Blue Springs, the last county one-room school to close next year

The local school board acted upon a state department of education recommendation to close Blue Springs school, Tuesday night at the regularly scheduled board meeting.

Blue Springs was the last one-room school left in the county after consolidation some ten years ago, and one of a very few left in the state.

Superintendent Charles Parsons said he had promised parents in the community who had protested the school's closing that he would keep the school open for as long as he could justify the "personnel/student ratio. However, two families moved away last year, taking ten of the school's students and leaving only 12 pupils.

Further mention was made of the building which is not in good shape, the water supply, which requires constant testing and the various programs available in other county schools, but not provided at Blue Springs.

The board approved tentative placement of teachers, administrators and certified personnel for 1982-83, subject to transfers. Local CPA, Dwight Griffin, was awarded the contract to audit the FY 1981-82 general fund, federal monies and high school activity accounts.

His bid of \$1595 was accepted over Courtney & Horton's bid of \$2,200.

A committee to audit the elementary school accounts was appointed. Named to the committee were Pauline Mullins, Garlan Cummins and Shirley Mullins.

Russell Bullock placed the lone bid of \$20.29 to tear down and remove the

storage building behind the administration building.

In other business, the board voted to exempt Lloyd Shuttis, finance officer from the 5% cut in extended employment of three days since he is needed full time.

A 5% salary increase was approved for next year for all cooks, custodians, maintenance, mechanics, secretaries, coaches, aides, contract bus drivers and the extra service portion of salaries for all administration.

All regular bus drivers were granted a \$25 a month raise for 1982-83.

Continuing contracts

were approved for Nancy Field, Kathryn Dyehouse, Debra Stevens, John Hamm, Larry Woods and Pamela Cash. One year endorsements were granted by the board for Beverly Owens and Doris Cash to teach special education.

A \$25,000 salary increase in the amount of \$395,000 was approved for Lloyd Shuttis by Norton Insurance Agency for \$268.

The board agreed to advertise for and accept sealed bids for class rings, paper products and various other school supplies needed for the next school year.

Department of Transportation projects discussed for Rockcastle County

The plan, according to Dave Byers, district manager, calls upon local citizens who travel roads in the community to call attention to the department's plan of action for Rockcastle and to emphasize the state's "spring offensive" which is the new approach to locating problems on Kentucky's state roads.

Certificate of Need for local hospital rejected

A proposal was rejected by the Kentucky Certificate of Need and Licensure Board to renovate space of a three bed Intensive Care Unit/Coronary Care Unit plus three acute care beds at the Rockcastle County Hospital.

The proposal was the only one rejected at the May 19 meeting during which 37 proposals affecting health, services and facilities across the state were reviewed. Thirty-one proposals were approved, one was withdrawn and four were approved with stipulations to be met before certificates of need are issued.

The local hospital project which was expected to cost \$316,651, was disapproved because of criterion relating to need and accessibility and cost, economic feasibility and resources available.

The plan, according to Dave Byers, district manager, calls upon local citizens who travel roads in the community to call attention to the state department about dangerous situations, needed "spring drainage projects on state highways."

Byers said in situations which are hazardous, such as a downed stop sign, the project will be corrected the same day the complaint is made.

If the situation is not dangerous, it will be worked into the general work schedule. All complaints are registered with the district office in Somerset on the same day they are called in.

Byers said if a complaint is made and no response is received, the

The rain that was much coveted by area farmers and gardeners during the first part of May came all at once seemingly on May 18 when approximately 3.07 inches of rain fell in about two hours.

Since then, much to the delight of most area residents, over 2 inches more of rain had fallen, making the total for May to 5.36 inches of rainfall.

The rainfall for May, 1981 was 7.96 inches and for 1980 was 3.58 for the same period.

County leases property to health department; given go ahead to impose fines for disregarding ordinances

As an early matter of business, at the June 1st meeting, the Fiscal Court voted to approve a \$9 year lease to the Rockcastle County Health Department on property which the county purchased last year for the health department with a grant.

Jerry Cox, chairman of the local health board, presently on leave on behalf of the board and said that he was not certain whether the department would decide to use the approximately \$70,000 they have in reserve to build a new structure or renovate the existing one (the old Diner Bell building).

Cox said that an architectural firm and a local builder have advised the department to tear down the structure and build a new one.

In other business, county attorney Jim Lambert read response from the state attorney general concerning the court's question about penalties for violating county garbage ordinances. According to the attorney general, counties can impose fines for putting unbagged household

or business garbage in dumpsters and for use of the dumpsters for garbage disposal by non-county residents.

The fines agreed upon were \$10 plus court costs for first offenders and \$25 plus court costs for second offenders. Court cost is \$35.

Gladys Parker, executive director of the district American Red Cross, which includes Rockcastle, Jackson and southern Madison, asked for \$500 again this year from the court to help keep the office open for this area. The magistrates voted to grant the request.

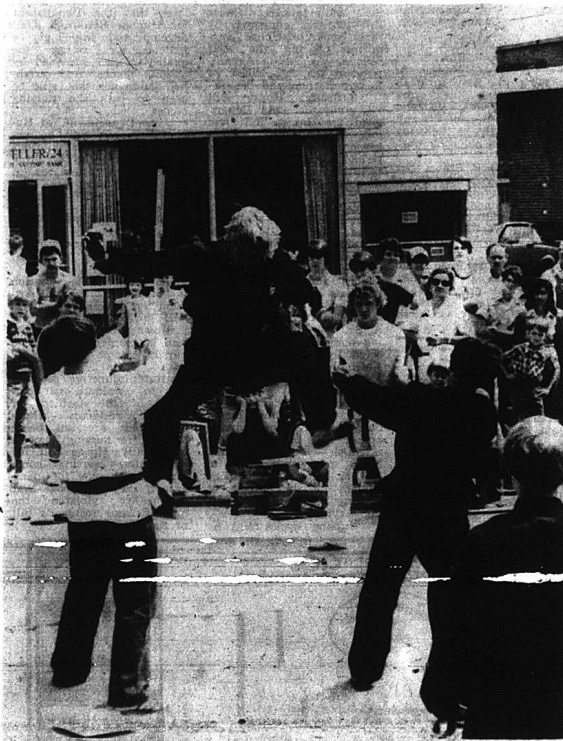
Robert Philbeck, a local builder, met with the court and requested a permanent easement across the edge of

State Legislature

 The 1982 General Assembly passed House Bill 106, the Nursing Home Reform Act. In all probability House Bill 106 was the most public discussed and written about bill ever passed by the Kentucky State Legislature.
 In addition to being thoroughly studied during the 1981 interim, House Bill 106 was addressed by three separate House committees during the 1982 session, one Senate committee and the full House of Representatives and Senate. Basically, House Bill 106 gives the state Department for Human Resources the authority to enforce new laws to protect the residents of long term care facilities, also referred to as nursing homes.
 House Bill 106 can be divided into three areas, requirements the nursing homes must fulfill, the Department for Human Resources authority to enforce these standards and provisions for nursing home residents to seek judicial remedies to ensure the protection of their civil rights. A Bill of Rights for nursing home residents was enacted by the 1980 General Assembly.
 Under House Bill 106, the state will set forth guidelines for visitation to which the nursing homes must adhere. The nursing homes will be required to establish daily visiting hours and permit access to the facilities for specified persons for the purpose of visiting, residents or offering services.
 Nursing homes will be required to conspicuously post their current license, number of beds, occupancy number, visitation statement, a list of material for public inspection and the nursing home's current state rating.
 Also, nursing homes will be required to retain, on public inspection, inspection reports for the past three years, description of services provided and rates charged.
 House Bill 106 stipulates that the Department for Human Resources shall develop and implement a system for rating the quality of care provided by nursing homes. And, establish guidelines that will be used to rate the nursing homes.
 The Department for Human Resources will be empowered to issue citations for facilities for violating nursing home standards. A system of fines has been developed which is based on the severity and frequency of violations committed by the homes. Also, the nursing homes will have the right to appeal the citations.
 Further, if the situation is warranted, the Department for Human Resources will have the authority to institute proceedings to obtain an order of removal of a nursing home to comply with state regulations, institute injunctive proceedings to terminate the operation of the facility, or transfer residents whose care needs are not being met by the nursing home.
 Finally, House Bill 106 will allow nursing home residents to sue for damages if they can prove that the nursing home resident's bill of rights.

The county library parking lot, Philbeck plans to begin a construction project near the library.
The general agreement was to grant the easement; however, magistrates and the judge made arrangements to meet Philbeck on the property and have surveyed the location of the easement.

The magistrates also agreed to grant Ikerd and Bandy Coal Company of

Somerset use of an old private road in the Bloss community, off Lane Creek Road, to strip mine, provided the road is left in as good or better shape as at present.

David Gregory asked the court if he could open an old county road which the County had previously voted to close.

Mr. Gregory said he needed a way in and out of property to which previous access was now blocked. He said he could

build a road on his property at a cost to him of \$10,000, but would prefer the county road be reopened.

The court took no action on this matter, feeling it would likely be opening the county up for a possible suit.

Amended into the budget was \$18,583.50, another payment from Wallick Construction Company on the Fairgrounds property.

At a special meeting of the Fiscal Court Tuesday, May 25, a motion was made and seconded to exercise the option for a five year lease on the county garage owned by Charles Bussell, however, after some discussion all five magistrates voted against the motion and instead voted to lease for 1 year at \$200 per month the property which consists of 1 1/4 acres and a building formerly known as the Armour Creamery located on old U.S. 25. Additional property which consists of a 1964 Chevrolet wrecker and tools also belonging to Charles Bussell, county mechanic, were leased for an additional \$100 per month.

The court voted to sell 8.54 acres joining the Brodhead Fairgrounds to Wallick Construction Company, of Columbus, Ohio for the purpose of constructing a housing project. The company's option to buy the property for \$85,400 was up in May, 1982.

Following the meeting, on Thursday, May 27, County Judge/executive Bob Jasper contacted, by phone, all five magistrates and gained approval to appropriate the first payment of \$33,569 on the property in the following manner: \$25,000-3 month Certificate of Deposit; \$10,000-6 month Certificate of Deposit; \$10,240-payment on the ambulance building and \$8,323.30 in the general fund.

was by wagon or buggy and her parents, Pop and Grandmother Tandy lived over a hundred miles away. Between the house and green gate there were some chestnut and walnut trees. We ate chestnuts till they came out our ears and we especially liked to warm them on the hearth by the fireplace and if you got one with a worm in it-no matter how hot you got the chestnut, the worm always tasted cold!

At the bottom of the hill we had a horse trough. The water came from a spring in the woods. I think the trough was a hollowed out beech tree laid crosswise the creek. The water ran over the top and made a nice little waterfall. The water was cold the year round. We kids heard that Jack Dempsey took cold showers to keep in shape so this became a must for us. We would strip off and stand under the waterfall and freeze out butts off.

Byers said the program is an effort to be of more service to the public.

461 D.J. Garland, assistant district engineer for pre-construction reported at the meeting that the portion of Ky. 461 that is to be rerouted (from Wabed toward U.S. 25) is in the process of being designed. Design engineers for this section is American Engineering of Lexington.

The section of Ky. 461 from Wabed back toward Pulaski County will be changed very little with regard to route. However, it will be widened and upgraded considerably. Design engineers for this section are Baughn-Melton of Middleboro.

The road which is scheduled for construction beginning in 1984 will feature a 24 foot surface and a 5 foot shoulder.
The estimated cost of the project is nearly \$21 million.

Resurfacing and upgrading A 6.778 mile section of U.S. 25 from Livingston to south of Burr is scheduled for resurfacing and guard-rail upgrading within the next few months.

G&G Construction of London has the contract for the \$235,470 project.

Allen Construction Company of Winchester will resurface U.S. 25 from Burr north to U.S. 150 for a stretch of 2.449 miles and cost of \$88,393.15, according to Jimmy Bryant, assistant district engineer for operations.

The project is expected to be completed this summer.

Apply now for Social Security number

Many young people in the area are planning to take their first job after school is out, and one of the most important things they have to do is to get a social security number. Bob Anderson, social security manager in Richmond said recently.

Most employers will not hire a person unless he or she has a social security number. Therefore, Anderson said, it is important to have a number before applying for a job.

A person must submit documentary evidence of his or her age, identity and citizenship or immigration status. A person 18 or older must apply in person.

The best evidence of age and citizenship is a

birth or baptismal record made before the person's fifth birthday. Immigration and Naturalization Service documents can be used to show immigration status.

Examples of evidence of identity include a driver's license, school ID card, voter's registration, school record, report card, insurance policy, membership card in youth organization, or any other document giving identifying data such as physical description, photograph or signature.

Only original documents or copies certified by the issuing agency can be used. Uncertified photocopies cannot be used. Documents are subject to verification with the agency that issued them.

Be sure to allow plenty of time to get a social security number. It may take several weeks, Anderson said. A person who has trouble locating proper evidence should contact the Richmond Social Security Office. The people there will suggest other documents that can be used.

Strawberries Juliet
(80 calories/serving)
2 1/2 cups fresh strawberries
1 cup plain yogurt
1 tbsp sugar

Crush 1/4 cup of the berries; halve remaining berries. Combine crushed berries with yogurt and sugar. Spoon halved berries into 4 sherbet glasses; top with strawberry yogurt mixture. Makes 4 servings.

Note: I just put it in a pretty glass bowl instead of using sherbet glasses.

Uncooked Strawberry Jam
2 cups crushed strawberries (1 qt.)
4 cups sugar
1 pkg. powdered pectin
1 cup water

Sort and wash fully ripe berries. Drain. Remove caps and stems; crush berries. Place prepared berries in a large mixing bowl. Add sugar, mix well and let stand for 20 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Dissolve pectin in water and boil for 1 minute. Add pectine solution to berry-and-sugar mixture; stir for 2 minutes.

Pour jam into freezer containers or canning jars, leaving 1/2 inch space at the top. Cover containers and let stand at room temperature for 24 hours or until jam has set. Yield: 5 to 6 half-pint jars.

Store uncooked jams in refrigerator or freezer. They can be held up to 3 weeks in a refrigerator or up to a year in a freezer.

This same recipe can be used with blackberries.

Strawberry Bavarian Cream
1 quart fresh strawberries
1 tbsp. lemon juice
1/4 cup sugar
2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
2 cups cream or whipped topping

Wash the strawberries, drain and hull. Mash or puree, reserving some whole berries for garnishing. Add the lemon juice and sugar to the pureed berries and stir until sugar is dissolved.

Soften the gelatin in the cold water then place in pan or heat-proof measuring cup over hot water and stir until it dissolves.

Add to the strawberry mixture. Place the bowl in ice and stir the mixture until it begins to thicken. Fold in the whipped cream carefully so that the air incorporated into the cream during the whipping is not lost.

Four 8-oz. quart mold, or eight individual molds, which has been oiled or sprayed with cooking spray. Place in refrigerator for at least two hours to become firm. Unmold and garnish with reserved strawberries. Serves eight.

"That" Strawberry Pie
1 cup sugar
3 tbsp. cornstarch
Dash salt
1 cup water
3 tbsp. strawberry gelatin
1 1/2 pts. whole strawberries

Combine sugar, cornstarch and salt in sauce pan. Slowly blend in water. Cook slowly, stirring, until clear. Remove from heat, stir in strawberry gelatin. Blend in strawberries.

Pour baked pastry shell and chill overnight or several hours. When ready to serve, garnish with whipped cream. Freeze whole strawberries may be used by increasing com-

starch to 4 tablespoons. For variation use fresh peaches and peach gelatin or fresh blackberries and blackberry gelatin.

Lemon Chess Pie
unbaked 9" pie shell
2 cups sugar
1 tbsp. flour
1 tbsp. cornmeal
4 eggs
1/4 cup butter melted
1/4 cup milk
4 tbsp. grated lemon peel
1/4 cup lemon juice

Combine sugar, flour and cornmeal in large bowl. Toss lightly with fork to mix, add eggs, butter, milk, lemon peel and lemon juice. Beat with rotary or electric beater until smooth and thorough-

ly blended. Pour in pie shell. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees) for 35 to 45 minutes or until top is golden brown. Cut pie while warm. A topping of unsweetened whipped cream can be used on top.
