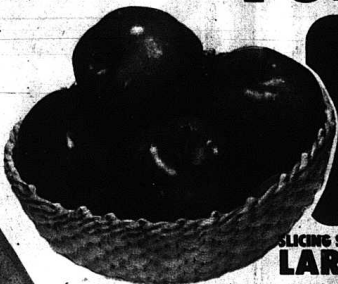
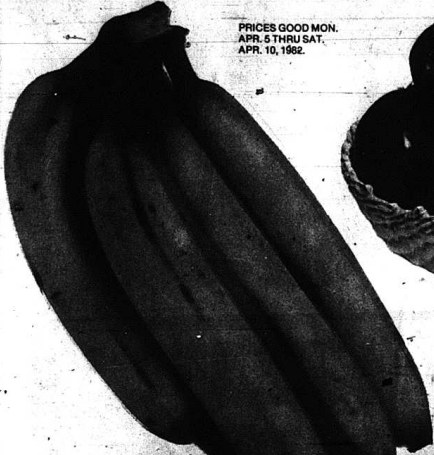

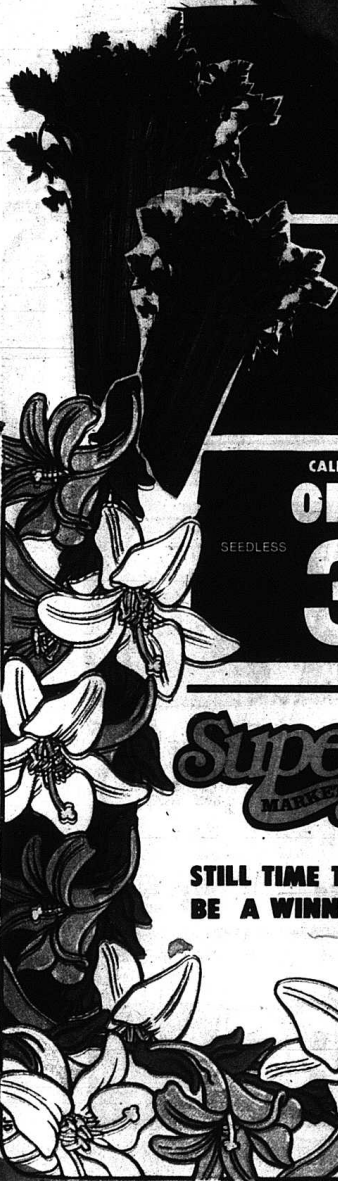

Court splits on personnel change; applies for community block grant

Three magistrates balked Tuesday at an attempt by Judge/executive Bobb Jasper to replace county road employee Monroe Hansel with Doug Bishop.

It seems that the new fiscal court and Judge/executive had overlooked the January ruling of the current county employees. The court took measure at the Tuesday meeting to correct the matter by hiring retroactively, from January 4 through April 6, those who were employed by the county at the end of 1981.

These employees included Monroe Hansel, who works as a heavy equipment operator; however, when the judge read the new list of persons recommended for employment beginning Tuesday, April 6, Hansel's name was not called and Doug Bishop's was substituted.

Magistrate D.G. Allister said Hansel was not on the list and why Bishop was added as a truck driver and further stated that he did not think the county needed two mechanics (Charles Bussell is head mechanic and Delno McClure is assistant).

Magistrates Donald Rowe, Tom Denney and Al Bright said that they would not "go along with" the judge's recommendation to omit Hansel and add Bishop to the list of county employees.

The meeting seemed at an impasse when Judge Jasper refused for a time to recommend the employees on an individual basis, but after trying to force the package deal of all or none.

The judge said he did not feel he was being unreasonable, but felt he "should have a little say so." He then asked the dissenting magistrates if they would reconsider, but they remained adamant.

Judge Jasper then conceded to take a single vote on each employee, but before the vote was taken, Denny said (and Albright and Rowe agreed) that they would be willing to hire Bishop as truck driver, if Hansel could remain as heavy equipment operator. Jasper said he did not have anything against Hansel, but he felt he needed "to have someone from that side of the county." (Obviously referring to the western end of the county.) Bishop, a democrat, ran against D.G. Albright for the office of magistrate in the most recent election.)

After Judge Jasper said that hiring both men would be agreeable to him, a motion and second was made to that effect and all were in harmony as the vote was taken.

Those hired by the motion were: Anna Rose Muller, executive assistant at \$1,000 per month; Willemetta Cromer as secretary at \$400 per month; John Bullock as janitor at \$3.50 per hour; Elmer Decker as custodian at \$400 per month; James York as dog warden at \$325 per month; Mary Lou at \$3.35 per hour as nutritional aide; Charles Bussell as head mechanic at \$5.00 per hour; Clayton Singleton at \$3.75 as driver and \$4.75 as heavy equipment operator; L.D. Bond and Luster Bullock at \$4.75 per hour to operate heavy equipment.

Luther McKinney, Billy Adams, Danny McKinney, Tom Kirby, Doug Bishop were hired at hourly wages, are not to work in excess of 40 hours per week unless an emergency arises.

Michael Hayes, representing the Cumberland Valley Area Development District, met with the court to request they formally adopt a resolution granting authority to CVADD to submit a community block grant application to the state of Kentucky on behalf of the county. The amount of the grant (\$302,000) is to be used to loan to the Industrial Authority to fund a rail spur to the Industrial Park.

The court passed the resolution and also granted authorization to the Judge to take into account property belonging to Jamps Poynter just off Ky. 461 on the old McMullins property. Road supervisor Paul Hansel said he knew the road and recommended it for acceptance. The road was designated the James Poynter Road.

Several magistrates voiced concern over the total bills for parts' cost which they thought was too much. According to magistrate Tom Denney, the most recent bill received by the county for parts was \$4,700 for a two month period. Magistrate Donald Rowe said the total bill amounted to well over \$100 per work day for the period.

It became the general consensus of the magistrates to have supervisor Hansel require the contracting parties and those billing for parts itemize the bill by name, not merely part number.

County attorney James Lambert was asked by the court to seek a written opinion from the attorney general concerning county ordinances and the penalties a county can impose with regard to illegally disposing of garbage.

The court voted to accept into the Rockcastle County Ambulance Service account \$10,424.00 in unallocated funds from the Department of Human Resources, Emergency Medical Services division.

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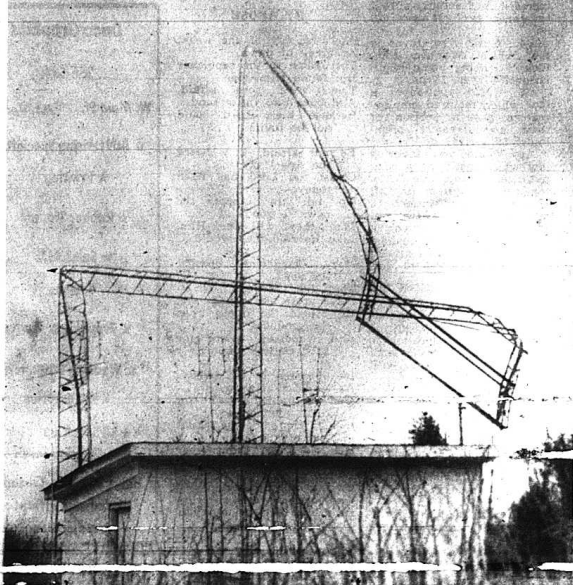
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Evidence of heavy wind late Friday night and early Saturday morning is shown in the above photo. The

Winter storm chills

It seems that "old man winter" is having another frigid fling before retiring for the season. Just as area residents were about to relax in the luxury of balmy spring breezes, winter's numbing breath lashed and chilled with weekend winds and plummeting temperatures.

Winds, though high all weekend, seemed most threatening late Friday night and early Saturday morning.

Mt. Vernon T.V. Cable suffered damages due to

strong winds apparently early Saturday morning when the T.V. and FM antennas blew down. Owner Wayne Stewart said Tuesday that they had enough spare boosters to get the three Lexington T.V. stations going on a temporary basis by Saturday afternoon. The FM antenna is expected to be repaired by Wednesday afternoon. Stewart estimated the losses at approximately \$4,000.

Thrifty Lumber Company lost a building which was near completion early

Saturday morning. The loss of the building, which was to be used to store supplies, represents a loss of about \$3,000, according to a spokesman for the business.

Glen Sayers, who farms in the southwestern part of the county, lost a large barn during the same wind storm and as a result several pieces of equipment he had stored in the barn were damaged. Sayers did not estimate his losses.

K.U. officials report only one power outage during the month. Monday night residents of the Town Hill area were without power for about 20 minutes due to a fallen tree limb across a power line.

According to the official weather recorder for the area, the rainfall so far for April does not vary much, however; the chilling temperature drops Monday and Tuesday nights made quite a range of variable temperatures. For this April, temperatures ranged from 73 to 17 degrees as

Board re-employs personnel and revises school calendar

In routine action the Rockcastle County Board of Education voted upon the recommendation of Superintendent Charles Parsons to re-employ all certified personnel for the 1982-83 school term. Any necessary reduction in staff, Parsons said, could be achieved by not replacing those retiring.

The revised school calendar for the remainder of the school year was presented to the board and adopted.

The calendar shows April 15 and 16 as Kentucky Educational Association meeting dates. School will be dismissed on those days.

Children will not attend school on May 6 and 7. Teachers will attend in-service training sessions. May 21 is set aside as a professional day when teachers prepare end of school records. There will be no classes for children.

May 24 is the last day students must attend school. If school should have to be closed due to some calamity between now and May 24, the (or days) will have to be made up forward and the closing day moved forward.

The board also accepted bids on Title I school furniture for the two new rooms to be built at Roundstone School. The total bid was for \$5,198.00. Purchased were four teacher desks, two storage cabinets, 2 file cabinets, 4 teacher chairs, 48 desks and chairs for students, 2 film-

strip projectors, two record players, two cassette player/recorders and four wall mounted projection screens.

Approval was granted to advertise and accept sealed bids on custodial supplies for 1982-83, a new roof for the administration building and for replacing ceiling in certain areas at Roundstone Elementary.

In other action, the board agreed to allow the insurance company employ a company to correct all damage done to the Roundstone School property as a result of the March 16 hail storm.

John Maupin, insurance agent from Richmond, who received the low bids and was awarded the insurance contract at the March board meeting was back at the April meeting at the board's request to submit an additional cost figure to include all risk insurance coverage. The board accepted Maupin's premium cost of \$1,135 yearly for insurance to cover theft, water damage and accidental glass breakage. The policy stipulates a \$100 deductible.

Mrs. May Payne, full-time cook at the Blue Springs School was moved to Mt. Vernon School as cook and Mrs. Rufus Wheat who serves as Title I aide at the school will assume part-time duties as cook and remain employed as aide on a part-time basis. Blue Springs element recently dropped from 22 to 12.

Brodhead to apply for grant to upgrade sewer

The City of Brodhead will apply for a \$39,430 grant from the State of Kentucky to be used to upgrade their sewer system.

The council voted unanimously Monday night to apply for the money, which if approved will come from the state's Pollution Facilities department of the state.

In order for Brodhead to receive the grant, their application will be rated by the state on a scale of 1,000 points. Points on the scale are determined by community need, project effectiveness, reasonable cost and financing, according to Jim Cass Tri-County Community Development director who is present at the meeting.

Crawford and Associates will be the engineers who will prepare the application if it is approved by the state.

Cass said that once the application is rated, if Brodhead is one of the top applicants, the state will visit the town to verify the facts on the application. "I think you will get a great chance of having the money," Cass said. "With the problems you've been having lately and the new customers that will be coming from the state wide home and the Fairground project you should rate very high on the scale," he said.

The grant, if received, will be used to fix manholes, put in a sewage flow meter, build a new lift station, replace sewer lines, sewer materials, sewer tie-

ins, remove solid rock, put in new concrete manholes, work on curbs and gutters and several other needed projects.

He told the council members and the few citizens at the meeting that if the city would borrow a round \$40,000 to help fund the project, he would own that it would help their application tremendously. He told them that the Kentucky Pollution Abatement Fund was set up just for this reason and that they would loan the city the \$40,000 over a 20 year period. He said that he had already contacted the person involved with the fund and they would be willing to loan the money. The council voted unanimously to borrow the money contingent on the grant being approved by the state.

Mayor Ronnie Cash then called the regular monthly meeting to order in which very little business took place.

Cash told the council that Water Superintendent Des Alva Bussell and himself had been working on the "much needed" insurance bid, over the past week and that it was almost completed. He said that several things of great value such as the city water tank and the fire department building had very little insurance on them at the present time and other things that were of no value at all were insured for very high amounts.

He told the council that the insurance agent

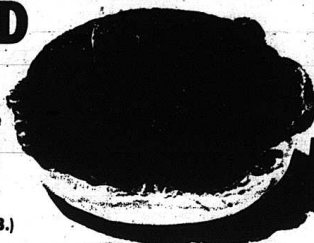

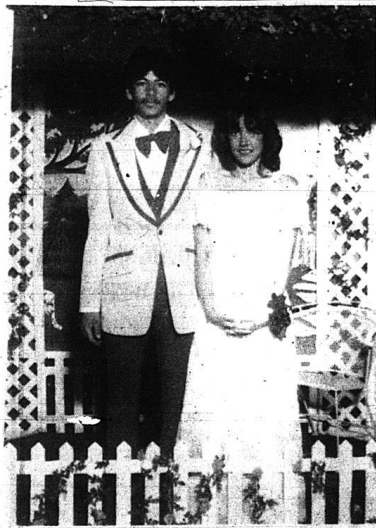

Fishing Report

Windy, unsettled weekend weather has slowed fishing activity around Kentucky, but several lakes are still reporting fair to good crappie fishing. The lake-by-lake rundown, as compiled by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

Kentucky: crappie fair over drop offs (10-15 feet deep) and around shallow cover (4-6 feet) in tailwaters, catfish and crappie fair; murky to muddy, stable at two feet above winter pool and 57 degrees.

Barkley: crappie fair over channel drop offs (10-12 feet deep), in tailwaters, little activity; murky, stable at two feet above winter pool and 57 degrees.

Barren: crappie good over channel drop offs (8-12 feet deep); black bass good casting crank baits off rocky points and steep banks; murky, rising slowly, seven feet below summer pool and 58 degrees.

Nolin: crappie slow over submerged cover (around 10 feet deep); black bass slow casting spinner baits off points and in coves; clear to murky to muddy; rising, 14 feet above summer pool and 55 degrees.

Rough River: crappie slow over submerged cover (around 10 feet deep); black bass slow casting crank baits and jiggling dolifines and nightcrawlers off points, and around shoreline cover; murky to muddy, stable at four feet above winter pool and 55 degrees.

Herrington: black bass good casting small crank baits in headwaters; crappie slow over submerged cover and around stick ups; Dix River muddy, little white bass activity.

Tips for TORNADO SAFETY

Tornadoes are spawned by severe thunderstorms, and are only one of the thunderstorm's hazards.

Lightening is the worst killer. Stay indoors and away from electrical appliances while the storm is overhead. If lightning catches you outside, keep yourself lower than and at safe distance from the nearest high, conductive object.

Thunderstorm rains may cause flash floods. Be careful where you take shelter.

TORNADO WATCH: Tornadoes may develop

TORNADO WARNING: Tornado detected, take shelter. When a tornado approaches, your immediate action can save your life!

-In homes, open some windows (but stay away from them); take shelter in the basement or under heavy furniture in the center area of the house.

-In schools, move quickly (following advance plans) to shelter areas or to an interior hallway on the lowest floor.

-In office buildings, go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor or to a designated shelter area.

-In factories, move quickly (following advance plans) to shelter areas. Post a look-out, if this can be done safely.

-In shopping centers, go to a designated shelter area (not to your parked car).

-In mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to overturning during strong winds and should be evacuated when strong winds are forecast. Damage can be minimized by securing trailers with cables anchored in concrete footing. If there is no shelter nearby, leave the trailer park for low, protected ground!

-In open country, move away from the tornado's path at a right angle. If there is no time, lie flat in the nearest depression with your hands shielding your head. Be alert for flash floods.

During a severe thunderstorm or tornado emergency, listen for radio and television broadcasts of latest National Weather Service bulletins.

P&G officials deny Satanical/Occult connection with trademark symbol.

In recent months a rumor has spread that Proctor and Gamble's moon and stars trademark is a satanical/occult symbol which signifies some connection with satanism or devil worship.

The most often repeated claim is that a Proctor and Gamble official appeared on the Phil Donahue show and discussed the company's connection with satanism.

One rumor has it that Rev. Moon of the Unification Church owns shares or stock in Proctor and Gamble.

The Proctor and Gamble Company and Multimedea Program Productions, a Cincinnati, Ohio based company which owns, produces and distributes "Donahue", the hour long morning talk show, deny that any official of Proctor and Gamble appeared as a guest on "Donahue" discussing the Proctor and Gamble trademark or satanism.

Proctor and Gamble officials state that neither Rev. Moon nor the Unification Church owns any shares of stock in the company.

Multimedia officials say they have never done a show on satanism and are at a loss to know how the rumor got started; however, they remarked in a recent communication with Proctor

and Gamble that a similar rumor got started a few years ago following a show with the owner of a fast food chain as the guest. "There was no reference to anything even remotely connected with satanism during his appearance."

Richard Thrall, vice president of Multimedea has assured Proctor and Gamble that it will provide any documents which might be required to prove that the "Donahue" show did not discuss the subject of Proctor and Gamble and satanism.

Company officials say the symbol in question

(moon and stars) which identified Proctor and Gamble products has a history which began in 1851. The symbol evolved from a crude cross used to mark crates of Star Candles, an early product, as they were shipped down the Ohio. In time, the cross developed into an encircled star and later into 13 stars representing the 13 original colonies and the man-in-the-moon profile, a popular fancy of the time. The moon and stars symbol was registered with the U.S. Patent office in 1882 and has been Proctor and Gamble's trademark ever since.

Acreage Reduction Program

According to Lillian A. Hart, State Executive Director of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Kentucky, crop reports indicate that grain production for 1982 will be about the same as in 1981. With the large carryover stocks from 1981 this would indicate lower market prices come harvest time for the 1982 crop.

Farmers should be considering the potential benefits of the 1982 reduced acreage program. Benefits for producers who sign up in the 1982 Feed Grain and Wheat Program are def-

iciency payments, higher commodity loan rates, and less reduction cost due to cutting back on their acreage.

An example of the benefits on corn: A producer with a 50 acre base and a 100 bushel yield on his farm would be required to reduce his corn planting by 5 acres for 1982. With the possible deficiency payment of 15 cents per bushel he would receive \$750.00 in payment (45 acres X 100 bushel yield X 15 cents per bushel equal \$675.00). By applying this payment to

FmHA Rural Housing Loans to Continue in Selected Rural Areas

State Director Kendall L. Seaton has announced that the Department's housing assistance programs will continue to be available in rural areas of 10,000 to 20,000 population. This authority was due to expire on March 31, 1982.

Normally, the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), which administers USDA housing assistance programs, is limited to serving areas of up to 10,000 people. An exception is made when the Secretaries of Agriculture and Housing and Urban Development agree that there is a serious shortage of mortgage credit in the higher populated areas. The assistance is then available in those designated areas as long as they are not located in a Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area (SMSA).

The Farmers Home Administration provides housing loan assistance to people in rural areas who are in need of decent, safe and sanitary housing but do not qualify for private credit. Single-family housing loans are available to people of low or moderate income at a reduced interest rate. The current interest rate for moderate-income borrowers is 13.25 percent.

FmHA loans are also available to multi-family housing developments to help hold down rental costs for low-income people, the handicapped and senior citizens.

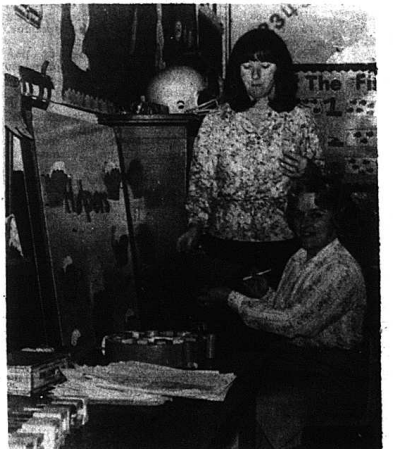
Lida and Janice live within walking distance of

Eggs in your Easter basket—Cook, keep, use and Eat Them

Eggs you hardcook for your kiddies' Easter basket or egg roll don't have to be written off as a play-time expense. If they're properly cooked, not out of the refrigerator long, and eaten within a day or two, they can do double duty for the family and the Easter bunny set.

In plentiful supply and low priced, it would still be a shame to let this high protein nutritious food either deteriorate in quality or end up in the garbage disposal. And so, here are timely tips for cooking, storing and eating them up while they're in top condition.

To hardcook, cover eggs completely with cold water in a pan. Bring slowly to simmering, and allow to simmer 20 to 25 minutes. Do not let the water boil. (Or, cover pan and remove it from heat when the water simmers, and let stand for 30 minutes.) When the time is up, cool at once under cold, running water. Low water temperature, timed cooking and quick cooling prevent green discoloration between the white and yolk of a hard-cooked egg.

After you or the children use a regular food-coloring dye to decorate them, store the eggs in the refrigerator until the games, egg roll or the Easter bunny beckon. While eggs are in the Easter basket, keep it away from hot places like radiators. Refrigerate eggs again as soon as possible and use within one or two days.

They'll keep either in or out of the shell, but if the shells are removed, protect the eggs with a film wrap. To remove shell, crack it all over first, then start peeling from the large end. If shell sticks, peel egg under cold running water.

Cooked eggs are good in salads and sandwich fillings, deviled and dip

and canapes. They're useful and nutritious in many casseroles. They make a good luncheon or supper dish stirred up in white sauce—alone or with tuna, ham or dried beef,—and served over toast, cracker, potatoes or rice.

Bacon and Egg Spread

- 1 pkg. (8 oz.) soft cream cheese
- 2 tsp. mayonnaise
- salt to taste
- 2 to 3 drops hot sauce
- 4 hard cooked eggs, chopped
- ¼ tsp. pepper
- 1 tsp. instant minced onion
- 8 slices cooked bacon, crumbled

Combine all the ingredients in the order listed above. Mix thoroughly and spread on your favorite sandwich bread. Yield: 2 cups.
