was advised by Commonwealth attorney, Benny Ham, that he (Ham) had carefully considered the case and it was his opinion that "that was not a proper charge for placing county gravel on private roads."

Ham told Wicker that for this reason he would not oppose the motion made by Thacker.

Ham also advised Wicker that it appeared to him that most of the "roads involved" were old county roads which had not been abandoned by the county. He said that even though the roads no longer served the general public, they were still legally county roads.

The Commonwealth Attorney said that two counts of the theft by unlawful taking involved private driveways. According to Ham, were graveled by their owners and no county gravel was involved.

Ham went on to tell the court that he, had no way of proving that any of the alleged acts were done with the knowledge or consent of Thacker.

Ham said that the misfeasance and malfeasance count against Thacker would also fail because it "was completely based on the theft by unlawful taking charges."

After consideration of Ham's recommendation, Judge Wicker ordered the indictment against Thacker dismissed.

Thacker, who was County Judge Executive for the last eight years, defeated in last year's May Primary by a narrow 24 votes.

Charges dropped against Thacker

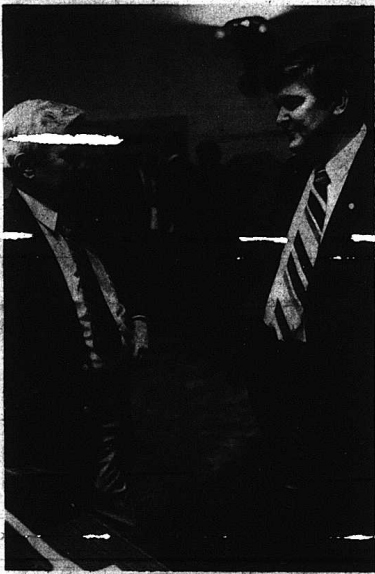
On Feb. 10, January 22, 1982, Rockcastle County Circuit Judge Phillip K. Wicker dismissed 12 counts of theft by unlawful taking and one count of malfeasance in office against Rockcastle County Judge executive, Hubert Thacker, who was indicted by the Grand Jury in October of last year.

Judge Wicker said, in an order dismissing the indictment, that Thacker came before the court, for a hearing in which he asked the court to "quash the indictments." Wicker also stated in the order that he

Troops battle on Wildcat early in War

[The following article was taken from the book, "The Zolleffs" and edited for print by Nancy Mullins. The book was written by Dr. Raymond E. Myers, published by the Filson Club Press, Louisville, Ky., in 1944.]

During the summer of 1861, Kentucky was attempting to maintain a position of neutrality with respect to active participation in the Civil War. Governor Beriah Magoffin had replied to the President's call for troops by saying that Kentucky would "furnish no men for the wicked purpose of subduing her sister Southern states." And he made it clear that he wanted no Federal troops within the limits of the state.

However, early in July, Lt. William Nelson, of the Navy, who was at home in Mason, Kentucky on furlough was ordered by the War Department to raise an army in southeastern Kentucky for service, not only in Tennessee, but in Kentucky as well.

This recruiting and training was carried on principally at Camp Dick Robinson (named for the man on whose farm it was located) in Garrard County. Provisions were transported by rail from Cincinnati to Nicholasville and from there to the Camp by wagons. Nelson was authorized to issue commissions from the federal government to those who would raise commands; and he distributed these generously which gave rise to the expression "as numerous as Kentucky Colonels".

When Nelson was distributing "Lincoln guns" shipped from Washington and rounding up mules and wagons for an expedition into East Tennessee, General Felix Kirk Zollicoffer "A man of Method" and a very promising young Rebel officer was proposing to arrest the advance by forming a chain of infantry posts at Cumberland Gap and at other paths leading across the intervening mountains.

But before Nelson's Tennessee expedition could

get underway, Grant had moved up the Ohio River from Cairo, Illinois and captured Paducah following the Confederate troops move into Hickman and Columbus in Western Kentucky.

The day following the takeover, Zollicoffer received orders from Confederate headquarters in Richmond saying, "The neutrality of Kentucky has been broken by the occupation of Paducah. Take the arms."

Zollicoffer replied on September 9 by stating simply, "I ordered three regiments into Kentucky today; other forces will follow rapidly."

Zollicoffer, a native of Tennessee, wrote to Governor Magoffin apologizing for sending troops into Tennessee's "twin sister" and promising that if Federal troops would withdraw and respect the state's neutrality, he too would withdraw his command immediately.

He left Knoxville on September 17 and proceeded

to take advantage of the non-profit group's offering. The premium, figured on the county's present payroll, will amount to \$6,592 for 1982. With the discount, \$959 will be returned to the county initially. Following the end of the year audit of the groups records, the county stands to receive another 10-12% refund, according to the representative.

KaCo as the group insurance plan is known, also offers a one-third decrease in the county's unemployment payments the first year of membership and two third reduction following the first year.

Cheese to be given away by local SSI office

Applications were taken Monday and Tuesday at the Department for Social Insurance for cheese to be distributed free to those who generally the same income limits as those qualifying for the Energy Assistance Program.

Linda McCauley of the local SSI office said Tuesday that the Mt. Vernon office has been notified that it is eligible to receive 568 five-pound boxes of cheese from the federal government. The number of boxes each family receives depends upon varying factors including the number of persons in the household.

Ms. McCauley said she understands the cheese distribution is to be done only once since the government expects to get rid of its present cheese surplus in this manner. She said, however, indications are all goes well and the hand-out is well received, it might be followed by other surplus food distributions.

To be eligible for the free cheese families must meet strict financial requirements. The following guidelines are used for qualification: 359 for a single person; \$475 for a family of two; \$589 for a family of three; \$704 for a family of four; \$819 for a family of five, and \$934 for a family of six or more. Families must also have a resource limitation of \$3,000 or less.

The matter of an urgent need for a backhoe for cleaning rock and dirt slides from county roads was also discussed with magistrate Joe Clark stating that he felt like the current situation constituted an emergency. The question arose over the propriety of declaring an emergency after the county has already advertised for bids for a backhoe. The advertisement has run only one time and, according to law, must run two weeks prior to awarding the bid on a designated date. Following a recommendation requested by phone from the Attorney General's office, the court agreed to wait until all bids are in.

By letter, the Division of Surplus Property in Frankfort granted the court permission to make purchases there. Paul Hansel, Judge Jasper, Alex Albright and Donald Rowe were designated by the court to do the purchasing.

Local attorney argues before appeals court

Local attorney, William D. Gregory, appeared Monday, January 25, before the 8th Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnati, Ohio and argued a criminal appeal case arising from a Federal District Court case in London during the summer of 1980.

The case, which received national attention when CBS' "60 Minutes" covered the incident in a documentary entitled "Little Boy" involved defendants, Charles Marcum and Kenneth Brewer, two Jackson County residents who were convicted on FBI evidence in that court of accepting payment for a proposed school building contract award. Gregory sought appeal on the grounds of entrapment and questionable tape erasers by the FBI.

The Federal Appeals Court, made up of a chief judge and two justices, before which Gregory argued, hears all appeals cases from Kentucky, Ohio, Tennessee,

CORRECTION

The statistics for 1981 seen in last week's issue of the Signal were gathered from various sources and in some cases represented approximates and averages; however, it was brought to our attention by city policeman Dickie Collinsworth that the figures attributed to the Mt. Vernon Police Department's arrests and traffic violations were incomplete. We gained these figures and the information from the Circuit Clerk's records and the Clerk's available records. Upon closer examination, it was found that the arrest figure of 22 for the year represented only the DUI citations for 8 months and that the traffic violations from the clerk's office did not accurately represent the police department's work.

According to arrest records in the Rockcastle County Jail, the police department made 243 arrests and when all months records were combined, the police department apparently issued 65 traffic related warnings and 273 citations rather than the 196 figure quoted.

February 4-Yeast Breads. Demonstration on making homemade yeast breads, tips on ingredients and methods for successful results. Will also shape rolls and make homemade pizza.

February 11-Pastry. Demonstration on making pie crusts, custard and meringues. Hints on pie making. Will make quiche and each participant will make a crust.

February 18-Meat Cookery. Discuss ways to save money on meats. Demonstration on cutting up chickens, beef and meet selection. Demonstration on economy meat dishes and low fat and cholesterol cooking.

February 25-Stir Fry. Preparation of vegetable by using stir fry cookery methods. Demonstration of several oriental recipes.

March 4-Microwave Cooking. Demonstration of various foods and techniques used in microwave cookery. Sharing of ideas and recipes.

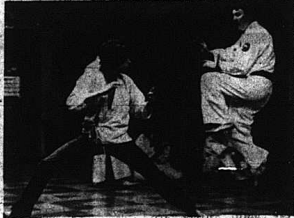

hospitals in Eastern Kentucky. She will now be responsible for the supervision of the monitoring and assessing of the 108 acute care facilities on a state-wide basis.

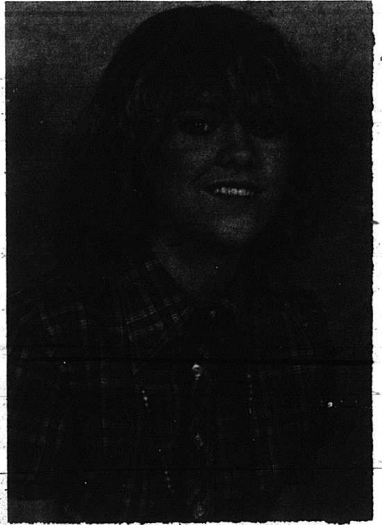
Ms. Vanzant has been with the organization since 1977, after receiving her baccalaureate degree in Health Services from Eastern Kentucky University.

to the present site of Pineville, where his troops were waiting at "Camp Buckner". The fighting force consisted of 3 regiments of infantrymen, one 6-pounder field battery of six guns and four companies of cavalry with 8 other cavalry companies on the way. He left one regiment at Cumberland Gap.

An action at Barboursville which had no military significance was, however, the first engagement of the Civil War to be fought in Kentucky.

A soldier, who participated in the engagement of 800 Rebels against the Union forces there, told the story that as they approached the town in the fog of early morning, they saw enemy pickets, their Colonel called in a ringing voice, "Make way men, make way and let the artillery come forward." When, in fact, there was no artillery. But the bluff worked and in an hour's time the enemy was dispersed and the command returned in triumph to Camp Buckner.

About a week later, Zollicoffer organized two well-planned strategic maneuvers, which he executed simultaneously.

The first was at Laurel Bridge (in what is now Levl Jackson State Park) where an assembly of Home Guards-estimated from 600 to 1500 men were encamped to dispute the passage of the Confederates toward Camp Dick Robinson.

A detachment of troops broke up the camp and captured three prisoners and took considerable supplies and equipment. As the same time, another detachment escorted a train of wagons to the Goose Creek Salt Works in Clay County where they obtained two hundred barrels of salt, a valuable acquisition to the Confederate Army.

It was reported to Zollicoffer upon their return that some of his men had

been guilty of misconduct with respect to the rights of private citizens. Zollicoffer wrote the Adjutant General saying he regretted the irregularities among the soldiers in trespassing on private property and further stating that he would investigate and punish those responsible. He added that he had signed a receipt for the salt with the expectation that the Confederate government would pay for it at the going price of 45 cents per bushel.

In the meantime, Union forces (the 3rd Regiment of Kentucky Volunteers-later known as the 7th) led by Colonel Theophilus Garrard were sent from Camp Dick Robinson to a point in the Rockcastle Hills, on the direct road from Cumberland toward the Bluegrass region. Here Garrard established a stronghold known as Camp Wildcat, east of Livingston.

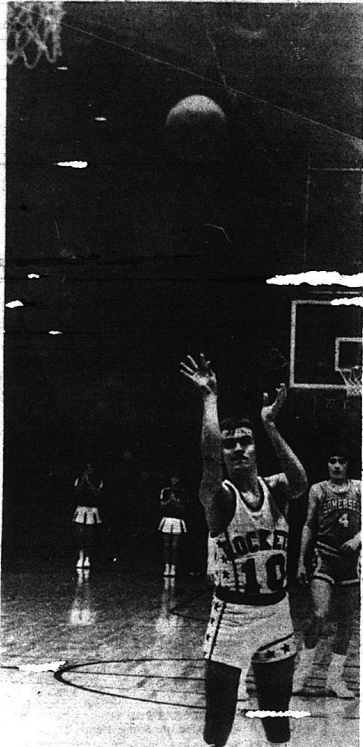
ter, they outscored us 9 to 8 and went on to defeat us 48 to 39.

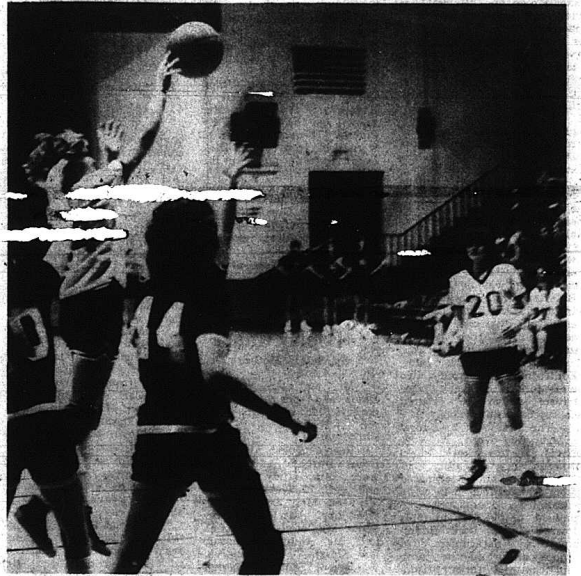
Boys win one lose one

Tuesday night, the A-teams dropped below the 500 mark at 8 and 9 with the 66 point loss to Clay County.

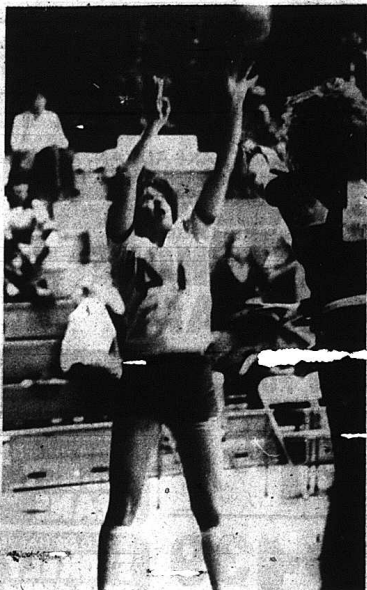
Clay moved out to an early 14 to 4 lead at the end of the first quarter and, by half-time, the Rockets were down by 44 points at 54 to 10.

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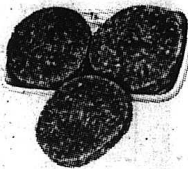
