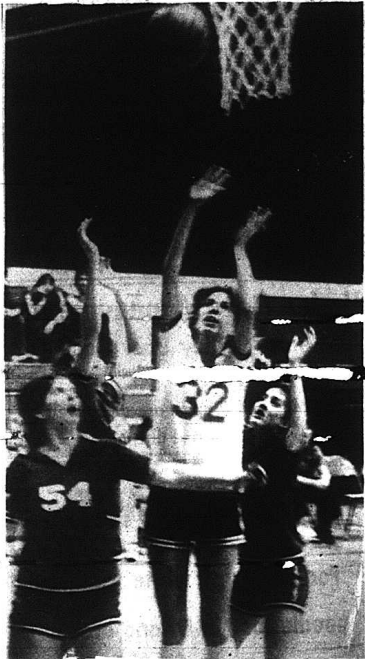

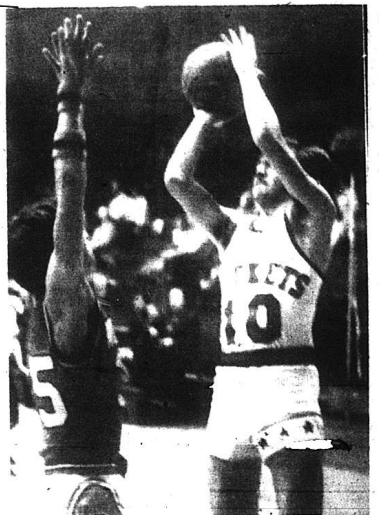
In turnovers Jackson County had 25 to our 9.

Mt. Vernon Business and Professional Association hears local law officers

The Mt. Vernon Business and Professional Association had its guest Tuesday morning, two members of the sheriff's department, Clarence Hasty and Willie Powell.

The deputies discussed the aims and goals of the department and pledged their determination to serve all warrants issued, beginning in 1982. They acknowledged a backlog of some 1500 warrants which were issued, but unserved during the previous four years and said they would serve them as they could get to them.

The merchants were concerned mainly with problems of bad checks, debts and repossessions, and shop lifting and discussed methods of controlling these.

The deputies agreed with the merchants that there had been problems getting warrants issued especially through the present county attorney's office, and told the merchants that if they had any trouble getting a warrant for a bad check, to come to the sheriff's department for help.

They advised merchants to have customers put phone numbers and addresses on checks.

Hasty told the merchants that following a 30 day waiting period and 10 days following official notification to the party writing the bad check, a warrant could be obtained for the check under \$100. A check for over \$100 is a felony and an indictment may be obtained from the grand jury for these issuances.

The association expressed its thanks to the deputies for taking the time to attend the meeting and answer questions.

Sheriff William Taylor of Rockcastle County received a diploma from Marion D. Campbell, Commissioner of the Kentucky State Police. The diploma was presented at a Friday luncheon hosted by the Commissioner, and represented the successful completion of a training seminar for newly-elected sheriffs conducted by the State Police.

State Legislature

The reorganization of government is an issue that always raises controversy.

The Brown Administration's reorganization of Kentucky's state government has already sparked sizeable debate during the first half of the legislature's 1982 session and more debate is expected.

On January 8th the Senate passed Senate Bill 32 by a vote of 35 to 9.

Senate Bill 32 seeks to amend the Kentucky Revised Statutes to require each executive order of the governor relating to the reorganization authority to be presented to the legislature as a separate bill.

The reasoning of Senate Bill 32 is to prohibit the governor from lumping all his reorganization actions into one bill, so the legislature will not have to consider a bill that has both good and bad provisions.

Apparently, the Brown Administration has decided to comply with the one bill-one reorganization act stipulation of SB 32, even though the bill has not yet been passed into law.

On February 5th, after an hour and twenty minutes of debate, the Senate passed Senate Bill 166 by a vote of 18 to 16.

Senate Bill 166 seeks to take several marketing and export functions from the state Department of Agriculture and place them under the Energy and Agriculture Cabinet. The responsibility of running the North American International Livestock Exhibition was the chief function stripped from the Department of Agriculture.

The underlying controversy behind Senate Bill 166 developed this summer because of a political fallout between Governor Brown and Alben Barkley, the state Commissioner of Agriculture.

Also another controversy which involves the Brown Administration's reorganization act which formed the Utility and Energy Regulatory Commission into a single Public Service Commission, which served to reverse a law enacted by the 1978 General Assembly.

The Public Service Commission sets the rates on public utilities in Kentucky.

The State Senate passed a bill which is designed to protect small children riding in automobiles.

Senate Bill 2 requires parents or legal guardians of children up to 40 inches tall to secure them in a restraint seat while in the car.

We had a spirited debate on this issue before passing the bill by a 29-7 vote.

Several senators expressed the concern that we should not be telling people how to protect their children.

However, the majority did not see the bill as a punitive measure which would be used against

people. Instead, it is designed to help educate parents on the benefits of using these car seats.

The bill calls for a small fine for parents who don't have their children secured in a car seat. However, the fine is waived if the parents later show they have acquired one of the seats.

Similar legislation is working well in other states, including Tennessee, and has contributed to a decrease in the number of deaths and injuries suffered by small children.

Though there are legitimate concerns sometimes about government intervention in our lives, if this bill saves one little child from being killed or seriously injured, it will have been worthwhile.

I felt very strongly about this bill and working for its passage was a proud moment for me.

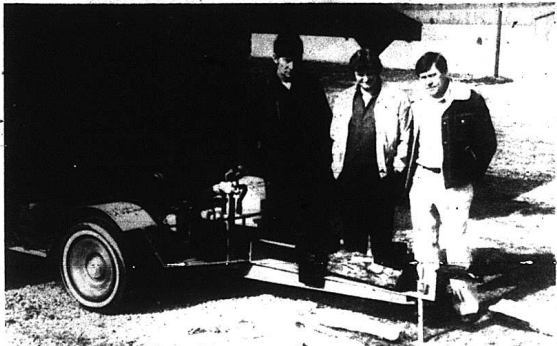

I mean that was the case of Margaret Mullins Linville until I got a recent letter from them in which they sent me some memoranda from the case. But read on. In 1913 the Berea Disputants Telephone Co. was formed with Clyde's father, W.H. Linville, as treasurer. Clyde and Margaret had enclosed some old cancelled checks drawn on the Berea National Bank which his father had written to pay dividends to the then shareholders of the company in 1913. Among the checks were many familiar names of long ago citizens of Clear Creek. To name a few were my dad, O.M. Payne, W.H. Hammonds, Spencer Abney, Hoss Anglin, Marshall Swinford, J.E. Hammonds, Sherrill Chaves and Harding, Iowa, from our world today. I was very grateful to Clyde and Margaret to recall these old memories of the past but what I didn't like was Clyde having Margaret also enclose in their letter, a picture of a man made during the days at Berea College saying perhaps we would be raising a garden this spring and would need it. home remodeled from the Bud Anglin house near the Scaffold Cane Church. To make amends about the picture insult, Clyde served us coffee that he does make well, I'll have to say. I hadn't seen them for many years and we enjoyed pictures and talk of days gone by; also seeing Clyde's many trophies won over the state by his fox hounds, and Margaret's collection of 99 small pitchers including a "left-handed one".

"Featuring People"

There was a rough element of population in this, was well as any backyard setting, during pioneer days. Clear Creek, being on the far, remote side of Rockcastle and its county seat of Mt. Vernon, where the law and order was centered, was no exception with its groups of uneducated, ignorant men who drank, made moonshine, fought, disturbed the peace, stole things, stole from neighbors, and killed each other as well as many other crimes that law abiding citizens tried to put down in order to have a peaceful place to raise their families.

In the late 1890's, my dad, O.M. Payne, had been elected magistrate while he also ran his country store. During the summer months in his district, he would hold court out under the big gum in the stump as a podium on which he conducted business.

It was just such a gathering of men, as I have listed above, along with the good portion of citizens, that he faced one day in the "courtroom". He told me years ago, "The group of men gathered on the fringes of the crowd seemed to be more unruly than usual and his calls for them to quiet down were

ignored while they argued, passed a bottle around and broke out in fist fights. Dad, who was known for his peaceful manner, glanced in desperation away from the group to where a large, rough looking man lounged against a table. George Sims pulled back his coat, nodded at Dad, and revealed a heavy gun he wore. Dad stepped away from the stump. When he returned, he slammed Sim's gun down, and in a ringing voice declared, "All right, men! We're going to have order here for this court, or we'll be going to hell!"

The sight of Magistrate Payne, who was never a harsh voiced man, and the big gun in the hands of one who could draw on them, having the authority to as well, restored a quiet to the outdoor courtroom which he said, was never broken again.

FmHA seeks to assist farmers with problems

Although many farmers are facing financial difficulty because of today's cost-price squeeze, the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) intends to do all it can to help its borrowers stay in farming, FmHA State Director Kendall Seaton said recently.

"We recognize there are problems, problems with high interest rates, inflation, a grain embargo, adverse weather and other causes," Seaton said. "And these have been intensified by overall bumper crops that have affected prices."

"As Secretary of Agriculture John Block said recently, our farm economy is in a valley right now and needs some help to move even up the hill on the other side."

Seaton said Block had explored the use of private credit to supplement its own lending resources whenever possible. In addition, existing legal authority to reschedule or defer payments is to be used where practicable.

"We intend to be reasonable, just as Secretary Block ordered," Seaton said. "Our objective is to keep farmers in business. That isn't to say there won't be some who go out of business, because there will be, but we are going to use the best judgement we can and reasonable criteria in making our loan decisions."

Secretary Block said that borrowers who have made good faith efforts to pay their loans, who have maintained their loan security in good condition, who follow sound, recognized management practices, and who have a reasonable chance to succeed can reasonably expect FmHA to stay with them.

"We will be working with our borrowers and with the commercial lending institutions to overcome

these temporary problems," Seaton said. "Agriculture is basically healthy, just as the Secretary said, there is no question about it. We just have to move out of the present situation and dig in for the long run."

VA Q's AND A's

Q-What is the difference between VA disability compensation and disability pension?

A-Compensation is paid to veterans with disability rated 10 percent or more disabling, which was incurred in or aggravated during active military service. Pension is paid to needy war veterans who are permanently and totally disabled prior to age 65 or who have reached age 65.

Q-I bought a home recently with a GI guarantee between my wife and I. Now we have discovered some defects which the seller refused to fix. Can the VA help me?

A-The Veterans Administration cannot compel a seller to remedy defects or to fulfill a contract on an existing home. However, there is a one-year guarantee on a newly constructed home. Contact the nearest VA office for details.

Q-I am rated 10 percent disabled for service connected disabilities. Am I eligible for preference in civil service jobs?

A-Yes. Veterans rated as having service connected disabilities received ten preference points.
