men lived many years ago on men lived many years ago on Lower Clear Creek. They were Lower Clear Creek. They were characters, each in his own way. Uncle Rube was my grandfather. Taylor Abney's brother and lived to be 59 yeas old. He was alert and active and could read without glasses almost up until his death. In his earlier life, he farmed and ran a grist mill, powered by the waters of Clear Creek. On Saturdays, it was a chore, as the waters of Clear Creek. On Saturdays, it was a thore, as well as a treat, for the natives to shell a large sack full of corn, throw it across the back of a mule, or into a joit wagon (and I mean joit when it bounced over the road or crossing a creek) which was taken to Uncle Rube's grist mill. Here men would gather on the banks of swiftly flowing Clear Creek, tellingtall tales, swapping Barlow knives, mules or whatever caught his neighbor's ege.

Many business deals were made there and seeled by a firm handclasp which was better than some deals made er, a paper today. Even a candidate running for a jubile office in the county learned to make it to Rube Abney's grist mill on Saturday to seek. 

The first Girl Scout Troop in Rockcastle County was organized about 1928 by Miss Helen Orth. Miss Orth came to Mt. Vernon from Washington, D.C. to work as a nurse at Langdon School. She later became our first county health

accame our tirst county health nurse.

According to former Girl Scouts who remember her with great affection, she was a devoted, capable leader who enjoyed working with girls.

Some members of this first Girl Scout troop were.

full-time Girl Scout work.

One of the highlights for a group of scouts during this period was a trip to Mammoth Cave. About 26 girls and leaders traveled on a school bus, stopping in Bardstown to wisit My Old Kentucky Home. They slept in bedroils on the ground, with tents for dressing rooms and to use in case of rain and cooked all their meals outdoors for two days and nights at Cave Park. They had earned the money for his trip by putting on plays and selling homemade items. After their return, they made a special Troop log to record this event in words and pictures. During this same 10-year period, a number of scouts traveled by train to a Girl Scout-camp called Camp O'Cumberland at Harlan.
