Transportation Department awards resurfacing contract

The Kentucky Department of Transportation has awarded an \$88,393 contract to The Allen Co. of Winchester to resurface 6.2 miles of U.S. 25, London-Livingston-Mt. Vernon road, in Rockcastle County.

U.S. 25 will be resurfaced from KY 400 to Mullins Station Road, a distance of 3.8 miles and from south of Burr interchange to U.S. 150, a distance of 2.4 miles.

The projects are part of the state's estimated \$23.5 million resurfacing program

for 1982. This year's program includes resurfacing 886 miles of highway throughout the state.

Within the past two years the department has cut the paving cycle by more than half, according to Transportation Secretary Frank Metts. Each state maintained road will be resurfaced an average of once every 15 years instead of once every 35 years.

Preventive maintenance such as this reduces the need for costly repairs and saves the taxpayers' money, Metts said.

Unseasonably cold and unusually wet spring throws farmer behind

The horrendous weather conditions that residents in Rockcastle County have been experiencing thus far this Spring affects everyone in some manner or another. However, the local farmer is the biggest sufferer of the peculiar weather, which has boasted hail storms, freezing temperatures, extremely high winds and partial flooding of the low lying areas.

According to Tom Mills, Rockcastle County Extension agent for Agriculture, the inclement weather has caused the apple crop in the county as well as across the state to be at an 80 or 90% loss for 1982. Mills said Monday that specialists in the field of agriculture at the University of Kentucky blame the extremely unseasonable-like temperatures of around 16 degrees for the apple shortage. He said that the peach crop, of which there are only a small number of growers in the county, will be virtually non-existent this year. "The cold weather is also blamed for this," Mills said.

Strawberries, which are more popular to the farmers in the county than either apples or peaches, usually bloom three times a year, according to Mills, who said that the first blooms were killed by the weather, and the entire strawberry crop will have to come from the final bloomings, thus causing strawberries production to be down by almost two-thirds.

Tobacco, the farmers most popular crop for it is their most profitable one, was also hurt by the terrible weather. Mills said

that although it is almost impossible to kill tobacco plants while they are still in the bed, if the temperature gets down in the teens as it has done this spring, the plants will die if they are in the "crook" stage of growth. The Crook stage is when the water is going into the seed and if it freezes it will kill the plant. Mills said that farmers usually plant three or four times more seeds than actually needed and this will help to offset the bad weather's effect on the plants.

However, Mills also said that the setting of tobacco which usually begins

around the middle of May will probably be about a month late. He said that plants are not ready and farmers have not been able to get into their fields to prepare them because of the above average amount of rain.

The Agriculture agent also said that alfalfa has not been spared from the weather either. He said that the cold weather has caused alfalfa to be set back considerably and the weevil insect which feeds on the hay will be highly prevalent during the growing season, which will also cut back production of alfalfa.

The wet weather has also caused farmers to be very late in seeding their fields and Mills said that this would cause the crops to be late in arriving this year. "It's just been a mess," Mills said.

Over \$10.3 billion was appropriated for the biennial to the Legislative \$27.3 million, Judicial \$ 114.7 million and executive \$10.3 billion branches of the Commonwealth's government.

Also, \$24 million in new revenue is estimated to be forthcoming as the result of several tax and fee increases and the implementation of management-efficiency programs approved by the legislature.

However, the legislature took the easy way out and raised taxes, which can only serve to promote the inflationary spiral.

In other actions, the General Assembly also took steps to reform the state's regulation and oversight of nursing homes, spouse abuse centers, jails, programs for the mentally ill, coroners, coal mine safety

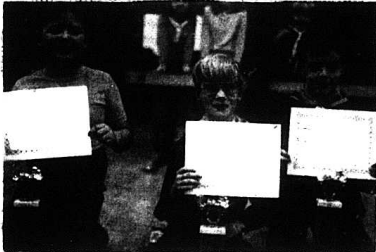

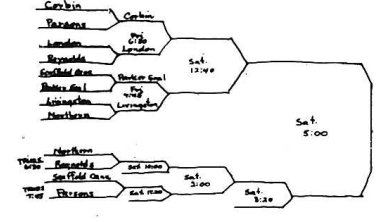

Eagles attracted to Kentucky

The results of last January's eagle census show that Kentucky is attracting more and more wintering bald eagles each year, says Jim Durell, an assistant director of wildlife with the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources and the coordinator of the state eagle count.

"Our observers counted 141 bald eagles this year," Durell says, "and this is a significant increase from the 105 counted last year."

Since the nationwide eagle population is up only slightly, the big jump in Kentucky eagles probably means that more and more of these birds are choosing to winter here rather than

elsewhere, they've been found, Durell says.

By now, many of the eagles that spent the winter in Kentucky have moved out, according to Durell, and, by summer, almost all will be gone. Most of them probably spend the summers in the Great Lakes region and move south when lakes start to freeze over there.

The largest concentration of eagles was on the Ballard Wildlife Area in far western Kentucky, where 43 were sighted.

Next in numbers of eagles was Land Between the Lakes with 17.

In Eastern Kentucky, the biggest concentration is in the Dale Hollow-Cumberland region, where 24 eagles were counted. One bird was spotted at the Minor Clark Fish Hatchery at Cave Run Lake, the eastern-most eagle in the county.

As far as can be determined, no eagles have nested in Kentucky in recent times, although this situation might change in the next few years. Biologists at Land Between the Lakes

are in the third year of a program which could establish a breeding population in the state.
