## Trained KSP dogs sniff out drugs

"Balcar" and "Dog" two dogs trained to sniff out drugs such as cocaine, marijuana, hashish, and heroin, were called to the courthouse Wednesday after search efforts failed to turn up some marijuana reportedly hidden in the third floor rest room.

According to Sheriff William Taylor, the jailer, Jerry Anney, was led to believe a visitor to the jail had left the marijuana in the rest room, but a search turned up nothing.

The "drug dogs", property of the Kentucky State Police Narcotics section, and available upon request, were called for and successfully located the 4 or 5 grams of marijuana (valued at approximately \$10) inside a towel rack.

The young dogs, one found in a pound and one bought at state auction, were trained by KSP detective George Campbell at Fort Royal, Virginia. Campbell said the retrievers were trained much in the same manner as a bird dog. To be successful, he said, the dogs must have a frantic drive to retrieve and be able to get along well with people. He said Balcar and Dog will "work all day" they enjoy their job so much. The reward for a "find" is a towel rolled and tied, accompanied by a romp with a trainer to see who can "win" the game and get the towel.

Detective Paul Brooker of Dry Ridge accompanied Campbell and was in charge of one of the dogs.

## Fiscal Court approves \$55,200 garbage contract with Multi County Service

Rockcastle Counties will have someone to take care of their garbage, at least until January 1, 1983. The Rockcastle Fiscal Court accepted a bid of \$55,200 per year from William K. Bullen, Multi Co. Service, Monday morning during a special called meeting of the garbage situation, what to do about it and how to go about doing for the least amount of money has plagued the fiscal court ever since the newly elected officials took office January 4th.

However, on Monday morning Mrs. William K. Bullen, a representative for Multi Co. Service, met with the court to present a bid of \$4600 per month to pick up the garbage for the county. The bid, which was \$3,000 a month less than the first bid submitted by Multi County Service, got approval from each magistrate except Bill Wren, who abstained from the voting.

The County paid Multi Co. Service \$51,244 last year for the garbage collection.

William K. Bullen, Multi Co. Service was the only bid received by the county the last month after they had advertised for them. Multi Co. is presently handling the garbage because of an

extension granted them by the fiscal court from January 1st. The old contract was to expire on that date.

The new contract between the county and Multi Co. Service is not the same as the old one. The new contract will state that the county is responsible for keeping the area around the dumpsters clean and that the continuation of the contract will be completely based on revenue sharing. When and if revenue sharing from the Federal Government is cut out from the garbage contract will also be phased out.

The new contract will go into effect on March 1st and will run for one year with an option for another year.

County Attorney, James H. Lambert is currently working on an ordinance for the county that would prohibit the dumping of any garbage that is not bagged, prohibiting persons from other counties to dump and disallowing littering around dumpsters. Stiff penalties will be imposed on all three actions, according to Lambert, who told the court Monday that he would have the ordinance ready to vote on at their next regular monthly meeting on March 2nd.

Lambert business the court voted to purchase a used 4-wheel drive vehicle from the Ky. Department

of Mines and Minerals for use by Road Supervisor Paul Hansel. Hansel told the court that he had been to Frankfort to look at the 1977 Dodge Rams and that the bid was "bidding the vehicles to counties for \$1,800."

"It's kinda hard to get around in a 4-wheel drive vehicle in the winter time," Hansel said, "and we could use the truck to get parts and in every day work at the shop," he said. Fifth district magistrate Joe Clark made the motion to buy the truck and the rest of the magistrates agreed on the motion.

County Judge Executive Bob Jasper made a motion to Trial Court Clerk as a truck driver and part-time heavy equipment operator at \$3.75 per hour for truck driving and \$4.75 when operating the equipment.

Magistrate Donald Rowe seconded Jasper's motion and it carried unanimously. Robert Robinson, before the court to ask if they would remove the back row of seats in the county court room so there would be less confusion during District court, a time when the room is very overcrowded.

The court voted to move the seats and place them in the hallway for use by persons waiting for court.

The meeting adjourned.

## Violence in post war times

(From information collected and recorded in "Rockcastle Facts and Stories" by Ralph Griffin.)

The chronicle of such events as are about to be related is not a pleasant task for one who attempts to record them, nor is it anticipated that they shall make such pleasant reading. Should the lurid details be deleted from all history, however, the result would present a very imperfect picture of the past. The contrast presented by such happenings should at least make Rockcastle citizens thankful for conditions as they know them today.

In the year 1870, this county had come far since its organization in 1810. Much progress had been made in agricultural pursuits and some degree of prosperity had been brought about through the export of timber products and coal. Hard times had been brought to everyone during the Civil War period, but a railroad had since been completed, which promised inestimable benefits to an isolated section such as Rockcastle had previously been.

Kentucky had been torn by dissenting opinions during the War, almost more than any other state. Located as it was between North and South, violent political battles were fought over whether the Commonwealth should ally herself with the one or the other; these ended in an attempt to carry water upon both shoulders. Thousands of citizens enlisted in the Union Army and other thousands joined the Confederates.

Under such conditions, the Reconstruction period here was particularly hard for all concerned. Passions ran high, rigid political opinions were in violent conflict and the lawless conditions of the War period could not be corrected in a day.

At this time Rockcastle County was largely controlled by Confederate sympathizers. Numbers of the most prominent families had been represented in the Rebel army, and several sizeable battles and skirmishes had been fought upon Rockcastle soil. When the soldiers returned home from the victorious and from the defeated armies, neither side was in a mood for reconciliation. Many acts of violence were committed, feuds began between families which were carried on for years, masked marauders roamed the county at night to commit depredations against those of different political faiths. Altogether, it was a most unpleasant state of affairs.

The Negro slaves had all been freed, of course, but that fact was of minor importance here, as compared with its effect in the Southern states. Probably there were not more than four hundred blacks in the entire county, counting women and children, before the War. Most of these when released, departed for the north or chose to remain with their former masters in the capacity of servants. Decidedly there was no mass insurrections among them, no roving bands of negroes, no real colored outlaws and no race problem. Confederate sympathy was rabidly against the blacks, however, and times were perilous for the best of them.

Tom was a seventeen year old mulatto boy who had been left by his mother or had chosen to remain with his former master, Judge Pearl, who then owned what is now known as the Charles Lovell farm and surrounding territory, three miles north of Mt. Vernon. According to the custom of the day, the boy having claim to no other name was known as Tom Pearl. It was an unhappy day when Tom Pearl chose (Cont'd to P-12)

## State Legislature

By Senator John Rogers

The 1982 session of Kentucky's state legislature has reached its midpoint.

Today, I would like to briefly describe several of the bills which have been passed by the Senate.

Senate Bill 65, which passed by a vote of 35 to 0, seeks to prohibit the state Department of Finance from reducing any budget appropriation or allotment to the Kentucky Teacher's Retirement System.

This past summer the Brown Administration took \$9 million from the Kentucky Teachers' Retirement System.

The administration claimed that the \$9 million from teachers' retirement was an overpayment to the fund, was not needed to operate the retirement fund and was needed in other areas of state government, because of the budgetary shortfall.

Despite the administration's claims, many legislators, teachers and other concerned citizens were opposed to this bill.

Senate Bill 65 is a direct result of that opposition. Under the provisions laid out in this bill, the Brown administration or any future administration will not be allowed to reduce any legislatively mandated funding of the Kentucky Teacher's Retirement System.

tucky Teacher's Retirement System.

Senate Bill 224, which passed by a vote of 29 to 2, seeks to delete the requirement of a \$3,000 bond for auctioneers and set up an auctioneers' education, research and recovery fund.

Senate Bill 31, which passed by a vote of 36 to 0, seeks to require the establishment of a seven-member advisory board for the auctioneers' school for the Deaf at Danville.

Senate Bill 54, which passed by a vote of 31 to 2, seeks to prohibit any employer benefit plan from requiring involuntary retirement of anyone 40 to 70 years of age.

Senate Bill 138, which passed by a vote of 30 to 4, seeks to move Kentucky's May primary election to the fourth Tuesday in August beginning in 1984. Also, this bill would eliminate Kentucky's presidential primary election.

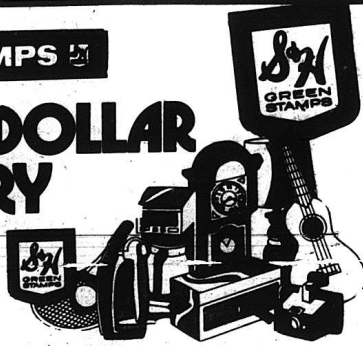

**GET ASSISTANCE IN PLANTING TREES**

Many Kentucky woodland owners would like some assistance in planting trees but don't know where to look. Fortunately, help is just next door.

Help can come from the County Extension Agent, who provides out of school training in multiple uses forestry, Christmas tree planting, windbreak planting, harvesting, marketing, business management, and safety. Or help can come from the Soil Conservation Service in the form of conservation plans and soils maps of your land.

Other agencies such as

P-4 Mt. Vernon Signal the Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Service (ASCS) can provide cost-share money to help pay up to 65% of the cost of planting the trees. Or a landowner could borrow the money through the Farmers Home Administration.

Technical assistance is offered by the Kentucky Division of Forestry through the Cooperative Forest Management Program. Under the CFM Program state employed professional foresters advise landowners on developing forest management plans including improvement of existing stands and advice on tree planting. In addi-

tion, they are involved in administering the Federal Forestry Incentives Program or cost sharing program.

The Division of Forestry also can provide high quality tree seedlings at a reasonable cost. These are produced at nurseries located at Gilbertsville, Dawson Springs and Woodsbend, where there is an ongoing tree improvement program underway to continually produce improved tree seedlings.

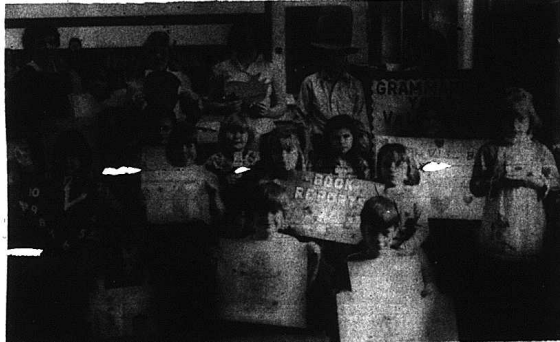

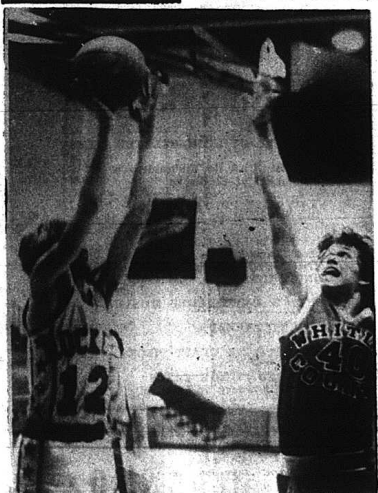

## Spring fire hazard season starts March 1

The official Spring Fire Hazard Season starts March 1 and ends May 15, according to Steve Bullen, Rockcastle County Ranger for the Kentucky Division of Forestry. During this period, weather conditions are such that the danger of forest fires is very great. For this reason, the law prohibits burning anything within 150 feet of any woodland before 4:30 p.m. during Fire Hazard Season. Other laws prohibit burning anything without first taking all necessary precautions to prevent the fire from spreading.

Last spring, Rockcastle County had 88 fires which burned a total of 3,055 acres. Most of these fires resulted from careless and illegal burning and could have easily been prevented.

"The Kentucky Division

of Forestry is again using airplanes both to spot forest fires and to detect violations of the law," stated Ranger Bullen. To help reduce the number of fires in Rockcastle County and to avoid paying a fine for illegal burning, Ranger Bullen offers a few suggestions. First, don't burn anything unless absolutely necessary. If you must burn

something, be sure to observe all Fire Laws, burn only on a day with no wind, and stay with the fire until it is completely out. For advice on burning safely, weather conditions, Fire Laws, or to report a forest fire, contact any Forest Ranger or call the Kentucky Division of Forestry office at London, phone 864-9396.

## Kentucky State Police activity report for January

During the month of January, the Kentucky State Police Post at London reports the following activity:

923 motorists were issued citations for traffic violations (including driving under the influence of intoxicants and moving hazardous violations); 524 persons were issued courtesy notices for faulty equipment and different traffic violations; 235 motorists were assisted with breakdowns, given tourist information, etc.

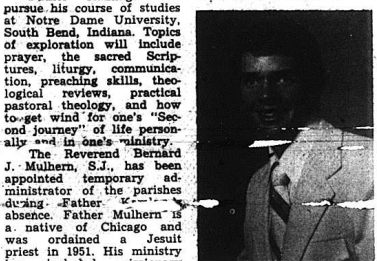

## Rev. Kamlage Granted Sabbatical

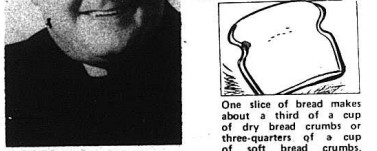

### The Thief on the Cross

"If one cannot be saved without baptism, how do you think the thief on the cross?" is a question asked frequently of gospel preachers and preachers have preached the terms of salvation under the Great Commission of Christ (Mk. 16:15-16; Acts 2:38).

Many reason (?) this way: "The penitent thief was not baptized and he was saved; therefore I do not have to be baptized to be saved." (Luke 23:32-43), readily admit that the thief was saved. However, his salvation has nothing to do with the question of whether baptism is to be required of you and me.

Every careful Bible student can see that the case of the thief is not an example to us regarding how to be saved. He lived and died under the Old Testament law of Moses and that law was "nailed to the cross" when Jesus shed His blood (Col. 2:14). Christ was alive, and while on earth, had the authority to forgive sins on His own terms (Mk. 9:8). A will (testament) is of force only after the testator dies (Heb. 9:16-17). As long as the thief is alive he may change his will as many times as he wishes. However, after one dies, the will is sealed and cannot be changed. Accordingly, after Christ died the blessings to be dispensed had to be according to His LAST will and testament. That will began to be probated on the day of Pentecost and it stipulated that all must "repent and be baptized..." for the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38). That will cannot be changed! We certainly could not expect this thief to submit to a baptism that came after Christ's death. He died before the Lord established
