

Funion webs and interfacings are a real asset to your sewing cupboard. Fusible (iron-on) webs are used to attach two pieces of fabric together and they are available in varying widths.

Use fusible web for hem-ming, securing facings, and positioning appliques or pockets. Fusible interfacings are used to give body or support to a fabric piece such as a collar or cutf. Keep amind that fusible Keep amind that fusible the facing side of the gar-ment or fabric.

While doing your laundry, pre-wash all washable fabrics such as fashion fabric, lining, zipper and trim.

when you have every-thing cut-out and seady to be stitched sew as you seams as possible-such as you seams as possible-such as both shoulder seams—with-out stopping to cut the thread. Feed garment plees through the sewing machine continuously and cut the threads at the end of the line of stitching. You will save thread as well as time.






