MVFD to Cease County Runs Unless Court Agrees to Help

Mt. Vernon Fire Department volunteer, Robert "Bud" Cox, met with the Fiscal Court Tuesday to request financial assistance from the county toward the purchase of county fire fighting equipment.

In a prepared memo, the court was apprised of the fact that since 1980, when the city purchased a new fire truck, the Mt. Vernon Fire Dept. has been answering calls to areas outside the city limits with the old pumper. Since that time, the MVFD has answered a total of 55 calls within the city and has made a total of 100 runs outside the city.

The memo further stated that the storage tank and plumbing of the pumper no longer makes fire fighting with the unit safe for the firemen, nor response time or service worthwhile.

While the fire department says in the memo that it is perfectly willing to donate time and a labor to the volunteer effort, it will have to terminate county fire protection service as of December 31, 1981, unless a new fire pumper is purchased.

The City of Mt. Vernon has been defraying the cost of the county runs and without some operational funds from the county, cannot extend coverage beyond this point, according to Cox.

The court agreed to leave the matter for the new judge and fiscal court to deal with in January, 1982.

Glenna Baker appeared before the court to request the county except an extension of a road previously deeded to the county known as the Green Vista Drive in Green Vista Subdivision. The court voted to accept the extension which is about 375-400 feet.

In other business, John B. McGuire was hired, effective December 1, as a laborer on the Green Thumb Program; subject to the duration of the program. He is to be paid \$3.35 per hour not to exceed 24 hours per week.

Mention was made that six of the seven officials attending the December meeting would not be back in their official capacity next January when court reconvenes.

After 20 years as magistrate, Sherman Sargent is retiring from his position on the court.

Replacing Sargeant and other members, Amos Burdette, Tom Cramer and Frank DeBorde as magistrates will be Donald Rowe, Tom Denney, "Alex" Albright and W.H. Wren. Joe Clark remains.

Recently elected County Judge/Executive, Bob Jagger will be replacing Judge Thacker and County Attorney-elect James H. Lambert will replace his father, James W. Lambert, who spent 22 years in the position as legal counsel to the court.

Hensley Indicted, Free on Bond

Fred Hensley, Livingston, was indicted November 18 on two charges of 2nd degree assault, stemming from an October 21 incident in which Hensley, a Livingston city policeman allegedly hit, Bernice and Lee Hammonds of Livingston with a night stick. Arraignment has been set for January 13. Hensley is free on \$5,000 bond.

Stolen Van Recovered from Youths

A resident living on Old US 25 south in Mt. Vernon got suspicious of a blue van which had been parked nearby for several hours, Wednesday, November 18 and reported it to the police for investigation.

When city policeman, Charles Hard and state policeman Jimmie Silvers, arrived they found what proved to be a stolen van occupied by 3 juveniles and three other youths, all of Cuban ancestry. The van, reportedly, was stolen in North Carolina, but had Dade County, Florida license plates when found. Also found in the van were tools, a gun, clothes and luggage.

The five boys were lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail. The girl, 15, was taken to the Family Life Center. She was apparently the only one of the proceeds from a farm in England and the only one who had been born in the United States.

According to the Circuit Court Clerk's office and the Judge's office, Jess Sarez, 18, Alberto Jelsol, 18, and Juah Beitran, 21, and the three juveniles were charged with theft by unlawful taking.

They were released Friday night into the custody of parents who live in Florida. The youths were ordered by Judge Wicker to appear back in court December 16th.

ASCS Committee Election

Ballots are being received in the Rockcastle County ASCS office in the courthouse for election of the 3 member county committee whose main function is to meet once a month and make decisions concerning various phases of the ASCS programs in the county.

The election will fill two positions on the committee as well as 2 alternate positions. The five nominated as candidates include: David Ballinger, Orlando; Clinton Brown, Ottawa; Benton Bullock, Wab; Gloria Robbins, Blue Springs and James Moore, Brohead.

Presently there are no alternates since both alternates, Gloria Robbins and Clinton Brown moved up to serve on the committee after two members, "Doc" Brown and "Alex" Albright, resigned to seek county office in the primary last May. Committee members serve 3 year terms.

The Committee's responsibility is to represent the farmers of the county in administering the federal farm programs locally. In Rockcastle County, the principal farm programs are burley tobacco, wheat, feed grain, the Agriculture Conservation Program and Commodity Credit Coop. Besides dealing locally with farm programs, the Committee may be called to meet with the state committee if necessary.

According to Harold Ballinger, spokesman for the office, the ballots must be postmarked no later than December 7. The election will be done on December 10 in the ASCS office. The tabulation is open to the public. Ballinger says anyone who shares in the administration of a farm is eligible to vote in the elections. Anyone who is eligible but did not receive a ballot may call the ASCS office at 286-2828 or stop by and pick up a ballot.

Vernon Plastics is expected to total approximately one million dollars and will double the size of the plant. Mt. Vernon Plastics, which manufactures plastic lids, has 30 employees.

Board to Solicit New Coal Bids; School Bus Accident Approves Purchase of Buses

The Rockcastle County School Board met Tuesday night in regular monthly session, and voted to reject previous coal bids and re-advertise for new bids. School superintendent Charles Parsons explained to the board that the coal from the company whose bid the board had accepted initially had turned out to be of unsatisfactory quality and that the East Bernstadt Company has since gone out of business.

Another East Bernstadt company had the second lowest bid, however, the coal from coal from this dealer was too low in BTU to sufficiently heat the buildings in cold weather.

The board authorized Parsons to purchase coal at the best price until January when bids are again opened and awarded.

The board approved the purchase of a new 65 passenger buses at \$21,474 each and one 23 passenger handicapped van at \$16,896.57, providing capital outlay money can be used to purchase two of the 65 passenger buses. If the state does not purchase the plan, two buses will not be purchased.

William Taylor's resignation as bus driver was accepted, effective December

31, 1981. Miller was transferred to Taylor's route. Dennis Marler was employed to drive R.B. Miller's, Blue Springs route, subject to qualifying.

Donald Gentry, John Hamm, Gary Scott, Homer Jones and Gene Evans were employed as substitute bus drivers subject to qualifying.

Also approved was the use of school buses for the annual Jaycee Rentro Christmas Party.

Dates to circle on your calendar for the 1982 blood drives are: Tuesday, March 9; Tuesday, July 20; and Tuesday, November 9. Remember that every time you donate in a year, you stockpile another year on your family coverage while the donation still gets credited toward the county goal. This means that if you donate three times a year, you

will have family coverage for 3 years and the county goal is reduced by 3 pints. Also, if you would like to donate for another family or friend, they would be granted coverage for one year for each pint donated.

Dear Editor:
 In this Thanksgiving sea-

son, our country has a great deal to be thankful for, especially our precious natural resources.

Today we can feed ourselves far better than any other nation in the world. In fact, nations are looking to us to stave off possible famine in the future as the world population jumps to 7 billion people.

Over the past 50 years, technological improvements have caused agricultural productivity to grow at an average rate of 1.6 percent per year. During the next two decades this figure is expected to drop to around 3 to 1 percent annually.

Meanwhile, one-third of our cropland is eroding faster than the soil can naturally rebuild itself. The two-technology and soil erosion-present us some real challenges as we face the future. How can our agriculture keep pace with the world demands without degrading our soil and water resources?

The time is at hand when we need to spend more money for research but not at the expense of our existing soil and water conservation programs. They both are important if the United States is to continue as the agriculture leader of the world.

The Secretary of Agriculture has proposed a new direction for USDA's conservation thrust to address these issues. The program called for under the Resources Conservation Act of 1977, is now out for public review and comments. Everyone's comments are needed. What is at stake, not only the ability to feed ourselves but others in the world who are less fortunate than us.

The Rockcastle County Conservation District Board of supervisors are interested in what you have to say. We welcome any comments which you might have to help us shape the conservation program of the '80's and beyond which we really need, to assure us that our Thanksgiving gifts are really blessed.

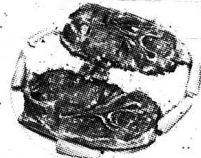

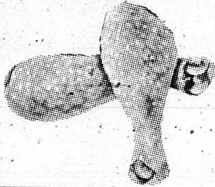

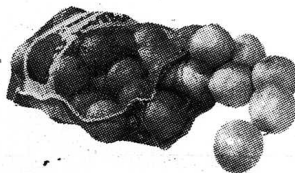

The Social Security Administration has announced a new "get-tough" policy on overpayments. People who do not make repayment promptly or show cause why they shouldn't, may find their debt referred to the General Accounting Office for civil suit. Social Security can excuse an overpayment only if the overpaid person was without fault and if it would cause hardship to make the repayment, according to the agency bulletin. 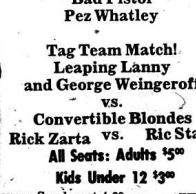
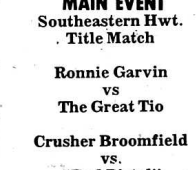

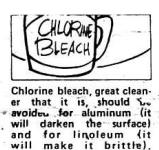

Obedience of Faith

The phrase, "Obedience of faith," occurs several times in the New Testament. The person who is concerned about his spiritual welfare will exert himself to learn what obedience of faith is. What is involved? Obedience of faith is not passive, but involves obedience to God's commands. Jesus taught that faith itself is a "work of God" (John 6:29).

The effectiveness of the preaching of the gospel in Jerusalem is seen in the statement, "The number of the disciples multiplied in Jerusalem exceedingly; and a great company of the priests were obedient to the faith" (Acts 6:7). The language demands that we recognize that there is something in the faith to be obeyed.

To what were the priests obedient when they were obedient to the faith? The word "Gospel" (Gosol-111), is used interchangeably with the word "faith" (Gal. 1:23). Paul said that he preached the GOSPEL but that which he preached is also described as THE FAITH. To preach the gospel is to preach the faith-hence, to obey the faith is to obey the gospel. All who obey not the gospel will be "destroyed from the presence of the Lord and the glory of His power" (2 Thess. 1:7-9).

Those at Rome who were "justified by faith" (Rom. 5:1), had been "servants of sin" before they became obedient from the heart to that form of

teaching whereunto ye (they) were delivered" (Rom. 6:17). Following their obedience from the heart they were "free from sin" and "servants of righteousness." Paul discusses the obedience from the heart in the first part of chapter six.

He wrote, "we who died to sin, how shall we live any longer therein? Or are ye ignorant that all who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into His death? We were buried therefore with Him through baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up through the glory of the Father, so we also might walk in newness of life" (Rom. 6:2-4). The order of obedience to faith is: (1) Servants of sin, (2) Baptized into Christ, (3) Free from sin and servants of righteousness. It is necessary for one to continue in obedience after he has been baptized into Christ. He must continue serving in obedience of faith.

Let no one conclude that one can be saved by faith alone, without obedience unto God's commands. Since a "great company of the priests were obedient to the faith" (Acts 6:7) in order to become Christians, we become children of God by doing less? No!

The place was always cluttered with many visiting nieces and nephews. I never did know where the other man got his nickname but he was always called Monkey John with affection by the community. He had a ready smile and if he happened to meet anyone, even to strangers, he always threw up his hand in greetings and would say, "Hello there, my friend!" Monkey John could play a fiddle like no man you ever knew and by his own admission, out dance anyone, man or woman, in Rockcastle County. One time he told me of a woman who was dancing the buck and wing step, to the music of a fiddle and banjo, out in the street in front of the county courthouse crowd one Saturday many years ago. He said, "I just couldn't let her get away with that, thinking she was the best dancer in the county so I jumped out there and joined her. Well, I danced rings around that old gal and she'd give up plumb over me while the crowd yelled,

Here men would gather on the banks of swiftly flowing Clear Creek, telling tall tales, swapping Barlow knives, mules or kids they'd caught his neighbor's eye.

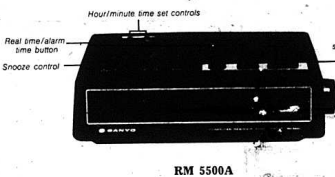

First Girl Scout Troop in Rockcastle County Organized by Helen Orth in 1928

(Note: The following article is a reprint from a previous edition of The Mt. Vernon Signal.)

The first Girl Scout Troop in Rockcastle County was organized about 1928 by Miss Helen Orth. Miss Orth came to Mt. Vernon from Washington, D.C. to work as a nurse at Landon School. She later became our first county health nurse.

According to former Girl Scouts who remember her with great affection, she was a devoted, capable leader who enjoyed working with girls. Some members of this first Girl Scout troop were: Julia Floyd Taylor, Annie Farris and her sister Elizabeth, Martha Griffith, Margaret Brown, Ruby Riddle, Jennie Marr Hansel and Marguerite McDaniels.

Miss Orth, with the help of her scouts, raised the money to build a camp at Beach Bottom on the Rockcastle River. There were two screened-in cabins and a covered eating area. The troop spent two weeks camping there in the summer. On the last night of camp, the girls always had a bonfire and a very impressive torch-light ceremony, at which time they received their badges and awards for the year.

About 1935 or 1936, Mrs. Dorothy Landrum reorganized the Girl Scouts and formed Troop #1. Starting as a troop of 4 patrols, they gradually grew to two troops of four patrols each, each patrol with its own adult leader. There were just two age groups at this time—intermediate scouts and Senior scouts. The girls earned badges and ranks, very much like the Boy Scout program.

During these ten years, Mrs. Landrum enlisted the help of a number of adult assistants to name just a few, Miss Katie Phillips, Mrs. Amanda Maggard, Mrs. Mollie Bryant, Mrs. Johnny Rowe,

Nina Cox and Mrs. Bernice Cox. One of these women, Miss Katie Phillips, later went into full-time Girl Scout work.

One of the highlights for a group of scouts during this time was a trip to Mammoth Cave. About 26 girls and leaders traveled on a school bus, stopping in Bardstowen to visit My Old Kentucky Home. They slept in bedrolls on the ground, with tents for dressing rooms and to use in case of rain and cooked all their meals outdoors for two days and nights at Cave Park. They had earned the money for this trip by putting on plays and selling homemade items. After their return, they made a special Troop log to record this event in words and pictures.

During this same 10-year period, a number of scouts traveled by train to a Girl Scout camp called Camp O'Umbreland at Harlan.

The next period of Scouting in Rockcastle County might be called the "On-Again, Off-Again" period. During these ten years, several attempts were made to organize Girl Scout troops in our county. Most successful at this time was Mrs. Joyce Henderson, assisted at various times by Mrs. Alene Davis, Miss Barbara Davis, Mrs. Joyce Baker and Mrs. Leneva Sowder.

Under their leadership, the scouts made an overnight trip to Mammoth Cave and it was also during this time that the swimming instruction classes were started.

The Scouts got permission to use a school bus to transport children to the Berea swimming pool for these lessons. The project was later continued by the Meridian Women's Club and the classes were moved to the Somerset pool.

Around 1965, the Girl Scout story in Rockcastle began another chapter. For the first time, troops were registered with the Wilderness

Road Girl Scout Council in Lexington. The national Girl Scout program had been revived and we now had four age levels: Brownie, Junior, Cadette, and Senior. Troops at all age levels were also organized in Brodhead.

A lot of enthusiasm and a lot of work went into the formation of these new troops in Mt. Vernon and a lot of fun was had by all. Community service, badge work and most of all outdoor skills and camping, were favorites of this group.

They took part in council-side events in Lexington, Frankfort, Richmond-attended Girl Scout camps, raised money to buy tents and camping equipment for our own troops, worked with local Boy Scout troops on many occasions, especially a presentation of Dickens' "A Christmas Carol" at Renfro Valley Barn. We have also been hostesses for two council-sponsored events—a Brownie Fun Day at Saltpetre cave and a Junior Encampment at Judy Layne—and many other events, right on down to present day preparations for Day Camp and marching in the Dairy Day parade.

A long story and a long cast of characters, and always in the finest traditions of Girl Scouting began nearly 50 years ago in Rockcastle County.

Check License Receipt For Expiration Date

The Rockcastle County Clerk's office reminds everyone to check their license receipt to see when your decal is due. If it is due in January, you may purchase the decal in December. The decal can be purchased a month in advance of the expiration date.

It is important for people who plan to apply for Social Security benefits to do so 2 or 3 months before they want benefits to begin, or, at least as soon as possible after they become eligible, Bob Anderson, Social Security manager in Richmond, said recently.

This is because payments for months before the month the application is made are limited by law. The general rules are:

Workers, widows, widowers 65 and over, parents 62 and over—Back payments are limited to no more than 6 months, but none before the month the person becomes 65 for worker, widows, widowers.

Workers, widows and widowers under 65—in general, no payments can be made for months before the month of application.

Disabled workers, widows, and widowers—Back payments can be made for up to 12 months before the month of application, but not before the 6th full month of disability.

Anderson said that people applying for benefits, especially those applying for reduced benefits before 65 for workers and survivors—should apply as soon as possible when they become eligible so they will not miss out on any possible benefit checks.

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. We also conducted tests of compliance with state laws and regulations.

As recommended by the State Local Finance Officer, pursuant to KRS 68.210, the accompanying financial statements are prepared primarily on a cash basis. Consequently, certain revenues and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when a liability is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the receipts, disbursements and excess fees of the County Clerk, Sheriff and Jailor for the year ended December 31, 1980, in conformity with the accounting system described above, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Recommendations and areas of non-compliance are as follows:

1. We recommend the Sheriff comply with KRS 68.210. The State Local Finance Officer has resources available to help the county officials comply with this law.

2. The County Clerk and Sheriff were in violation of KRS 68.010 which requires the:

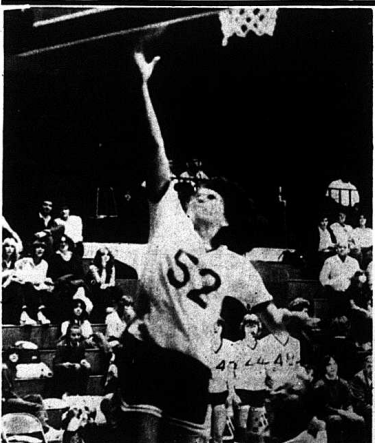

Boys Win 1; Lose 1 in S.E.K.C.

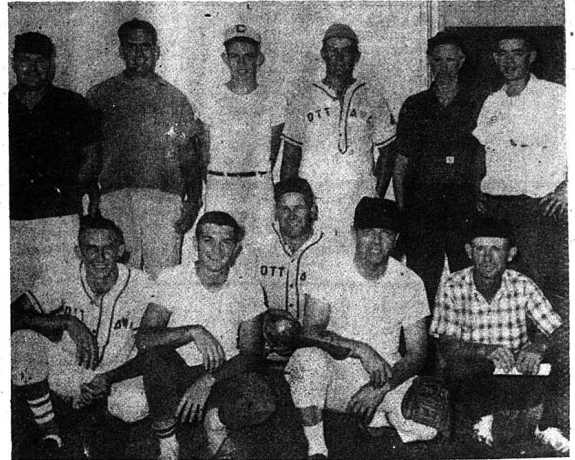

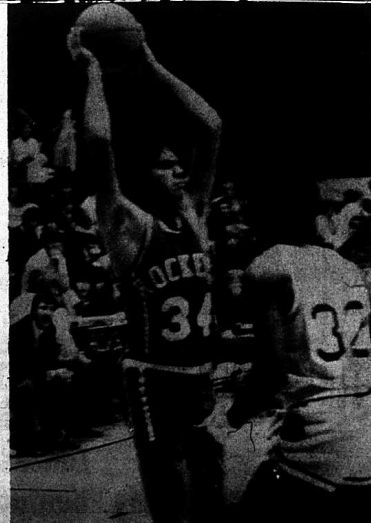
