The thirty-eight students at Livingston will hear the class Valedictorian and Salutatorian speak.

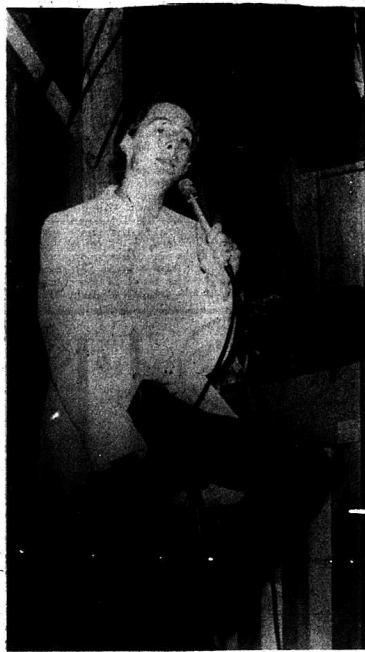
Rick Holladay, minister of Bethany United Church, Mt. Vernon, will speak to the 72 graduating eighth graders at Brodhead Elementary.

## Long Airdox of West Virginia purchases local Lee Steel Corp.

A spokesman for Lee Steel Corporation announced Tuesday the pending acquisition of the Rockcastle plant and property. Long Airdox, a manufacturing division of the Marmon Group, Inc. is the acquiring company. Long Airdox has

headquarters in Oak Hill, West Virginia. Approval for the corporate change was granted in Federal Court Monday afternoon. Pending final legal maneuvers, the closing date for this transaction is set for late this month.

A name for the new corporation has not yet been established. The spokesman indicated it was

anticipated that Long Airdox would legally be doing business at the Brodhead site by early June. The firm will continue fabrication and erection of coal handling and preparation facilities, just as Lee Steel Corporation has been doing. The Marmon Group, Inc. is a nationwide firm with yearly sales in excess of \$8 billion.

## Early community of Reedsville was site of thriving tannery

The economics and social center of the early community of Reedsville (now known as Disputanta or Clear Creek) was the tannery. The tannery was owned by a family named Reed from Lexington; thus the name Reedsville evolved. Nobody's certain what year the tannery started, but it is said to have been operating full strength the time of the Civil War.

It was the first influence industry had on this part of the country, and the first opportunity for settlers to become wage earners. There probably was a tannery in the community prior to the Reed's intervention, but it would have been a one-man operation with a local market and bartering as the system of exchange.

The tannery was located on the southern side of Todd Branch where it joins Clear Creek. An abundant water supply, vast amounts of chestnut oak trees and a railroad at Paint Lick were the factors that drew the Reeds and their tannery to Clear Creek. Foremost of these reasons, however, were the tanbark forests.

The Reed family, as well as owning the tannery, owned nearly 600 acres of forest land surrounding the tannery, and smaller tracts up and down the head of Clear Creek.

and on Copper and Skeggs Creeks. This amount of land was necessary to provide the tanbark needed in the process. Workers included tanners, men to haul the hides and men to peel and haul the tanbark.

The Reeds expanded the tannery operation of Travis Dodd (purchased in 1855) to such a size that one man recalls seeing a pamphlet, apparently published by the Reeds, which boasted Reedsville as the largest settlement between Knoxville, Tennessee and Richmond, Kentucky.

"I remember one time... it was the most I ever talked to anybody about... it was to Uncle Rube Abney. He wasn't my uncle, but we all called him that. He told me there were about fifty houses around those hills there, shacks that belonged to the company... It was kind of like a coal camp. They built these little houses and he said they just put them up on posts. They was back around that steep hill. He said that the lower side of them you could have walked under. They'd set them on the ground, then raise the back end of them up to level them up. And there was more over back of that bottom where the vats were. (Earl Hammond).

The Reeds also owned a commissary adjacent to

the tannery. However, they paid their workers in cash, unlike the script paid at coal camps.

"Well, they paid them good for the time, because they paid them seventy-five cents or a dollar a day. But that was as much or more than they got anywhere else. They paid so much a cord for that tanbark... I don't know what they paid them but they paid them enough that everybody was making a living out of it." (Charlie King)

Since there were very few places near to spend their money, after the workers paid their rent to the Reeds, much of the payroll undoubtedly filtered back through the commissary.

Another building in the settlement was the Reeds' house. It sat across from the tannery on the inside loop where the road now bends to run alongside Todd Branch toward Clear Creek.

"Well, right there in the bend, there was a house, of course, it was all dilapidated when I can first remember, but it had really been a fine place. It was where the owner, or boss of something lived.

They were stained glass that was leaded in on the side of that front door. There was a panel of glass plumb up and down the length of the door. This stained glass. On the front it had this little... you know what they call a portico instead of a porch it had this little fancy thing out there. These aris-

est need. There are very few strings attached to the spending of Revenue Sharing Funds.

According to Anna Rose Mullins, assistant to Judge Jasper, the largest portions of Revenue Sharing locally go to the operation of the local ambulance service and for garbage disposal.

Karen King, Carl Kirby, Mike Bryant and Donavan Cross voiced their concern that the sheriff's department be supplemented from the Revenue Sharing budget. After some discussion, Sheriff William T. Orr said he would put his deputies back to work until the 18th and pay them with money from his own pocket.

County government officials are scheduled to meet with a representative from the Kentucky Department of Transportation on that date to discuss the county budget and get a recommendation from him as to whether it would be economically sound to include the sheriff in the budget based upon the county's anticipated income.

Welkie Balkinger, representing the local Senior Citizens program, asked that the program be included in the budget in any amount.

Cheryl Witt was the only other person making a request for consideration. She asked the court to consider supplementing the salary for the county 4-H agents, something the county has done for several years.

The Local Government Economic Assistance Fund hearing was held at 11:30 Monday. The county got about \$94,000 last year and, according to Mrs. Mullins, expects to receive over \$108,000 in the 1982-83 fiscal year.

Thirty percent of these monies must be spent on coal roads according to Mrs. Mullins. The remaining portion can be spent on anything that local governments can legally spend money on.

Faye Thompson, director of the local Senior Citizens Program said that their program gets some funds which must be matched with 20% local funds and requested to be considered in the budget.

## Renfro man injured in one car accident

A one vehicle accident early Friday morning on U.S. 25 one tenth of a mile south of Mt. Vernon sent a Rockcastle County man to the hospital with class two injuries.

Injured was John Jay Teater, age 25, of Renfro Valley.

Teater was reportedly traveling north when his vehicle left the roadway to the left and went into a ditch. The vehicle traveled 244 feet before striking a rock cut and coming to rest.

Teater was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital suffering from injuries to the head. Trooper Guy Blevins investigated the accident.

## Hearings on spending of federal and state revenues

County Judge-executive Bob Jasper and Rockcastle Fiscal Court conducted three public hearings Monday to receive requests on appropriating Road Aid, Revenue Sharing and Local Government Economic Assistance monies for the 1982-83 fiscal year.

The first Road Aid hearing scheduled for 10 a.m., Donovan Cross asked that some of the \$244,428.00 the county expects to receive this year be spent on the Copper Creek road and a bridge on that road.

Joe Denney who runs a truck on the Cove Branch Road asked that the Cove Branch Road be considered for improvement.

Carl Kirby requested work on the Calloway Hollow Road where large coal trucks have

been traveling. Also, the High-Dry Ridge Road was mentioned by John Martin Graves as needing repair.

County Road Aid monies are funded by the state to be used specifically to maintain roads which the state turned over to the county several years ago.

At the 11 a.m. Revenue Sharing hearing, local citizens were told that Rockcastle Revenue Sharing monies for the coming year would be reduced from the \$244,000 it received last year to \$218,684, this fiscal year.

Revenue Sharing, a program initiated by former President Richard Nixon, is federal tax money returned to local governments to be used for whatever local officials see at the great-

est when he was driving it. There were under those things, you couldn't hardly stay around the wagon it smelled so bad." (Earl Hammond)

Sometimes the hides were salted to delay the decaying process, but the flesh tasted, only a few days before it began to rot. The bacteria from the rotting flesh carried disease as well.

The typical tanning process of the nineteenth century had six major steps: liming, bating, beaming, tanning, or mulling dry. It is probable that most or all of the steps were used at the Reedsville tannery.

The men unloaded the hides and put them in a lime solution to soak. This loosened the hair and made the hides porous. They were left here from five to seven days. Afterward, the hides were immersed in a bate solution, which was a mixture of chicken manure, water and salt. Bating softened the hides and counteracted to a degree, the liming solution, which tended to contract the hides. Hides were then moved to the beaming shed where the hair and excess flesh.

Throughout the tannery, there were rows of vats sunk into the ground some five to six feet. These were filled with thick poplar. Different vats were used for each of the liming, bating and tanning processes.

Chestnut oak was the only local tree whose tan-

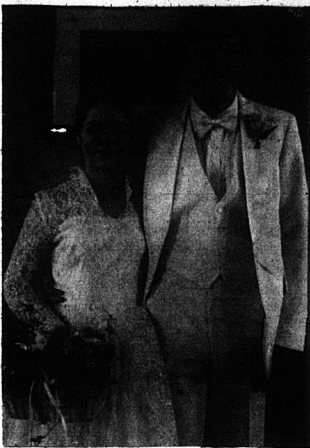

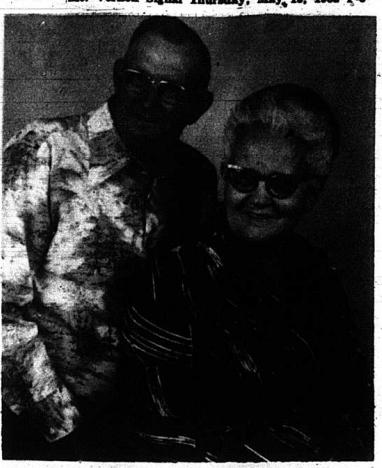

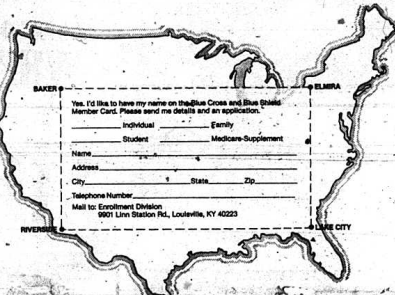

### Symbols or Cymbals?

Jehovah's Witnesses are working feverishly throughout the country to spread their doctrine. We admire their zeal, but abhor their false teaching. When one points out to them a scripture that contradicts their teaching, they usually counter with this statement: "That's only a symbol." The "fit" literal passages into their "symbols" category and vice-versa quite arbitrarily with expertise, wresting the scriptures to their own destruction as well as the destruction of those who believe them.

A case of point is the story of the rich man and Lazarus recorded in Luke 16. Since the "witnesses" do not believe in eternal torment, they cannot reconcile the statement regarding the rich man of whom the Scriptures say: "In hell he lifted up his eyes, being in torments, and seeth Abraham afar off, and Lazarus in his bosom. And he cried and said, Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus, that he may dip the tip of his finger in water, and cool my tongue; for I am tormented in this flame" (Luke 16:23-24). Now, for one who does not believe that anyone will be tormented after this life is over, this Scripture (and many others) poses a very serious dilemma. Therefore, they "explain it away" by saying, "That's only a symbol." We ask honestly, is it a symbol and if so, of what is it symbolic. "Torment" can only be symbolic of excruciating pain and anguish. It could never, even in the wildest imagination, be construed to mean a state of unconscious annihilation which the "witnesses" say is the only destiny of the wicked. The grave, they say,

ends it all for the wicked and there is no such thing as torment after this life. All this, in the face of the Savior's words, "These (the wicked) shall go away into everlasting punishment" and "there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth" (Matt 25: 41-46; Luke 13:28).

The "symbol" identifies its counterpart by its comparison. Torment and unconsciousness are not symbolic of one another; they are opposites.

There are, however, cymbals which have no value, according to the apostle Paul (1 Cor. 13:1). A cymbal, apart from the rest of the orchestra, is just a noise, and a most unpleasant one at that! Those who teach doctrines and commandments of men are merely making a noise. They speak "cymbals" of evil; not "symbols" of good.

It is our fervent prayer that all men everywhere will cease to pervert the Scriptures and "handle a right the word of truth" (2 Tim. 2:15). Only then can we avoid obtaining first-hand knowledge of the torments suffered by the rich man who failed to show compassion toward his fellow man. Whether the story told in Luke 16 is literal or figurative, it's still torment. Don't be taken in by "cymbals" that beat out this message: "There is no hell nor punishment after death." Let's take there is. Let's take God's Word for it!

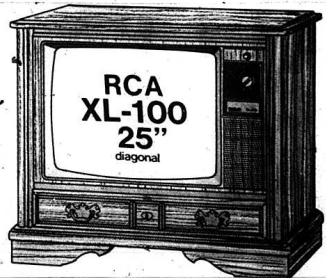

right. He picked it up on the train, but he never did get back. This fellow, he'd got a horse from found the horse back in the barn. I believe his name was Lefe King. They said he had a real fine saddle horse and this fellow Sinkhorn paid him something to ride it. Somebody told me, maybe it was Papa, that when the man never came back there he got to hunting around and wondering and inquiring and they went and looked at the horse. Said this horse had this dried-up leather hanging all over him where it looked like he'd rode so hard you know. Said this fellow Sinkhorn wasn't a hard rider." (Earl Hammond) Here's where the speculation began. Soon after the disappearance, a family of Blacks moved away from Clear Creek and reportedly began showing signs of prosperity. Some said they must have murdered Sinkhorn and stolen the money. But it is said that Lefe King might have done it or that Sinkhorn himself, took the money and ran. Others said you could see a red color in one of the branches near King's the next day. The Sinkhorn story had its basis in fact, but it surrounded with enough mystery for many folk tale adaptations.

"A lot of people have always claimed that Sinkhorn was killed and buried up there in the pine diggins in Hainted Holler and you know that the reason Hainted Holler was named "John D. ... of the Sinkhorn page circulated through the area and nearby hollows with a speed and completeness never obtained by a newspaper. Each one who read the story added his interpretation and so by the time it reached these pages it had been sifted through a hundred years of time and molded to fit the styles of numerous front porch historians. Whatever monetary effect the disappearance of Sinkhorn and the money had the tannery, they were small compared to the vast scientific changes which were rerouting the direction and location of tanneries. As mechanization continued, the number of tanneries decreased and became more centralized. The Reeds probably saw they were falling behind and realized they could not have an obsolete operation. They sold out on January 9, 1886. Henry Todd of Madison County bought the buildings and surrounding lands for a total of \$1,500. Todd's operation lasted only a few years, most before his whole outfit died out. The Reed house, the commissary and workers' one-room houses stood for many years, but gradually rains and winds of time rotted and corroded away the buildings. Those who had first hand knowledge of the tannery gradually died. The name of the community was changed from Reedsville to Hainted Holler and Reedsville became a ghost town. One can drive along the road now and never imagine a town the size of Reedsville ever existed. Only a few physical signs remain. Two axle-like shafts that were probably from the bark mill were stuck into the ground along Todd Branch on Johnny King's property; Johnny occasionally plows up old yellow poplar logs, probably from the vats. An old fleshing rock lies in Mattilda Miller's front yard. The tanneries marked the first forage of industrial developers into the Kentucky hills. Its sister industry logging soon followed as did its cousin, coal mining. Tanning industrialists were of the first to see the untapped wealth of the mountains and some of the

to another vat which was called the oil mill load. This was a mixture of oil, tanner's sugar and epsom salts which set the tannin, heightened the color and added weight. The finished hides were sold by weight. After a few days the hides were lifted out of the vats and the water soaked hides were sold by weight in the dry lots; they were gradually allowed air and light. The drying process lasted six months to a year. By the time the raw leather was loaded on the wagons and hauled to Paint Lick for shipment to New England shoe factories, the tanning process was nearly two years old.

Reedsville continued to prosper until the early 1900's. By this time, recent scientific discoveries were beginning to influence the economics and location of the tanneries. The Reedsville tannery, which was individually owned, was caught in the middle of a major economic change. It was also troubled closer to home to contend with; namely a possible murder and theft. As with any unsolved murder story, there are a thousand and one variations and speculations. The story concerns a fellow named Sinkhorn who was paymaster at the tannery. Once a month he would go to Paint Lick to pick up the payroll that was shipped in from Lexington. One night in his monthly journey, he never returned.

"This fellow Sinkhorn, he got the payroll all

ing level was high enough to tan the hides successfully. Because such large quantities of bark were required, the Reeds hired men just to peel and haul bark. "Tanbark peeling. They'd do that in the early spring. Sap would get high in the timber. They could peel up till the sap got thick, got to gartering on them. Little pins would come under that bark and it wouldn't peel, so that made for a big fight getting that bark off that timber in that space of time. They had to peel through the month of April. They'd start the last days of March. They'd peel it and just let the timber lay. Did not pay no attention to it. Had no market for it." (Morgan Abney) The tanbark was hauled to the yards in wagons, then stacked under large barksheds. When the bark was needed it was crushed in a mill which utilized a horse or mule as its source of power. Alternate layers of bark and hides were soaked in water-filled vats. Here they soaked for a year, sometimes less, depending on the type of hide and what part of the shoe the finished leather was to be used for. Workers had to regularly raise and separate the hides to prevent "kiss marks" where hides touched and the tanning didn't soak through.

After the tannin solution, the hides were moved

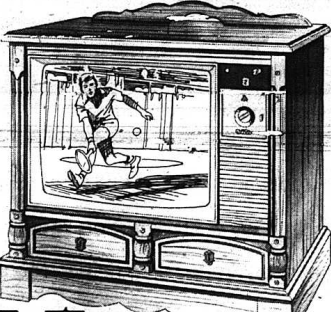

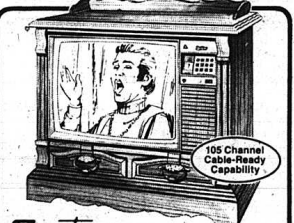

## May is Older American Month

Old???? Not us! Come on Gramps, get out of that chair, grab your hat and let's get going. We may be over 60 but we're young at heart and able to do a lot more than those "other" generations give us credit for.

Longer life has become a visible fact dramatized daily in the homes and streets of America. The contribution older Americans have made to society should be recognized, especially during Older American Month.

Each year for the past 19 years the month of May has been set aside to honor the older generation. In his proclamation signed April 2, President Ronald Reagan said, "The opportunities and support we can provide to older Americans today will benefit all of us tomorrow."

Today at age 65 average life expectancy is another 14 years. If a person is healthy and active and stays around until age 70 he/she has an average of an additional 10 years to keep going and doing.

Older Americans are a special category. The myth that they don't want to work or to keep "doing" has proved inaccurate. A 1981 Harris Poll found that 73% of retirees wished they have never quit working.

On a national basis the proportion of workers over 65 is nearly 13% and it keeps going up. Many of these people have found retirement is "for the birds."

One organization that has worked hard to dispel the myths of Older Americans is the Green Thumb program. Since 1966 Green Thumb has hired the over 55 generation and found them conscientious and willing workers. Often more reliable than the

younger person.

"Older Americans possess a reservoir of experience and depth of knowledge that is a great national resource if only the employers of America would make use of their talents," says Mrs. Deloris B. Kash, State Director Kentucky/West Virginia. Green Thumb, Green Thumb has 353 workers in Kentucky and 45 in West Virginia with headquarters in Beatyville, Lee County, Kentucky.

Green Thumb has a goal of placing 15% of their workers into unsubsidized jobs. "We find the dream of retirement can turn into a nightmare when these older people find themselves without an income," Mrs. Kash continues.

She tells of the woman who had been selling furniture from her home in order to have money for food stamps. "She broke down and cried when she learned she had a job." Until Green Thumb provided the lady with a position she had been unable to find work anywhere.

Hopefully, the next 25 years will bring a basic change in the position of

older people in America. Since the proportion of those over 65 percent is expected to increase, the attitude of the public should change to include older Americans in the work force as well as other aspects of day to day living.

The key to getting the maximum benefit from the added years of the older worker is in the hands of the individual, of society as a whole, and particularly in the hands of the employers of America.

Like the young couple, at the beginning of this article there are others who are willing to trade their rocking chairs for a job or their old tin lizzie for a modern car.

Rockcastle County has 7 workers who would be willing to exchange their Green Thumb smock, or their handcart and badge for a qualified position in the work force.

Mr. Employer, you'll never know the benefit of the older worker until you tap his/her ability, energy and determination to do a good job. Discrimination based on chronological age alone deprives our nation of a very valuable resource!
