Roger's Committee works on rates

My committee in Congress, the Energy and Commerce Committee, will soon be considering legislation to keep local telephone rates from skyrocketing.

Although Congress can't actually set utility rates (rates are set by the Governor-appointed Public Service Commission), it can determine how telephone companies conduct their business and this will have a big effect on your phone bill.

The legislation in my committee would establish a national telephone policy to regulate the whole industry now that the Bell Telephone system has been ordered to be split-up by a federal court.

Throughout the whole discussion of this bill, my first and foremost concern has been that good telephone service be provided to all Kentuckians at decent rates. Because of the effect this bill will ultimately have on phone rates, I'm particularly interested in its outcome.

One of the major problems facing rural telephone companies is the expense involved in providing service to more sparsely populated, rural areas like that in most of Kentucky as compared to urban areas like Lexington or Louisville. We must find a way to hold down rural telephone rates.

This bill addresses this concern by setting up a special fund which will be used to keep rural phone rates as low as absolutely possible. I strongly back this provision of the bill. The bill also requires all telephone systems to hook up with one another. There are twenty-two different phone companies in Kentucky, so you can see how important it is to have all the phone companies connected with each other.

The bill is far more complex than this, but these are two of the primary areas directly affecting folks in the Fifth District. These are areas which I am watching very closely, and I will keep you up-to-date in the months to come on just what is happening to this bill.

Sheriffs are left out of first draft of county budget; Taylor will not resign

At a special budget meeting of the fiscal court held Monday morning, May 24, Judge/Executive Bob Jasper passed one copy of the proposed 1982-83 county budget around to the Magistrates who took only a cursory look at the budget and said that Anna Rose Mullins, assistant to the judge, had already explained it to them fully.

When Judge Jasper asked if there was a motion to approve the budget as it stood, Magistrate Joe Clark made the motion and Magistrate W.H. Wren seconded it. Magistrate D.G. Albright said he couldn't go along with paying Mark Jasper (the judge's grandson) \$5,000 and leaving the sheriffs out. The sheriffs have been attending the court meetings and repeatedly asking for money to operate the office.

Magistrate Tom Denney said he had nothing against Mark, but that he felt that "we needed sheriffs more than a deputy judge."

When a vote was called for, Donald Rowe voted, along with Clark and Wren to approve the first draft of the budget, and the motion passed 4-2 with the judge casting his vote.

When asked by someone in attendance if the sheriffs had been included in the budget, Judge Jasper said "No, they are not in the budget. There was no room to put them in." He said he considered it but had some other things that had to be taken care of first. He said the budget shorted the ambulance service by \$34,000 and over all the budget was short \$77,000 from what was needed to meet the needs and requests. The \$77,000 shortfall included the sheriffs' request for \$29,000.

Al Howell of the Kentucky Department of Finance, who had attended the last meeting of the fiscal court and was there Monday in an advisory capacity, told the court and others present that the sheriff could not legally close the doors to his office. He said he could lay off his deputies and use constables to wait on the court, but that he would either have to keep his office open or resign.

Sheriff William Taylor said Tuesday that he would not resign, but would have to lay his deputies off at the first of the month.

The tentative overall budget for 1982-83 is \$915,930.50 which contains the jail budget this year for the first time. The jail budget for the year is \$112,872.68 and must be kept in a separate account, but is controlled by the county treasurer. According to Anna R. Mullins, the county general fund had to supplement the jail budget with \$31,438 in order to meet the need the budget requested.

Carl Clontz was present at the meeting to request the court allow Jailer Henry Abney one more deputy. The new budget allows for two deputies, one cook-matron and one part time cook.

The court voted to leave the budget as it appeared rather than allow the third deputy.

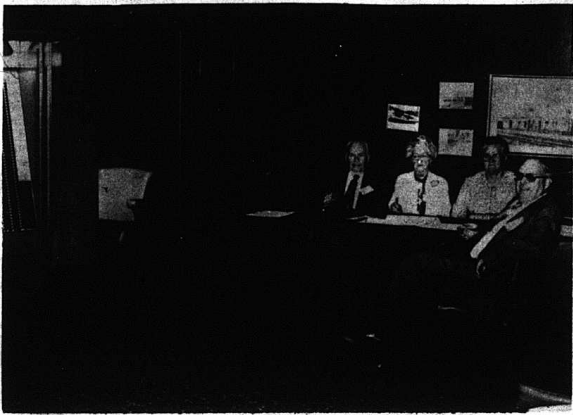
With the new reorganization policy by the state, jailers now receive a salary of \$28,348 yearly rather than relying on fees.

The judge lamented the fact that the county budget shorted the ambulance service \$34,000 and leaves the amount to be made up from some source in yet undetermined.

According to ambulance service records, there is only a 33% collections rate. Most of the 33 percent collected comes from medicare and Medicaid.

The court voted to draft a letter to send persons owning delinquent ambulance service bills and to make concerted effort to increase the collection rate for the service.

A more detailed account of the budget will be made available after the budget is returned from first review in Frankfort.

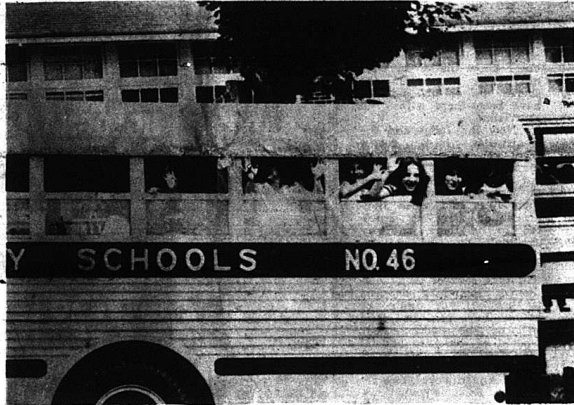

Law officers make three raids Sunday

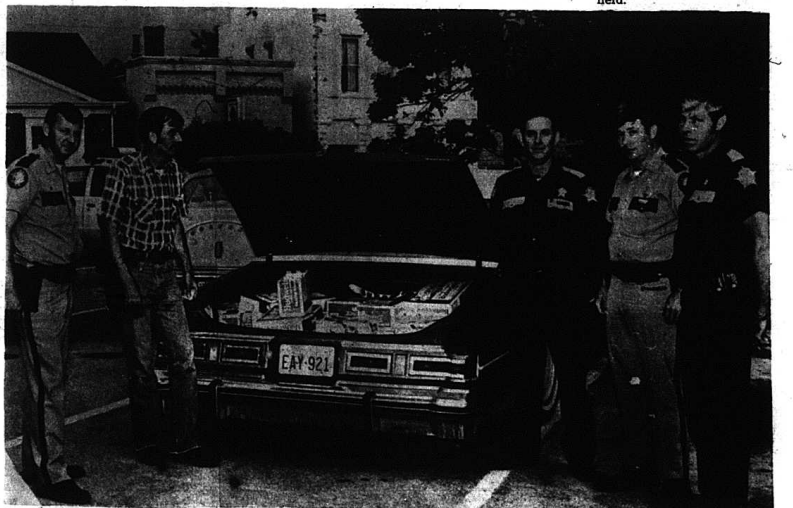

REPORTS TO THE PEOPLE OF KENTUCKY

I am pleased to report that the Senate passed legislation I co-sponsored that will help states in their efforts to crack down on drunk drivers. A similar bill is pending in the House of Representatives, and it is my sincere hope that with the House's cooperation, we can get this legislation on the President's desk - and drunk drivers off the highways - just as soon as possible.

The National Driver Registration Act of 1982 would provide states with economic incentives if they adopt strict new drunk driving laws, which would include suspending a driver's license for at least 90 days after an arrest for drunk driving, and for at least one year for a second offense.

Also, the bill would set up an electronic register so states could know quickly if an applicant for a driver's license in one state had been suspended for drunk driving in another. This safeguard, I believe, would prove itself indispensable in preventing many senseless deaths in the future. The costs involved - \$75 million in "incentive grants" to the states for two years and \$8.8 million for the register - would be a small price to pay when we consider the estimated \$17 billion a year in economic losses in 26,000 irreplaceable lives, as well as the 775,000 injuries incurred yearly.

The violent crime committed by drunk drivers is indeed a national disgrace. This bill, in concert with the recently named commission to work with state and local governments, church groups, concerned individuals, and responsible education campaigns by the distilled spirits industry should accelerate the movement to keep drunk drivers off the road.

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Farm & Home News Meat increase causes food price jump

Retail food prices in Kentucky jumped 1.6 percent in May, primarily as the result of increases in the cost of meat, according to Kentucky Farm Bureau's marketbasket survey.

A selected group of 40 food items cost \$59.58 this month, up from \$58.62 in April. The 13 meat items above the \$57.44 marketbasket cost in May of 1981.

Fueling the upsurge were hikes in the cost of beef and pork, which closely tracked moderate farm price improvement for live animals. The 13 meat items checked in the survey showed a 4.6 percent increase this month, which more than accounted for the overall food price jump. The 27 non-meat items in the marketbasket declined since the April survey.

The five beef cuts in the survey showed an average increase of 5.7 percent, or 83 cents, Farm Bureau's survey coordinator Ruth Ruggles said. The May average for pork gained 4 percent, or 40 cents for the five cuts. Compared to year-ago levels, beef at retail is 5.1 percent higher on average than in May of 1981. Pork is 14 percent more costly than it was a year ago.

Decliners in the May survey included eggs, which were off 4 to 8 cents a dozen, as well as apples, lettuce and tomatoes. The price of iceberg lettuce dropped to 64 cents a head, down sharply from the April average tab of \$1.05. Weather and insect problems in California have resulted in erratic price swings on this popular salad item for the past six months.

Morehead had the lowest local marketbasket average in May while Jackson reported the highest price tab. Overall, volunteers from Farm Bureau Women canvassed food outlets in 24 Kentucky communities.

Those local averages are Morehead, 52.76; Greensburg, 53.82; Scottsville, 54.26; Tompkinsville,

55.36; Glasgow, 57.07; Hopkinsville, 58.29; Salyersville, 58.36; Greenup, 58.46; Seebree, 58.79; London, 59.61; Henderson, 59.69; Shelbyville, 59.42; Elizabethtown, 59.46.

Louisville, 60.91; Cynthiana, 61.06; Bradenburg, 61.16; Owensboro, 61.43; Stanford, 61.70; Covington, 61.81; Murray, 62.00; Paducah, 62.53; Georgetown, 62.78; Frankfort, 64.21; and Jackson, 65.65.

Farm prices moved on a very similar track to food costs during the most recent reporting period, according to the Department of Agriculture. With slight to moderate gains in grain and livestock prices, farmers increased their income potential an average of 1.5 percent.

Predictably, the greatest price movement came in the livestock sector. Kentucky's beef cattle prices are up 6.3 percent compared to the previous month, while hogs increased 4.7 percent.

The comparisons with year-earlier figures, however, showed a marked divergence from the retail pattern. Farm level hog prices were 30 percent above 1981 figures, more than twice the retail increase for pork of 14 percent. Cattle prices, on the other hand, remained more than 8 percent below the year-ago levels, but retail beef is currently selling 5 percent higher than May of 1981.

Cutting Quality Hay Means
Cutting at the Right Time
Quality hay has been defined as hay which provides the nutrients required to meet an expected animal performance. The most important practice, and the

least expensive one, in making quality hay is cutting at the right stage of maturity. As green grasses approach maturity they become higher in fiber and lignin content and lower in protein content, digestibility, soluble carbohydrate acceptability and intake by livestock.

You can expect a drop in alfalfa digestibility of one-half percent each day

Senate endorses new housing program

The Senate Appropriations Committee has endorsed an infusion of funds for this year for a housing program Senator Walter (Dee) Huddleston would assist potential homebuyers and begin re-implementation of the nation's severely ailing housing industry.

Huddleston, who is a member of the Appropriations Committee, said the bill has the effect of authorizing and funding in part a bill he co-sponsored with Senator Lugar of Indiana. That bill was approved by the Senate Banking Committee recently over strenuous objections by the administration.

"This program has the dual effect of making decent and affordable housing available to a much broader cross-section of the public, and at the same time address unemployment and stagnation in the housing industry, which is traditionally one of the most vital segments of our economy," Huddleston said.

"The American dream of home ownership has been shattered by the high interest rates to the point where as few of five percent of Kentuckians can afford a new home. The program cost expansion that to 25 percent and result in as

many as 1,000 new housing starts in Kentucky by the third quarter of this year.

As amended, the appropriations bill would provide for \$1 billion for this year, to allow potential homebuyers with income of up to \$30,000 a year to obtain a mortgage that is subsidized by the government by four percentage points for up to five years. At the end of the five years, the participant would pay according to the terms of the original mortgage and would repay the subsidy when the home is sold or refinanced.

Thus, Huddleston pointed out, "We have an opportunity to give our economy a boost with a program that will be repaid by responsible homeowners."

In committee action on what is called the "urgent supplemental" appropriations bill, Huddleston indicated he has also offered funding the entire \$5 billion program. However, Huddleston said he was pleased to get the amount of endorsement for even this amount. He noted that today's actions places both the House and the Senate Banking committees on record in favor of providing relief for the housing industry and the frustrated potential homebuyers.

Ladino or white clover-cut at the correct stage for the companion plant. Sudangrass, sorghum hybrids and millet-40 inch height or early boot stage, whichever comes first.

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Five men from Rockcastle Co. are part of special SWAT team at depot

Special Weapons and Tactics Team—or, as it's more popularly known, the SWAT team, is the elite of the police in most cities, the team called on when things get too tough for the regular force.

Now LBDA has its own SWAT Team. The team was formed in April from 14 members of the Blue Grass guard force. Its mission is to deal with any kind of emergency at Blue Grass where security is keenly important because of the presence of chemical munitions. The team will also help with any crisis at the Lexington Facility.

"We're trained to deal with any kind of crisis," said team leader Lt. Emmitt Igo, "whatever it may be: hostage, riots, bomb threats, anything that could break out on the inside or come from without."

To earn their status as members of the SWAT team the guards had to go through an intensive two-week course taught by Igo, who has the credentials to be a SWAT instructor. Igo is the first Department of Defense civilian to graduate from the Air Force's Emergency Services Course, which is taught by the team. The Air Force sends out on world-wide emergencies.

"Not only military, but civilian police go through the course every year," said Igo, "plus they train a lot of the FBI. It's a tough course—only about 40 percent pass."

The course Igo taught wasn't exactly easy, either. The Blue Grass guards began each day's training with one-half hour of physical exercise, which included a half-mile run. Then there were the different areas they had to become proficient in.

Twelve ladies from AARP visit interesting places in U.S.

A group of members of the Rockcastle County AARP club were joined by a group of the "Golden Age Club" of Lancaster, for a 9 day tour recently.

Points of interest visited were: Niagara Falls, Canada, Notre Dame, Bas-cilla, which was fabulous, St. Joseph Oratory, then to the Capitol at Montpelier, Vermont, points of interest in New Jersey, Boston, Mass.—including the state house. They also shook hands with Gov. Edward King, and saw the U.S.S. Constitution, the oldest commissioned war ship afloat in the world.

They saw the Capitol at Providence, Rhode Island, visited in Connecticut, and New York. There they took a 2½ hour bus tour of Lower New York City, viewed Chinatown, Statue of Liberty, passed Wall

"They had to be able to use all kinds of weapons," said Igo, "specifically the pistol, shotgun, rifle and grenade launcher. And they had to simply stand and shooting at a target. The guards had to run 100 yards and shoot at a target within a certain time. They didn't know ahead of time what target they were going to shoot at or how many rounds to fire. To make things tougher, they also had to shoot with a gas mask on and to be able to shoot with either hand."

The team was also trained in self-defense, hostage negotiation, subduing intruders, room searches and safe approaches to buildings held by hostile forces. One type of approach is from the roof, which required the guards to learn rappelling. The rappelling classroom was the face of the Eastern Kentucky University football stadium.

As a final test the team was put through both night and day full-scale exercises that each took up to four hours. The guards were presented with a scenario, such as an intruder holding an employee hostage, and then expected to resolve the situation using what they had learned.

"We tried to run the exercises with as much realism as possible," said Igo. "We even brought in ROTC students from EKV to play the intruders. At the conclusion, I critiqued them on their performance, looking at things like whether or not they took unnecessary chances."

Because of the difficulty of the training, the team is made up entirely of volunteers. "To go through this you have to have someone who really

believes in the program," said Igo. "A number of people backed out when they found out what was involved. You don't want people who are forced into the training because SWAT really involves working together. Each member has to be able to do everything the rest can do because everyone is dependent on each other."

The team will continue to train every month, said Igo, and Security hopes to eventually train enough other guards to have 10 SWAT members on each shift.

Five men from Rockcastle County are part of the 14 member SWAT team at the Richmond Depot. The men are, former sheriff Manuel Shepherd, Billy R. Sowder, Edward R. Moore, William C. Wren, and Charles Shepherd, Jr.
