'Tis the Season To Humidify!

With the onset of the winter heating season and dry indoor air, pesky problems of static electricity, wilting plants and creaking furniture joints return to plague us. Home humidifiers help prevent these annoying conditions by adding moisture to the air. Maintaining an adequate relative humidity level (about 30%) provides another bonus—the energy-conserving lower furnace settings (68 to 70 F or less) seem "warmer". Here are some questions often asked

about humidifiers. What Size Humidifier Should I Buy? Humidifier size is measured by the number of gallons of water evaporated into the surrounding air in

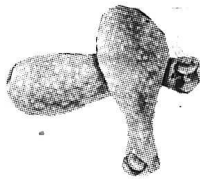

24 hours with the humidifier operating continuously. To select the right size humidifier for your needs, you must first determine the total square footage of your house and the amount of insulation and the number and condition of the storm windows and doors.

Will One Humidifier Adequately Humidify the Entire House?

It depends. If your house has an open floor

plan and the humidifier is the capacity needed, it probably will adequately humidify the entire house. If room layout does not allow air to circulate freely, you may need more than one humidifier. This is also true for two and three story houses.

Where Should the Humidifier Be Located?

Because water vapor is easily distributed, location is not as critical as long as the moist air can circulate freely. For convenience, locate the humidifier where it can be easily filled with water. Do not place it near cold outside walls or in high humidity areas such as the bathroom, kitchen or laundry area. If your house has a warm (forced) air heating system, consider placing the humidifier near the return air register to help moisture distribution.

How Can I Determine What Humidistat Setting to Use?

The humidity is right for you when the room feels comfortable. Signs of low humidity are static electricity, a physically uncomfortable dry feeling, plants that wither and die, and a cold feeling even though the room tempera-

ture is relatively high. Your humidistat is set too high if excessive moisture collects on windows and other cold surfaces. Excess humidity for a prolonged time can damage walls, especially when outdoor temperatures are very low.

Use a humidity indicator to measure the relative humidity in your house. The American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air Conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE) recommends these maximum indoor humidity levels:

Outdoor temperature, 30 degrees-indoor relative humidity, 35%; 10 degrees-30%; zero-25%; -10 degrees-20%; 20 degrees-15%

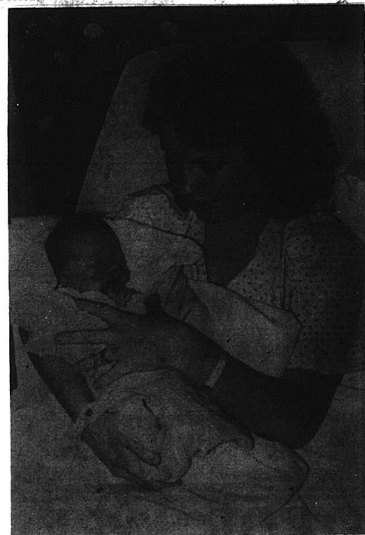

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Natives of India find U.S. "stressful"

Hasmukhbhai Patel and his wife, Shardabeh, who still own a motel in California, were looking for a new business venture in another state, when they bought a motel in Berea and later (in October, 1981) bought Mt. Villa Motel in Mt. Vernon.

January 23, 1982 marks the 10th anniversary of Hasmukhbhai's life in America. He came here from India in 1972 as a "gold medalist" (an extremely high academic classification there) with a bachelor of science degree in chemistry, physics and mathematics. Because he scored so high on tests, he qualified as an exchange student. He attended the University of Southern California, Pacific Palisades, and was two terms away from an electrical engineering degree from Cal State when fate began to dictate.

In addition to his demanding academic responsibilities, Hasmukhbhai had taken a job as a security guard working long hours in order to gain the financial security needed for his wife to join him from India. In 1973, one month after she had arrived to join him in California, he was stabbed five times and beaten with an iron bar as he worked.

He dropped out of school to recuperate and undergo treatment which lasted 2 1/2 years. He says he still has to live with the physical effects of the attack.

The pressure and stress on the young Indian who maintained a perfect 4.0 standing during his schooling here while holding down a job and trying to establish a home in a very different culture, was overwhelming. He decided not to return to school and bought a motel in the Los Angeles area.

He said of finishing his degree, that if a degree

would "bring him more prosperity", then he would pursue it, but he doesn't see that in his future. He thinks that he may possibly expand his business and management skills to include an import-export business. He is in the process of getting some licenses and other governmental requirements from both the U.S. and India.

His father, before retirement, both farmer and was in the diamond industry (cutting, polishing and shipping) in India. This, he says, is one prospective business he may enter.

Hasmukhbhai still owns a home in California and one in Berea and says that California is a good state, but he has enjoyed the small, quiet, peaceful com-

munities of Berea and Mt. Vernon. He would like to see some growth for Mt. Vernon and some development which would be good for his business. People in Kentucky, he says, have been friendly and kind.

Shardabeh received a B.S. degree in chemistry before she left India and later worked for a finance company there. Since coming to America, she has held "white collar" jobs, but now she helps him in the motel business, a job she does not find very challenging or fulfilling, says her husband. He says she would prefer to work independently, but right now, while the children are young (6 and 4 years) and other circumstances are such as they are, she will

continue to help him. Also helping in the family business are Shardabeh's brother and his wife who have lived in the U.S. for the last 2 1/2 years.

Even though Hasmukhbhai has been extremely successful by most standards, he says it has been the hardest 10 years of his entire life. The stress of going to school and trying to survive economically and carve a niche in American society and life has been great.

When he came to America, he could not speak or understand a word of English. He had studied written English, but he says, that is very different. He was able to succeed in school initially by reading the book and performing

on written tests. In 3 or 4 months he was able to understand lectures and answer questions in class, he said.

He says he "tries to go with society" and, according to his parents who visited here recently, he has become 80% Americanized in terms of his thinking and lifestyle.

Getting used to American food was one of the harder of the small adjustments the Patels have had to make, he admits, but now they eat about everything that the average American eats, including meat, even though the average Indian is vegetarian. He has not abandoned the ways of his heritage altogether though. He says he prays daily to God, asking for protection for himself and his family. Following the prayer, he places a red dot on his forehead to symbolize his faith in God. (The dot on the forehead of women in India is not, as a symbol of faith, but has changed in significance over the years. To modern women, it is considered an adornment or beauty enhancer and usually matches the color of the dress.)

The Patels believe in God and are not prejudiced against any faith. Sons Neehar and Nimesh attend the Wednesday night and Sunday religious services at the First Christian Church in Mt. Vernon. He says he wants his children, who are

American citizens, to become familiar with all aspects of American life and to become part of the community where they live so that they can benefit from the educational and other opportunities afforded in America.

fully tight, but I'd say that we'd be willing to do whatever we can to get it approved. We'll have to make our part a specific project such as the light fixtures, so we can get it approved through the state's buildings and grounds committee, and start advertising for bids,"

said school superintendent Charles B. Parsons.

Coleman asked the board for approximately \$2,500 but said that the light fixtures would cost \$3,400. The school board agreed to take the bids on the lights with the understanding that the people would reimburse the board any amount over \$2,500 that they spent, if the group had any money left over.

In other business the board accepted the low bid of RBS Coal Co at Lilly, for coal to heat the county schools.

Mr. Parsons said that when he wrote the advertisement for the bid he asked for the price of the coal at the tipple. The only other bid for the job was from Genale Coal Co of Lexington. However, their bid was a delivered price and not what Mr. Parsons asked for in the advertisement. Parsons said that the board already had given a contract for

hauling coal at \$6.00 per ton and that they would have to stick by their obligation - RBS Coal Company's bid was \$47.50 at the tipple and Genale Coal Company's bid was \$49.75 delivered. The board accepted the RBS Coal Company bid.

In other business, the board passed a motion to continue the attendance accounting system for the next school year. According to Mr. Parsons, Rockcastle started on the new system this year with no cost. However, Raymond Barber, State School Superintendent for Public Instruction, wrote Mr. Parsons a letter last week telling him that if Rockcastle wanted to stay on the computer system next school year it would cost the school system \$150 per student per year, due to the budget cuts in state education. The move will cost the system \$4,800 next year if the registration of students is about the same as

this year. Parsons said approximately 3,400 students enrolled in Rockcastle County schools this year.

The school board also gave Mr. Parsons authority to advertise for bids for two new classrooms to be built as the Roundstone School. According to Parsons, the rooms will be funded through ESEA, Title I and will cost approximately \$129,300.00. The rooms will be 40 feet by 22 feet and each will have a restroom in them.

The school board also renewed their workman's compensation policy with State Farm Insurance at the legal rate for 1982. Mr. Parsons told the board that the rate is determined by the state and therefore no bids are necessary because one insurance agency would be no lower than another.

The unemployment insurance that covers our local school system is handled through the state board of education. The board voted to renew their

contract with them for 1982. "Last year we got back \$12,000 from the state because we hadn't had to lay off any workers at that time, but with the laying off of the aids this year we probably won't get anything back this time," Parsons said.

The board approved the renewal of the contract with School Board attorney Carl Clontz. Clontz asked for a \$300.00 a year raise and the board approved it. Clontz now makes \$1,200 per year.

In final business, the board approved G.E.D. certificates for Linda Alene Bullock, Sherry L. McClure and Denton Dee Allen. They also approved the hiring of Casey Carroll and Darlene Cameron as substitute teachers subject to the state approval, approved the hiring of William Taylor and Harold Miller as substitute bus drivers and approved the advertising and accepting of sealed bids for lunchroom tables at Livingston Grade School.







and 11% interest on the balance of a truck which would cost between \$45,000 and \$50,000.
FMC of Tipton, Illinois had delivered a truck to the fire department's specifications Monday and attached a price of \$49,115 to the "stripped down model". Firemen told the court they could transfer much of the equipment from the old truck. The company spokesman said he would accept a 20% down payment with a 10%

locked-in simple interest rate on the remainder of the debt which could be paid off in a 7 year plan, or at anytime.
At first the court was reluctant to make a commitment and wanted to wait to make a decision until later, but after considerable discussion, they voted unanimously to purchase the new truck under the plan offered by the company.
Cox told the court that the arrangement with the city to provide maintenance and housing had been entered into the minutes of

the city council meeting the previous Monday night, and that the county would be responsible for insurance, license and gasoline. Deputy judge, Mark Jasper, who apparently is volunteering his services to the county, said he felt there should be some formal agreement between the city and county concerning the responsibilities of each concerning the new truck.
Magistrate Joe Clark made a motion to grant road supervisor, Paul Hansel, specific power to supervise county road workers. The motion specified that any employee not meeting the responsibilities of the job would be required to answer to the judge and fiscal court.
Deputy sheriff, Clarence Hasty, asked the court to help furnish gasoline for the sheriff's department. Hasty said they couldn't patrol the county roads without some assistance. Formerly the county has helped the department by furnishing a secretary and buying uniforms. Hasty said they had already bought uniforms and had hired a secretary but requested a gasoline allowance from the court.
Magistrates decided to give \$5,000 consideration to an amount and vote on the measure next month.



County Judge/executive Bob Jasper and grand-jury Mark, who will serve as his assistant, are shown at Tuesday's fiscal court meeting, the first for Jasper since being elected to the position in November.

The court voted to purchase from former jailer, Billy Kirby, a washer, dryer and a dishwasher for a combined total of \$850. The county now collects \$5.00 per road fine some of which is to be used for jail maintenance.
William K. Bullen, who holds the present garbage hauling contract with the county, met with the court and was given a 30 day contract extension to provide the service. In a motion to advertise for new garbage haul bids, Clark added that the advertisement and contract should specify the containers be not only emptied but also that the surrounding area be kept clean. Bids are to be opened at the next meeting.
As part of this same item of business, the court voted to reimburse Bullens in the amount of \$520 for

the month of January to hire someone to clean up around the present dumpster sites.
David Waller of the DHR, division of child support enforcement asked the court to pass a resolution approving county attorney James H. One magistrate pointed out that the court had given the group \$3,500 for lighting for the field. The body agreed to study the decision later.
Magistrate Clark made

a motion to continue, paying the magistrates the \$100 a month expense account. All magistrates voted 'yes'.
Judge executive Jasper authorized an order to be drawn allowing magistrates to perform marriages.

Residents in the city of Brodhead will be without police protection for 18 hours a day because of an order passed by the City Council at their regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The order was passed because some of the council members felt that Wayne Denney, Brodhead city policeman, should work only

40 hours per week. The council made Denney's working hours from 8 p.m. till 2 a.m. These are the only hours Denney will be on call as opposed to being on call 24 hours a day, previously.

Also, anytime that officer Denney spends in court will be deducted from his forty hour work week making it even shorter as far as the time actually spent on duty.

The council also voted

to keep the city water truck and the city cruiser inside the city limits when there was a fire outside the city limits.

The new city council members and the new Mayor were also sworn in Monday night by City Attorney Jerry Cox. Ronnie Cash is the new Mayor, while the former Mayor, D.A. Robbins, was elected to one of the four city commissioner seats. The only other new member of the board is Eddie Cash, who won the seat vacated by David Cash, when Cash did not seek re-election.

Fiscal Court approves purchase of fire truck for use in county runs

The first Fiscal Court meeting of the new year created a buzz of excitement in the courthouse Tuesday morning as the new county officials took their seats. New officials, county judge/executive, Bob Jasper, county attorney, James H. Lambert; magistrates, D.G. Albright, Donald Rowe, Bill Wren and Tom Denney were joined by Joe Clark (who was elected from the last Fiscal Court).

The courtroom was almost filled with persons who had some business or request to be brought before the court and of spectators who had possibly come to see the new court, new judge and his grandson, Mark Jasper (whom the judge has recently appointed as his deputy) conduct their first meeting.

Perhaps one of the most exciting actions taken by the new team was the purchase of a new pumper fire truck which will be used by the fire department to make county fire runs.

Coming before the Fiscal Court for the third or fourth time concerning the need for the truck were several members of the volunteer fire department.

Spokesman, Bud Cox, briefly restated the department's need for a truck if county fire protection were to be continued. Cox had local insurance broker, Donnie Singleton, to explain what the loss of fire protection could mean to county residents in terms of insurance premiums.

Singleton explained that the discount for limited fire protection from a county fire response team could mean a savings to homeowners of from \$92 to \$160 yearly.

Two companies, Grumman and FMC Fire apparatus gave the court their best prices and finance plans. A spokesman for Grumman, which could not deliver a truck for the next 30 days, said they would accept 20% down.
