictures, as well as historical facts about people, for this column. He admitted to 54 years of age and Vivian (who didn't look 10) said she was 45. They have six children. About one year ago, they bought a small section of land just across the road from the old Bullens home. They are building on the bank of Clear Creek, high up, and even have a swimming pool of the big hole of water in Clear Creek, Cecil said. As long as he doesn't go in his "birthday suit", I'd hate to see the mess of traffic it does, I thought since the house and high bank are near the road.

He is in construction work and doing all the building of the home himself. It is such a cute, sturdy, little house and Cecil uses good lumber from a 100 year old house to do the work along with some new material, of course. They apologize for the unfinished state of the place inside (as women do) as well as outside; but we all agreed, "people must crawl before they walk" in order to have something in the future. Elijah Abney, his grandfather, who lived in this house here, a long time ago, that we now call home, left Cecil a pipe measuring 11 inches in length. Elijah is long gone from Clear Creek, but you who remember his tall, stooped figure, know

that he was never without a pipe in his mouth. I was amazed at the size of the pipe Cecil said Elijah used. Vivian, a very pretty, blackeyed brunette woman, works at the Berea Hospital so she is one of the early morning drivers out of Clear Creek. Cecil resembles his grandpa, Elijah, very much. He has helped us a lot in doing repairs here. One day Armon Neely came by and he and Cecil were discussing the height of stick beans they had grown this summer past. Armond said, "We measured the cornstalk that some of ours grew up on and they were 11 1/2 feet high." Cecil challenged him by saying, "Well, I didn't have any corn that tall, so I just put some seed around an apple tree there and it filled the tree plum full." Now that was too tall a tale I said to them but Cecil declared, "You can ask Bill Bullen. He came by and saw the tree full of stick beans!" I was stopped in my quest for the truth for I know Bill Bullen to be a God fearing man who would lie for no one, and we let the tale telling stop there. Vivian is helping me have space in the Signal by paying \$6.75 for a year's subscription. I like that woman!

Coming on back up Clear Creek, we stopped at Bro. Herbert and Alta Todd Berry's home which was built on the site of his grandfather, James Berry's old homestead. The scene was the same as I had seen since childhood but a new home stood there seemingly in two sections. Bro. Herbert said he had built one side for his aged mother, Harriet, to live in that they might be near to care for her, yet she should still have her own home. That seemed so thoughtful of Bro. Herbert, age 60, and his 40 year marriage partner, Alta, who is 56. He really goes by the commandment that said, "Honor thy father and mother". Harriet could enjoy her grandchildren, or which there were 4ive, and still "go home" if any of them got too noisy or playful. This seemed the greatest plan for people who grow old as we all are sure to do. Bro. Herbert had

been chosen by God, to take his messages to the people, 24 years ago. He is the pastor of Morrill Church near Big Hill now and has most always pastored in the Rockcastle area. Alta has made him a good wife, and has been a good mother. Years ago she would come to church with the neatest, cleanest, group of little children and they all looked as if they had been scrubbed to within an inch of their life. I would watch them at church and now I know, they were scrubbed "with love!"

I next stopped at Sara Gadd's home where she lives alone after caring for her mother, Aunt Laura Gadd, until her death, at about age 84, a few years ago. Sarah is a relative because she too is a descendant of the Abney family from her grandmother. I didn't get her name but Sarah's grandmother was a sister to Reuben, Taylor and Squire Abney and Ollie Sexton. Just behind Sarah's neat, well-kept, home sets the home of her brother, John H.
