Mayor names DeBorde acting head of Mt. Vernon's police department

The City of Mt. Vernon still does not have a full-time chief of police, but they do have an acting

Mayor Roland Mullins appointed Frank DeBorde, as acting chief of police at the city council's regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The action came after councilman Tom Welch made a motion to name Joe Howard chief of police, a job that has been vacant since Jim Durham resigned the position in January of this year.

Welch's motion gained a second from councilman Ernie Tolle. However, councilman Pete Hurd told Welch, "It's always been done by seniority and I think that is the way it should be done this time. These men won't have anything to look forward to if we don't do it by seniority," he said. Hurd's son, Ronnie, has the most seniority in the police department.

After his remarks, Hurd voted no on the motion to hire Howard and fellow councilman Joe Gentile did likewise. Councilman Conrad Parrett abstained from the voting.

Because of the absence of councilman Roger McClure, the voting ended in a tie and instead of breaking it, as is usual, Mayor Roland Mullins instead

asked city attorney Carl Clontz if he (Mullins) had the authority to appoint an acting police chief. Clontz told the Mayor that he felt he did and, with this, Mullins, proceeded to appoint DeBorde as acting chief.

"We've got a great deal of dissension on the council concerning this matter and I think it's gone on long enough," the mayor said, "so, I am appointing Frank for the present time with no increase in pay."

Very little other business was handled during the meeting except that the council brought to the council's attention by councilman Ernie Tolle that Edith Lainhart had reportedly purchased the Benfro Boat Dock lease from Sterling Hoskins.

The council had voted in an earlier meeting to have the city attorney bring a lawsuit against the Hoskins for alleged illegal activities from the boat dock site.

Mullins told the council that he probably he did not

know had contacted him and asked if it would be alright to go ahead and spend money on the boat dock fixing it up. The Mayor told the council that he told the lady to be at the meeting of the council to discuss the matter.

Mrs. Lainhart was not present at the meeting, she did call during the meeting and was told by City Clerk Mary McClure that the city attorney had recommended that she wait and not spend any more money on the dock for now.

The council also accepted the monthly fire department report presented by assistant fire chief Bud Cox, who told the council that the department would have to have a new base radii because the old one in use is over 20 years old and is almost inoperable.

The council decided to advertise for bids which are to be opened at the regular meeting of the council in May.

Rogers to seek second term

Congressman Harold Rogers has filed his papers with the Secretary of State seeking the Republican nomination for re-election to Congress from the Fifth Congressional District of Kentucky.

Hal Rogers was elected for his first term in 1980, filling the seat vacated by Dr. Tim Lee Carter. Surviving a tough Republican primary against ten opponents, Rogers went on to win the general election handily by defeating Democrat Ted Marcum by 58,000 votes.

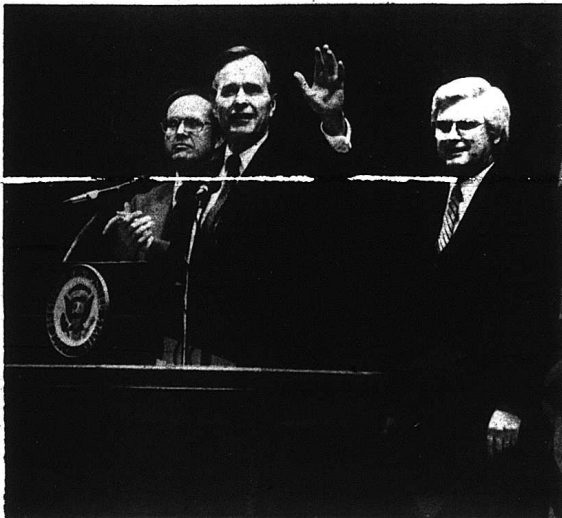
Congressman Rogers' first term of office has been marked by several special accomplishments. His 52 fellow Freshmen Republicans selected him to represent them on the prestigious Executive Committee on Committees. This Committee makes committee assignments for all Republican members of Congress.

Rogers then sought and

won a seat on the Energy and Commerce Committee, from which he has been an active proponent of increased use of coal, particularly in the area of coal exports. Late in 1981, he founded the Congressional Task Force on Coal Exports and now chairs that group.

In looking back over his first term in office, Rogers points with particular satisfaction to two areas in which he became involved. "Working with the team which saved the tobacco program was the awarding battle I've been in," Rogers commented.

He also points to the work of his Fifth District Task Force on Regulatory Reform with pride. This was a group of about 800 men and women put together by Rogers who met and submitted recommendations for specific regulatory reform to Vice President Bush's National Task Force on Regulatory Revision.

The ordeal of war: a private glimpse

War. The superlative degree of man's inhumanity to man, justified by those deranged heroes who produce it and force it upon others. The following story is about the enigma of war, of killing and of a young marine involved in both. He joined the Marines in 1964 at 17, unaware of the time or where Vietnam was or how it might come to make an indelible mark upon him.

In 1965, during his first full tour of duty in Vietnam, he was injured and when he got back to the United States on leave in 1966, he was glad it was over.

Following a stationing in California, the young Marine was sent to Hawaii and from there, with only nine months to go, he was settled aboard a troop carrier for a "float phase" which promised the Orient before his discharge, a change he welcomed.

After two days at sea, his battalion was notified by loud speaker that because of the surprise Tet Offensive, they were now on their way to Vietnam as one of the units selected to go.

He was on his way back to Vietnam. In anger, in rage, he threw his dress uniform overboard. He contemplated refusing, as six others did, to leave ship when it reached the Bay of Tonka, but could not face the possibility of six months in the brig. So, he was beaten. Finally, he wrote to his parents, knowing they would be crushed by the news and hating the prospect of the pain and worry for them.

The first stint in Vietnam made the trained Marine dread the upcoming one. The fighting had been mostly light contact with bands of Viet Cong who were farmers by day and guerrillas by night. The only thing familiar about the second tour was the jungle terrain. This time, they were fighting a trained North Vietnam army with guerrilla support and there was no let up to the fighting.

It was after several frustrating weeks of heavy fighting against an invisible

enemy with heavy U.S. losses that the incidents happened which were to change the course of events in young Deniz Allen's life.

Early in May 1968, during a night of particularly heavy fighting that kept U.S. forces penned down near DaNang, the sergeant of Allen's patrol mysteriously disappeared and left the men to fend for themselves.

Allen, who had sustained a leg wound in the fighting, took command and provided the leadership required. He "walked" the artillery around the patrol base and when the enemy persisted despite air bursts, he called in artillery rounds point blank upon his patrol base. It was this die anyway, for the enemy was quickly overpowering them. The barrage stopped and when the men reported Allen's bravery to a commanding officer, he was told he was being recommended for the Navy Cross, the second highest Navy decoration. He was then removed from the midst of the fighting and enrolled in NCO training school.

It was during this stretch of night-fighting an unseen enemy, surrounded by day by wounded, dead and dying buddies, that anger, frustration and mental strain mounted to the point that when Allen and men from his company finally caught five unarmed Viet men in two separate instances, they killed them.

He did not justify what he did. He says it was wrong to take the lives of those five men, even though they were later proven to be Viet Cong in war though, he says, he questions the validity of murder trials. War is murder. Vietnam was the first war in which one side imposed upon itself rigid regulations, handicaps and penalties from the onset. Allen, who admittedly lied in the slayings, was the first American soldier in Vietnam to be singled out and court martialed for civilian murders. He never received the Navy Cross. Similar charges against William Allen, which received national attention, were brought shortly following Allen's arrest.

The Marines make a "killing machine" out of a man, Allen says. In a book Allen wrote about his ordeal, he says the Marine Corps training, through which he went, left a deep mark on his mental processes.

Allen said he had observed killing rather than talking of prisoners as an almost daily occurrence on both tours and under two different commands. Some of the killings he had been involved in before the May 7th and 8th incidents. Allen did not and does not think this is right, but it is how things were. He does feel, however, that it was unfair that he was singled out as a scapegoat, possibly initiated by the humiliated, degraded sergeant who was trying to save face.

In his book FROM HEAVEN TO EARTH, Allen writes, "a country's ultimate crime is that of waging war and compelling her youth to fight and die for obscure reasons...war is always brutal and inhumane, a man may on occasion, act badly, but this does not mean that he is a bad man, for each has his day of poor judgement."

So the young Marine, who could not stand the thoughts of six months in prison and thus embarked upon his second tour, was placed in various cages, much like those built to house animals and was in other ways treated more like a hated animal than a human while he was incarcerated in Vietnam.

Ironically, the six Marines who had refused to disembark for a second tour in Vietnam a few months earlier were returned to Hawaii, pulled out of the infantry and served their remaining months on guard duty.

The first lawyer assigned to Allen by the military was replaced a few weeks later. He was relieved of Vietnam duty and returned to the U.S. His second lawyer talked him into pleading guilty to the murders with the hope of lighter sentence. On September 9, he was sentenced in Vietnam to life at hard labor and issued a dishonorable discharge. He could have gotten the death penalty. La-

Jury selected to hear evidence in rape case

In open court, Circuit Judge Phillip Walker read the charges which allegedly took place in Rockcastle County last March 29 involving 2 youths from Pulaiki.

Clarence Kirby is charged with first degree rape, kidnapping, third degree assault, first degree robbery, and sodomy.

Vince Pittman is charged with complicity to first degree rape, kidnapping, complicity to third degree assault, complicity to first degree robbery, and complicity to first degree sodomy.

Michael Joe McFerron is charged with first degree rape, kidnapping, complicity to third degree assault, complicity to first degree robbery, sodomy, and complicity to first degree sodomy.

Prosecution of evidence in the case began Wednesday morning.

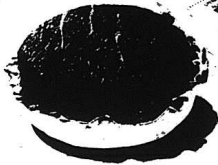

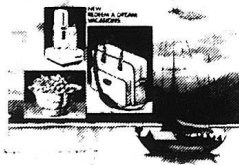

"Ordeal" Cont. From front page the sentence was reduced to 20 years.

After he was returned to the United States, Indiana supporters, including groups of Disabled American Veterans and various other groups, set up a trust fund for Allen's defense. The civilian lawyer who took the case developed such a genuine interest in it that he dropped his regular case load and worked on Allen's release almost exclusively for three years, accepting only \$100. He and Allen became close personal friends and still keep in touch.

All efforts to get Allen released through military

and governmental channels failed. Word of Washington, Allen says. His situation became very political and left him more than a little bitter. He was released by the parole board from the Naval prison in New Hampshire where he was being held after spending a total of 4 1/2 years imprisoned. This means of release left no mark on the military's methods of handling the situation.

Adjustment was hard for Allen when he returned to his hometown of Union, Indiana to a hero's welcome complete with a honor guard salute from a

veteran's group and applause from a crowd of well-wishers. Suddenly, after a long period of being treated like a cold-blooded killer, he was hero. Actually he felt like neither. He was frightened, still very young (23) and hesitant to re-enter the mainstream of life away from the security of his cell. His plan at the time, he now says, was to get a doctorate possible of philosophy and become a teacher. His ordeal is certainly nothing he would like to live over; however, the whole experience has served, he thinks, a good purpose. While in prison, he read and studied almost

constantly, obsessed with mind improvement and self-analysis. Following his release, he attended classes at the University of Indiana, taking mostly philosophy courses. In prison he digested the really good books, read the great philosophers, and usually was able to search out a prisoner with education and similar intellectual interests to discuss the new world of books with.

Allen began to mingle and become involved in living again. As he did, he gave up his determination to get a degree and keep to himself and overcame the recurrent suicidal fantasies which had

surfaced in his poetry and in the conclusion of his unpublished book. About three years ago, he moved with his wife, Sherry, a native of Indiana, back to Rockcastle County, the place of his parents' birth. He and his wife, who have two small sons, have built a new home here and he keeps busy working as a skilled carpenter. He left a successful sales manager position in which he made a lot of money. He says he decided to divorce himself "from things that are a strain." Once again, Allen quotes a Marine, "A Marine always and about 8 years ago he seriously considered going

back into the Marines as a drill instructor. "You have stupid loyalities," he says. "The Marines are the most efficient branch of service. I tend to block out the bad and remember only the good, the camaraderie and spirit of the corps."

He was told he would have to start a process to get his dishonorable discharge changed. It seemed more trouble than it was worth, so he dropped the idea.

The bitterness has waned, much of the inner conflict has subsided and admitted, Allen seeks and seems to have attained a measure of peace and calm, fourteen years after his war ordeal.

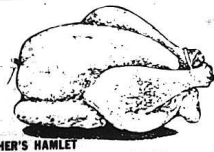

Save Time With Sewing Shortcuts

The new fabrics for 1982 are out and stirring up interest in sewing. If you have put off starting a sewing project because you think it will be difficult and time consuming, think again. Sewers have many ways to cut corners without sacrificing the quality of construction.

Organization is the key to time-saving. The best way to get organized is to have a permanent area for sewing that includes your sewing machine, ironing board and sewing equipment. Good lighting and a full length mirror make your sewing more enjoyable, also.

Think about your sewing project before you start. Read the pattern guide to determine what steps can be eliminated or changed. Use several times savers such as button loops instead of buttonholes and using a glue stick for some of your basting-be sure to test it on a scrap of fabric first.

Braid is a very attractive way to finish the outer raw edges of a jacket as well as to eliminate facings. If you are sewing on plaid or striped fabric, cut the pockets, collar, yoke and cuffs on the bias. Matching plaids and stripes adds many hours to sewing time.

Fusible webs and interfacings are a real asset to your sewing cupboard. Fusible (iron-on) webs are used to attach two pieces of fabric together and they are available in varying widths.

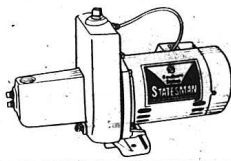

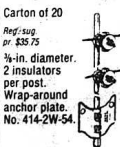

We are living in what might be correctly labeled a "Push-button" society. From coffee and pudding to television replays, nearly everything is "instant." We want it "immediately" if not sooner, and preferably, in easy-to-open packages that can be discarded with little effort.

When it comes to religion, many Christians have fallen into this quick and easy kind of thinking. We expect instantaneous answers to our prayers and immediate solutions to our problems. We want maximum results with a minimum of effort. And, we somehow think that we can become mature Christians overnight. But it just doesn't work that way.

In the matter of our spiritual improvement, there is no button marked "Instant Spirituality." Maturity is Here. The customs and habits of a lifetime are not always set aside instantly. We don't usually overcome a quick temper, a vulgar manner of speaking, or selfish attitudes without setbacks and disappointments. It takes time, hard work and patience to learn to walk by faith in every aspect of life.

The apostle Peter knew this, for he instructs Christians to

...add to your faith virtue; and to virtue knowledge; and to knowledge temperance; and to temperance patience; and to patience godliness; and to godliness brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness charity. (2 Peter 1:5-7). He added, "Wherefore the rather, brethren, give diligence to make your calling and election sure..." (2 Peter 1:10). His exhortation, therefore, suggests that to reach the goals God has for us, we must WORK AT IT!

Some of us are frustrated because we are not making the progress we would like, and may even be "down on ourselves" for our relapses into the old sinful way of life. If so, we should follow the advice of the apostle Peter. Be assured that God knows our desires to grow, and that He has heard our prayers.

Don't give up. If there were a button to spiritual growth, it would actually be marked: "DILIGENCE."

cap. Dad showed him some and the young man asked the price of one he seemed to like. "It is 50 cents", Dad said to him. The young man studied the cap for a few minutes, then burst out, "Nope, that's too much. Tell you what. I'll give you a half dollar for it." "So, no nodder my father and out went the fellow satisfied he had driven a sharp bargain.

Dad brought one of the first Model T Fords on Clear Creek, and had our home installed with a gas carbide lighting system that I remember as a child. Most of all, I knew him as a good Christian man who was a leader for progress in this community and I am very proud of him for a father. In 1913, a doctor in Beres who was treating my father, put the wrong medicine in one of his eyes and he lost the sight of it. But my father refused, what is commonplace today, to sue the doctor who had made the mistake by accident. In 1937, he sold out his store to Curlew Holt but later a Payne's Store was opened again.

son John, then Stanley took over from and in turn Howard until it was in the hands of a grandson, Billy Payne, at whose death the Payne's Store closed. Now I have my youngest brother Cleve runs the Payne Store on Clear Creek and it seems Dad left a heritage of his sons being men who followed in his footsteps in the business world. In his early business days, he was the Disputanta post office from Sherman Chasteen and it too, passed along from sock to son until the store until Disputanta was closed by the government in an economy move some years ago. Dad made his mark in the "sands of time" on Clear Creek and moved on, but his descendants are many in the land.

I am visiting up holidays of Clear Creek again of which I write next week.

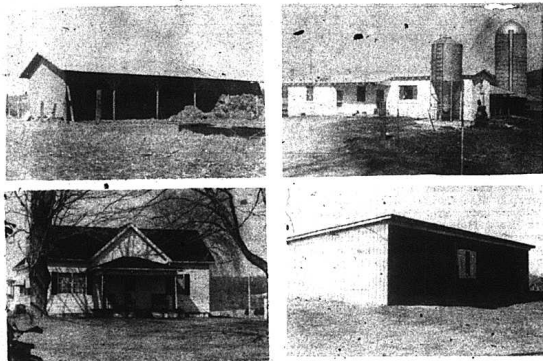

School Boards Say

Schools Face Funding Crisis

The 1982 Kentucky General Assembly will soon be making a decision of major proportions about the future of our students and public schools. This decision, in the form of state budget allocations for the 1982-83 biennium, will determine whether schools will face a crisis caused by insufficient operating funds. How did we get in this precarious position? First, schools, like individuals, suffer greatly from inflation. Some examples: The cost of textbooks has more than doubled in the last five years; the cost of fuel for buses has more than doubled in two years and the cost of school facilities has more than doubled over five years. The list could go on, but the important fact is that state support for public schools has not kept pace with rising costs.

The proposed executive budget for 1982-84, presented by Governor John Y. Brown, Jr. on January 7, does not provide the funding schools must have if they are to maintain even the basic education programs still in place after recent budget cuts. For example, the proposed budget would allocate \$1.79 million new dollars for current operating expense but another budget provision for calculating the number of special instructional units (music, physical education, remedial reading, art, etc.) and administrative units the state will fund takes away \$9 million from schools currently receive.

These are not the easiest of times in which to submit a balanced state budget. However, if Kentucky schools do not receive substantially more operating funds (funds not earmarked for teacher salaries) from the state, we can expect that at least 400 teachers will be laid off.

One proposed change in calculation of state support

would eliminate an estimated 412 classroom units. Caught between rising fixed costs and no significant increase in net operating revenue and with teacher salaries comprising more than 50 percent of the average school budget, there would be no alternative to teacher layoffs. The proposed 3 percent increase in current expense allocations over the 1981-82 budget probably would be largely absorbed just in paying the unem-

ployment benefits of laid-off teachers.

Our children will hardly benefit from fewer teachers, lack of instructional materials, older school buses, larger class sizes and poorly maintained schools, all the inevitable results of inadequate school funding.

Shock #2: This year, \$965,800,000 in Social Security benefits will be paid to 313,342 people living in other countries, 70% of whom aren't U.S. citizens!

For example, a total of \$910 had been paid into Social Security by four families of illegal aliens. As of late last year, those same four families had drawn over \$81,000 in S.S. benefits! \$70,000 of that went to dependents and survivors who had never set foot on American soil.

The bill I am backing will prohibit the payment of S.S. to illegal aliens. Benefits to non-citizens of the U.S. would be limited to a single lump sum benefit, equal to "the total

amount of S.S. taxes that they have paid plus interest."

Shock #3: Over \$60,000,000 can be saved each year by simple requiring that Social Security checks not be sent to people who have passed away. Right now, thousands of checks are sent out each month to those no longer living. It not only costs the government money just to send those checks out, but many survivors of the deceased are putting the checks into their own accounts!

The Social Security System has had a tough enough time without this kind of fraud and abuse. I am working to make sure

that these problems are taken care of so that those who earned and deserve that monthly Social Security check will get what they worked for.

AN ORDINANCE OF ROCKCASTLE COUNTY, Kentucky relating to the disposition and disposal of refuse

Be it ordained by the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, Honorable Bob Jasper presiding, with the following magistrates present and voting: Honorable Donald Rowe, Honorable Tom Denny, Honorable Ed Albright, Honorable W.H. Wren and Honorable Joe Clark:

1. That after March 12, 1982, in Rockcastle County, Kentucky, it shall hereby be illegal and in violation of this ordinance for any person or persons from any other county or municipality to bring or transport refuse, garbage or trash into Rockcastle County, Kentucky and place or deposit it in or around garbage containers provided for the citizens of Rockcastle County, Kentucky for Multi-County Services, Inc. pursuant to a contract between the said Multi-County Services, Inc., and Rockcastle County, Kentucky; further,
2. That after March 12, 1982, in Rockcastle County, Kentucky, it shall hereby be illegal and in violation of this ordinance for any person or persons to place any trash, garbage or refuse, other than household bagged garbage and household bagged garbage only, into any container provided for the deposit of garbage by Multi-County Services, Inc. pursuant to a contract between the said Multi-County Services, Inc., and Rockcastle County, Kentucky; further,
3. That after March 12, 1982, in Rockcastle County, Kentucky, it shall hereby be illegal and in violation of this ordinance for any person or persons to dump or deposit trash, refuse or garbage beside, near or around any container provided for the deposit of garbage by Multi-County Services, Inc. pursuant to a contract between the said Multi-County Services, Inc. and Rockcastle County, Kentucky.

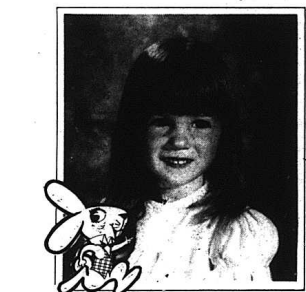

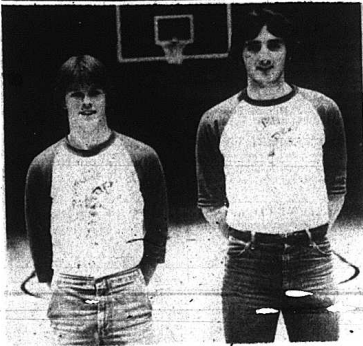
