
Miss Holt Accepts Position



Firewood Insects Annoying But Not Harmful As the winter winds begin to blow, many homeowners are stoking up their fireplaces and wood stoves, often with logs they themselves cut. But when a homeowner goes out to cut that first cord of firewooding many little beasts that the cord of the control of the cont nuisance. sect that can be a nuisance to homeowners is the wood wasp. The larvae and adults often are found infesting old elm trees in Kentucky. For people who waspe can seem like a real threat. Wood wasps look like ordinary wasps, but they are unable to sting humans.

another colony insect that can excavate large portions of firewood or lumber, homeowners need not worry. When firewood is cut, the colony is broken up and the possibility of the colony re-stabilishing itself in the woodpile is very unikely. Chances for any damage are slim. The best protection for homeowners is to store firewood away from the house to prevent the insects from coming in the colony of the co

sects are carried into your house in wood, it is best simply to use a vacuum sweeper to remove them.




