#### Legislature increases fees

While the effective date of the much publicized weight-distance tax is still up in the air, HB 810, recently approved by the 1982 General Assembly, increased a number of other user fees effective April 8. For the first time, about 10,000 for-hire trucks and any with three or more axles licensed in Kentucky must pay for a vehicle identification card (cab card). Under previous statutes, these vehicles based in Kentucky were not required to pay for cab


cards.

The cab card fee has been raised from \$2 to \$20 each. However, there are a number of exemptions to the requirement in the new legislation.
