Homemakers recognized at recent state meeting at UK

Rockcastle County Homemakers received three awards at the Kentucky State Homemaker's meeting held at the University of Kentucky campus March 17-19.

Gladys Bussell, County President, received a membership increase award for the county. Rockcastle County was the only county to receive the award, for 23 or more new members from the Wilderness Trail Area.

County Homemakers also received two first place awards on the State level for cultural arts entries. Rachel James, Town and Country Homemakers, received a blue ribbon in music composition. Betty Jo McKinney, Quail Homemaker, received a blue ribbon for poetry composition. This was the first year for competition in these categories.

Norietta Thompson, Quail Homemaker, represented the Wilderness Trail Area as Area President at the opening session of the meeting, as well as on the State Board, who plan and conduct the state-wide Homemaker Club program. Norietta has also represented the Wilderness Trail Area on the State Extension Council; an advisory group to the State Extension programs on Agriculture, Home Economics and 4-H.

Gladys Bussell and Sylvia Whitford, Brodhead Willing Workers Club, served as voting delegates from the county. What are Extension Homemakers Clubs

Extension Homemakers Association is a National organization, working through local clubs, whose purpose is to use education to achieve a better life for themselves, their families and their communities.

Kentucky boasts of 36,189 Homemaker Club members; 173 of whom are associated with Rockcastle County. The Homemaker Club organization is sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Service of the University of Kentucky.

The County Extension Agent for Home Economics serves as the advisor for the Homemakers.

There are two types of Homemaker memberships available in Rockcastle County: the organized club and the at-large membership. There are seven clubs: Brodhead Willing Workers (the largest with 27 members); Quail (the oldest with over forty years of continuous club work); Town and Country; Happy Hearts; Livingstone Live Wires; Rise and Shine Homemakers and Brindle Ridge. The last two were organized this past fall.

The clubs meet monthly with education lessons in areas of health and nutrition, family living, consumerism, housing and energy, and citizenship. The lessons are selected by the club members and presented to club leaders by Extension agents and specialists. The leaders, in turn, share the educational lesson at the club meetings. Most clubs also become involved in community improvement projects when needed.

A Homemaker-At-Large member belongs to the county organization but not to a specific club. These members receive educational materials and lessons through the mail and join in county, area, and state homemaker activities.

Rockcastle County has sixty-one Homemakers-at-Large.

As a county association, the Homemakers Clubs sponsors the Blood Drive 2-4 times a year in the county, and outstanding Home Economics student award at RCHS, Cultural Arts tours each summer, and special interest programs throughout the year.

The State Homemakers Association has won many awards nationally for cultural arts, health and membership awards. One of their outstanding projects is the contribution of over \$51,168 toward Ovarian Cancer Research at the University. Each member can voluntarily contribute to this fund. Kentucky Homemakers also provide scholarships to college students majoring in Home Economics. Theresa Gllovak, an RCHS graduate and student at UK, was granted one of the three scholarships available this year.

The Extension Homemaker Club program is growing in Rockcastle County. During the past seven years, the membership has doubled twice.

Rockcastle County is proud of the Homemaker Club members. Wouldn't you like to be a part of them?

County sheriff closed doors Tuesday

Rockcastle County fiscal court and judge-executive were hit head-on Tuesday morning with a problem that had been successfully "swept under the rug" for some time.

Sheriff William Taylor appeared before the magistrates and asked that the sheriff's department be accepted into the budget for the fiscal year 1982-83. Taylor said that according to auditors report, the sheriff's office grossed \$23,958 in 1981. The net after expenses was \$6,400, he said. Taylor said there was no way to operate the office on that. He said that the biggest monthly check he has drawn this year was \$311.00 from the state. The rest comes from the \$300 per month. The rest comes from fees and tax collections or county assistance.

Taylor requested the county make up the difference between what he collects in fees and the amount it would take the county his deputies \$12,000 a year, a secretary, \$6,000; \$1,000 a month operating expenses and himself, \$14,000 a year.

Taylor said the state sets the sheriff's salary at \$28,000 but he is asking for a reasonable guarantee of only half that amount. He said he wants to do a good job, but can't if he can't make a living. He related how he had already spent \$9,000 of his own money on cars and gasoline.

The \$10 fee for warrant serving is paid only if they get a conviction, a \$3 fee is paid to serve jury summons which must be handed directly to the person and \$18.50 is paid to take a prisoner to LaGrange and \$16 to Lexington. None of these fees, he says, pays for the gasoline for the trips.

The magistrates, for the most part, remained silent as the issue was discussed. Judge Jasper said that he couldn't comment at the moment on the request. He said he had contacted the state Dept. of Finance and asked that a representative who helps counties in fiscal matters be present at the Tuesday meeting to advise the county. He said revenues would allow for the inclusion of the sheriff in the budget. The representative was unable to attend the Tuesday meeting, but promised to be at the courthouse on May 18 at 10 a.m. to discuss the budget.

Jasper said he knew the "boys" were doing a good job but that it was a matter of having enough money to go around. He said the court had its own obligations and indicated that if there was any money left it would be in favor of helping them.

Karen King, representing the Mt. Vernon Business and Professional Association, Don Stewart, representing the Old Barrens Shackleford, representing the Lions Club and Randy Isom, representing the Kiwanis Club, read letters of support from their organizations and Ms. King presented the court with several petitions in favor of the court's including the sheriff's department in the budget.

Several other persons attended the meeting to testify on behalf of the sheriff's department and request that funds be made available to them to operate the office.

Judge Jasper said he could make no answer until after the meeting on the 18th and said the county had the road program to think of and he did not want the county to go broke.

Taylor said if he could not get a commitment from the magistrates, he would have to release his deputies, Willie Powell and Clarence Hasty and open his office only two days a week to collect taxes, which according to Taylor, is the only job he is required by law to do.

In other business, the court hired Danny Offutt to replace Brad Durham as ambulance driver at \$3.38 per hour.

Don Kirby requested that the road to the county land-fill be fixed. The court agreed to fix the road and gave Kirk-Bundy Coal Co. permission to relocate the White Oak Road near Red Hill, provided they fix it back to present condition and make any improvements have ceased.

Rockcastle man electrocuted

A Rockcastle County man died while working on an electrical transfer at the Blue Grass Army Depot in Richmond, last Wednesday afternoon, according to Bazil Cole, an employee of the depot.

Ronald Gene Thacker, 42, of Route 3, Mt. Vernon, was pronounced dead at the scene by Madison County Coroner James Curry, around 1:30 p.m. Curry said that accidental electrocution was the cause of death.

"He was working on a line changing out an electrical transformer when he apparently got into a live line carrying 2400 volts of electricity," said Bazil Cole.

Robert Taylor of Mt. Vernon, who was working with Thacker at the time of the accident told Curry that he did not know anything had happened to Thacker until he heard a frying noise. He said that once he realized that something was wrong, he brought Thacker down from the line, and took him to the dispensary where Curry

pronounced him dead at the scene.

Thacker had been an electrical lineman at a depot for 17 years.

He was the son of the late Gilbert Thacker and Florence Pauline Parsons Thacker and a member of the Clarksville Baptist Church.

He was a member of the Berea Blue Lodge 617 F&AM, the Royal Arch Masons, the council, the commandery of the Order of Shrines. He was past Master of the Masonic Lodge and past member and worthy patron of the Eastern Star Chapter 120.

Survivors include his wife, Thelma; one son, Randall Gene, 14, at home; one brother James Thacker of St. Louis, Missouri; three sisters, Mrs. Geneva Bullens of Mt. Vernon, Mrs. Betty Griffin of Lexington and Mrs. Barbara Sue Preston of Salvisa.

Funeral services were held Friday, April 30 at the Wray Funeral Home in Berea and burial was in Madison Memorial Gardens.

Local school board plans ahead for 1982-83 school year

Replacing the ceiling at Roundstone Elementary School will cost much less than anticipated following Tuesday night's opening of bids to remove the ceiling and replace it.

Vitamin Promoters May Provide Unneeded Advice
Among the preventive health measures practiced by many Americans every day is the taking of vita-

mg.; Vitamin B12-6 micrograms.

A separate tablet of vitamin A or vitamin B, for example, is not necessary. Large quantities of vitamins, especially two of the fat-soluble vitamins A and D, can be toxic.

Foods generally do not contain toxic quantities of vitamins. The biggest problem is with over-the-counter supplements that contain many times the USRDA. Never take these amounts without a physician's recommendations.

Also, so-called "health" foods may be highly fortified. Read labels to be sure you are getting only the RDA.

The symptoms of vitamin A toxicity include headache, nausea and vomiting, tiredness, ringing in the ears, dry skin, brittle nails, abdominal pain and bone pain. Blindness and death could occur if the overdose continues over a long period. The USRDA of 5,000 I.U. daily is not harmful, but dosages of 25,000 to 50,000 I.U. per day may cause the symptoms.

The symptoms of vitamin D toxicity include weakness, constipation, loss of appetite, weight loss, excessive urination and nausea. More serious conditions result from calcification of soft tissue, such as the kidneys and blood vessels. This happens when excess vitamin D causes too much calcium to be absorbed and deposited in abnormally large amounts. Other problems are bone deformities and multiple fractures.

As little as 1,800 I.U. of vitamin D over long periods may be slightly toxic for children. More would be required to cause problems in adults. The USRDA is 400 I.U., the amount found in one quart of fortified milk.

mins to supplement their diets. Controversies over what vitamins our bodies need and in what form and quantity continue.

Recently in Kentucky certain companies have been pushing sales of vitamin supplements to the public. Convincing advertising claims can make the facts even more difficult to recognize. One such claim states that natural forms of vitamins are better than synthetic ones. This is not true. Vitamins from a natural source are no more expensive than synthetic ones. Whether natural or synthetic, either form acts the same way in the body.

Promotions say, too, that everyone needs vitamin supplements. Rather, vitamin needs depend on the amount of nutrients in your diet. First, analyze your diet by keeping a list of what you eat for several days, and then compare the day's food intake with the Basic 4 Food Groups. A person eating a variety of foods from the basic food groups each day is probably getting the necessary amounts. One exception, however, would be in the case of a special health problem, diagnosed by a doctor, that requires increased vitamin intake.

If your diet isn't sufficient in nutrients and you need a supplement, choose a simple multi-vitamin. Compare the prices of different brands and the amount of each vitamin per tablet, listed on the label. Use the list below to choose a multi-vitamin tablet that provides what you need. Do not choose a tablet that gives more than 100 percent of the USRDA for each vitamin.

State Legislature

By Senator John D. Rogers

Kentucky's two-year state budget, which for the first time will exceed \$10 billion, is a mixed blessing.

This is to say that the budget, like most everything else, is not perfect. There are both positive and negative aspects of the appropriation measure approved by the 1982 General Assembly.

On the positive side, education in the Commonwealth should fare rather well in the coming two years.

Spending for elementary and secondary education will increase by 11.9 percent in the first year and 7.4 percent in the second year of the budget.

Salaries for public school teachers will increase by 3.5 percent next year and 6 percent the following year. Also, two paid in-service days, which teachers lost in budget cuts last summer, will be returned.

The average classroom size in the first three grades of public elementary schools will be lowered

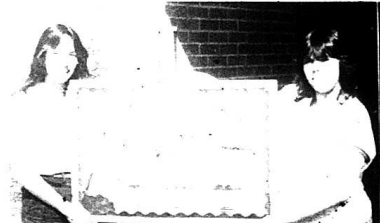

from 27 to 25 pupils. And, special programs for gifted and talented children will be established.

New funds will be provided for operating and transportation expenses and supplementary classes in such areas as music and physical education.

Also, the power equalization program, which helps poorer school districts, will receive a boost beginning in 1983 when school attendance money will be calculated on a district's best 7% months of attendance. This measure will primarily aid rural school districts that annually lose valuable state funds, which are based on attendance, due to students that miss some school days in order to help out on the family farm.

In higher education, new funds were provided for the expansion of student financial aid. Also, instructors' salaries will increase in each of the next two years.
