City of Mt. Vernon still having internal problems with police dept.

The City of Mt. Vernon is still having problems within their police department. The City Council spent approximately one hour of their regular monthly meeting Monday night, in executive session discussing personal problems within the department.

After the lengthy close-door in which three of the city's police officers were called in for questioning, the council came back into open meeting where no motions were made, concerning the police department.

Mayor Roland Mullins did, however, state that the council had instructed acting police chief Frank DeBorde to begin shopping around Mt. Vernon for the lowest price on gasoline and car washes. Mullins also stated that the council had instructed DeBorde during the closed session to tell the rest of the men on the force to begin logging their mileage and report to the council each month on the total number of miles driven.

During a public hearing held on March 25, the council voted to apply for a Community Development Block grant of \$500,000 from the department of Housing and Urban development to upgrade the sewer system, fix curbs and gutters, and clean up streets and work on housing in

the Fairground Hill area of Mt. Vernon. The city has applied for this grant several times and never received it.

The UDAG grant which is to help Mt. Vernon Plastics their expansion project and create 45 new jobs was finally approved and the money will be released by the federal government as soon as the city does an Environment Impact study on the area. Michael Hayes, of Cumberland Valley Area Development District was present Monday to present a contract to the council on the impaled study which the CVADD will do at a cost of \$2000. Hayes said that this could be paid out of the pay back from Mt. Ver-

non Plastics. The council voted to accept the contract.

In other business, city clerk Mary McClure told the council that she had contacted Floyd Owens about serving as director for the ARP grant that the city has applied for to work on revitalization of the downtown area. The grant, if approved, will be for \$20,000 and Owens will be responsible for all the bookkeeping of the project.

In a public hearing held before the regular monthly meeting Monday the council voted to amend the revenue sharing budget in order to use the money to build sidewalks instead of buying a new police cruiser.

Local hospital to construct intensive and coronary units

On April 7, the Governing Board of the Eastern Kentucky Health System (EKHS) approved Rockcastle County Hospital's application for a Certificate of Need to construct a combination Intensive Care and Coronary Care Unit in the facility. The unit will contain three ICU/CCU beds, with adjacent step down beds adjacent to the unit.

Acute coronary heart disease is responsible for over one-half million deaths and ranks as the greatest single cause of death in the United States. According to the American Heart Association 85 percent of the deaths occur resulting from cardiac arrhythmia, cardiac shock or cardiac failure alone or in combination. Increasingly impressive evidence is accumulating showing that

prompt and adequate treatment in the hospital in special care facilities can significantly reduce mortality through early detection, diagnosis and treatment. To an increasing extent within recent years, acute general hospitals have developed intensive care units for the more effective care of seriously ill patients. The continuing needs of seriously ill medical and post-surgical patients and many others have led to the need for intensive care units.

Approval by the EKHS is a major step in the difficult process of implementing or adding new hospital services under Kentucky Certificate of Need Laws. Final approval must still be obtained from the Certificate of Need and License Board which meets on May 19.

Five injured in two car accident

Five persons were injured in a two vehicle accident Saturday April 10, two and one-half miles north of Mt. Vernon on US 25.

Injured were Diana Mills, 22, driver of one vehicle, Cynthia Mills, 4, and Tommy Mills, 2, all of Stanford and Edward Hopkins, 38, Lexington, driver of the other car and a passenger in the Hopkins car, Janice Gemin, 40, also of Lexington.

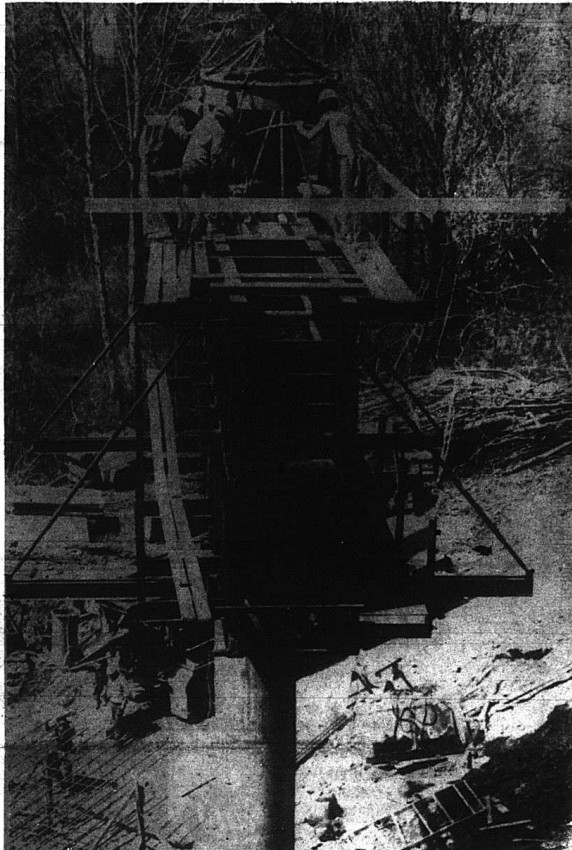

The plight of the local farming community, especially during recession

Those brave enough to attempt making a living from farming the mostly rough, hilly, limestone terrain in Rockcastle have found that it takes determination, good management and luck, among other things, to be even moderately successful.

Persons in a position to make an intelligent comment about the current and future farming situation, say the farmer will have to have a little bit more of all three ingredients in order to succeed in the squeeze in which he is now finding himself.

So ironic, confusing and

disconcerting are their experiences and information that farmers all over the country are worried. Those in Rockcastle are no different. Some say they are worried for the first time in their farming careers.

Actually, in comparison to those who "do a little farming" there are very few farmers in Rockcastle who are "hard core" or "full time", that is, they live from farm income alone. These farmers have, of course, more reason to be concerned about economic indicators and farm forecasts.

Wayne Adams and his brother, Kenneth, run a 150 acre dairy farm in the

choicest farming section of the county, the Brindle Ridge area.

Adams admits he's more concerned this year than he has ever been since he began farming. He worries about being able to pay his bills during what he anticipates as some rough time ahead for the dairy farmer. Eventually, he thinks, it will get better.

Topmost on Adams' and other dairymen's list of worries is the expected price cut. Because the government has been generous with a price support (between \$13 and \$14 per 100 pounds) there is a milk surplus which is reportedly

costing the government \$250,000 per hour.

Good prices at the milk tank have encouraged more farmers to enter the dairy business especially since there was no quota or base, while prices at the grocery have caused consumers to resist buying milk.

The Adamses have already met with their buyer, Southern Belle, who predicted that, following numerous current USDA hearings, the price support of milk could drop by as much as \$2, as early as April.

Adams raises some tobacco, but "everything comes from the dairy", he says, "and the dairy has

been good up until now."

But with the cost of feed (his biggest expense) and other increasing farm expenses including interest, machinery, parts and fertilizer, he wonders a questionable whether some dairy farmers will be able to hold on.

Adams says one problem the farmer faces is getting behind one year on short term operating loans. Whatever the reason, if this happens, he is in trouble. The next year, he has to refinance, and add to it. It is almost impossible to catch up. For some farmers, one bad year can mean ruin.

The dairy industry has made attempts to regulate

production and thus regulate its price, but producers have resisted it, so the government may be asked to help enforce a quota. Milk producers are anxious by waiting to see what happens.

Even though Adams doesn't relish having to accept a lower price for his cash commodity, he sees it as the only option to reducing the surplus.

"When people are making money good, they say, 'ways want more,' he says, "but the government cannot continue at the current parity price and store the surplus."

State Legislature

Kentucky's state legislature has an opportunity to enact a two-year budget that will allow state government to live within its means.

The Brown Administration budget proposal can be revised in such a way that necessary state programs can be adequately funded without the benefit of a tax increase.

The first budget revision would save \$10 million the first year of the budget and \$18 million the second year, by directing the Department of Revenue to increase the effectiveness of its tax audit division, especially in regards to out-of-state corporations.

\$10.1 million in state revenues could be saved during the budget's first

year and \$11.7 million the second year by reducing the appropriations to most General Fund agencies by one percent.

Excluded from this one percent cut would be the minimum foundation and related programs for the blind and deaf, vocational education and rehabilitation services. Also excluded from the cut would be General Fund appropriations for universities and the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority.

\$10.2 million in state revenues can be saved by retaining a 27 to 1 pupil-teacher ratio in public school grades 1 through 8 during the budget's first year and a 25 to 1 ratio in the second year. An additional \$12.3 million can be produced by channeling 25 percent of the coal severance tax revenues, returned to coal counties for public improvement projects, to the Power Equalization Fund. Power Equalization is an educational mechanism which is used to help fund poor school districts. This new severance tax allotment program would only be utilized during the budget's first year.

The revision would continue by reinstating \$1.4 million to the education budget the first year and \$1.8 million the second year, for the vocational education equipment and the maintenance of facilities.

The revision would conclude with a \$3.1 million appropriation, to increase the capital outlay payment to local schools under the minimum foundation, program by \$100 per classroom during the budget's second year.

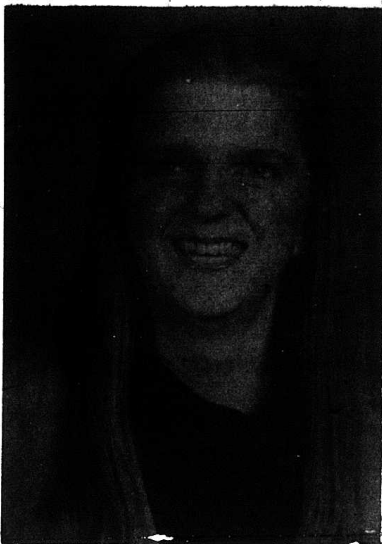

EXTENSION HOME ECONOMICS

Too Much Salt Can Harm You
Do you add salt to everything on your plate before tasting it? Many people do. Most people consume too much sodium in the

form of salt. Some sodium is necessary for proper body functioning. It is needed for normal growth and it helps maintain fluid balance in the body. Sodium is also involved in the utilization of both carbohydrate and protein. However, the average American consumes three to four times the estimated safe and adequate level of 1,900 to 3,300 milligrams of sodium listed in the National Research Council's recommended dietary allowances. One teaspoon of table salt contains 2,000 milligrams of sodium.

In addition to salt added at the table, it is added during cooking and in foods commercially processed. About 30 percent of the sodium in the average American's diet comes from salt added in the cooking. About 70 percent of the sodium is added in commercial processed foods or in sodium naturally occurring in foods.

Manufacturers add salt primarily to flavor foods. Other additives containing sodium are used to improve the color, texture and keeping quality. Since foods contain natural and added salt through processing, you can obtain the estimated safe and adequate amount of sodium with very little or no additional salt in the cooking or at the table. The biggest problem with excessive sodium is for people with high blood pressure. Kentuckians have a higher incidence of high blood pressure than the (Cont'd to P-13)

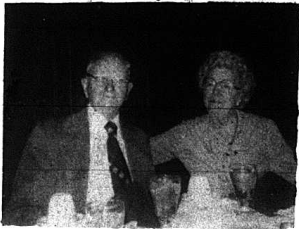

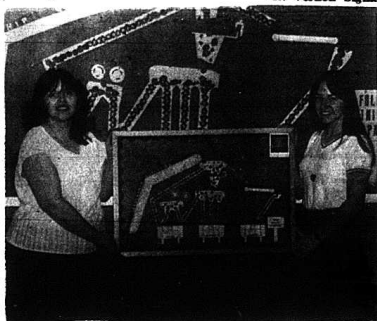

works third shift at Gibson in Berea and he jokes, "she keeps me farming," but then concedes that they would have to "slow down" if she didn't work.

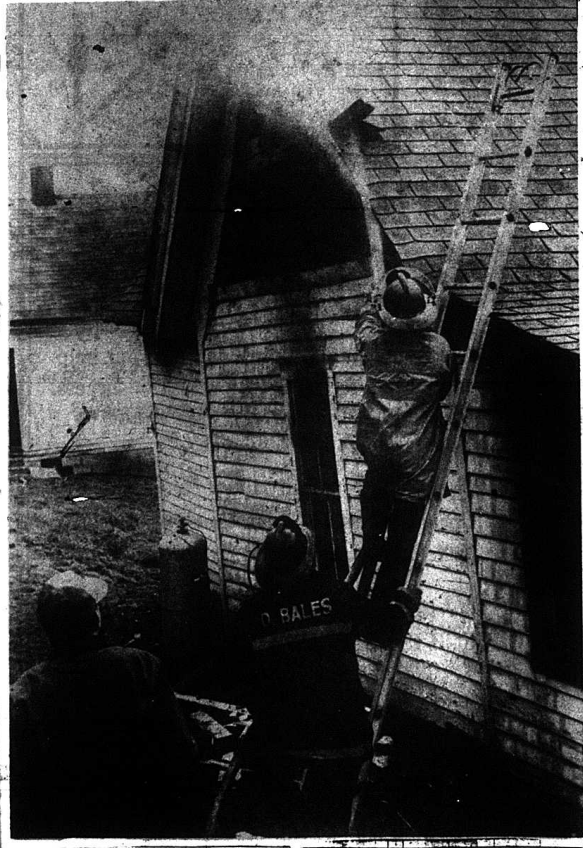
Barbara is frustrated that, like many middle-income families, they cannot afford to send their daughter, a 1981 graduate, to college, yet their income level is too high for her to qualify for student aid. She has not been able to find a job even though she is well qualified to hold a secretarial-type position.

Stephen Trebulo is a young Brodhead farmer who holds an agronomy degree from the University of Kentucky. He was featured a few years ago in an issue of the "Cooperative Farmer" magazine for his successful methods of soil testing and resultant corn production. The Trebulos have a 250 acre farm and raise about 900 hogs for the market yearly. Because the quality of their product is premium (a leaner animal with less fat) packers in Cincinnati and elsewhere are eager to pay top prices for their hogs.

But Trebulo and his wife have just weathered 2 years of what he says was possible, the worst de-

pressed hog market in the industry's history. Too many good years in a row ruined the market, he says. Three straight severe winters in the '70's knocked the litter size down and forced prices up. This trend was fed by low interest rates in the '70's which allowed for overexpansion.

The market was flooded with pork and the consumer refused to buy more than the 40 pounds per capita, standard consumption rate. Americans consume about 98 pounds of beef per year in comparison, Trebulo says.

Right now, hog prices are up because many small farmers got out when prices fell. The credible prediction is that hog prices will continue upward for some time, but no one knows for how long.

Trebulo sees this (marketing) as the biggest problem facing farmers now. Being at the mercy of the market naturally forces some farmers out and discourages potentially good farmers from entering the business.

Harold Ballinger, local ASCS officer, affirms that most farmers are having a bad time right now. They are caught in the "price-cost squeeze", he says, with fuel prices being the only recent decrease in cost. The biggest increases, most agree, have been in machinery costs and repair.

With regard to the tobacco situation, Ballinger predicts the tobacco price support will be lowered, partly, he believes, because the present formula is pricing the United States out of the world tobacco market.

The price support of \$1.62 for 1981 was surpassed at the market last year with an average price of \$1.86 per pound. Because of the good year some tobacco farmers were able to hold on another year, says Stewart, local farm adviser. He thinks tobacco farmers will be asked to share some of the tobacco marketing costs and thinks it would be better for the farmer to contribute to the cost of the program rather than lose it.

Last year, the pool for the first time was not self-supporting and the government lost money. He doesn't think this trend

will be allowed to continue.

Stewart has also heard rumors that there may be some changes made in the program with regard to leasing from farm to farm and buying and selling of leases and quotas.

These changes and added costs may not be something the farmer will accept readily, however, Stewart says he can expect to have to do some adjusting in order to retain the system.

Stewart says the dairy and beef farmer can make it through the current recession if he will do a better job of management including control of flies and internal parasites; breed for production; cull low producing cows; feed according to production and do a better job of producing forage silage. In other words, he must plan and scrutinize every facet of his farming operation for ways to make it work.

Sam Ford, local auctioneer and realtor, says the trend in the last year or two has been back to selling the farm as a unit rather than subdividing large farm acreages, as had been the trend for several years. He says, this may be due, in part, however, to the depressed housing industry. He conceded that the short-term outlook may be grim, but in the long run, he says, things are going to be good for the farmer. He says everything he reads points to this, especially with the shortage of world food supply.

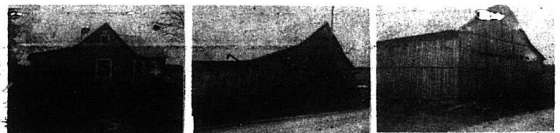

national average of 17 percent. And more Kentuckians die from cardiovascular disease, linked with high blood pressure, than do people in any other state.

Usually, sodium restrictions for individuals with high blood pressure lower their blood pressure, reducing the need for medications to treat this ailment. High blood pressure can be caused by other factors, though, and there is no way of determining in advance who will be sodium sensitive and who will not. Therefore, it is wise for everyone to analyze salt consumption if necessary. It is especially important for persons whose relatives have high blood pressure or cardiovascular disease to moderate salt intake.

Following are some specific ways to cut your salt intake:

Avoid or limit the amount of foods high in salt, such as cured meats, pickles and salted snack foods.

Homemade soups and broths are economical and easy to prepare without salt. Freeze extra portions in plastic freezer containers.

Use less salt in cooking, season with herbs and spices instead.

Avoid using extra salt at the table. Read food labels. Check the ingredient list for salt or the nutrition information part for sodium listed in milligrams.

Many heat-and-serve main dishes and dinners such as frozen TV dinners, pot pies, and canned-meats are high in salt. Prepare and freeze convenience foods at home.

For more information, contact your county Extension agent in Home Economics. We have a new publication, "Salt and Sodium in a Four Diet," published by the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Legislature increases fees

While the effective date of the much publicized weight-distance tax is still up in the air, HB 810, recently approved by the 1982 General Assembly, increased a number of other user fees effective April 8.

For the first time, about 10,000 for-hire trucks and any with three or more axles licensed in Kentucky must pay for a vehicle identification card (cab card). Under previous statutes, these vehicles based in Kentucky were not required to pay for cab

cards. The cab card fee has been raised from \$2 to \$20 each. However, there are a number of exemptions to the requirement in the new legislation. Those vehicles exempted are farm trucks licenses in accordance with KRS 186.050 (4)(b), those licensed for limited urban hauling, trucks used exclusively for carrying coal and forest products less than 50 miles, and those carrying concrete blocks or ready mixed concrete less than 30 miles.

Motor fuel trip permits have been licensed from \$10 each to \$20. These are 10-day temporary permits for trucks subject to the motor fuel surcharge requirements in KRS 138.660 but which do not have a permanent Kentucky fuel user's license (KYU).

Single trip over-dimensional vehicle permits now cost \$30 each instead of \$15.

Single trip over-dimensional house trailer permits were increased from \$10 to \$20 each and annual house

trailer permits rose from \$40 to \$80 each.

Any of the yearly cab cards and permits that have already been purchased are valid until the appropriate expiration date.

All Democrats, between the ages of 14 and 35, are encouraged to attend. There will be a discussion about upcoming club elections and the annual state convention.

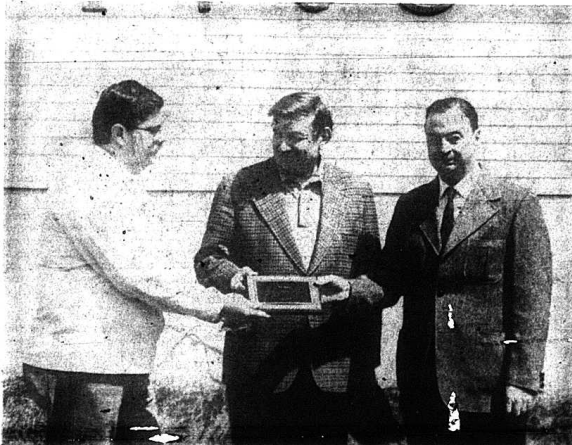
