## Burke arrested

## Industrial Authority asks city to accept water and sewer

The Industrial Authority spokesman, Bill James, was present at the Monday night city council meeting to request the city take over maintenance of the water and sewer lines at the industrial park.

The council held session on the matter after some councilmen voiced apprehension at an acceptance which would not include annexation of the property. According to Mayor Mullins, the city has never provided sewer services to areas outside the city limits. According to councilman Joel Gentry, the industrial park joins city property.

There was some discussion of the sewer lift station at the park flooding, following heavy rains. James said the Industrial Authority plans to build a wall around the station to prevent this from happening.

James was asked to discuss the matter of annexation with the manager of the two factories and report back at a called meeting.

The council agreed to accept Maggie Johnson's prom-

ise to move her driveway and septic tank bleeder lines off city property and to clean brush from city property.

Reportedly, Mrs. Johns, who had been sued by the city, was under the mistaken impression that she owned some city property which joins her property lines near Lake Linville.

City attorney, Carl Clontz, was directed by the Council to take the legal action necessary to break the boat dock lease held by Sterling Hoskins, citing alleged illegal activities as the basis for the action.

The council approved city fire chief, John Cox's request for turn-out gear for five new volunteers. The council also granted permission to the fire department to remove the tank from the old fire truck and sell the chassis at a local auction of farm equipment.

Copies of the 1981 audit was distributed to council members for review. The audit will be presented officially at the March meeting.

## McCreary Co. added to 80th; most of Lincoln moved to 54th

Splitting districts, taking old ones out, putting new ones in and satisfying a Democratic controlled state government were all things that happened in Frankfort during the past two weeks of the legislative session.

Redistricting, a touchy subject in the state for the last year, has affected just about every voting district in the state and the 80th

district, of which Rockcastle County is a part, was no exception.

Representative hopefuls, in the next primary election, will be traveling south to campaign as well as west. The old 80th district which was composed of all of Lincoln and Rockcastle counties and 4,100 persons in Pulaski County, has been changed drastically to now include McCreary County.

The new 80th district is

comprised of all of Rockcastle, while only 6,053 persons are still in the 80th in Lincoln County. Pulaski County was being twice as many people to the new district with 8,296 persons and McCreary County will be the newcomer, bringing 9,334 to the 80th district.

According to Danny Ford, representative from Mt. Vernon, the 80th district would have probably avoided any change whatsoever had it not been for Democrat Joe Clarke of Danville, who, Ford said, decided he wanted 13,000 people out of Lincoln County to come into his district which is the 54th.

Ford said that he did not like the idea of splitting Lincoln County up because House floor last Friday contacts there in the May Primary last year and now he would have to start all over.

The bill cleared the House floor last Friday by a vote of 86-3 and according to Ford will pass in the Senate this week.

The first proposal was to split Pulaski in half, putting 20,000 persons from Pulaski County in with Rockcastle to make the 80th. However, Tommy Todd, representative of the 83rd district, was reluctant to see his county split up and Ford was reluctant to have such a huge population from Pulaski come into the 80th district.

"The first proposal expected to come from the state leadership was to have Jackson and Rockcastle counties in the 80th district," Ford said in an interview Monday, "but that idea was never put forth," he said.

Clark wanted part of Lincoln County, the change had to be made.

Clark is chairman of the state revenue and appropriations committee.

The next election of a representative in the 80th district will be in 1984, a year longer than usual because of population change, according to Ford, who also said the ideal number of persons in the district is 6,608. The old 80th district was 1,83% over that figure.

He said that a variance of 5% is usually allowed but because Clarke wanted part of Lincoln County, the change had to be made.

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## Notice from the clerk's office

Mrs. Bales says that because of the state installation of a new computer in her office, which allows for only one processing at a time, anyone wishing to avoid a possible delay may mail a self addressed envelope, social security number, Todd month and a check for \$12.50 to the clerk's office and receive the license decal in the return mail.

## City Receives 3 year revitalization grant

Mayor Roland Mullins announced Friday that the city of Mt. Vernon has received a 3 year, \$20,000 grant, funded through the Appalachian Regional Commission to be used to finance a downtown revitalization effort.

According to the mayor, the city will receive the full \$20,000 the first year. Next year, ARC will fund 75% of that amount with the city putting up the other 25%. The third year, the city's portion will be two-thirds.

The first step of the plan is an immediate survey of local businessmen to gather ideas and needs. The survey will be conducted by Mike Hayes of the Cumberland Area Development District. Based upon

this survey, a scope of work will be written and submitted to ARC and other agencies.

The overall development plan will look at the entire downtown area and determine the needs, estimated cost and methods of financing the downtown revitalization effort.

Mullins, the planning includes a traffic flow and parking study, a marketing study to determine what business should offer in order to attract new business and encourage more local shopping and an architectural study aided by the U.K. College of Architecture to offer suggestions as to what inexpensive improvements could be made to enhance the looks of Main Street.

## South Kentucky Rural Electric Cooperative receives rate increase

The state Public Service Commission has approved an \$815,000 rate increase for the South Kentucky Rural Electric Cooperative.

The increase was needed so the utility could meet the requirements of its mortgages that secure its long-term debt.

The cooperative had requested an increase of \$1.07 million which would have increased the average monthly residential bill

from \$42.72 to \$44.73. The approved increase will raise the average bill, based on usage of 800 kilowatt hours to \$44.23.

South Kentucky RECC provides electricity to approximately 34,400 members in Adams, Casey, Clinton, Cumberland, Laurel, Lincoln, McCreary, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Russell and Wayne counties.

The rates were effective February 1.

## Armed robbery at Burr Shell

The Burr Shell Service station, owned by Danny Smith, was robbed Friday morning around 3 a.m. when two armed men in their early twenties entered the station, took \$288 and a Remington shotgun and fled.

The men were described as white males in their early twenties, about 5'8" tall and weighing about 135-145 pounds. One of the men reportedly had black, collar-length hair and the other had sandy over-the-ears hair.

According to Roland Huckabee, state police detective, the two drove into

the station in a 1978 or 1979 lime colored Ford, 4-wheel drive pick-up truck with a darker green side panel. After having gas, valued at \$26, put into the truck, the two pulled a gun on attendant, James Spears, forced him into a '78 Ford and hit him on the head with the gun. The truck bore North Carolina license tags, number HN 7729.

Anyone having any information which might be helpful in apprehending the subjects, is urged to call the local state police.

A composite of the suspects is shown elsewhere in the paper.

## Officers conduct raid at Lake Linville

Local law enforcement officials raided the city owned boat dock at Lake Linville about 11 p.m. Saturday night and confiscated 43 half-pints of whiskey of 6 cases, plus 10 cans of beer from boat dock operator, Sterling Hoskins.

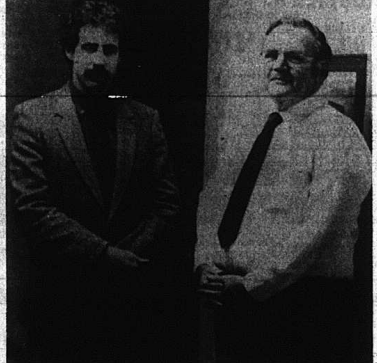
This is the second time in less than a year that Hoskins has been charged with possession of alcoholic beverages for purpose of sale. Hoskins has the boat

dock business leased from the city of Mt. Vernon.

Sheriff William Taylor said that his office has gotten numerous calls and complaints about Hoskins since he took office in January.

Three members of the sheriff's department, three city policemen and a state trooper took part in the raid.

Hoskins is free after posting the required 10% cash of a \$3,000 bond.

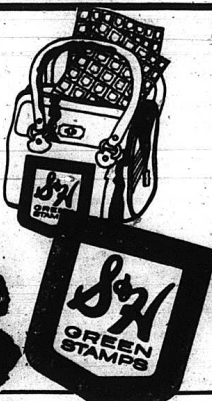

## Enemies of God's Plan for Marriage

In the very beginning God said, "Therefore shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall cleave unto his wife and they shall be one flesh" (Gen. 2:24). The teachings of Jesus is that this union is to be a permanent one. "What therefore God has joined together, let not man put asunder" (Matt. 19:6). Also, in the writing of the apostle Paul, he stated plainly that the husband and wife are bound to each other until death (Rom. 7:1-4).

In the case where one marriage partner is guilty of sexual immorality, the innocent may put away the guilty party and marry another with God's approval. However, the guilty party is not allowed to remarry without committing adultery (Matt. 19:3).

There are at least four militant forces seeking to destroy God's plan for marriage today:

1. The Woman's Liberation Movement boldly declares, "The end of the institution of marriage is a necessary condition for the liberation of woman. Therefore it is important for us to encourage women to leave their husbands and not live individually with them. Now we know it is the institution that has failed and we must work to destroy it." (The Document, a declaration of feminism).

2. Alternate life style—much money and effort is being put forth to convince Americans that homosexuality is just a different life style. That it is different I agree, but that it is acceptable to God I disagree. Homosexuality is condemned in the Bible (Rom. 1:28-27; 1 Cor. 6:9-11). God's way is for man and

woman to be united as husband and wife (Gen. 2).

3. The living together arrangement has been lauded as the "Cure for all marital ills." However, it is failing to accomplish its desired end (Reader's Digest, April, 1977). In addition to this failure, it is contrary to God's way. The sexual relation outside of a scriptural marriage is sin (1 Cor. 7:1-2).

4. Modern theories concerning divorce and remarriage. The three aforementioned movements are attacking God's marriage laws head on, but this force is working within the church, undermining the authority of God. When a theory proclaims that a man can unscripturally divorce his faithful wife, marry another, ask forgiveness but continue in this state and even multiply the action and still be in favor with God—surely some have turned from God's Way! These views, if accepted, can have but one end: the destruction of God's plan for marriage.

With regard to the subject of marriage, divorce, and remarriage, many false doctrines have been and are being spread. These doctrines have had and will continue to have tragic consequences. Churches of Christ can be filled with fornicators. May God give us the courage to stand firm for the truth about marriage, divorce and remarriage. "Stand therefore, having your loins girt about with truth" (Eph. 6:14).
