leads to the Chastain Graveyard. Here I reached the home of Jessie and Fairy Robinson Cope. He is the son of Frank, now deceased, and the grandson of Dicy Cope, who was a true "old timer" of this region.

Jessie and Fairy, both have reached the age of 53, live in a modern home surrounded by a chain link metal fence, which I thought maybe was to keep

them "invited" me in with that friendly, mountain gesture of making you welcome. I know they have worked to make a living but neither seem to show any sign of age. They have lived here at the foot of this steep hill for 30 years. Jessie has been in construction work for the past 17 years, driving out to a job as so many of the people, men and women of

the hills, do but he says inflation "flooded" his job the past year and he will farm some. Fairy raises a nice garden ever year (I must visit them again in the late summer) and does lovely handwork. Now Fairy and Jessie are the parents of two children, one of whom is Darlene Clark. They too have spring water piped into their home. Could there be something in that, I thought, as I looked at the mother and remembered the daughter.

As I was leaving, Jessie gave me some facts to think upon. "Do you know you never see a mule team doing farm work around on Clear Creek anymore? I'm the only man who farms without a tractor or any of the machinery that goes with it. I still use old time methods of harvesting and with a mule team, he informed me. Then I realized what he had said was true for I had not seen a team of mules, nor horses, nor a wagon, pulled by them since I had returned to Rockcastle Hills! That part of my childhood has gone forever. They are replaced by dozens of trucks which travel this road daily.

Now there are many pretty women on Clear Creek as well as handsome men and the ideas of the clear, cold springs may be having something to do with it (too bad John and I left here) has crossed my mind. Could that also be the reason why Bluford Payne, of Royal Oak, Michigan; Floyd Chastain of Lebanon, Ohio; Clay Gabbard and Edd Croucher of Berea feel sorry that they too, "left" too early. Gives you something to think about.

max rose over Lomar Hill, I went up the steep road and came to a large log house built by another "old timer" Ott Finnell. It sits out on a flat top of one of the hills and is owned by Bill Finnell of Berea who was a Clear Creek boy going around with his big toe tied up like the rest of us did when we skinned it on a rock years ago. They say

he comes back to drink spring water! Here I found Jean Payne, who was the wife of my deceased brother, Stanley. Their two children, Billy and Patty, both passed away at an early age, leaving JEAN to carry on alone. But Jean wouldn't leave the hills even though relatives and friends told her it was best. For her family memories lie in Rockcastle's hills and she stayed working as a postal clerk and was the last Payne to be connected with the old Disputanta Post Office. She stood by a postal inspector closed its doors forever since her son, Billy Payne, my Dad's grandson, was the last official postmaster at Disputanta. A legend is ended.

JEAN is now one of

those driving to Berea daily with Judy Miller where both are employed. She has a companion, Dorothy Raines who stays with her and rides the school bus to Mt. Vernon where she is in her last year of high school then will set stall out into the big business world. As a wife and mother, JEAN did such a good job, I feel the Lord wanted her family with him. Now she gives that devotion to her grandchildren which her son and daughter left her in this

world.

When a woman is speaking to you, listen to what she says with her eyes.



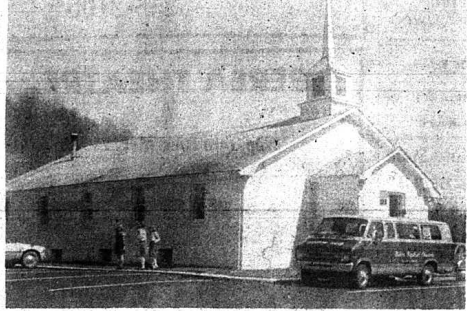

## Judge Wicker addresses the MBPA Tues.

The Honorable Judge Phillip Wicker opened his address to the Mount Vernon Business and Professional Association Tuesday morning by saying that the group would have the rare opportunity, following his remarks, "to subject a judge to cross examination."

Wicker said the public, for the most part, is in the "dark about our court system and the average citizen wonders if the present court system is worthwhile."

He continued by giving a brief history of the Kentucky Court System and the changes brought about by the 1975 amendment which reorganized the Kentucky court system.

Wicker said that the courts are sending more people to the penitentiaries than ever before, but the streets are still full of habitual offenders and notorious whiflers.

The reason is, he says, Kentucky has only three penitentiaries, two for men and one for women.

He said that the federal courts have ruled they are overcrowded and that the population must be reduced. In order to keep prison population down, the state has bought farms and forests on which are not working well enough, he said. The method whereby prisoners are able to alleviate the problem best is "bureaucratic" parole boards which hear requests and grant or deny parole to "the extent of prison by juries or judges."

Correction officials are forced to "juggle criminals" in and out of penal institutions which results in some 90% of those sent to prison being released well in advance of the sentence.

To emphasize his point, Wicker showed members some of the notifications received in the last few months of former prisoners who have been convicted in his court who have recently been released. Of the eleven, five were convicted murderers. He said he had a file cabinet full of such notices.

Wicker recommends building more prisons. He believes a better deterrent to crime would be keeping prisoners in the state penitentiary 10 years if the sentence is 10 years.

"I have not seen anyone rehabilitated yet. The first thing they do (officials) do is furnish them (inmates) with a typewriter and a law library and they immediately become legal experts...I begin getting a barrage of petitions."

He concluded by saying that judges, along with public health, personnel system which in many cases is out of the hands of the state court.

He also feels strongly that nobody, including federal judges, should be appointed for a term.

Wicker, who ran unopposed in 1975, is up for reelection in 1983.

## Drowning claims two former residents

Two former Rockcastle County residents were victims of a drowning last August near Lake near Harriman, Tennessee.

The bodies of Floyd Knuckles, 37, and his six-year-old son, John Henry, were recovered around 7:40 a.m. Saturday by the Roane County, Tennessee rescue squad, according to Roane County coroner, Clyde Houston.

Houston said that Knuckles, his wife, June, their two sons, John Henry, 17-year-old Alvin and their 11-year-old son, Tennessee man, put their boat in the lake at the KOA campground near Kingston, Tennessee sometime Friday afternoon.

The party immediately ran into waves and experienced difficulty getting back to shore and the boat capsized, Houston said.

Houston said that one son, Alvin, apparently was able to swim to shore and the boy's mother, June was picked up by another boat. The 51-year-old man also managed to survive. Knuckles and his son John Henry, never surface after the boat capsized, June

Knuckles was taken to the Harriman General Hospital where she was admitted for treatment.

The rescue squad along with volunteers searched for the two bodies until around 9 p.m. Friday night when darkness hindered the operation and they were forced to cease dragging operations until Saturday morning when the bodies were recovered.

Knuckles and his family left Rockcastle County approximately five years ago to move to Tennessee.

His wife, June is originally from Orlando, Florida. Floyd Knuckles was born in Rockcastle County on September 6, 1944, the son of Sarah, Elizabeth Knuckles and the late John Henry Knuckles and was a masonry contractor and a member of the Victory Temple Pentecostal Church in Lenoir City, Tennessee.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. June Helton Knuckles and one son, Alvin Knuckles both of Mascot, Tennessee; his mother, Mrs. Sarah, Elizabeth Dalton and his step-father, Mr. Barney Dalton of Route 3,

## Berea Hospital announces \$7.1 million project for expansion and renovation

The Beres Hospital Board of Directors announced today that its \$7.1 million Program for Progress is underway to build a 40,000 square foot addition to the hospital, while renovating the existing facility.

The four story addition will feature 67 acute care beds and all patient rooms will have toilet and bathing facilities, a larger mother's Emergency Room with private consultation rooms for patients and their family, a much expanded Clinical Laboratory to keep pace with the rapid advancements in medical technology. Also featured in

the new addition is the X-Ray Department and an enlarged Surgical Suite which is located conveniently to ICU/CCU (including 6 special care beds), and ancillary services.

The renovated sections will be used for hospital support services, doctors' offices and the Berea College Health Service. "This will replace many existing services and alleviate crowded conditions under which we have been operating for many years," says Hospital Administrator, David Burgio. "Our purpose is to insure that we are operating for our community and service area, the most modern up-to-date facility we possibly can."

Total cost of Berea Hospital's Program for Progress is \$7.1 million which includes interim financing costs. \$6.1 million is being financed through a bond issue and will be repaid from the hospital's operating revenues.

\$1 million is the amount being sought from the businesses, foundations, and individuals who have demonstrated by their support of Berea Hospital, their commitment to having quality health care close to home.

Berea Hospital is the primary acute care facility for the counties of southern

## Jury returns verdict late Wednesday in rape case

Kidnapping and robbery charges were dropped last Wednesday by Judge Phillip Wicker from the list of charges in the original indictment against three Rockcastle county men involved in the March, 1981 rape of a fifteen year old Somerset girl.

The seven man, five woman jury had heard five days of testimony in the case when it received instructions, heard closing argument and began deliberation Wednesday afternoon.

After nearly two and one half hours of weighing testimony in closed chambers, the jury found Clarence Kirby, 22, guilty of first degree rape and recommended he be sentenced to 10 years in the penitentiary. He was found not guilty of third degree assault and first degree sodomy charges.

Vincent Pittman, 17,

was found guilty of complicity to first degree rape with a recommended sentence of 12 months and fine of \$500 and first degree sodomy with 90 days recommended confinement. Sentence is to be served in the county jail.

Michael McFerron, 18, was found guilty of complicity to first degree rape with sentence recommended at 12 months; sodomy, with a \$500 fine and a sentence of 12 months and first degree sexual abuse, 90 days.

Sentence is to be served in the county jail. McFerron and Pittman were found not guilty of third degree assault. The assault charges against the three grew out of the fact that they allegedly hit two teenage friends accompanying the rape victim.

## On the campaign trail with an old pro

Charlie Carter was an old time Kentucky politician who ran for various offices in Rockcastle County numerous times. Sometimes he won, sometimes he lost, but he carried with him all appreciation of people and appreciation of people.

To attest to this, we retell a few stories from the many he recorded for his children and others to enjoy.

Many are his recollections of "politicking," like the following stories. The names are changed.

It seems that after doing some campaigning on his own in the county, Charlie came back into Mt. Vernon to get with a couple of highly successful politics, Joe Penn and Sam Dunn and going to the Crooked Creek section, so he could learn something about politics.

While waiting around in the courthouse office of Joe Penn, an old preacher came in. It was raining that day, and cold. After a few minutes of sitting, Joe called Sam and the preacher into a side room with Charlie following. Joe brought out a quart of moonshine and passed it around. When it got to the preacher, he said he believed he would take a sip as he was wet and it might keep him from taking a cold. The jar continued to be passed around with the preacher sipping a sip each time everyone else did.

That afternoon, on horseback, the four started toward Crooked Creek. About nine miles from town, they came upon a

church having a revival meeting. The time was about 7:30 and Joe, the more reserved politician of the group, said, "Boys, we better stop. It wouldn't look right for us to go on and church going on." About the time they got in and settled, the minister spotted the guest preacher among the four and asked if he didn't want to say something.

The preacher stood up and said, "Yes, I have a little confession to make. Brothers and sisters, this morning I went to Mt. Vernon. It was raining when I got there so I went into Joe Penn's office and while I was there, Joe got out a quart of moonshine and Sam and that young lark back here (pointing at Charlie) all got to sipping and I'll confess I got a very little too much as you can see."

Joe said, "H... let's go."

They proceeded from there back to town with Joe pessimistic and convinced they were all ruined.

Back in town they relate the event to a third politician who said he would take \$10 from each of the three to give to the preacher so that everybody would forget about it. Joe and Sam gave him the ten, but Charlie said he didn't have it to spare since "it was under the Hoover administration."

Charlie lost the race but Joe and Sam won by a good majority. Charlie said he learned an important lesson. "You have to have money to make a race on... sometimes plenty of it."

Charlie stopped to talk

election with a woman who had been a widow for several years. While he was there on the porch, an old lady named Floyd rode up. Floyd's wife had died about 2 or 3 months before and he was actively seeking a new wife.

Charlie tried to talk election with Floyd, but Floyd had clearly come to see the lady. The lady blushed, but old Floyd came quickly to the point still seated on his horse. "I want a wife and I'll tell you what I've got. I got a big white house and crib full of corn. Think you want to get married?"

The lady said no that when she got married she wanted a man, not a big white house and crib full of corn.

Floyd turned his horse around and hollered back, "All right, I'll go on and see Suzie Bue. Just thought I'd give you a chance."

Charlie stopped by one afternoon to talk with a woman who was sitting on her front porch. After talking with her for awhile and not getting the promise of her vote, Charlie decided to try another angle, so he began to brag on the magistrate that lived near her. After he said several nice things about the man, she finally said she wished the magistrate would get a cancer on his neck and it would eat his head off. Upon some investigation, he learned that the man had sent her to jail for 30 days. "Sometimes a person just doesn't know what to say or do to get a vote."

### Protecting Woolens in Storage For Summer

Soon you will be putting away your winter clothing and extra blankets when warmer weather comes. If the articles are wool or partly wool you will want to protect them from clothes moths and carpet beetles.

Although the articles may be out of your sight, these fabric pests have no difficulty finding articles that are not properly protected. The pests can follow the perspiration odors that come from worn clothing and the pests prefer to attack articles with such odors.

Dry cleaning articles before putting them away will remove these odors and also will destroy any pest eggs that may be hiding in pockets and seams. If the articles are not dry cleaned that should be thoroughly brushed and hung in bright sunlight for several hours to get rid of any pest eggs. Turn pockets inside out and pay attention to seams when brushing.

Woolens and part-wool fabrics should be stored in airtight bags containing moth balls or moth crystals. Moth balls or crystals will repel pests from infesting fabrics, but they may not kill or chase out the pests already doing damage. Cedar chests without the addition of moth balls are not sufficient protection against fabric pests.

Some people object to moth

repellents when they use the articles again. A repellent, they hang Vapona resin strips in the storage closet. The strips are sold under various trade names, such as No-Pest-Strip. An insecticide vapor is slowly released from the resin or plastic strip, and it kills small insects in the storage space. If this method is used for controlling fabric pests, do not put the clothing in an airtight container. The airtight container will only protect the pests from the insecticide vapor. The vapor is virtually odorless to humans.

### How to Wash An Electric Blanket

If you've been putting off washing that electric blanket because you've lost the instructions and are not sure quite how to do it, here's how.

First disconnect the control and shake the blanket to remove dust. Then pretreat soiled binding and stains by using a soft brush dipped in mild detergent. Scrub lightly. Next, use the gentle cycle of your washer, warm water, and just a few minutes agitation. A short spin cycle will remove most of the water. NEVER put an electric blanket through a wringer. Line dry over two parallel lines, straightening the edges and corners gently. Machine dry only if instructions from the manufacturer recommend it.

If you handwash your blanket, use a plumber's plunger to squish the suds through the fabric. This does a fine job of loosening soil and saves you a lot of lifting and squeezing by hand. Use the plunger again as you put the blanket through two or three

The Devils placed two boys on the All-tournament team. Johnny Kirby and Harold Graves. They were

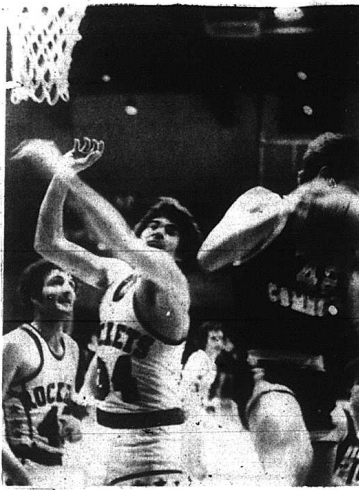

2. Their opponents scored 1,492 points in 27 games for an average of 55.2 points per game.

3. The Rockets were outscored by their opponents by a total of 63 points.

4. In eight of the 13 games they won, Rockcastle County held their opponents to 50 points or less.

5. The team's defensive average for the 13 games in which they won was 49.4 as they allowed only 643 points during those games.

6. In three of the last four regular season games, Rockcastle County made 28 free throws twice and 23 free throws in one other game: 28-33 vs. Lynn Camp; 28-39 vs. Jackson Co. and 23-32 vs. Barbourville.

7. The team free throw percentage was 679, including substitutes, as the Rockets made 407 of 599 attempts.

13. Barry Proctor was the team leader in assists with a total of 56.

14. Willie Hiatt led the team in recoveries with 98.

15. Craig McGuire made seven consecutive field goals against Richmond Mead.

16. Anthony Brock made 100 field goals of 175 attempts for a team leading .57 percent.

17. Billy Reynolds made eight consecutive free throws during the fourth quarter against Jackson Co.



## The Family Affair

When television first hit the market many Christians said they would never own one. They saw this form of entertainment as a current push for a great potential for evil. However in time, most of them changed their minds and purchased a set. It is estimated that 98 percent of homes in America have at least one set and have it on more than 40 hours a week. When an average child graduates from high school, he will have been to school for about 10,800 hours, but he will have watched TV for more than 20,000 hours.

Now, those initial fears have become a reality. Christians are faced with the problem of harmful influence to the home and the church via TV. Consider:

**TELEVISION.** Thankfully many Americans are now objecting to violence on TV. It is estimated that by age 14, the average child has witnessed 11,000 murders, not to mention the figures on kidnappings, rapes and robberies. Since children tend to identify with their TV heroes, this violence has a definite effect upon their lives. If children are constantly given models of violent behavior, their conduct will likely be violent to some extent.

Violence is opposed to Christian life. We must seek to be at peace with all men (Rom. 12:18; Matt. 5:9). What is lost in the mind will govern to a large degree-what we do. "Keep thy heart with all diligence for out of it are the issues of life" (Proverbs 4:23).

**TELE-IMMORALITY.** The majority of TV programs are diametrically opposed to Bible Teaching on morals. One survey of one night TV prime time revealed that the Ten Commandments were broken forty-four times. What the networks call "entertainment" for the most part, shows rape, torture, immorality, and all kinds of abuse. The sin of adultery is depicted as the way of life. The frightening part of all this is that drinking alcoholic beverages, drugs, fornication, homosexuality, cursing

and other wickedness is presented as an acceptable manner of life. Reaping of such sowing is evident already in our current push for "gay rights" and the alarming increase in divorces in the U.S. Have you often thought said those who do such things cannot inherit the kingdom of God? (Gal. 5:21).

**TELE-LANGUAGE.** To illustrate how TV has deteriorated since its beginning, compare the language initially used with that of today. Rarely can one view a TV program today without hearing impure language and my prediction is that it will get progressively worse.

How can we teach our children that God wants our language to be pure (Matt. 23:34-37; Col. 4:6; Eph. 4:29), and then expose them constantly to impure speech on TV? These TV programs are not written by Christians with Christians in mind, but as one network official put it, "To meet the needs of the masses of taste and propriety."

I am not opposed to owning and viewing television. There are good programs that teach history, English, math, and other academic subjects as well as to provide some good entertainment. TV has opened a world of beauty, activity and travel, the can see countries, sporting events, and historical events the moment they take place in their own home. How thrilling to watch man walking on the moon, or the inauguration of Presidents. Yet the viewing of TV must be controlled. The OFF/ON switch must be used by concerned parents to assure that this modern teaching tool does not interfere with the spiritual training. This television programming controlled in your home, or is it the FAMILY ALTAR?

## General fund receipts up 11.8% over 1980-81 collections

Total general fund receipts for the first eight months of 1981-82 were \$1,413,284,472 for an 11.8 percent increase over 1980-81 collections, state Finance Secretary George Fischer and Revenue Commissioner Ron Geary has announced.

Part of this increase is due to a difference in the transfer of coal severance tax receipts from the general fund to the transportation fund. Adjusting for this aberration indicates a true general fund growth rate of 10.5 percent.

Transportation fund revenues now total \$373,609,244 for a 6.3 percent decline relative to 1980-81 (a 2.8 percent decline after the coal severance adjustment), while total agency fund receipts of \$647,556,934 indicates a growth of 2.8 percent over the comparable 1980-81 figure.

The coal severance tax continues to exhibit the strongest growth rate of the major general fund taxes. Total coal severance

receipts have registered a 37.6 percent increase this far in 1981-82 and now exceed \$152 million.

The largest tax source, the general sales and use tax, now totals \$462 million for an 8.7 percent increase over 1980-81. Individual income taxes are up by only 4 percent for the first eight months of 1981-82.

Corporation income taxes remain sluggish and now register a decline in receipts of 0.8 percent relative to the comparable figure for 1980-81.

The decline in transportation fund revenues is largely attributable to an 18.1 percent decline in non tax receipts brought about by a \$43 million decrease in matching federal grants.

The two major sources of tax revenues, the motor fuel taxes and motor vehicle usage tax, are up by 12.7 percent and 11.1 percent respectively.

Agency fund collections continue to be bolstered by the insurance carriers workers' compensation special fund—three-fourths of a percent premium tax, which comprises \$49,350,716 of the other sales and gross receipts category. Nontax receipts are up by 1.2 percent, with a 13.7 percent increase in departmental fees offsetting a 4.3 percent decline in federal grants.

### MINING PERMITS

The Division of Permits in the state Department for Resources and Environmental Protection issued 120 mining permits during the month of February.

The number and types of permits issued included 121 original permits, 28 amendment permits and 10 succession permits.

Of the total issued, 125 were for surface mining operations; 46 for underground mining operations; 27 for preparation plants and refuse areas and 1 permit for a haul road.

Permitting activities for February authorized the disturbance of 6285.8 new acres of land and resulted in the collection of

A test tornado warning will be conducted on March 25th between 1 and 2 p.m. EST (noon and 1 p.m. CST) to check the state's warning systems and response capabilities. "The exact time of the warning will not be announced in advance," Buntin said.

During the week, information will be provided on spring's most common forms of severe weather.
