## To the Taxpayers of Rockcastle County

During the past several weeks, much public attention has been focused on the financial condition of Rockcastle County. Rumors have been scattered throughout the county and some of the things that are being said are simply just not true.

1. The County Road Supervisor's salary has not been raised. It is the same as under the previous administration.
2. The Administrative Assistant's salary has not been raised. It is the same as under the previous administration.
3. The County Judge Executive did not raise his own salary. The reason it was increased was because state law says that a County Judge/Executive has to make at least as much as any other county official makes. Since the Rockcastle Co. Jailer now makes over \$28,000.00 per year, this forced the judge's salary to be increased to at least what the jailer was making.
4. Some people are complaining because the Deputy County Judge's salary has been "proposed" to be increased to \$5000.00 per year. For the past 5 months he has worked for nothing. How many of the people that are complaining would work for nothing? The ones that are complaining the loudest are the ones that are asking for, or already making, 2-3 times more than the \$5000.00. These same people are griping because the Deputy is the Judge's grandson. Just how many of the County offices in the courthouse can you go in and not find a relative working for the person elected to the office? There is nothing wrong with any elected official working a relative as long as they are qualified to do the work.
5. The Sheriff has threatened to close his doors and lay off his deputies if the Fiscal Court doesn't guarantee them a salary. Well, the Fiscal Court is already giving the Sheriff's Department \$810.00 per month and it just cannot afford to give anymore at this present time. All of the past Rockcastle County Sheriff's Departments were able to operate without a guaranteed salary and since county taxes have been increased in the past few years there should be even more money for them now, than was ever in the past.

The fact is almost all county governments across the state are having financial problems. Federal and state cutbacks are forcing all county governments to tighten their belts. The members of the Fiscal Court would like to have enough money to help everyone out, but the money is just not there. No one, including private individuals, businesses, nor county governments can spend more money than they take in.

Because of federal and state cutbacks, Rockcastle County will not have as much money to operate on this coming year as it had in the past years. Federal Revenue Sharing money has been cut back approximately \$31,000,000. The new state-installed job tax system, or what is called the Taxpayer's Choice, will have to come up with over \$30,000.00 to cover jail expenses. One of the major expenses for the coming fiscal year will be the County Ambulance Service. In past years, the federally funded CETA Program paid for the ambulance drivers' salaries. However, the federal government has cut out this program, which means that Rockcastle County will have to come up with over \$76,000.00 to pay the ambulance service employees' salaries.

This next fiscal year, starting July 1, 1982 and ending June 30, 1983, is going to be rough. Since the county has much less money to operate on, it is going to be rough. It is the responsibility of the taxpayers of Rockcastle County to take good financial management to make sure that the taxpayers of Rockcastle County continue to receive the same services they have received in the past. Efforts have already been made to make the ambulance service and road department cost efficient. The county's debt is gradually being reduced to an acceptable level. No one said the job would be easy but we are working hard to straighten out the financial condition of our county government.

We put this article in the paper because we want the taxpayers of Rockcastle County to know what the truth is. Don't pay attention to a few rumor spreaders who don't know the facts. Feel free to come talk with us and we will gladly discuss matters with you.

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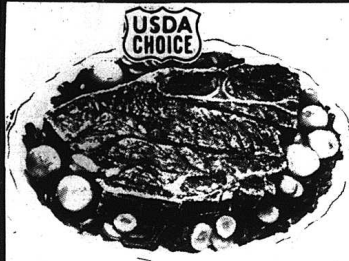

Vernon; one brother, Joe Hampton of Stanford; three sisters, Miss Juanita Hampton of Mt. Vernon, Mrs. Ericella Hedden and Mrs. Joyce Hedden, both of Andes, North Carolina.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, June 9 at the Dowell and Martin Funeral Home Chapel by Bro. Kenny Roberts. Burial was in the Maple Grove Cemetery.

## "Brodhead" - Herb Young remembers how it used to be

Part II [A continuation of last week's feature article. Herb Young, former Rockcastle resident, reflects on years he and his family spent in and near Brodhead.]

One of the biggest items of interest was watching the "K.U." progress. In the early 1900's the Kentucky Utilities, or K.U., as they were known, began laying their electric lines into eastern Kentucky. The dam and power plant was at Dix Dam on the Dix River and after we moved back to Brodhead, we used to go there sight seeing. We used to think that Dix Dam was one of the seven wonders of Kentucky. Anyway the power lines that we saw under construction was on a big hill between Brodhead and our farm. They cut a wide swatch right up the mount-

## Child Abuse Week proclaimed

Child abuse is a mistreatment or neglect of a child by a parent, guardian or other adult that causes injury or harm. Abuse can be sexual, verbal, physical or emotional.

In Kentucky, it is against the law to endanger the welfare of a child under 18 years of age. Adults who abuse or neglect children in their care are committing a Class A misdemeanor and could be fined no more than \$500 and spend up to one year in jail.

Kentucky law also makes persons who know of children who are abused or neglected responsible for reporting these incidents to the State Department for Human Resources. The department's Bureau for Social Services is the agency authorized by state law to investigate all reports of child abuse or neglect. People who do not report instances when they believe

a child has been abused or neglected are committing a Class B misdemeanor and could be jailed for a maximum of 90 days.

Failing to report instances of child abuse and neglect is against the law. More important, by not reporting abuse, you are allowing Kentucky children to continue to be mistreated.

Abuse and neglect can happen anywhere—in poor, middle class, or wealthy households. The child may be living at home or in a residential facility. One or both parents or other adults may be involved.

Signs of physical abuse are usually obvious. The child has been beaten, burned or otherwise injured. The child is abandoned or left alone without adult supervision. The child is sick and has not been taken to the doctor. The child may not be fed enough or may be forced to work too hard.

Other signs of abuse may be detected in children's behavior. They seem scared of their parents and other adults. They show signs of repeated injuries that are not treated properly and adequately explained. They may behave erratically. Often they act as parents towards brothers and sisters and even their own parents.

When you suspect or are certain that a child is being abused or neglected, you should immediately phone the Bureau of Social Services office in your county. (In Rockcastle

## State Legislature

By Sen. John Rogers

The 1982 General Assembly passed six House Concurrent Resolutions, two House Joint Resolutions, one Senate Concurrent Resolution and one Senate Joint Resolution which will serve to create study commissions or direct studies to be conducted on areas that may need to be addressed during its next regular session.

Concurrent Resolutions must be approved by both houses of the legislature and the governor. They deal with legislative organization and are used to transmit messages to other branches of government or express opinions. Any proposal for a research study to be undertaken by the Legislative Research Commission must be in the form of a concurrent resolution.

Joint Resolutions have the effect of law and are treated as bills. They are used for constitutional amendments and matters of temporary legislation.

Summaries of the aforementioned resolutions are as follows:  
Senate Joint Resolution 1 directs the Public Service Commission to study the feasibility of implementing a residential conservation service plan and other methods which assure non-discriminating utility structures for solar and renewable energy users.

House Concurrent Resolution 8 creates the Kentucky River Task Force as an advisory committee to the Legislative Research Commission on all aspects of the Kentucky River.

House Joint Resolution 46 directs the Legislative Research Commission to call a special fact study committee to oversee the collection of data on county jails and develop legislative proposals and recommendations.

House Concurrent Resolution 47 creates a Municipal Pension Study Committee to work with the Legislative Research Commission staff to develop a report and recommendations on the actual soundness and administration of city pension systems.

House Concurrent Resolution 49 directs the Legislative Research Commission to study the compensation of county magistrates, county commissioners and sheriffs.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 50 directs the Legislative Research Commission to study state employment classifications.

House Concurrent Resolution 61 directs the Kentucky Horse Park Board and staff to study the feasibility of establishing a Hall of Fame listing all aspects of the horse industry.

House Joint Resolution 62 directs the Legislative Research Commission to appoint members to serve on the Kentucky Water Management Task Force for the purpose of assisting the department of natural resources in the development of a plan for the total management of the state's water resources.

House Concurrent Resolution 63 directs the Legislative Research Commission to study the loss of farmland in Kentucky and the programs needed to prevent such loss.

**What is Farsightedness?**  
Farsightedness or hyperopia is a condition in which a person can see more clearly at far distances than at near or where extra effort is required to maintain clear focus at close distances.

**What is Presbyopia?**  
Presbyopia is a vision condition in which the eyes focusing ability has gradually decreased so that vision at a normal reading distance is blurred or difficult. This condition happens to virtually everyone as they get older.

**What is Astigmatism?**  
Astigmatism is a vision condition where objects at both distance and near may appear distorted, blurred or difficult to see.

**What is a "Lazy Eye"?**  
A "lazy" or amblyopic eye is one that because of unexplainable reasons does not see well either at close or distance. It is usually limited to only one eye and does not see as well as the other eye, no matter what correction is used.

These eye conditions are all quite common and usually can be remedied with the proper eyeglass prescriptions.

In the weeks to come, this column will cover various eye conditions and diseases and attempt to explain them in everyday language.

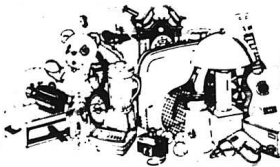

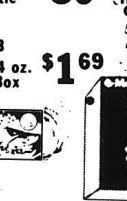

the child's name and address and the name and address of the parent or person responsible for the child's care. If you know the child's age, the extent of abuse and neglect, who is abusing the child and evidence of other instances of abuse, you should tell Social Services staff.

You may also give your name, address and telephone number, but it is not necessary. Your report will be kept confidential.

When the Bureau for Social Services receives a report of child abuse, a social worker visits the child immediately to see if abuse has occurred. If the child is in immediate danger, the Department for Human Resources may petition the court seeking temporary custody of the child. The child may be temporarily placed with relatives, in a foster home or in a child care facility while social workers counsel parents to help them prepare a safe home for the child.

If the child does not appear to be in immediate danger, the social worker will help the family resolve any problems or refer them to a family services agency.

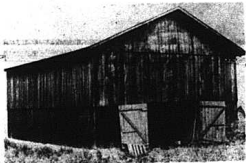

**Timely information on "bugging potatoes"**

By Nancy Mullins

This newspaper tries to supply readers with timely relevant articles especially in the area of agriculture and homemaking. Actually this bit of "how to" advice concerning what is commonly referred to as "bugging potatoes" (actually the proper term is "debugging") fits into all three categories. That is: it is timely (any gardener worth mentioning has potatoes up); it is agricultural, since it deals with growing a food crop and it has to do with making a good home since few homes could be considered "good" without potatoes. This is also a fitting article since an insect has been identified by leading

agricultural specialists in the county as the common potato beetle. Alerts have sent out indicating that as much as 50% of the potatoes now growing in local gardens may be infested. There are several ways to debug potatoes; however, due to the present state of the economy, I will mention only the most inexpensive. The first phase of the operation involves securing the killing agent, kerosene. How much kerosene one should buy depends upon how many persons are participating in the operation. Actually one cup per person, I have found, works well. The cup of kerosene should be poured into a metal or plastic container,

preferably a bucket. The actual mechanics of the operation are quite simple though a certain amount of strain will be placed upon the back or knees depending upon which position the debugger takes. The standing-bent position is the best for all practical reasons. Starting at the beginning (or end) of a row give each vine a good slap toward you with the other hand holding the bucket of kerosene near the ground and turned in the direction of the vine so as to catch as many bugs as possible. One can see the benefit of a large opening on the container one chooses. Those bugs which are knocked off but do not happen to fall into the

pockets. I remember George telling me not to eat any, but I believe he took more than any of us.

We had a little problem that was probably common to country schools at that time, especially in winter. Lots of kids had head lice. Most everyone wore toboggans in winter and I reckon that's why they were a good place for them to hide. Anyway, we had a regular ritual at night at the farm. One time we would sit in a chair with a newspaper on the floor at our feet and Mule would take a fine white comb, dip it in kerosene and comb the lice out of our hair. They would fall on the floor and the nearest kid would stomp them.

The Brodhead Fair lasted three days and our family always managed to go one day.

Along with the carnival there were many things of interest. The balloon ramp was a big attraction. They would fill the balloon with hot air and when it was released with a man seated it would go straight up and the man would jump out with a parachute. The feller never did land near the fair and we always speculated that he landed in a tree somewhere or on a freight train and got carried away.

The mule race was the most exciting event. About 20 guys on mules lined up on the race track and each one had a barrel stave to urge his mule on. A shot was fired and the race began. Some mules were running real fast, then they would start bucking and a few jumped the fence, some got all the way around and turned and ran the wrong way and some just stood there and watched the others. Usually, about half of them actually finished the race.

The fairgrounds were just outside Brodhead on the Mt. Vernon road. It was a dirt road and especially at fair time it got pretty dusty. There were wagons, cars, trucks, bu-

gys, bicycles, motorcycles with side cars, people on horse and mule back and some people just walking.

Everyone was excited and seemed like they just couldn't wait to get there. Most everyone took food with them to have a picnic on the grounds. Most of the rides and the shows cost a dime.

The main events were viewed from the grandstand. The race track was 1/4 mile around and had a white fence around it. Here they had the trotter, the pacer and, of course, the mule races.

Along with the rides, concession stands and shows, there were some wild animals in cages. I remember in particular a male lion (The first I had ever seen.) A man jabbed him with a pole and the lion would throw himself against the bars of the cage and roar. There were snakes in boxes and chickens thrown in the air with the promise of seeing a Boa Constrictor eat a live chicken.

All too soon it would be time to go home. Cows had to be milked and all livestock had to be fed but the Brodhead Fair would not be forgotten and even now after the many years of not attending, I can still hear the music and smell the popcorn and hear the "bars" and feel the excitement of that wonderful fair for country kids.

kerosene which kills them immediately (a painless death), should be stomped. Here one can see the benefit of standing-bent rather than the knees in the dirt position or squatting.

If bugs are left on the ground unstomped, they will eventually crawl back onto the potato vine, eating

the leaves and causing small potatoes, or none at all.

This method is recommended over spraying with chemical since many feel chemicals are unsafe and since it is a more "sure-fire" and humane death for bugs.

To avoid sweat bees and overexposure to the sun, this project should be carried on every other night or every other morning for at least 5 or 6 weeks or until the vines die.

This is (or at least "was" back in the "old days"), used as a type of punishment for children who, bored or suffering from summer heat, fell to arguing, griping about nothing to do or constantly messed the house up. I would advise area children to keep a low profile lest this fate befall you.

### MINING PERMITS ISSUED IN APRIL

The division of permits in the state Department for natural Resources and Environment. Protection issued 266 mining permits during the month of April.

The number and types of permits issued included 179 original permits, 39 revision permits and 48 continuation permits, including amendment, renewal, re-permits and succession permits.

Of the total issued, 158 permits were for surface-mining operations, 82 for underground-mining operations, 20 for preparation plants and refuse areas and 6 for haul roads.

Permitting activities in April authorized the disturbance of 8,805.9 new acres of land and resulted in the collection of \$474,065 in fees.

Permits issued for Rockcastle County in April were:

Pre-plant, 6.5 acres, permit issued to Benle Coal Corp. of Middlesboro.

Surface mining, 18.3 acres, permit issued to Denham and Lewis Corporation of Lexington.

Surface mining, 6 acres, permit issued to Mallicoate Coal Company of Mt. Vernon.

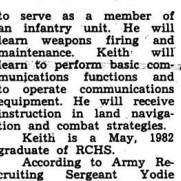

EXTENSION HOME ECONOMICS

What's Happening to Milk June is Dairy month. Milk that is derived from special recognition, not just once a year, but the year round.

Gone are the days when the family had plenty of milk only when "old boss" or grandpa was plentiful. Modern day refrigeration and refrigerators have made this possible for most families every day of the year.

If you are a farm family or simply like to grow your own food, you can keep a milk cow. Drinking raw milk or milk that has not been pasteurized is risky.

One half gallon of milk taken from a 40 degree temperature and placed in a 90 degree temperature warms up 12 hours in an hour or 65 degrees in two hours.

It takes eleven hours to cool the milk from 56 degrees back down to 40 degrees. Temperature control is important to good quality milk.

Chlorine in water is a good sanitizer. (The dairy chlorine acts fast whereas the household bleach will require a few minutes to activate the sterilization process).

8. Iodine-tear dip after milking prevents bacteria from entering the udder through the teat.

9. Don't add warm milk to milk that has been cooled.

10. A brush for cleaning milking buckets, etc. is better than a cloth.

11. Vinegar used with or without the test of three months will prevent mineral deposits called milk stones from building up in milking utensils.

12. Milk should be cooled to below 40 degrees Fahrenheit.

13. Cream for making butter should be pasteurized for preventing the spread of diseases and to prolong keeping quality.

14. If milk from the dairy is to be good, it must have the proper care in the store and at home. The refrigerator should have a temperature of 40 degrees or below. It should be kept in a close container.

15. If you have your own milk, how do you make it safe? The surest way is to pasteurize the milk. A good pasteurizer may cost from \$50.00-\$85.00, but there are other precautions which will insure for a cleaner milk supply.
