

## KSP March activity report

During the month of March, the Kentucky State Police Post at London reports the following activity:

777 motorists were issued citations for traffic violations (including driving under the influence of intoxicants and moving hazardous violations); 34 persons were issued courtesy notices for faulty equipment and different traffic violations; 29 motorists were assisted with breakdowns, given tourist information, etc.

A total of 197 traffic accidents were investigated. Of these, 132 were property damage only accidents; 60 were personal injury accidents; there were five fatal accidents; 118 persons were injured and six persons were killed.

221 criminal investigations were made resulting in 138 criminal arrests.

418 persons attended 14 safety programs conducted by the Ky. State Police.

## Suit dismissed

## Democrats gain control of Brown Precinct once again

It's hard to keep a good man down! Or at least that is the way it seems to be in the Brown Precinct of Rockcastle County. Brown, which had been a predominately Democrat precinct for as long as almost anyone could remember, went over to the Republicans side in last May's county primary. The Republicans had 304 regis-

tered voters to the Democrats 271, 77th, 11th, 14th voting precincts in the county were Republican.

The reason for the change in the status of Brown was the fact that 11 Republican candidates were seeking the Magistrate's seat that Danny Sargent of Brodhead, had held for some time. Sargent declined to run in the election thus opening the door for the 11 hopefuls.

Brown, which is located in the general area of Wyalilla, Quail and Ottawa, stayed the most heavily-populated Democratic Precinct in the county; but, according to Henry Brown, who is the Rockcastle Democratic County Chairman, and who lives in the Brown precinct, "that just wasn't good enough." Mr. Brown said that once the primary election was over and the 11 candidates were narrowed to one, he began working trying to convert Brown back to it's old status. Brown managed the task, and as last in the Rockcastle County Clerk's office, the Democrats showed a voter registration total of 332 and the Republicans, 299.

## Revitalization project gets underway

The City of Mt. Vernon has been awarded a grant from the Department of Local Government and the Appalachian Regional Commission to prepare a long term downtown revitalization program.

Floyd Owens has been named Project Director and will have the primary responsibility for management of the revitalization project. He will coordinate activities and scheduling and see to it that all contracts are fulfilled, according to Roland Mullins, Mayor of Mt. Vernon.

Community support will be established in large part with organization of the Local Development Corporation (LDC). "This organization can be the vehicle for progress and help make the entire community aware of the assets of downtown and the importance of the program," said Mullins.

Named to the LDC committee will be representatives of the city council and various civic agencies and clubs.

According to the first year plan-of-work, a careful economic analysis and promotional analysis, in advance of and coordinated with, program development is planned to establish the downtown area's market and determine what the city can and cannot do. Included in this analysis will be recommendation on promotional ideas for Mt. Vernon, merchandising techniques and the economic restructuring of downtown, if need be. "The project is intended as a major step to recapture Mt. Vernon's place as an attractive and business district," Mullins said.

The plan-of-work further states that, as with most communities, parking and traffic congestion are seen as major problems in Mt. Vernon. "This situation will be addressed and worked on whether it takes an extensive rewriting of traffic regulations, or just a program to change attitudes and perceptions of residents," Mayor said.

The plan outlines the general timetable for the project as follows: "During

the first year, it is essential to determine what Mt. Vernon is capable of accomplishing and what residents and business persons want the city to be. During the second year of the project, the actual design work can be best undertaken based on the research and recommendations. The city and Project Director will help any resident or business with design work and implementation whenever possible, but "jumping the gun" and uncoordinated piecemeal activity is underscored. A unified plan for streetscapes and building facades will be developed and implemented in the second year of this program.

During the third year, the implementation will continue and the mechanisms will be put in place for the revitalization project to continue into the future."

## Elmwood Perpetual Care Corporation solicits help

For approximately sixty years the Elmwood Cemetery has expanded and has received donations from an increasing number of people. Today very few lots are available. This means that in one generation there will be too few donations to meet the need for maintenance. This constant perpetual care must if the graves are to be properly cared for.

The Elmwood Cemetery Perpetual Care Corp. which supersedes Elmwood Cemetery Association, was founded September 17, 1981, after a number of interested and concerned citizens met to discuss the need for the establishment of perpetual care for Elmwood Cemetery.

The corporation, managed by an elected board of directors, acquired a tax exempt status from the IRS on December 23, 1982.

By virtue of both state and federal law, all funds received by the corporation must be used exclusively for the maintenance and upkeep of the cemetery. The secretary-treasurer is bonded to insure proper handling of all accounts.

Be selecting this method of organization all donations are tax deductible while at the same time no

member incurs any liability by virtue of membership. Any person making contribution becomes a member of the corporation and is

## Other ASPI projects complement solar house

"Perma-culture", the idea of getting almost every aspect of life and environment working in a relationship which benefits the other, thus conserving and enhancing all, is demonstrated in the Appales Science in the Public Interest (ASPI), near Livingston on the Rockcastle River.

An experimental solar house, built two years ago on the side of a hill, serves as an office and residence for directors of ASPI. The developers and expanders of the project are trying to incorporate various experiments and projects which relate to the best use of natural resources and the interaction of scientific skills and knowledge with these resources.

The two-story solar house, which is not "super-insulated" and at present is not even underpinned, features an attic solar water-heater and inexpensive drums filled with water, which store and radiate heat from the sun. The only back up heat is a wood stove on the ground floor. According to the winter residents, one and one-half cords of wood were used to heat the 1700 square feet of floor space last winter.

According to information from a daily temperature and climate log, the coldest morning in January, the temperature inside the house was 52 degrees with

a stoked fire in the stove. There were only 5 sunny days in December of '81 according to the log and on those days the sun warmed the house with no need for back-up heat.

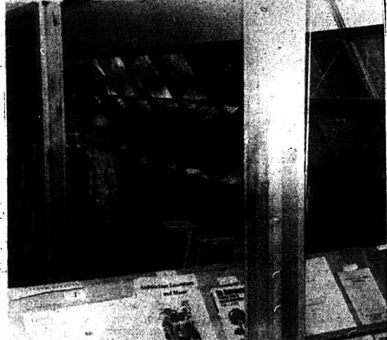
The insulated panels, which serve as window shutters, are crucial and are still being perfected, according to Pat Sloan, a civil engineer, who along with his wife, Donna, has recently assumed the position as director at ASPI.

The French Intensive garden on the premises is a demonstration of organic gardening designed to use every available space in the mountain landlay. Com-

post from a Clivus Multitrum system of solid waste disposal inside the solar house provides the soil enrichment for the garden and for the greenhouse. The solar greenhouse was added last year.

The Clivus Multitrum was recently approved by the National Sanitation Foundation which allows for FHA financing approval. "This method of solid waste disposal is especially suited to rural and mountain areas as an alternative to septic tanks," Sloan says. "Gray water" (liquid waste) can be drained naturally away from the house and in the

## State Legislature

The legislature has approved a measure, developed by the Program Review and Investigations Committee, that could save the state somewhere between \$14 and \$39 million over the next two years.

The General Assembly passed Senate Bill 243 during the final days of the legislature session.

Senate Bill 243 will make changes in state investment practices for the purpose of increasing investment income earned on state funds.

The Appropriations and Revenue committee has estimated that the bill will save the state approximately \$14 million in the next two years.

However, Program Review estimates that the cash management system will yield \$19.5 million per year in new revenue.

The Program Review's credit, a provision developed by the committee and implemented in September is already in the process of saving the state \$125 million. The new procedure allows quicker mail collections and a check-deposit system for state funds.

Senate Bill 243 is the result of ten years of debate which culminated in Program Review's documentation of overwhelming evidence that state funds could be more efficiently managed.

The committee discovered specific instances where state funds were being in a Frankfort bank, without any interest being paid to the state.

One committee report, issued in 1980 revealed that the state lost \$50 million during fiscal year 1979-80, because of antiquated investment practices.

Senate Bill 243 will clearly centralize the authority to invest state funds in a five member commission composed of the governor, state treasurer, secretary of finance and two private citizens knowledgeable in financial management.

State investments will now have to be made according to regulations set by the new commission.

Senate Bill 243 will also permit idle state funds to be deposited in savings and loan associations as well as banks.

Further, the bill will require that state funds be offered first to Kentucky financial institutions at the full average rate being paid by regional banks.

The major change that Senate Bill 243 will bring about is that the investment of state funds will now be based upon earning the highest possible interest rate.

Also, the legislature passed Senate Bill 252, which is another result of a Program Review investigation that will save money by requiring the state to competitively bid for Fire and Tornado insurance coverage.

My, how the relative perks up when seeing something so full of life! Comb her (or his) hair, massage the arms or legs with a scented lotion or give a facial. Bring a plant or flowers. Take them for a car ride to see something other than the four walls of their confined world. Laugh with them when they forget who you are. If they are unable to talk, you do the talking. They often understand a great deal more than you think.

Above all, be upbeat and cheerful and stop feeling guilt. People who cannot take care of themselves do better when they are cared for by trained people. But do go see them often. Even the most senile ap-

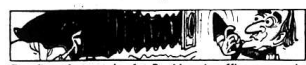

Selecting Vegetable Varieties  
The question is often asked, "What is the best vegetable variety to plant?" In reply, there are several things to be considered.

Generally speaking, though, the variety should be able to produce high yields and be of good flavor or eating quality. It should lend itself to storage or preservation by canning, freezing or drying, be resistant to disease and insect damage and when mature, occupy as little gar-

den space as possible.

In most cases when garden specialists in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture make recommendations, they have already evaluated the vegetables for at least a year and know what they are talking about. The home gardener will do well to acquaint himself with their terminology which, incidentally, is also used by seed companies. For instance, when the terms "resistant," "tolerant," "infinite" are used it will be well to know exactly what it means.

The word "resistant" means that a particular plant can endure an attack by a particular insect, disease organism, or some adverse conditions of growth. Resistant varieties may also be expected to survive and produce acceptable crops under all but the most severe conditions to climate and insect and disease infestation.

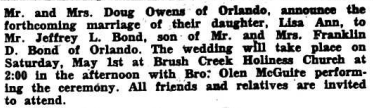
Immune varieties are reasonably safe from certain specified diseases, and becoming affected only if conditions favorable to the disease or insect damage persist for a long period of time.

The term "tolerant" means that a plant is capable of surviving and making a satisfactory crop under adverse conditions, but becoming affected only if conditions favorable to the disease or insect damage persist for a long period of time.

A tolerant variety of vegetable is easier to protect from damage by a particular disease, insect, or adverse conditions of soil and climate than a susceptible variety when standard control measures or cultural practices are used. In selecting seeds, pay attention to plant descriptions on the package or container.

Regardless of all the details mentioned, the thing that really counts is performance. By using recommended varieties and following good cultural practices, satisfactory results are greatly enhanced.

Any Kentucky gardener going out to plant this year will do well to first obtain a copy of UK Vegetable Recommendations for 1982. The list includes varieties that have been tried and tested and represent the "cream of the crop." The list, as well as a free publication, "Kentucky Home Fruit and Vegetable Gardening" can be obtained by calling the County Extension Service (256-2403) or dropping by the Extension office in the Courthouse.

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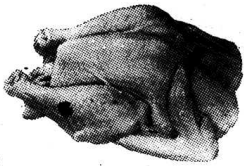

Nolin: crappie fair in the main lake, scattered from three to 18 feet deep; black bass fair casting crank baits off points; clear to murky, rising, at summer pool and 61 degrees.

Rough River: crappie fair along shoreline stick-ups (3-6 feet deep); black bass slow casting medium to deep runners off points and over deep drop offs; clear to murky, fishing slow; two feet below summer pool and 60 degrees.

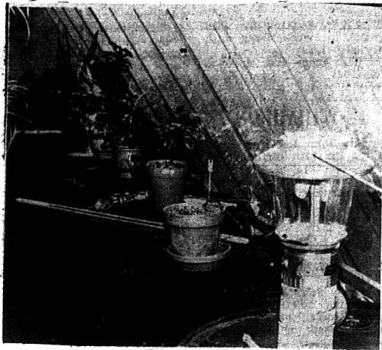

## "Judge Not, That Ye Be Not Judged"

Frequently when someone does not agree with me in what I teach, they accuse me of being too "judgmental," implying that I have no right to judge anyone. Somehow it does not occur to them that they are JUDGING me and of their teaching by this accusation.

Such is the problem in trying to apply (or mis-apply) the approval or commendation of Jesus in Matt. 7:1-5. Why, in their judgment, am I violating the teaching of Jesus in this passage, but not my own judging of me is no violation thereof? This, of course, is precisely the thing that Jesus was condemning in this passage.

The word "judge" is used in the Bible in both a GOOD (John 7:24) and BAD (Matt. 7:1-5; Rom. 2:13) sense. Jesus apparently deals with its use in a bad sense in Matt. 7:1-5. His reference is to Pharisaical hypocrisy. They placed heavy burdens upon others, yet did not keep God's laws themselves (Matt. 23:4, 16, 18). They were like a father who lectures his son about the evils of drinking while mixing a cocktail for himself. Of these, Jesus said, "...first cast the beam out of thine own eye..." (Matt. 7:5).

But Jesus also said, "Judge righteous judgement" (John 7:24). He means that we should render judgement which His law dictates, not judgements based on opinions or appearances. If all judgement is prohibited, then no PERSON could criticize another for ANYTHING. Try living in a society like that for awhile! We could have no judge in civil courts, no preacher in the pulpit, and parents could not judge the actions of other children. All of the required kinds of judging in the Bible are on the basis of God's law as it is revealed in the scriptures. Thus, when a

judgement (even of condemnation) is rendered on this basis, it is not really the person doing the judging (deciding), but the judgement has already been pronounced by God. Of course, for this to be true, correct interpretation and application of the scriptures is essential.

Why is it that no one cries "judge not?" The approval or commendation is expressed for what they are doing? Judgements are required for approval as well as for disapproval. The real problem is that many people want to teach and practice things not authorized in the Bible, and when someone points out the error, they cry "judgement!" If we have the right attitude, we do not resent having our religious practices called into question for we know that we do not "prove (test) all things" (1 Thess. 5:21); and "...believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they be of God..." (1 John 4:1). One who becomes angry or defensive because another "judges" his religion is in the same of what a search for truth might reveal. Merchants with bad watermelons don't want them plugged!

Truth does not fear honest investigation. Peter said, "...be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason concerning the hope that is in you" (1 Peter 3:15). Yes, Jesus said, "Judge righteous judgement" (John 7:24), and for us to fail in the discharge of this duty is for us to be judged by His law ourselves!

### Continental Telephone says lower phone bills are expected for most callers

The Federal Communications Commission has approved a plan that changes the way telephone companies calculate some long distance telephone calls. The plan went into effect for all interstate telephone calls placed after April 1, 1982.

According to Dean Sturgill, Superintendent of Continental Telephone Co. of Ky., Science Hill, Ky., the most significant change involves precise time billing of interstate long distance calls. (Interstate long distance calls cross state boundaries, while interstate calls go outside the local area but remain within the state).

If an interstate long distance call spans two rate periods, the charge will not be determined by the specific time slots it covers. This is markedly different from the traditional method of billing which calculated the cost of an interstate call on the basis of when it began.

"For example," said Mr. Sturgill, "under the new plan, the bill for a 15-minute interstate call that began at 4:55 p.m. will have a five-minute charge at the full day-time rate and a 10-minute charge at the evening discount rate. Before, this call would have been charged entirely at the full rate and the evening discount wouldn't have applied," he said.

Dean Sturgill explained that there are three rate periods for long distance billing purposes: between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. the full rate applies; from 5 p.m. to 11 p.m. the rates drop 40 percent; and the rates fall 60 percent on weekends and weekdays between 11

p.m. and 8 a.m. Sturgill said he expects many people will save money under this new plan, which is called Rate Period Specific Billing, because more calls are made just before 5 p.m. than before 8 a.m.

Dean Sturgill also said there are several other changes in long distance billing that went into effect on April 2. The evening discount (from 5 p.m. to 11 p.m.) has been increased from 35 percent to 40 percent.

The initial rate period for operator-assisted interstate calls and Calling Card calls is now one minute instead of three minutes. Additional minutes are charged at direct-dial rates, however, a surcharge will apply for the specific type of call. Those surcharges range from \$.60 to \$1.05 for Calling Card calls, \$.75 to

\$1.55 for station-to-station calls, and \$3.00 for all person-to-person calls. The exact surcharge for Calling Card and station-to-station calls is determined by how far the calls travel.

Also, Mr. Sturgill announced that Friday and Monday 'legal' holiday discounts on long distance calls have been eliminated. These discounts applied where New Year's, Independence, Labor, and Christmas Day fell on a weekend and the holiday was observed on a Friday or Monday.

### HEART CLINIC

A one day consultative and diagnostic heart clinic for cardiology patients will be held in the Whitley County Health Department on Tuesday, May 4, 1982.

Cardiologist from the University of Kentucky Medical center will conduct the clinic. These clinics provide a diagnostic service for the patient, along with the recommendations for treatment and management of the case. It also provides an opportunity for the referring physician to consult with the cardiologist regarding his patient.

Only those patients who have been referred by a physician and who have a written referral will be admitted to the clinics. Counties in this clinic area are Clay, Jackson, Laurel, Bell, Whitley, Knox and Rockcastle.

### PERMITS ISSUED

The division of permits in the state Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection issued 243 mining permits during March.

The number and types of permits issued included 153 original permits, 44 revision permits and 46 continuation permits for amendments, renewals, re-permits or succession of existing permits.

Of the total issued, 156 were for surface-mining operations, 83 for underground mining operations, 23 for preparation plants and refuse areas and 1 for a haul road.

Permitting activities for March authorized the disturbance of 6,260 new acres of land and resulted in the collection of \$353,550 in fees.

The following companies were issued permits to mine in Rockcastle County:

- Ikerd-Bandy Co., Inc., 42 acres; Jasper and Jasper Coal Company, 73 acres; Midnight Excavating, 4 acres. All three were for surface mining.
