Brodhead Receives \$30,000 Grant; Holds Meeting to Plan for Project

The city of Brodhead has been granted \$30,000 to help finance construction of a sewer line to the city's industrial site.

Local funds will complete financing of the \$51,678 project, said Sally Hamilton, acting commissioner of the Department of Community and Regional Development Fund, which finances improvements involving fire protection, emergency services, industrial development and water, sewer and sanitation facilities.

The Brodhead Town Board met Wednesday night December 16, with James Cash, head of Tri County Community Development Agency, a private agency that helps local governments apply for and administer grants, and representatives of Cumberland Valley Development District to discuss plans for and begin development of the sewer project.

Accident Involves Stalled Truck

A stalled tractor trailer rig which was unable to pull completely clear of traffic on I-75 was apparently the cause of an accident Monday night, December 7 about 10 p.m.

According to Guy Blevins of the Kentucky State Police, both subjects in the accident, Everett Bullock, 36, of Brodhead, and Howard Walker, 44, of Raleigh, North Carolina, were traveling north about 7 1/2 miles south of Vernon. Walker's rig stalled with part of the truck still in the lane of traffic. Bullock, who was traveling behind, was unable to change lanes because of traffic and struck the left rear of the truck with the right side of his vehicle.

Bullock sustained third class injuries and did not require immediate medical attention.

Student in Europe Learns About Architecture and... "Much More"

Scenes of small boys sleeping huddled on news-stands in Cairo, Yugoslavian women smuggling coffee and other contraband across the border into their communist country and the sight of sand bunkers and the prevalence of police armed with machine guns in most of the countries he visited and the airports he passed through this summer are a few of the reasons Garlan VanHook, a fifth year architecture student at the University of Kentucky, has come to a fuller realization of what it means to live in America.

Garlan, son of Gene and Jeletta (Meece) VanHook of Brindle Ridge, spent 9 weeks this past summer as part of a U.K. study-tour group in Europe. Garlan, feeling that he might not get another similar opportunity to travel, yet not wanting to put an added financial burden on his family, borrowed the \$3,500 to make the trip.

The tour featured 2 weeks of study in Rome, two weeks in Austria and southern Germany and two weeks in Paris. Sandwiched between these study periods were 3 free weeks, which the 23 students could travel anywhere.

According to Garlan, his experiences abroad served to make him more aware of what we have as a nation and how apathetic we are about it. By his own admission, the trip

The industrial site to which the news release refers is commonly called the "Profit Property," according to Ronnie Cash, board member.

The 20 acre tract of land formerly belonging to A.A. Proffitt was purchased by the city some 8 or 10 years ago to be used as a possible industrial site. However, the sewer project will be partially completed with the \$30,000 grant and, according to Cash, the property, which lies close to the backside of the Fairgrounds, may be divided into residential lots. The city could then finish the \$51,678 project as the area

developed.

The property hopefully could be made more accessible by building a "loop" around the fairgrounds beginning near the present site of the Senior Citizens building, near the front of the grounds, according to Cash.

Cash will begin a four year term as Mayor of Brodhead in January.

Brodhead is in the Cumberland Valley Area Development District. CVADD has been allocated \$2.1 million since the Area Development Fund began in 1976. This includes \$367,000 allocated for the 1980-82 biennium.

New Superintendent Named for Continental Telephone

Dean Sturgill has been named service superintendent for a telephone service area that includes Mt. Vernon and seven other exchanges in Pulaski and Rockcastle counties.

This is a key appointment among several made as part of the reorganization of Continental Telephone Company of Kentucky. The appointments were announced today by L.W. (Sonny) Darden, Jr., who himself recently was appointed President of the Kentucky Company by Harold Marshall, manager of the Allegheny Division for Continental Telephone Corporation.

In a major realignment of Continental's divisions, the Allegheny Division is absorbing responsibility for telephone operations in Kentucky, effective January 1, 1982.

Darden, who comes to Kentucky from his position as customer service manager for the Mid-South Division in Knoxville, Tenn., said the realignment is de-

signed to "provide more individualized and responsive telephone service for its customers."

Operations are being decentralized from a divisional to a state-run structure, and "under the new plan we are increasing our staff in Kentucky, enabling it to operate on a more autonomous arrangement."

"This move is due to the competitive, deregulated nature of the telephone industry," said Darden.

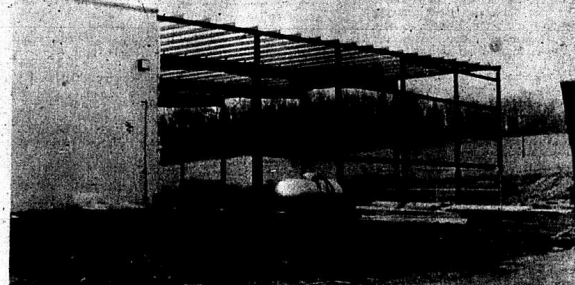
"There has been a dramatic change in the way the telephone business operates. Competition is part of our industry now and the government is steadily loosening its regulatory controls."

Construction began three weeks ago on an expansion at Mt. Vernon Plastics, a local manufacturing company which produces plastic lids. According to a spokesman for the company, the million dollar expansion

project is scheduled for completion sometime in January or early February and may allow the plant to double the present number of 30 employees. Mt. Vernon Plastics is now taking applications.

DeBorde Rehired as Policeman; Community Field House Discussed

The resignation of Mt. Vernon City Police Chief Jim Durham was accepted by the city council at their regular monthly meeting Monday night.

Durham, who resignations will be effective December 31, told the council that he and his wife would be moving to another part of the state due to a job change by Mrs. Durham.

With Durham's resignation, a job opening existed on the police force which the council filled by hiring former city policeman Frank DeBorde on a part-time basis.

DeBorde, an unsuccessful candidate for County Judge/Executive in the November General Election, was hired for 32 hours per week. Policeman Dickie Collingsworth was placed on a full-time basis.

The council split on hiring DeBorde with Councilman Ernie Tolle casting a no vote and councilman Tom Welch abstaining. The other four councilmen all voted yes.

In other business, Mayor Roland Mullins discussed with the council a proposal for building a community field house on Main Street to serve as a skating rink, theatre and conference facility.

The building will be located on city property and on property presently owned by Sam Ford.

In his proposal, the mayor showed possible funding for the project to come from the following sources: City of Mt. Vernon, \$20,000 (labor, materials, etc.); recreation funds, \$30,000; area development funds, \$30,000 and Kv

Highland Investments monies, \$50,000 for a total of \$130,000.

Expenses for the project shown in Mr. Mullins' proposal consists of building, \$80,000; lot, \$45,000; engineering, insurance, etc., \$2,000.

The council approved a lease with the Rockcastle County Coon Club for one year for the "milk house" at the Renfro Valley Boat Dock. The club will pay

the city \$350 per year under terms of the lease.

The council also decided to extend the dead line for the city fire truck to quit making out-of-town runs until January in order to give the new Fiscal Court a chance to provide some help on maintenance and operation of the truck. Councilman Tom Welch was asked to talk to members of the court beforehand.

Postal Clerk - Carrier Position Soon Available at Area Offices

New positions for a U.S. Postal Clerk-Carrier for the Berea, Brodhead, Mt. Vernon, McKee and Crab Orchard Post Offices will be available within the near future, according to Mt. Vernon Postmaster James O. Smith.

Application forms may be picked up anytime at any of the above-named post offices.

Auto Allegedly Stolen in Florida

A 1967 Chevrolet allegedly stolen in Tampa, Florida was recovered at the Renfro Exxon Monday night when the four occupants of the car, Terrance Grube, 21, John C. Adolph, 24, Tracey M. Penny, 18, and Patrick D. Burke, 19, attempted to

leave the service station without paying \$25.00 for gas.

The four were arrested about 11:30 Monday night and lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail. They have been charged with receiving stolen property over \$100 and theft of services in connection with the gasoline theft.

According to Mt. Vernon city police, Jim Durham, the arresting officer, other stolen property was also found in the car.

The four who, according to officials, are transients, will be held here until extradition back to Florida.

Break-in

Legislative Report

The legislature's Citizens Speak Out program

concluded its third year in September after reaching some 1,500 Kentuckians in 15 cities across the Commonwealth.

About 30 Speak Out programs are being planned for the 1982 interim.

The program began in 1979 with 12 meetings from June through October to allow citizens the opportunity to express their concerns to their legislators. In 1980 another 12 programs were conducted across the state and the positive response led to an expansion of the program in 1981.

Surveys taken by the Legislative Research Commission have indicated that 98 percent of those attending felt the meetings were informative and useful. Public response to the program was positive, with 99 percent of those surveyed indicating they felt the program should be continued.

Registration cards returned at each meeting indicated that two-thirds of those attending were private citizens expressing their personal concerns and not representing any special interest groups.

As a result of the meetings, over 300 items of citizen concern were referred to the Legislative Research Commission for their consideration.

The 1981 Speak Out programs were conducted in Henderson, Louisville, Frankfort, Lexington, Northern Kentucky, Maysville, Morehead, Ashland, Hazard, Harlan, London, Danville, Bowling Green and Hopkinsville.

Three sessions were held in Louisville, bringing

the total of meetings held to 17.

The legislature has always been the branch of government closest to the people.

The Citizens Speak Out Program has served to strengthen and enhance this closeness.

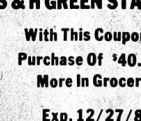

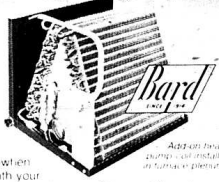

ing down the street one night and stopped to admire an ornately carved wooden and brass door. Suddenly police began running toward them with machine guns, backed them up against the wall and only after much gesturing and jabbering on the part of both police and students, the police were finally convinced that they were tourists, not terrorists and told them to "shoo-shoo."

Garlan said he was able to keep his composure, but as soon as they turned the corner away from the scene, his knees gave way and he sat down on the side of the street. In talking with members of the Associated Press the following day, they learned that the government had been in the process of changing hands and there had apparently been a meeting going on behind the ornate doors.

"Here," they were told "police shoot first and ask questions later. You were lucky."

Another time, while riding a train across Yugoslavia enroute to Cairo, Garlan was ordered off the train, and had to go to the police station. He had no idea why or what to expect. Following inspection of his passport, he was released. He said as they passed through this communist country, it was hard to miss the Soviet tanks stockpiled around the train yards. They were approached by Yugoslavians on the train who wanted them to smuggle items into their baggage for them. On the train they observed a woman who sat while her aged mother stood in the aisle. As it turned out, the seated woman had huge quantities of smuggled items under her clothes and needed to sit to conceal them.

One thing that impressed Garlan and the students was the sense of community identity and togetherness in some countries and the absence of the obsession to make money to the exclusion of everything else. He thinks we as Americans could

take a lesson from the French and Italians who seem always to be having a good time. Shops and business are closed from 2 p.m. until about 4 or 5 p.m. each day while owners eat and take a "siesta." He and his friends once tried to buy gasoline (priced at \$4.25 per gallon) but because it was 2:02 attendants waved them away and refused the sale.

Poverty is much in evidence in the countries Garlan visited especially Egypt and this is sad, but he thinks that in some ways these countries' lack of an abundance has created a more practical approach to housing and conservation of natural resources. He sees a time in the near future when our natural resources become depleted, but we may be taking a closer look at some of the European methods of economizing. One of the questions raised by the trip, however, was why Americans are denied access to a 4 cylinder van made by the Ford Motor Company? The students rented such a van to tour the Italian countryside.

One of Garlan's prime career goals is to make architectural services available and practical from a conservation and community planning point of view. He believes that in the future almost everyone planning a

house will have to consider the advantages of solar heat and that with the demand for more housing, more thought and planning will have to be given to meeting these needs.

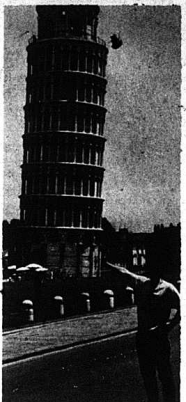

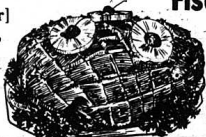

There they may be wrapped up bright and pretty under your Christmas tree, toys that just don't care. Some 700,000 youngsters are "attacked" by these toys every year, encounters that can cause diffidence, disability and sometimes death.

For years, Kentucky's Citizens Commission on Consumer Protection has alerted shoppers about several toys it considered hazardous. Since then, 141 playthings have been removed from the market. In spite of this action, there are still many dangerous toys about. The only effective way to stop the production and sale of hazardous toys is through pressure from consumers.

Consumer complaints and federal regulations, in the meantime, are teachers, babysitters and older siblings must take the responsibility for protecting children from some toys and supervising their

And so, while visions of both sugar plums and terrible toys dance in your head, take a close look at your child's Christmas loot. For playthings that can be friends, instead of mortal enemies, look for:

Electrical toys with the Underwriters Seal of safety.

Toys suited to your child's age and abilities. (Projectile toys like sling shots, dart guns, arrows and faulty rubber-tipped missiles can be extremely dangerous in small hands.)

Toys that are built to withstand investigation by curious kids.

Toys with easily understood instruction.

Wheels attached to pull toys, trauks, etc. with screws, not nails.

Pull cords attached with staples, not thumbtacks.

Metal edges that are rolled or turned in.

Wooden toys with smoothly sanded finishes.

Toys made of flexible, instead of rigid, plastics. Rigid plastics produce a very sharp edge when broken.

Cloth or painted faces on stuffed animals (better than buttons fastened with a pin or hook.)

Washable and non-breakable toys for infants.

Toys not so small or fragile that they, or any part, can be swallowed

(whistles, horns, rattles, balloons, bubble blowers, etc.)

Labels that say paint is non-toxic and fabric is inflammable.

Riding toys with wide-spread wheels and a low center of gravity to prevent tipping over.

Sturdily-made toys that won't come apart, break or splinter.

Firewood Insects Annoying But Not Harmful

As the winter winds begin to blow, many homeowners are stoking up their fireplaces and wood stoves, often with logs they themselves cut. But when a homeowner goes out to cut that first cord of firewood, he may find he is disturbing many little beasts that make their home in the wood and bringing them back to live in the woodpile, and eventually to get into the house. Firewood insects can be plentiful at times, but most cause no real threat to homes or to people other than being a nuisance. One of the best signs that firewood contains insects is sawdust under the woodpile. Homeowners so should be on the look-out for a large number of bugs in the house that were not present before wood-burning season. Wood-boring beetles can be plentiful in wood and can become a big nuisance to homeowners. They are up to 1/2 inch long with bright colored bodies of red, yellow and black. The beetles found in firewood are not the type of insect that will infest the lumber used to construct a home. They are just an inconvenience to the homeowner. Another brightly-colored in-

sect that can be a nuisance to homeowners is the wood wasp. The larvae and adults often are found in festing old elm trees in Kentucky. For people who cut their own wood, these wasps can seem like a real threat. Wood wasps look like ordinary wasps, but they are unable to sting humans.

After families start hauling loads of wood inside, they may notice a large number of wood roaches in the house. Most of the roaches found in firewood are in the nymph stage, with flat, dark red or brown bodies just over half an inch long. Pennsylvania wood roaches are found mostly in dead, hollowed-out firewood or under loose bark. But even if they do get into the house, they cannot live long, because they are an outside-roach. Termites are a major worry of some homeowners, but they generally do not cause problems in the home when they are brought inside in firewood. It would take an entire termite colony to establish a nest in your home, and the possibility of transferring an entire colony in firewood is very slim. Carpenter ants are another colony insect that can excavate large portions of firewood or lumber, homeowners need not worry. When firewood is cut, the colony is broken up and the possibility of the colony re-establishing itself in the woodpile is very unlikely. Chances for any damage are slim. The best protection for homeowners is to store firewood away from the house to prevent the insects from coming into the house in the first place. It is suggested that firewood be stacked away from any buildings and not kept in the basement, and that wood be brought into the house in small amounts to keep the possibility of insects at a minimum. All wood should be removed from the house at the end of the winter. There is no need to spray either firewood or your home with insecticide as long as you store wood properly. If in-

sects are carried into your house in wood, it is best simply to use a vacuum sweeper to remove them.

The Soil Survey Manual includes maps showing the total areas of Rockcastle and Laurel counties. Every parcel of land is shown on the maps and has a complete soil description. The soil types present are coded by letter. The letters are easily cross-referenced by a key in the manual to give the soil name of the area studied.

The Soil Survey Manual gives a complete history of the soil and its geologic make up in the two counties. The manual contains important history and data about Rockcastle County and the surrounding area. The manual is loaded with facts about farming, geology, industrial resources and water resources, etc. The information is easily read and can be used by everyone.

The information contained in the Soil Survey Manual is useful to many individuals. Farmers and landowners can readily use the Soil Survey Manual to evaluate potential farmland or to choose fields to rotate pasture and crops. Builders and construction people can use the manual to choose building sites and to locate drainage and service ways. Government and community planners can use the manual to direct long range goals and to make

maximum use of our resources.

It is easily seen how useful this document can be to everyone. The Local Conservation District and the Soil Conservation Service can provide these soil survey manuals upon request. The Soil Survey Manual will be distributed to school libraries, government agencies and businesses in the near future. Any individual can request and receive the Soil Survey Manual by stopping by the Soil Conservation Office in the Courthouse. The Rockcastle Soil Conservation District and the Soil Conservation Service take pride in presenting the Soil Survey Manual to the public.

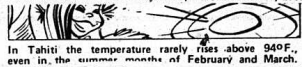

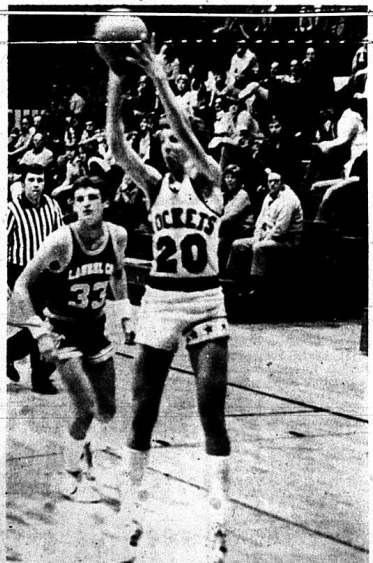

From that night on, the romance started and flourished. They married in 1938. Joe was 21 then and felt it was time to try his own fortune in the world. He persuaded Ruth they could live better in one of the northern cities of Ohio and there they went. It took Joe three years for the truth to come home. Clear Creek was his background in boyhood and as a young man. He could not adjust to the "Buckeye State." More and more, on each visit home, he felt this terrible gnawing at his being. Here on the hills, in the valleys, and among

some of Rockcastle's finest people, was where he needed to be. Big money was coming in, for Joe had a good job in Cincinnati.
