A tax-increase raising fierce debate before the state legislature is as familiar as a basketball tournament in March.

Of course, this March the basketball tournaments are once again on so too is a tax-increase issue. The Brown Administration has called upon the state legislature to generate \$186 million in new General Fund revenues by passing a package of tax and fee increases. The new revenue is then to be used for increased spending in education, human services and mine safety.

The cornerstone of the proposed tax package is a weight-distance truck tax. Basically, it is a graduated tax based upon the declared combined weight of heavy trucks and the number of miles they travel across the Commonwealth.

The Brown Administration claims that the weight-distance truck tax will generate an additional \$72 million each year of the biennium for the state transportation fund. The purpose here is to free-up over \$85 million over this period in General Fund revenues originally earmarked for the Road Fund.

Coming quickly on the heels of this proposal came legislative input on the issue. One plan seeks to reduce the administration's truck-tax by half and another plan seeks to accomplish the increased funding, without a tax increase, by funneling a share of severance-tax revenues into education.

Additionally, the administration's other new revenue sources include higher user fees, a transfer of the current tax on liquor from the retail to the wholesale level and increased earnings from the Commonwealth's cash investment.

On the expenditure side, the biggest spending increase is proposed for the elementary and secondary school foundation program, \$27.3 million in fiscal year 1982-83 and \$30.4 million in fiscal year 1983-84.

The major proposals for higher education is to provide debt service payments for a number of capital construction projects at the state universities.

Also, increased revenues have been proposed for the human resources budget to fund various health-service activities and the Universities of Kentucky and Louisville teaching hospitals.

As you can see, the state's \$10 billion two-year budget is beginning to take form, yet, all the final details still have to be hammered out.

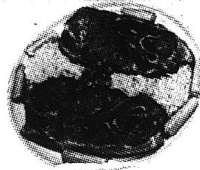

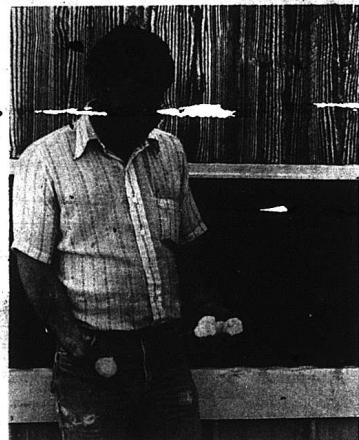

## The UK - Rockcastle connection is a strong one

A strong connection exists between Rockcastle counties and the University of Kentucky, according to information released on the university's services, programs and students.

"I think people might be surprised by the number of services UK provides to Rockcastle County," said UK President Otis Singletary. "There certainly is a strong link between the people and the university."

Currently, there are 20 students from Rockcastle on the campus at Lexington and another 11 are enrolled in the community colleges. There are 75 UK graduates and former students now living in Rockcastle County.

UK offers a wide variety of services in Rockcastle County through its Cooperative Extension Service, headquartered in Mt. Vernon.

Extension Service staffers—Tom Mills and Cheryl Whit—work with thousands of persons in the county each year, providing information and education programs on agriculture, home economics, 4-H and community development.

In 1980 alone, the Rockcastle County Extension Service made some 23,000 contacts to residents who had requested its services.

The Rockcastle County Extension Service programs are provided through tax revenues from county, state and national sources and the programs are localized to fit the needs of Rockcastle counties.

Individuals in the county can request information on any phase of agriculture, home economics,

and community development from the Extension Service. All information and educational programs are free.

Among the agricultural services provided by the Extension Service are soil sample and analyses and recommendations for growing home gardens, commercial crops and livestock. In addition, information concerning the economics of farm management and marketing is available.

Home economics programs in Rockcastle County are conducted through Homemakers clubs and through special interest meetings, newsletters, office visits and mass media activities. More than 120 Rockcastle residents belong to Homemakers clubs.

In youth programs, the Rockcastle County Extension Service worked with more than 1,200 youths in 1980 who participated in 4-H projects and activities.

Community development programs are conducted through local councils and other planning agencies and are based on the needs of the citizens.

Backing up the Rockcastle County agents with technical expertise are Extension specialists and researchers at University of Kentucky College of Agriculture in Lexington. Dr. Andrew J. Hlatt, chairman of the UK department of agronomy, is a native of Rockcastle County.

"For every dollar invested in research and Extension work, more than \$28 is returned to the citizens as a result of greater productivity made possible from the information received," said Dr. Charles Barnhart, dean of UK's college of Agriculture.

More than 19,000 Extension bulletins, 4-H booklets

and leaflets were distributed in Rockcastle County in 1980 by the College of Agriculture.

The UK hospital treated 207 patients from Rockcastle last year. Of these, 165 were adults and 42 were children. In the previous year, there were 157 admissions from Rockcastle, 111 adults and 46 children.

One graduate of the UK College of Medicine is now practicing in Rockcastle. Classes and workshops for doctors and other health professionals are part of the continuing education program of the College of Medicine. In the past two years, five people from Rockcastle have attended these classes.

Two Rockcastle County students are enrolled in the UK College of Pharmacy and four graduates of the college are now living in the county. During the past year, eight pharmacists from the county have attended continuing education programs in pharmacy.

Four graduates from the UK College of Dentistry are now practicing in the county and UK dental school graduates from Rockcastle County have received \$21,064 in financial aid at the college since 1974.

One graduate each from the colleges of Library Science and Allied Health Professions is now living in Rockcastle. Eleven high school students from the county visited the UK College of Home Economics for Career Days last year.

The Center for Business Development in the College of Business and Economics provided assistance to four business firms in Rockcastle in the past two years that resulted in the creation of five new jobs.

## Rape case given to jury Wednesday following lengthy five-day trial

Testimony began last Wednesday in Rockcastle Circuit Court of an alleged rape, sodomy, kidnapping, robbery and assault case brought against Clarence Pittman and Michael Joe McFerron, all of Rockcastle County by the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Pittman, 17, and McFerron, 18, are being tried as adults along with Kirby, who is 21.

Steven Strunk and Jason Biggs, both 17 and both of Somerset, testified in opening day testimony, before a jury of 7 men and 5 women, that three youths terrorized and robbed them and kidnapped their 15-year-old friend after they stopped for a soft drink at Children's Service Station at the junction of Hwy. 461 and 150 on way home from a rock concert in March of 1981.

Strunk, the prosecution's first witness, said that when they pulled into the closed station, around 11:30 p.m., McFerron and Pittman were in the parking lot and Strunk asked them for change.

Kirby gave him the change and one of the youths asked Strunk for a marijuana cigarette, Strunk testified and when he didn't have a "joint" (marijuana cigarette) Pittman became angry and a scuffle ensued.

Strunk told the court that he and Biggs were both beaten and one youth rifled the purse of one of the girls. Strunk said one of the youths kept demanding an additional \$20.

He also testified that everyone then calmed down

and McFerron apologized for the beatings; however, Strunk went on to say that the 15-year-old girl was dragged from the car forced into a car driven by Pittman.

Strunk told the court the three youths instructed him and Biggs to drive down 461 to a side road. He said that after the two cars arrived at Skaggs Creek Church, he, Biggs and Elizabeth Spurlock (the other passenger in the Strunk car) were instructed to leave the church for an hour or else, "you'll never see the (15-year-old) girl again."

Strunk told the court that the three of them left the car and returned to Mt. Vernon where they found two law officers — a state trooper and city policeman. Police officers, with the three teenagers in the car, raced back to the church where, according to Strunk they floundered in the car driven by Pittman and containing their friend.

Strunk, who remained calm throughout three-and-a-half hours of testimony, said that when the car attempted to leave, the Mt. Vernon police officer shot out the tires. At that point, Kirby, who was later apprehended by then Commonwealth Attorney Lester Burns and a detective, fled on foot through a graveyard, Strunk testified.

Strunk said that the fifteen-year-old girl, named and hysterical, tumbled out of the car, screaming for her father.

Police then arrested Pittman and McFerron and summoned an ambulance for the girl, who was taken to the Rockcastle County

ty Hospital where she was treated and released.

On cross-examination, defense lawyers, Carl G. Holt, William Gary Crabtree and Bill Chambliss, hammered at inconsistencies in the youths' testimonies from the juvenile hearing last year to the present trial.

The defense contended that the girl went willingly with the three youths.

On Thursday morning, the prosecution's fourth witness, Mt. Vernon Police Officer Ronnie Hurd testified that when he arrived at Skaggs Creek Church, he saw a "scared little girl."

Hurd told the court that the three of them found the fifteen-year-old girl crying and saying she wanted her daddy. "Somebody help me, please, they've raped me," she said, according to Hurd.

Another witness for the prosecution, Elizabeth Spurlock, testified that she was robbed, last summer, Biggs and Steven Strunk were beaten and that the fifteen-year-old girl was forced to get into the other car.

The fifteen-year-old alleged rape victim testified Friday that she submitted to sex acts with the three youths in the parking lot of the secluded church last year in fear of her life. She was the first witness for the prosecution during the third day of the lengthy trial.

The girl testified that two of her friends had already been beaten and one of her friends robbed and she had been told she would be killed. She said the friends returned too early. "I didn't want them to hurt me, I didn't want to die," she told.

She also told the court that she was forced to get into the car with the three Rockcastle youths at the service station. She said her three friends were ordered to lead the way in their car down 461 to Skaggs Creek Church and that, when they got the

## Local Epidemic of Influenza

An illness much akin to the old fashioned influenza is being treated by local doctors and observed by school officials in the Mt. Vernon Elementary School. Last Friday 196 students were absent from the grade school and Monday morning 126 absences were reported.

Local physician, Dr. G.W. Griffith, became aware early last week of the epidemic, which so far seems to be confined to the Mt. Vernon area. According to Griffith, most often children have been stricken with the symptoms of high

temperature, dizziness, aching muscles, sore throat and coughing.

The symptoms are more like the old influenza, Griffith said, last longer and more severe than the usual 24 to 48 hour illness people usually call "flu". Antibiotics are being prescribed in some cases, he said.

School officials at Mt. Vernon Elementary School said that many children are being held ill at school and some students are returning to school too soon after having had the illness.

**Public meeting for community land trust held at Livingston**

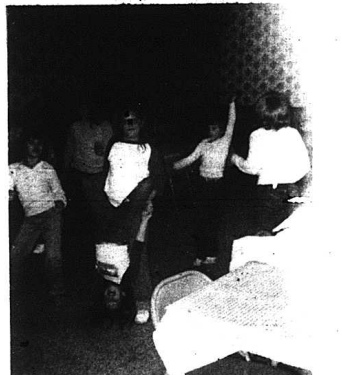
Staff of the Rockcastle Resource Center and guests from Tennessee presented the possibilities and vision of a community land trust at a public meeting in Livingston Tuesday, March 9.

A three-dimensional map of one hundred acres of land that has already been purchased in Rockcastle County was unveiled. Four residents of Rose's Creek shared their story of three years of work on organizing a land trust in Tennessee. Those in attendance agreed that the 100 acres, meant to be organized by local citizens, could indeed be useful in meeting Rockcastle County needs.

The next organizational meeting will occur on Tuesday, April 6 at 7:00 p.m. in the Livingston City Hall. One agenda item will be planning a community picnic to be held on the land trust to give people

an idea what the land is like. Anyone interested in being part of the organizing committee or knowing more about the land trust is invited to the April meeting or call 453-3115.

There are currently about forty land trusts already existing in the United States. Land in trust is never sold or individually owned, but held by a board made up of people who live on the land and other interested local people. People who otherwise cannot find land and who agree to take care of the land can be given 99 year leases to house sites. Any houses or improvements are owned by the lease holder who builds them. The land, however, remains in trust for the benefit of present or future communities.

An idea called Quality Improvement Circles, which experts are hoping will help reverse America's declining productivity, is being tried at Lexington Blue Grass Depot Activities. The depot's first Quality Improvement Circle (QIC) was started in October by the guard force at LBDA.

This March, Manuel Shepherd of Rockcastle County, a security police with the Blue Grass Depot and the provost marshal in charge of security for LBDA Capt. Lee Remond attended the 1982 fourth annual Convention of the International Association of Quality Circles sponsored by the Gateway Chapter in Louisville, Missouri. Approximately 3,000 persons from across the nation attended the convention held at the Stouffer's Riverfront Towers in St. Louis.

QIC is based upon two suppositions: a line employee knows how to do his particular job better than a manager, and a group of people working together are more likely to solve a problem than people working as individuals.

Circles are composed of members of a "related work" group meeting regularly to identify, analyze and assist in resolving problems encountered in the performance of their jobs. However, circle activities are not limited to problems and many circles choose to address potential improvements to things

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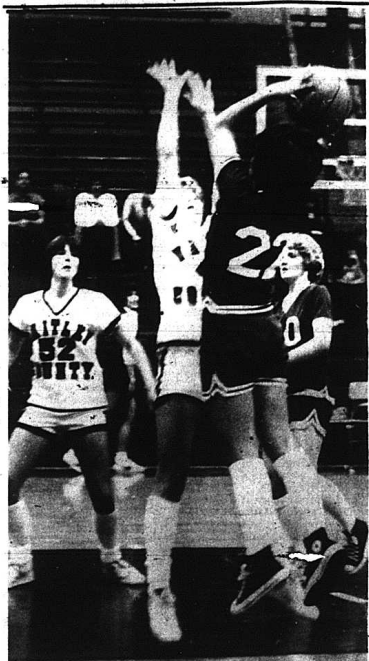

## FISHING REPORT

Fishermen are beginning to catch a few black bass with water temperatures reaching the 50 degree range at several of Kentucky's larger lakes. The lake-by-lake rundown, compiled from reports by conservation officers:

around shallow cover and drop-offs at 10-18 feet; in tailwaters, catfish and crappie fair; murky, rising slowly, 1/2 foot above winter pool, 42 degrees.

Barkley: crappie fair 12-15 feet deep over submerged cover; murky, rising slowly, 1/2 foot above winter pool, 44 degrees.

Nolin: black bass slow on jigs; clear to murky to muddy, rising, two feet above winter pool, 50 degrees.

Barren: crappie fair around submerged cover in headwaters; black bass slow with crankbaits; murky to muddy, rising, 10 feet above winter pool, 50 degrees.

Green: black bass slow with jigs around drop-offs; crappie slow in submerged cover; murky, rising slowly, at winter pool, 48 degrees.

Rough: crappie fair around submerged cover in heads of creeks; murky to muddy, rising slowly, one foot below winter pool, 46 degrees.

Herrington: crappie fair near submerged cover in tributaries; black bass slow with jigs on rig and cast combinations off points and steep banks; clear to murky, rising slowly, seven feet above winter pool, 45 degrees.

Dale Hollow: crappie fair in submerged cover about eight feet deep; white bass fair on spinners and jigs in tributaries; clear to murky, rising slowly, at normal pool, 49 degrees.

Cumberland: walleye and white bass fair to good in South Fork; crappie fair around stick-ups in upper and lower lake; in tailwaters, trout fair to good (heavy flow from generators); clear to murky, rising, six feet below the timberline, 48 degrees.

Laurel: trout good trolling medium and deep runners; black bass slow on spinnerbaits; clear to murky, stable, one foot below winter pool and 45 degrees.

Cave Run: crappie fair around stick-ups in headwaters; black bass slow jigging in shallow cover; clear to murky, stable, one foot above winter pool, 50 degrees.

Grayson: black bass and crappie slow; murky to muddy, rising, five feet above winter pool and 42 degrees.

Buckhorn: black bass slow jigging nightcrawlers; crappie slow in submerged cover; murky to muddy, stable, at winter pool and 50 degrees.

Dewey: crappie slow; muddy, rising, at winter pool, 57 degrees.

Fishtrap: crappie slow; murky to muddy, stable, at winter pool and 52 degrees.

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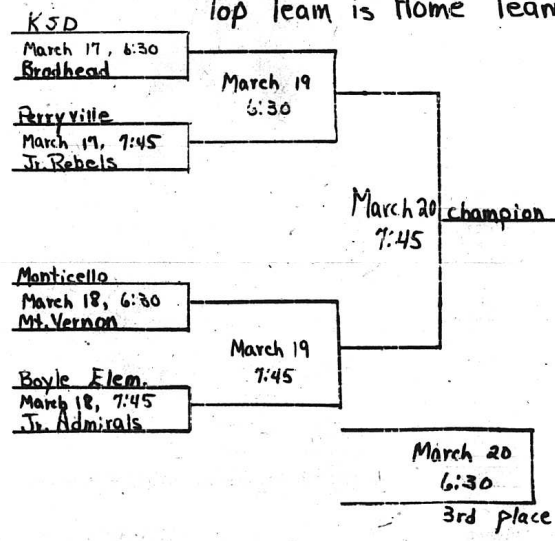

The company will resurface the road from Ky. 490 to just south of the Burr interchange, a distance of 6.8 miles.

The contract also involves installation of new guardrail.

That simply could be better. Though relatively new to the United States, quality circles have been a prominent feature of Japan's business life since the early 60's. As American companies watch their productivity rates spiral downward, they began studying what Japan was doing differently. They were pleased with the idea of the quality circles. Lockheed in 1973, became the first company to try circles and by the end of the year, the company estimated it had saved \$3 million, six times the cost of operating the circles.

Since then, other major U.S. companies and the Army have embraced the idea with positive results.

church, she heard Pittman tell her three friends to leave for an hour or they would never see her again.

"I screamed, I was scared to death because my friends were leaving me," she said, as she cried. The fifteen-year-old broke down twice during her two-and-one-half hours of testimony.

On several occasions, she draped herself across the rails of the witness box to demonstrate positions she said she was forced into in the car and to illustrate the kind of

shoes she was wearing that night.

She went on to testify that she saw the church, Kirby poured whiskey in her hair and face and that she was forced to commit sex acts with the three.

"I didn't resist as much as I could have because I could have been killed," she testified. She said she tried to push them away, but otherwise did not resist because she was scared.

On Tuesday morning of this week, after three days of prosecution witnesses, the defense began with their side of the case.

The defenses' first witness was Michael Joe McFerron, who told the court that the fifteen-year-old girl went willingly with him, Kirby and Pittman to the first time the hearing her not testified that he did not know where the two cars were going when they left the service station on 461. Pittman arranged the meeting at the church, McFerron later testified.

McFerron told the jury that he heard Pittman tell the other Somerset youths that they could leave and go anywhere they wanted for an hour.

McFerron said he never introduced himself to the fifteen-year-old girl and the first time when the police pulled up at Skaggs Creek Church.

"Oh, my daddy's going to find out," the girl said when the police pulled up, according to McFerron's testimony.

During his two hours on the stand, McFerron told the jury that the girl went willingly from the service station in the car driven by Pittman, around 1 a.m.

Kirby nor Pittman took the witness stand in their defense and defense attorneys, only called two more witnesses before opening the floor for rebuttal by Commonwealth Attorney Benny Ham and deputies Mike Henry and Ray Balliff.

Closing arguments were heard Wednesday morning and the case was turned over to the jury after four-and-a-half days of trial which was conducted before a packed courtroom daily.

The case was heard before Circuit Judge Phillip K. Wicker.

## Medicare general enrollment period now on

The end of March is the enrollment period for the medical insurance part of Medicare. Bob Anderson, Social Security manager in Richmond, said recently.

People who passed up the change for this protection, or who had it and dropped out, can again sign up, if they do so by March 31. Protection for people who sign up during this period will start next July 1.

### TIMBER PRODUCTION

New laws have brought incentives back for timber production.

In October, 1980, Congress enacted and the President signed a new law of major importance to industrial landowners. In many ways it is the most beneficial tax legislation since passage in 1944 of tax law changes allowing capital gains treatment of timber.

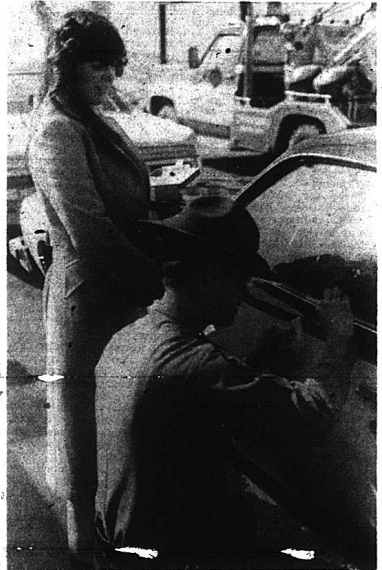
The new law permits owners of qualified timber property to deduct from the gross income one-seventh, qualified capitalized reforestation expenditures over a seven year period. Up to a total of \$10,000.00 of such expenditures incurred during each taxable year can be deducted. In addition, the law allows a 10 percent tax credit up to \$1,000.00 in the year in which the expenditure is made. The new measure will principally benefit small and medium sized landowners.

A detailed explanation of the new reforestation tax incentive is available from the Forest Industries Committee on Timber Valuation and Taxation, 1250 Connecticut Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20036.

Also being changed over the next five years are the federal income taxes on estates. These limits are being raised every year for the next couple of years. This should mean a better deal for woodland owners to pass their property on to their heirs without having to sell the estate to pay taxes.

Remember also when selling your timber you may deduct costs relating to the expense of sale, operating cost of your timberland and any capital expenses.

## Ford's bill passed by House on 71-10 vote

House Bill 484, introduced and sponsored by State Representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon was passed by the House of Representatives on March 11th by a vote of 71 to 10.

House Bill 484 will require restaurants, cafeterias and other types of food service establishments in Kentucky to display a

choke-saving technique poster in a location conspicuous to employees.

The bill will also require the department of human resources to provide the posters to the local health department for distribution to food establishments free of charge.

In explaining the bill on the House floor Repre-

sentative Ford stated, "This is a good bill that will help save lives, especially when you consider that 57 lives were lost in Kentucky alone, due to food related choking."

"I also think it is important to mention that many lives have been saved across the county be-
