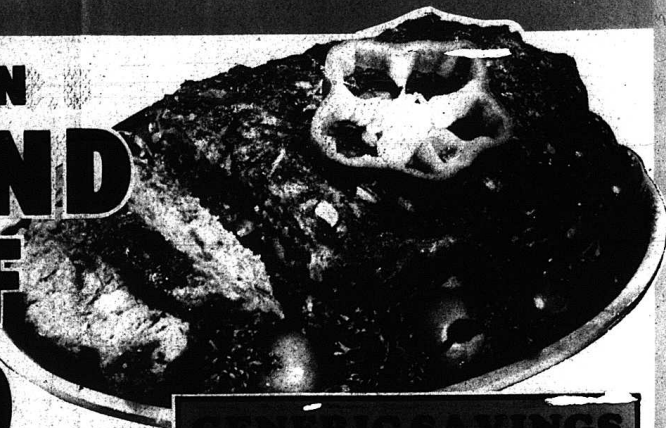

## Overweight coal trucks to receive more equality

According to a report from the Kentucky State Police requested by Representative Danny Ford, Rockcastle County ranked third in total number of citations issued for overweight coal trucks during the last 6 months of 1981, from among the five surrounding coal producing counties of Jackson, Clay, Laurel, Pulaski and Whitley.

The report was attached to a recent order dismissing 15 cases of violations involving overweight coal trucks in Rockcastle County District Court by Judge Daniel Venters. Reportedly, all fifteen were written within a 2 day period in February.

Until the laws (KRS 189.221-230, making it illegal to operate a vehicle in excess of a legal weight limit and KRS 189.990 (2) establishing a fine amount of \$500) are gotten off the books, this is, according to the tone of the recent dismissals, going to be a general rule in dealing with violators in local district court.

For these years, Venters says, he has encouraged truckers to see their legislators about the problem. Rockcastle and possibly Madison and Lincoln seem to be the only counties with the problems of excessive citations issued and violators brought to court.

Those citations issued in other counties, according to Venters and the truckers, are for the most part, ignored. He says he knows of no other counties in the heavy coal producing area where a fine of \$500 is meted out to truckers as it has been in Rockcastle County in the past, though recently the court has typically suspended as much

as \$400 of the fine resulting, in effect, as a fine \$100-plus court costs of \$25.50. In some areas, defendants do not appear in court on the charges and often pay court costs as a "prepayable offense."

The truckers maintain that virtually all trucks hauling from mine to tipple in southeastern Kentucky exceed the weight limit. To remain competitive in an industry, each truck hauls as much as it is technologically able.

## The question of U.S. and El Salvador

Washington's recent preoccupation with the internal affairs of El Salvador, resulting in the sending of U.S. money and military advisors being sent there, prompted us to ask a few questions of a few people to determine we have of thinking locally about this far away place that is in the nightly news.

Harvey Penson, a local Baptist minister and retiree from the Army, said he thinks we have a large interest in El Salvador and that we ought to support whoever and whatever is in power there to further our interest. "In fact, we have an interest there if we don't have any interests there, he says, we shouldn't be involved. He says he feels like our officials were elected to make these decisions for us and we ought to abide by their decisions."

When asked if he felt the United States should send large sums of money to El Salvador, he answered, "I don't know. If I knew what our interests were..."

"I don't believe it will turn into a Vietnam. I don't feel we are ever justified in sending troops to another country's civil war."

A retired man, Millard Owens, is also confused about the validity of our interests in El Salvador and says, "I don't know if we've got any business over there or not."

"I think we ought to take care of our own people first. That's what I think."

He says he had two sons and two brothers in the other one (Vietnam) and doesn't feel it was justified and doesn't think the U.S. will ever send troops to El Salvador.

Mary Gregory, who is a housewife, mother and trained speech pathologist, says, "I believe in a valid interest in all of South America, because it is in our hemisphere."

She says she, like others, doesn't know the true political situation in El Salvador enough to know what our position should be.

"I am fearful of any military intervention." She says she is not sure if the circumstances are such that we ought to involve us in another situation like Vietnam.

Clairetta Hodges believes we should abide by the earlier precepts of the Doctrine, a policy of "hands off" the affairs of other countries.

She said, "They (El Salvador) would cut our throats in a minute if they thought they could get 50 cents from us."

"I'm not being inhuman. They wouldn't lift a finger to help us if we needed help and there are not many countries who would."

She says the U.S. has "worked and fought for every penny we have. We have given it away to others and are still put down for not giving more."

"If we gave them (El Salvador) the whole United States, I would end up just like the (civil war) in about 3 months."

"I think the U.S. ought to get out and let Russia tear herself apart down there. She is dispersing her resources by having too many interests and if she does it, she will get her," she says.

Clairetta fears U.S. military build up there, but says Reagan is trying to get re-elected, he will not get us involved that way. If he's got any sense, he won't do it, but...

She says she, like many housewife and mother who holds a degree in business education.

Yvonne Carmack thinks our main interest ought to be right here at home.

"I think we ought to get the interests and everybody out (of El Salvador). I know they are doing their jobs, but I can't grasp putting myself in the line of danger. I don't think we ought to send anybody down there."

She does not think the U.S. should get involved either. "We have always given to civil war countries. If the U.S. were in the line of danger, we have helped would probably be the last ones to help us."

Yvonne works in an industry, but is presently laid off from that job.

Shirley Ray Cable, a local farmer, says he thinks we ought to stay out of the internal affairs of El Salvador and that means that we should keep our money at home.

He thinks the situation might come to drafting men to serve there and says he doesn't know how he would react if he were drafted. He says the situation of being asked to go there and fight.

The issues of legislative independence and the governor's authority to reorganize state government have been on a collision course that has now reached the countdown stage.

The primary bone of contention is House Bill 345, which has also become known as the Legislative Independence-Agriculture Compromise Bill.

House Bill 345 would give the legislature the power to review a governor's reorganization action. Also, the Legislative Research Commission would have the authority to veto a governor's reorganization when the General Assembly is not in session.

Further, included in House Bill 345 is a compromise measure on the Brown Administration's reorganization of the state Department of Agriculture.

The Governor's reorganization is opposed to an inter-legislative having veto power over an executive branch reorganization order, yet the administration also wants to end its embarrassing feud with Commissioner of Agriculture Alben Barkley III.

House Bill 345 passed the House of Representatives by a vote of 95 to 3 and is now being considered by the Senate. If the Senate passes the bill, there stands the probability even with the agriculture compromise that the governor would veto it.

stage for the legislature to override the governor's veto and pass House Bill 345 into law.

Also, should House Bill 345 become law, the Brown administration would probably ask for a court-ruling on the Legislative Research Commission's power to act in the interim period between biennial sessions of the General Assembly.

House Bill 345 constitutes a truly unprecedented, perhaps even historic situation for a court-ruling on legislative, executive and judicial branches of government.

Although there is an air of excitement about the questions of constitutional authority that could be raised by House Bill 345, there is also the fact that it is only one of several hundred bills and resolutions moving through the legislative process as the last few days of the 1982 session windle away.

Also, it is important to note that among these several hundred bills are proposals to increase the legislature's control over the state budget during interim periods and to increase legislative oversight of personal service contracts, capital construction and administrative regulations.

It seems almost certain that the legislature will come out of the 1982 session in review and oversight authority over Kentucky's state government, but with the increased authority will also come increased responsibility.

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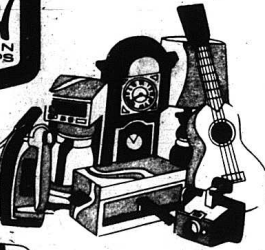

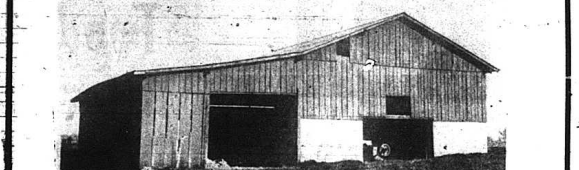

Medicare medical insurance can help pay for physical therapy services you receive from an independently-practicing, physical therapist in his or her office or in your home if the treatment is prescribed by a doctor. But, the maximum amount medical insurance can pay for these services starting January 1, 1982, is \$400 in a year. The medical insurance payment would be less than \$400 if charges for these services are used to meet part or all of your \$75 deductible.

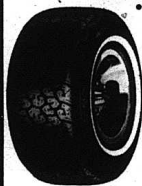

## Hold Down Health Care Costs

Like all family expenses, the cost of health care continues to increase every year. There are ways to cut health costs, but don't make the mistake of choosing the unhealthy ones. As many as one half of American families are trying to hold down the cost of health care in questionable ways. These include not having annual check-ups, skipping dental care and postponing such things as allergy shots, prescriptions and new eyeglasses.

Such methods are questionable because in the long run, these families may end up paying more for health care than the preventive health care measures they are eliminating.

Among the better ways for cutting the cost of medical care include not going to the doctor's office unless it's necessary. Telephone the doctor if you are worried. After describing your symptoms, ask if you need to come in rather than automatically making an appointment. If you do have an office appointment, come prepared. Be as specific as you can about your symptoms. Write down what it is you want to discuss with the doctor.

Take any prescriptions according to directions. Health care professionals estimate that as many as 50 percent of patients do not take the prescription as it was intended. They stop taking it too soon, or don't take it according to directions, or never have the prescription filled. Always know what you are taking. Ask questions so you will know how long to take a prescription, what side effects to expect, and exactly how the medication is to be taken.

Use the hospital emergency room only for emergencies. Just because your insurance covers emergency room care and not doctor visits is not a good reason

to use the emergency room. Ultimately you, and all other consumers, pay the cost in increasing health care insurance premiums.

You can cut hospital costs by getting a second opinion before having surgery. There is no reason to have tests repeated. So, if you do get a second opinion, remember to test your first doctor did.

Lastly, if it's necessary to go to the hospital, do what you can to keep the costs down. Ask to have preoperative workups done as an outpatient. Never check in to a hospital on Friday or Saturday, unless in an emergency. Most medical procedures are not done on the weekend; so tests will not begin until Monday. A hospital is an expensive place to spend time.

I have been feeling really down lately. I don't know if it's spring fever or the planets lining up or the crazy state of the union.

## Neighboring Laurel County wins boy's State Tournament

For the first time in Laurel County High School history, the boys basketball team has won the state title.

Laurel County ended the boys' sweet 16 tournament last Saturday night in most appropriate fashion.

With only 3 seconds to play in the game and the score tied at 51, Laurel County junior forward Paul Andrews intercepted a North Hardin pass around North Hardin's free throw line. Andrews dribbled the ball out to midcourt where he unleashed a one-handed push shot that was to swish through Laurel County's net as the buzzer was sounding.

The shot, about 44 feet, gave Laurel County and head Coach Chuck Brughout, on the first state tournament title since Hazel Green won the title in 1940. Hazel Green was one of the schools that consolidated to form Laurel County High School.

Laurel County, the underdogs to North Hardin, who was the favorite to win the tournament, they defeated Bryan Station in the opening round, fell behind by as many as 9 points in the first quarter and trailed by 8 at the end of the first period.

Laurel County rallied in the second quarter to pull within two points and go into the dressing room at intermission down by a

score of 30-28.

The Cardinals came out in the third quarter ready to play basketball and behind the shooting of senior Joe Karr and Paul Dees, took the lead from North Hardin. The game was tied several times and the lead switched hands frequently throughout the remainder of the game.

With 1:10 to go in the contest, North Hardin's 10" senior forward Brett Burrow tied the game for the last time by hitting one of two free throws. The Cardinals then brought the ball upcourt and held it until 38 seconds remained on the clock and called a time-out. Laurel called another time-out with 18 seconds to play to set the strategy for their final shot.

Laurel County took the ball in bounds and worked the clock down to three seconds when senior James Maxey dribbled the ball off his foot and out of bounds giving it to North Hardin.

North Hardin called a time-out and set up the play that was to spell their state

tournament title to the Laurel County Cardinals.

Laurel County advanced to the final game by easily defeating Louisville Jeffersonville in the opening round last Thursday afternoon, by blitzing Owensboro on Friday night 83-74 and by getting past Virgie and All-State Center Todd May on Saturday morning, 61-60, thanks to game saving free throws by Paul Andrews.

The Cardinals placed three players on the All-Tournament team. Seniors Joe Karr and Jamie Maxey and junior Paul Andrews.

One of Laurel's wins came at Rockcastle early in the season when they easily defeated the Rockets by a score of 81-60.

Laurel County, who was ranked in the top five teams in the state all season long, finished the season with a 33 and 3 record as North Hardin finished at 37 and 3.

### Fishing Report

Despite cold weather over the weekend, Kentucky conservation officers report generally fair fishing, especially for crappie. The lakesy lake rundowns, Kentucky crappie good over submerged cover (3 feet) and dropoffs (6-10 feet); black bass fair but small in size casting the shoreline with crank and spinner baits; in tailwaters, catfish good, cranie fair (gates closed), musky rising slowly, 1 foot above winter pool and 50 degrees.

Barkley crappie good over submerged cover and dropoffs, 8-12 feet, in tailwaters, little activity, clear to murky, stable at winter pool, 52 degrees. 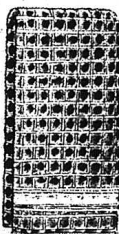

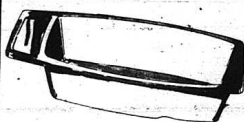

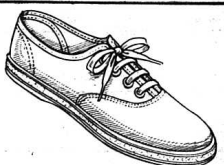

### Fish and Wildlife Camps are one of best bargains around

If your fifth or sixth grader comes home with an application for summer camp, take a close look—it could be one of the best bargains around. A week (Monday through Friday) at one of the camps operated by the conservation education division of the... Fish and Wildlife Resources costs just \$30, plus transportation to and from camp, which generally costs an additional \$6 to \$8. Students who have participated in the conservation education program in schools throughout Kentucky are eligible to attend camp. Since this school program reaches over 90 percent of all fifth and sixth grades in Kentucky, chances are your child is among the 100,000 who will be getting information, assistance and applications to the camping program this month.

There isn't always room to accommodate everyone who wants to attend. The fish and wildlife department has had a summer camping program since 1946, so it's entirely possible that the youngsters going to camp now have both parents and grandparents who have participated in similar camping programs. The department operates three camps, one at Kentucky Lake, one at Lake Cumberland and one at Grayson Lake. The week-long program is primarily educational with trained instructors giving lessons in boating, swimming, water safety, fishing, archery, first aid, nature study and hunter safety. Students who successfully complete the program are certified as safe hunters. Hunter safety certificates are required by many states and for hunting on some federal areas in Kentucky.

Although the deadline for returning the completed applications is May 1, you shouldn't wait until the last minute, says Kelley Hubbard, assistant director of the conservation education division. Applications are processed on a first-come, first-served basis and are processed at the following information centers and applications to the camping program this month: "Our primary goal in both our school and our camping program," Hubbard says, "is to pass along the traditions of good sportsmanship and conservation and to encourage the safe and ethical enjoyment of our fish and wildlife resources."

### Help Non-Game Wildlife

That April 15 tax deadline is creeping closer every day, so those of us who put things off until the last minute are going to have to get busy soon. But in the rush to get your returns in the mail before the deadline, don't overlook line 19 on your Kentucky income tax return. This line gives you the opportunity to contribute a portion of your refund to wildlife.

The money donated for these refunds will be divided equally between the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources and the Nature Preserves Commission. The money is to be used only for non-game wildlife—those species not sought by hunters.

The fish and wildlife department's share goes into a special "non-game wildlife fund" and will be earmarked for research and management of non-game species. The Nature Preserves Commission uses its share in its program to acquire and protect significant rural areas. The contributions will reduce your refund by the amount you contribute, but may be deducted from next year's taxes the same as other charitable contribution.

Because almost all funding for wildlife programs has come from sportsmen (through the sale of hunting and fishing licenses) most of the attention has been devoted to game species. Sportsmen's dollars have financed the development of scientific wildlife research and management, disciplines which did not exist 50 years ago.

Today we have the techniques for doing effective research and management of non-game species. Unfortunately, anything else is money. With inflation eating into the sportsman's dollars as private budgets, it's impossible to fund research and management of non-game wildlife.

### Disability Cases Being Re-examined

People who receive Social Security or supplemental security income (SSI) payments because they are disabled can expect to have their claim reviewed at least once every 3 years unless they have a severe condition considered permanent. The Social Security spokesperson said recently.

Recent studies have shown that some people on the disability rolls no longer meet all requirements for benefits. Social Security, as required by law, began a large-scale effort in 1981 to make sure that all eligible individuals continue to receive disability checks. In addition, this effort is in line with the goal to improve administration of the disability program.

In part, the new law recognizes the many advances that have been made in medical science and rehabilitation techniques over the past 25 years that Social Security has paid disability checks.

People who had little hope for recovery from an accident or illness then have a better chance today of returning to gainful work. As part of this review, people may be asked to have a medical examination. If this is done, there will be no cost to the person. If a person's benefits are stopped as a result of this review, he or she can ask that the decision be reconsidered and the person will receive written notice of the decision and appeal rights. More information about the review of disability claims can be obtained at any Social Security office. The address and telephone number of the nearest Social Security office can be found in the telephone directory.

Q. I started my own business last year. I know I have to file W-2 forms for my employees, but where do I see them and when are they due?

A. Forms W-2, "Wage and Tax Statement," and W-2P, "Statement of Payers for Annuities, Pensions, or Retired Pay," must be sent to the Social Security Administration with Form W-3, "Transmittal of In-

come and Tax Statements." The forms are due by March 1, 1982. For information on how to complete and mail the forms, contact your local Internal Revenue Service office.

A. If an eligible person (or couple) lives in another person's household and receives support and maintenance in kind from that person, the amount of SSI amount is reduced by one-third. 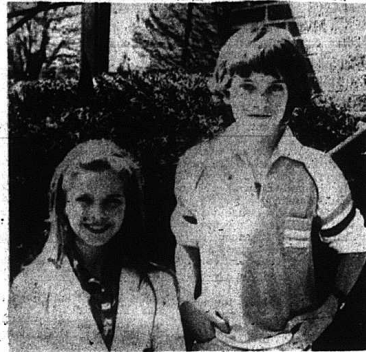

A steady rate, and therefore a tumor grows at a steady rate. First, one cell splits into two, the two become four, four become eight, etc. The average length of time required for all cells in a tumor to divide has been called its doubling time. With the completion of one doubling time, the number of cells in the mass doubles and the weight of the mass doubles. A tumor that is large enough to see contains at least one million cells. By the time a lump in the breast can be felt, it has gone through 30 generations of doublings. It has been estimated that the doubling time for breast cancer ranges from 6 to 540 days, depending on the kind of cells and their rate of growth. Thus, seeing a physician immediately when you feel a lump is vital.

For not only will the lump continue to grow if it is cancerous, it may also spread to other parts of the body. Self-examination is the best way to keep track of what is normal for you and thus to discover any unusual lumps at the earliest possible time. Breast self-examination for women and testicular self-examination for men are simple, easy to learn techniques, and the few minutes involved once a month could save your life. Then I visited Myrtle Gabbard at Berea. I asked her if she would want to return to Clear Creek and she answered, "Oh, yes!" Then she said she had been doing some wall papering for spring house cleaning. When I looked at the design on the wallpaper, guess what it was. Sure enough, groups of broad leaved trees very lonely, stood out on the paper. I knew it told the longing of Myrtle to come back where the water is clear as it pours over rocks and down mossy streams through the hills of Clear Creek.

Not long ago I went to visit some neighbors of days past, who now live at Middletown, near Berea.

They were Nan Chasteen Shearer, age 93, and Mary, Eliza Chasteen Croucher, age 89. They came of old time family friends of my parents and of their children in our family. Both women are widows and live across the road from each other but seem very alert. Mary Eliza had just gotten out of the hospital and was staying with Nan until she regained some strength. "He was trying to shock us girls and he did," Mary Eliza laughed. "Has he changed any?" "No, Nan. I regret to say he hasn't," I told her.

A very pretty girl (but who other probably would like to live on Clear Creek, walked into visit Nan and Mary Eliza. Imagine my surprise when she said she was the daughter of Eli and Pearl Chasteen, near neighbors of ours here. She was just getting out. Hasty who spent her early life as a child with a special heart condition that would not let her live the normal life of all children. She says she lives a normal life now after years of little activity. I believe she had come to borrow something but I told her I had gotten but 1, Maudie!

On a drive Sunday, she laughed and said her office is no more either, we stopped to see Nathan and Laura. Maudie just got going over the flu they told us and Nathan who will soon reach the young age of 84 looked much as I remember him 20 years ago. While there he gave me a genealogy of the Mullins family since the time some of them came over on the Mayflower. Certainly he is a fifth generation of the seven Mullins men who followed Daniel Boone from North Carolina to Kentucky. God gave Nathan a talent in a wonderful voice which was used to sing at churches to praise the Lord. He promised to sing for me when I visited again so, get out your songbook, Nathan, I'll sure be there.

A big hello to Mary Cain Vaughn out there in

Indianapolis, Indiana and to tell you Clear Creek is opening up to spring with lovely, purple, redbud trees bursting out along with the white blossoms of the "Service trees." I know you remember how good and fresh the air smells in spring, how branches of water rush down hill, how little early spring flowers like pale, purple violets push their heads out of the ground. But it's spring out there too, Mary, so let's all enjoy God's gift of life to us.

I was told by one of the staff in the Signal office that about 5,000 papers go out a week. My brother, Elwood Payne writes me from Michigan that he thinks there are more people up there who read Clear Creek news than down here. So that's how so many of the Signals go. 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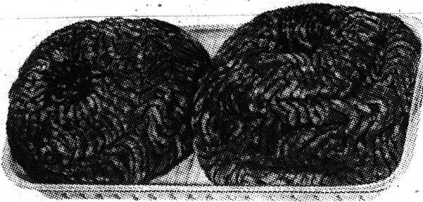

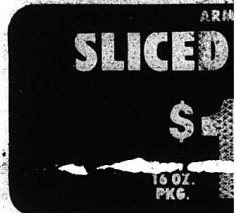

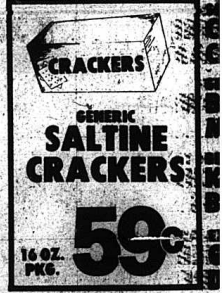
