Is Home Canning and Freezing Worth It?
While you are struggling with that heavy canner in your kitchen this summer, the thought of a cross your mind, "Is it worth it?" Or you have decided with the rising cost of food, to cut or not to produce this summer. Either way, what is the money value of your home preserved food?

Let's assume that a pint jar will be filled by one pound of vegetables canned, the cost per pint would be produce (one grown)-6.7 cents; pressure canner (\$60 amortized over 20 years, used to can 200 pints per year)-30 cents; jars (\$3.50 per dozen amortized over 10 years)-2.9 cents; lid (60 cents per dozen)-.6 cents; electricity or gas .5 cents for a total of 15.6 cents per pint.
The cost of your pint jars is 16 cents per jar.

HUD will accept an objection to its approval of the release of funds and acceptance of the certification only if it is on one of the following bases: (a) That the certification is not a fact executed by the chief executive officer or other officer of applicant approved by HUD; or (b) That the applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision, finding or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the procedure (24 CFR Part 58) and may be addressed to HUD at the P.O. Louisville Area Office, P.O. 1044, Louisville, Ky. 40201. Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by HUD. Objections received after June 4, 1982, will be considered by HUD.

Commercially frozen small produce costs from 40-80 cents per container; home grown is 20 cents per 10 oz. container-you have over 50% savings.
You will need to take into account the fact of buying a new canner, if you buy the produce instead of growing it yourself and if your garden did not produce what you thought it would. With today's high cost of living any savings we can manage will be of great help to you.
If the gauge on your pressure canner needs testing, we can do it in the Extension Office. Just bring the lid of your pressure canner.

Making new friends, swimming and boating, sports and games, crafts and nature study and even computers will be available to county's youngsters at 4-H camp this summer.

Approximately sixty 4-H'ers from Rockcastle County will attend the Monday-Friday camp at the J.M. Felner Memorial 4-H Camp this summer from July 19-23, according to Tom Mills and Cheryl Witt, County Extension Agents. Last year, sixty-two youngsters attended camp.

J.M. Felner 4-H Camp is one of the five 4-H camps in the Commonwealth which offer a variety of summer activities for youngsters ages 9-19. Fun, and learning along with a chance to enjoy the outdoors, are the main ingredients in the 4-H camp experience.

Swimming, volleyball and basketball are favorites of most campers. Archers and hunters can improve their aim on camp target ranges, and those who like to fish will be able to work on casting skills.

Young nature lovers can learn more about their environment and its resources, collect specimens and hike the many trails.

Besides the usual outdoor fare, 4-H camp will feature an indoor activity most youngsters find fascinating-computers. In craft classes, the 4-H'ers will have a chance to be creative with wood and nature crafts, latch-hook rug squares, quick point and other projects.

Trained instructors will help with the sports, crafts and games to teach beginners and help skilled campers observe safety rules. Special training in nutrition and first-aid are also part of the program.

Extension agents and adult teen leaders will be on hand to supervise the young campers.

For many campers, staying in cabins with other young people and adults is their first experience in group living. They learn a lot about getting along with others. Getting to know other people, sharing fun and learning with them offer valuable lessons in interpersonal relations for the campers.

Informal training in citizenship and leadership is an added benefit of 4-H camping.

The camp cost is \$38 which includes meals, lodging, transportation and insurance. Deadline for fees being in the Extension Office is June 4th.

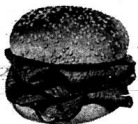

Storm causes damage in city

According to official weather gathering information, approximately 3.07 inches of rain fell in one hour's time between 5:30 and 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, when an electrical storm accompanied by heavy rain hit the county, causing several power outages and flooding in low-lying areas. Available records show this to be the heaviest rainfall in the shortest time period since 1974.

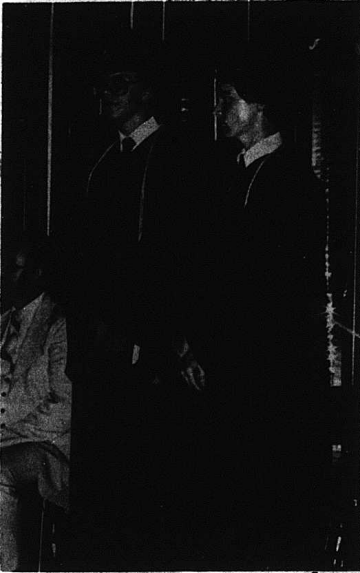
Workmen pumped water from the Mt. Vernon Elementary School lunchroom following the downpour and, according to city workers, there was some flash flooding in the Cox Trailer Park and in the subdivision adjacent to the library; however water did not get into any of the dwellings in either location.

Wednesday morning, city water superintendent, Matt Powell, discovered that the sewer lift station at the elementary school was out of working order. Powell said Lawrence and Woodman of Crab Orchard, who did all the electrical wiring for the plants, were on the job replacing burned out starters and other damaged equipment.

The main sewer plant was also knocked out of operation by the storm, but K.U. officials were able to get it going early Wednesday morning.

Powell said at 1 p.m. Wednesday that he had not at that time had a chance to check the two other lift

Fate of sheriff's department still uncertain; judge must earn more

Ironically, at a meeting set to determine whether or not county revenues could support subsidizing the county sheriff's department, the fiscal court and persons who had filled the courtroom, curious to hear what the "state man" had to say, learned Tuesday that House Bill 378 which goes into effect July 1, 1982, makes it mandatory that county judge/executives receive \$28,387 per year (the same salary as fee officials).

Al Howell, troubleshooter for the state department of finance, said at the meeting that even though the judge may not want to take the increase, he is obligated by law to take it. The increase will amount to about \$10,000 for Rockcastle County Judge Bob Jasper whose present salary is approximately \$18,000.

Howell had been asked to attend the meeting to advise the court about the feasibility of including the sheriff's department in the budget. Howell said that it was a matter of "juggling" and "priorities" and that the "county could put the sheriff in the budget."

He said, this year, unlike last, the county judge/executive is solely responsible for preparing the budget to present to the court for their approval or disapproval. When the judge presents the preliminary budget to the court, he said, the court has the right to make whatever

changes it wants. The budget is scheduled to be presented to the court at the next regular meeting June 1. The budget then goes to Frankfort for approval and back before the court for a second approval at which time they may again change it. The budget then goes back to Frankfort for final approval.

Howell said that the county could help the sheriff's department, but that county fiscal management is "extremely tough" and most county budgets are tight because there are more needs and wants than there is money, especially a right now with the present cutbacks.

He said counties need to look closely at ways to "stretch every dollar and make it go as far as possible."

Howell said after the meeting that, about half of the county governments in the state (and Rockcastle is one of them) failed to vote in the 4% tax increase last year.

The increase, he said, would have amounted to about \$190 per tax bill and would have brought in about \$5,500 more in county tax revenues plus it would have generated \$5,600 more in Revenue Sharing to the county. Revenue Sharing funds are distributed according to a formula based largely upon local tax effort, according to Howell. In effect, the county would have received

an estimated \$11,000 increase with only \$1 more from each taxpayer.

The 4% tax increase was 4% of the entire total of tax revenues from the previous year, not a 4% increase in taxes, which Howell says some people may have thought.

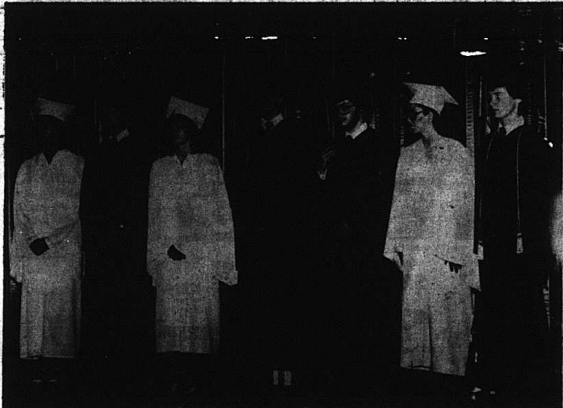
Sheriff William Taylor is present at the meeting and submitted to the judge executive a budget request for 1982-83 for his office. The request included the assurance that he could make \$14,000 and his two deputies \$12,000 each.

Howell said that sheriffs usually have a cash flow problem during this period of their terms and said that other counties handle the plight in different ways, some paying the salary of sheriffs and having the sheriff turn in a deficit to the county. He said sheriffs do not have an effective lobby to get the situation changed because of the succession limitation.

When Judge Jasper was asked if the sheriff had been included in the estimated budget he prepared he said, "Not at this point. We want to help what we can."

The magistrates would not comment as to what they plan to do if the sheriff is not included in the budget.

Later Tuesday, a special called fiscal court meeting to discuss the budget was announced for Monday, May 24th.

Election officers school

The director of a group of these people will be called The Mt. Vernon Local Development Corporation and will become the lead organization and sponsor of the revitalization program which will plan for the promotion of Mt. Vernon, work on traffic and parking projects, and beautification of the area and promote the economic climate.

After the formation of the corporation, other local business people and interested person will be asked to serve on various committees which will include: research and data gathering, loans, economics development, architectural, review and community landscaping. A total of 60 local people have been asked to serve on the

above committees and others will be asked later to serve on other committees as needed.

Floyd Owens, project director of the new program states that he has personally contacted all of the 60 people involved to date and each of them have agreed to serve and have shown an interest in the revitalization project. Mr. Owens also stated that the first meeting will include the following business and professional people: Joe Young, Ernest Stanley, Harvey Pensel, Marsha Cox, Ron Calhoun, Tommy Hodges, Donald Rowe, Bill James, Jael Gentry, Toiy Hopkins, Sam Ford, Mollie Bryant, Billy Hlatt, Hutan Farthing, Donnie Singleton, Richard Anderkin, Dwight Griffin, Estil McPhee and Dale Winstead.

Other objectives will include

hoping to promote community pride, establish goals and objectives for the downtown revitalization and starting a study of parking problems. The "downtown area" includes all business places in the Mt. Vernon shopping area.

The program will start with a grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission and funds from the City of Mt. Vernon totaling \$20,000 for the first year. A loan program for business places will be established later.

State Legislature

The 1962 General Assembly passed House Bill 505, which seeks to do something about the Commonwealth's high unemployment rate.

According to the state Department of Labor, the number of unemployed Kentuckians during March of this year was 139,600 or 10.7 percent of the state's labor force.

House Bill 505 establishes the Enterprise Zone Authority of Kentucky and permits local authorities to apply to the state for creation of an enterprise zone.

Also, House Bill 505, which is based on a federal proposal now being considered by the United States Congress, is the direct result of good lines of communication between the Republican members of the Kentucky General Assembly

and the National Association of Republican Legislators.

House bill 505 was passed in the state House of Representatives by a vote of 93 to 2, passed in the Senate by a vote of 30 to 2 and signed by the governor on March 26th. House Bill 505 will become effective in July of this year.

Kentucky is one of only six states to have adopted the enterprise zones and is considered a national leader because it incorporates many features that are being proposed in the federal proposal.

House Bill 505 will create seven enterprise zones over a four-year period, each of which will last for 20 years.

The zones will provide tax and regulatory relief for businesses willing to be located in "Free Enterprise zones" of high unemployment and poverty.

The concept is that such zones would permit businesses to attack high unemployment in disadvantaged areas of the state through the regular free enterprise system rather than through use of state or federal funds and serv-

ices. The federal bill, the Enterprise Zone Tax Act of 1982, would create 25 such zones over a three-year period to enhance business location in underprivileged areas by creating tax incentives and advantages.

The General Assembly's forecast in establishing the state-level free enterprise zones hopefully will put Kentucky in position to be declared a federal free enterprise zone, meaning that the state zones will also be eligible for federal tax breaks and incentives.

TAXES WILL BE OPEN FOR INSPECTION

The Rockcastle County property tax roll will be opened for inspection May 24 through June 5, 1962. Under the supervision of the property valuation administration or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

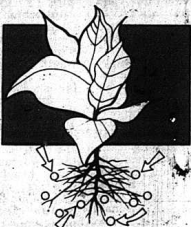

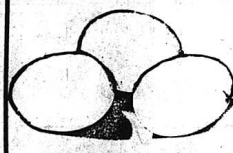

Rockets place second in district Lose to Russell County in Regional

The Rockcastle County Rockets Baseball team ended their 1982 campaign last Wednesday afternoon in the regional tournament as they lost to a fine Russell County team, 6-2.

The Rockets advanced to the region by placing second in the District tournament held two weeks ago at Rockcastle County High.

Rockcastle demolished the generals from Jackson County on Wednesday. Of that week behind the strong pitching of Craig McGuire, who gave up only one hit while the Rocket bats were hot scoring 17 runs for the senior pitcher.

On Friday, the Rockets played Laurel county in the finals of the district and held a surprising 6-1 lead at the end of the first inning. However, the Cardinals came back from the five run deficit to win the contest 16-10 and give the Rockets their 12th defeat of the season.

Lady Luck wasn't on Rockcastle's side during the draw for regional tournament when they drew Russell County, because Russell

County knocked off Somerset to take the district title from the Southeastern Kentucky powerhouse.

"We played a fine game overall, errors at the wrong time hurt us extremely bad," said head coach Larry Woods. "McGuire pitched a good game but we just couldn't score enough runs for him," he said.

Rockcastle ended their season with a 10 and 13 record and their second straight trip to the regional tournament. Woods, in his third year as head coach will lose only three seniors next year. Steve Childress will be gone from center field, while he loses Craig McGuire from the mound and behind the plate. Willie Hlatt will also be gone from second base.

McGuire, who battled with Hlatt all season long for the batting title, eventually prevailed with a .423 average as he had 30 hits in 71 attempts. Hlatt was second getting 25 hits in 73 attempts for a .342 average. Spencer Bengo, who is a junior and will return at first base for the Rockets next season had a .308 average. Rex Oliver, a jun-

ior transfer student from Berea, who started most of the season at shortstop, finished with a .288 average.

Steve Halcomb, a junior and starter in left field, had a .280 average while senior centerfielder Steve Childress hit .246 for the year and junior James Allin Bradley, hit .256 in 39 trips to the plate.

Junior Jeff Hamm, who found the going a little tough in the beginning finished the season with a .200 average.

Other members of the Rockets team who had more than ten trips to the plate were Teddy Lawrence with a .240 average getting 6 hits in 25 attempts. Roddy Carr was 2 for 14 with a .143 average and Chris Cornelius was 1 for 13 hitting .077. Freshman Gary Fain had 1 hit in 10 attempts for a .100 average.

Several other boys went to the plate and they were: Louis Tagliabochi, who was 2 for 4 with a .500 average, Charles Bryant and John Glovak were both 0 for 2 along with Allan Hammond and Bruce Blanton while Tim Albright was 0 for 1.

Ernest Brooks, blind since car accident, to receive BS degree in Industrial Arts

Among the graduation candidates at Berea College's May 23 commencement will be a very special recipient who, at age 42, will be receiving a Bachelor of Science degree in Industrial Arts Technology.

It isn't the major that makes this student special, or even his age, but the fact that he has worked his way through the technological milieu of machines without being able to see. He listens to and feels the equipment he works with, because he is blind.

Ernest Brooks was involved in an automobile accident in February of 1973 which left him blind without a sense of taste or smell. The former Russell

County Vocational School principal was in critical condition for six months when his situation finally stabilized. "The right eye is dead," he says. "And I have about two percent vision in the left."

"For the first six months after the accident, I'd wake up in the middle of the night crying," he said. He had always worked with his hands and his eyes, running a machine shop in Brodhead and later teaching in the machine shop of the Somerset Vocational School.

After an initial period of adjusting to his sightlessness, Ernest went to a Veterans Administration in Chicago to take part in its

training program for the blind. He completed the six-month course at the Chicago school in three months, then he, and his wife, Janet, returned to Rockcastle County, her home.

Ernest soon entered Berea College as a special student, taking a New Testament course. "As the confidence he once had returned, he decided to make a big step in the right direction. With special study materials and assistance from the college's office of Testing and Tutorial Service, Ernest made the decision to return to college for a degree in Industrial Arts Technology. A proud day in his life will come May 23 when he receives that degree he has worked for."

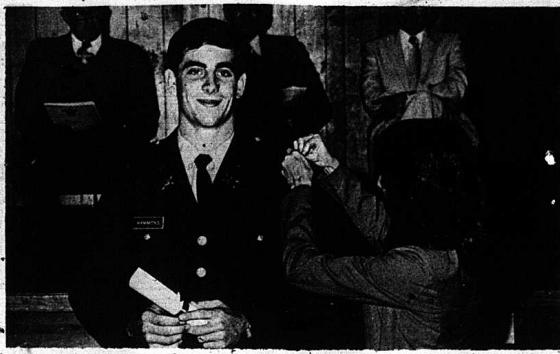
Along the way, his wife also decided to enter Berea to study Industrial Arts, but she has since changed to elementary education. The couple has taken some classes together and Ernest boasts of outscoring her on tests.

The Industrial Arts shops are filled with table saws and other dangerous machines and seems to be the last place you would find a blind worker, but Ernest has come into his classes and the shops with a minimum of disruption. He functions as well and efficiently as any student and in some cases seems to be more cautious than most.

"I just had to prove to myself that I could still do something," Ernest said earlier this year. And he has.

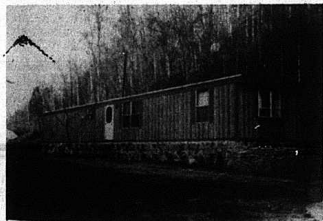
