AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY
Amending Provisions of Existing Ordinances As To Required Connections and Connection Charges

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky:

That Section 3 as amended, of Ordinance No. 297 is hereby amended so that as amended said section provides as follows:

SECTION 3. CONNECTION AND CONNECTION CHARGES.
New customers of the waterworks system located within the City limits of the City shall pay a waterworks connection charge of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for a three-fourth (3/4) inch meter. Non-resident customers shall pay one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) for a three-fourth (3/4) inch meter. Res.

ident and non-resident customers requiring larger meters shall pay the connection charges for three fourth (3/4) inch meters plus the costs to the City of the larger meter.

New customers of the sewer system shall pay a connection charge of one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

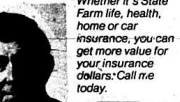



Lee Steel becomes Lee Industries as it moves to Rockcastle

Since August of this year, Lee Steel, Inc., of Baxter in Harlan County, has been in the process of moving its headquarters to Rockcastle County.

According to comptroller, Tony Skidmore, the company has, since that time, bought and already spent considerable money renovating the Cass Building (which formerly housed Rockcastle Steel) on U.S. 150 near Brodhead. By January 1, 1982, all corporation records for both the Harlan and the local operations will be located at the Brodhead site.

Lee Industries, Inc. as the plant will be known here manufactures and erects coal handling and preparation facilities including standardized and customized work.

The four main products manufactured by the company are: Lee modular preparation plants, which wash, clean and separate coal; conveyors to move coal; Lee stacking tubes for storing coal and Lee Weigh bins.

The company is not hiring at present and future additional employment will depend upon the economy and the demand for their product, Skidmore said.

One of the persons who moved to Rockcastle from Harlan is company president, LeRoy Hensley.

Two utilities request rate increases

Two utilities, Kentucky Power Company and Continental Telephone Company, asked the state Public Service Commission Tuesday for rate increase, that if granted will total nearly \$38 million.

A spokesman for Kentucky Power of Ashland, said his company was asking for \$34.99 million, which would add a 23 a day or \$9.90 a month to the typical residential customer's bill.

Continental said. The monthly bills of business customers with one-party service would go up about \$5 per month to \$28.40.

Ed Shelby, spokesman for the Public Service Commission, said both utilities asked permission to raise the increases into effect January 18. The commission suspended Continental's request for five months and is expected to take similar action on the Ky. Power request.

The suspension means that customers cannot be charged the new rate increases until 18 without further commission action. In the meantime, the commission will study the requests and hold public hearings before ruling on the amount to be given each utility.

Low-income energy assistance program cut 50%

Dr. Grady Stumbo, secretary of the Department for Human Resources, anticipates Kentucky will receive 50 percent of the funds authorized for the Low-Income Energy Assistance Program, due to Congress not appropriating the full benefit this year.

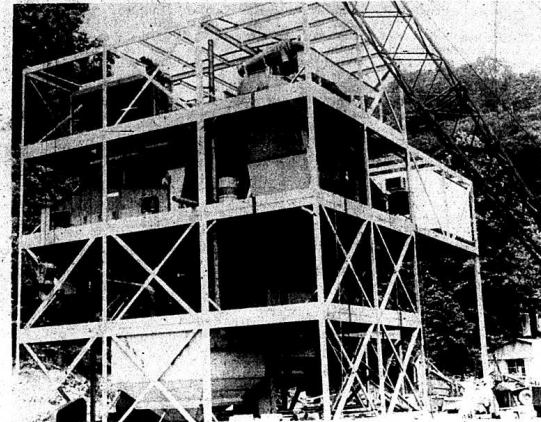
According to a news release received Monday, applications will be taken on a first-come basis and will begin January 4, 1982 for the elderly and disabled. These households will receive one-half of the benefit amount they would otherwise be eligible to receive or that they received last year. Should the federal government appropriate the remaining funds, these households would then be issued the remainder of the

benefit. Applications for households in crisis situations will be taken on January 18, 1982. Full benefit amounts will be given to these households because the full benefit will be necessary to alleviate the crisis.

The Bureau for Social Insurance will stop taking applications when all funds are spent.

Locally elderly and disabled persons may go to the Bureau for Social Insurance to make application January 4, 1982, and heads of households in crisis situations may make applications January 18, 1981.

Office hours for the local office will be 8-4:30, effective Monday, January 4, 1982.

Coleman resigns after 17 years on state police force

Rockcastle County has one less Kentucky State Policeman than they did a month ago.

Danny Coleman, who had worked Rockcastle County the entire 17 years he was in the state police, resigned from the force effective November 15, 1981.

"I just got fed up with the way everything was going," Coleman said in a telephone interview Monday. "You go out and arrest people for crimes, put your own neck on the line and nothing ever comes of it," he said.

Coleman took early retirement from the force which means he will get back all of the money from the retirement fund that he paid in. "I never got to see the kids with the horrendous hours I had to work," Coleman said. "I had to work a lot of holidays and put up with a lot of things that anyone that's not a state policeman wouldn't have to, I didn't feel like it was worth it," he said.

Coleman, who had been shot once in the line of duty in the edge of Laurel

County in 1972 while he was investigating a kidnapping, said that he didn't feel like the state police was going in the right direction. He said that he just didn't like the way they were handling things.

The resignation of Coleman leaves Rockcastle with only four State policemen, one under the normal amount for a county this size.

According to Stanley Hale of the London State Police Post, the situation will not get any better for Rockcastle anytime soon. "Troopers have to complete a 16 week academy and then they must be hired on the paper work done on them in order to get them set-up, say in Rockcastle for instance," Hale said. However, Hale said that the State Police had not held an academy for the last two years and it doesn't look like one will be held this year either.

"We've got a waiting list of men who would like to go through the academy, but if there isn't one to go through then it's kind of hard for these men to get into the ranks of

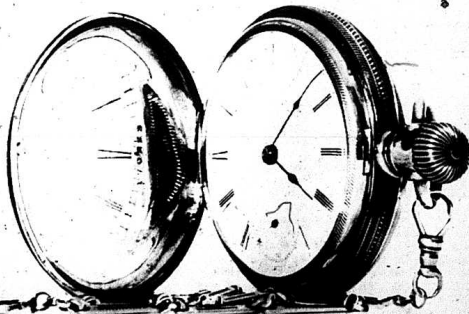

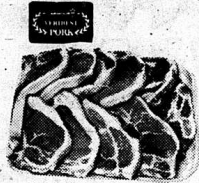

Care of Holiday Plants

Do you have a Christmas plant in your home this holiday season? Certain plants have become part of the holiday tradition. With proper care, these plants can provide extra weeks of beauty and enjoyment.

Poinsettias are the most popular and traditional of the Christmas plants. Red is the favorite color, but there are other varieties available, including white, pink and a combination of pink, white and yellow. Other popular Christmas plants include the azalea, Christmas cherry, Gloxinia and Christmas begonia.

The ideal temperature for the poinsettia is about 65 degrees. The plant should be kept out of drafts and away from doors opening to the outside. It should be kept in bright light and never allowed to wilt. If the surface of the soil in the pot starts to change color, put some water on. There are some modern varieties, such as Eckespot C-1, which you can have in the house in April with the flowers still on. Specialists don't

recommend trying to make the cooler places in the home, away from heat registers. There are too many problems in reflowering. That is a job for professionals.

The azalea needs a temperature of around 60 degrees. Therefore it should be placed in one of the cooler places in the home, away from heat registers. It also needs to be by a window. The azalea is very hard to reflower as a potted plant indoors. However, garden varieties are available which can be planted outdoors in the spring. Ask the producer or seller of the plant if it is a garden variety.

The Christmas cherry, also known as the Jerusalem cherry, is a plant most people find easy to keep. The ideal temperature for this plant is 50-60 degrees, and it should be kept in front of a bright window. This plant can be grown outdoors by taking a cutting, putting it in a glass of water to root, and then setting it outdoors. The new plant will produce cherries outdoors. It is a hardy plant which can withstand cold weather.

The Gloxinia is in the same family as the African violet. It has bell-type flowers in reds, blues, whites and pinks. It needs a temperature of about 70 degrees and should not get direct sunlight.

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Honor Thy Father and Mother

Jesus sternly rebuked the Pharisees for their hypocrisy in this regard. They gave of their wealth to the temple and stated that because the money belonged to God, they couldn't help their parents financially. But this was merely an excuse for not fulfilling their responsibility to their parents. (Matt. 15:1-20).

Christians often make the same mistake. They reason that since they are so busy in church work, or because they have so many responsibilities of their own. They can't spend time with an aged loved one who lives alone and who needs their presence and sometimes financial help to brighten the monot-

onous hours or to pay the bills. I'm afraid that such neglect on the part of responsible children is all too common. As a result, many elderly parents are desperately lonely because their children rarely visit them or help them.

The time to honor parents is while they are still with us. It is hypocritical when someone who ignored or rejected his parents while they were alive puts on a show of tenderness by placing a huge wreath on their casket. I like what a young man did at a funeral service when he graduated from college. After receiving his diploma, he left the line, walked over to his mother and placed it in her hand. As he kissed her wrinkled brow he said, "Mother, that's yours. You earned it. Thank you so much for all you have done for me."

Don't let your parents down; they brought you up. Honor your father and mother today.

That it may be well with thee, and thou mayest live long on the earth" (Eph. 6:3).

The arrests were made at approximately 4:30 Tuesday afternoon.

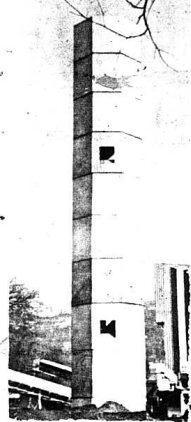
